## ALAN L BEAN BOULEVARD DEDICATION SPACE TRAVELER BARBECUE IS FRIDAY

### PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, Captain Alan L. Bean, a NASA astronaut, holds the distinction of being the fourth man to set foot on the surface of the moon, and

WHEREAS, Captain Bean, a member of the third group of astronauts selected by NASA in October, 1968, was born in Wheeler on March 15, 1932, and

WHEREAS, the City of Wheeler has received much newspaper and television publicity with each of Capt. Bean's historic fetes, and

WHEREAS, Capt. Bean's continued work in the Space Program will bring about added publicity and recognition for the City of Wheeler,

WHEREFORE, I, as Mayor of the City of Wheeler, do hereby proclaim Friday, September 4, 1970, as

**CAPTAIN ALAN L. BEAN DAY,**

and urge each of you to be present and extend your personal congratulations to Capt. Bean at the dedication of Alan L. Bean Boulevard at the corner of 111 East Texas and Alan L. Bean Boulevard at 7:00 p.m. and the "Space Traveler Barbecue" at Nicholson Field at 7:00 p.m.

### FRIDAY, SEPT. 4 PROCLAIMED ALAN L. BEAN DAY

Alan L. Bean, (Commander, USN) NASA Astronaut, will return to his place of birth Friday, September 4, 1970, for the official dedication of a street named in his honor. Following the dedication at 6:00 p.m. a barbecue is slated to be held at Nicholson Field.

To honor Capt. Alan L. Bean on his first visit to Wheeler since he was three months old. Friday, September 4, 1970 has been proclaimed "Captain Alan L. Bean Day" in Wheeler by Mayor Pete Burton. The citizens of Wheeler are asked to fly their flags on that day.

The name of Shamrock St. will be officially changed with the street dedication scheduled for 6:00 at the corner of Texas and Shamrock. Street signs have been ordered and will be in place at that time for the 13 block length of the street.

The dedication of Alan L. Bean Boulevard will be held at the corner of Texas and Highway 83 in front of the

Wheeler County Historical Museum. Serving as master of ceremonies will be Judge

Grainger McIlhany. Judge McIlhany will introduce Mayor Pete Burton, who will

in turn present the Key to the City to Capt. Alan L. Bean.

The dedicatory speech will be given by Thomas Daughtry, manager of the local Ben Franklin Store and former Wheeler mayor. Following the speech by Mr. Daughtry, the street sign will be unveiled.

The 100 block of East Texas will be roped off for the dedication.

At 7:00 barbecue will be served at Nicholson Field. Judge McIlhany will resume his duties at the barbecue. A plaque commemorating the dedication of the street will be presented to the guest of honor, Capt. Alan L. Bean before he makes the evening address.

### STORES TO CLOSE EARLY

The stores in Wheeler will close at 5:00 p.m. Friday, September 4 for the street dedication.

Signs will be placed on the four roads leading to Wheeler welcoming people to Wheeler, birthplace of Astronaut Alan L. Bean. The signs are 4 x 8 with white letters on a dark blue background. The signs are to be in place by September 4.

Capt. Alan L. Bean, USN, was a member of the third group of astronauts selected by NASA; his destination was the moon. Capt. Bean served as the lunar module pilot for the flight of Apollo XII, which was in flight November 14-24, 1969; he walked on the moon—the fourth man to set foot on the moon—November 19, 1969.

Capt. Bean has logged a total of 244 hours and 36 minutes of space flight, 31 hours and 31 minutes on the surface of the moon—of which 7 hours and 45 minutes were spent in lunar EVA.

Tickets are available at the City Office or may be purchased from any of the City Councilmen. The tickets are \$3.00 each.

Thomas Daughtry, owner and manager of the Ben Franklin Store, is given credit for the suggestion to change the street name to honor Capt. Bean. In the November, 1969 meeting of the council, it was decided to change the street name. Capt. Bean's parents lived at 605 S. Shamrock at the time of his birth.

Capt. Bean was born in the Wheeler Hospital March 15, 1932; the hospital was located at the time over the City Drug. Baby Bean's stay in Wheeler was a short three months. Bean moved with his parents to Ft. Worth where the parents still reside.

## FIRST NATIONAL BANK STOCK SALE COMPLETE

Charles R. Brown of Memphis Is Named President, Adrian Risner Is Vice-Pres.

R. J. Holt, President of First National Bank announced today completion of the sale of stock in the bank to J. W. Bell of Pampa, who represents a group of Wheeler businessmen and invest-

Wheeler; J. W. Campbell, rancher, Pampa; Ed Daughtry, President of First State Bank, Canadian; Joe Gordon, attorney, Pampa; Robert (Chuck) Hogan, rancher-farmer, Wheeler; Loyd Lee, Merchant-rancher, Wheeler; Harry Wafford, County Clerk, Wheeler; and Jess Moore, farmer, Wheeler.

Mr. Adrian Risner was elevated to the post of Vice-president and Cashier and was also elected secretary to the Board of Directors. Mr. Risner is a native of Wheeler and has been with the bank for 17 years.

No other changes in the bank staff is anticipated according to Mr. Campbell.

The bank was founded on August 11, 1908, opening that day in temporary quarters in the northwest corner of the old wooden courthouse building. Mr. R. J. Holt attended the opening with his father, Mr. D. E. Holt, who was the first cashier of the bank and owned the first share of stock, certificate No. 1. Mr. E. E. Holt, who was D. E. Holt's uncle, was the first president of the bank and remained in that capacity until June 2, 1924 when he was succeeded by Mr. J. M. Porter who served in that post until August 8, 1936. Mr. J. M. Porter was one of the original stockholders and was in the founding of the bank with the Holts.

Mr. D. E. Holt then became president of the bank and remained in that capacity until his death in May of 1953.

R. J. first started to work in the bank February 1922 and became president July 14, 1953. His reputation as a top notch banker is recog-

nized throughout the banking fraternity.

Mr. Holt states that he is not retiring, but will merely be able to devote more time to his many and diversified interests throughout the area.

## 'OLD SETTLERS' TO GATHER AT OLD JAIL IN MOBETTIE SEPT. 7

Wheeler County "Old Settlers" will gather at the old Jail in old Mobettie for their 20th annual consecutive reunion on Labor day, September 7, 1970.

Wheeler County was the first one organized in the Panhandle in 1879 and jurisdiction over what is now 26 counties was transferred from Henrietta, Clay County, to the new County. The old jail was the first

substantial one constructed in the Panhandle and was completed in 1886.

Wheeler County residents and business concerns furnish free barbecue, beans, and coffee. Local ladies bring cakes, pies, salads, etc. All old settlers and former residents of Wheeler County and their friends are urged to attend, and enjoy a day of good entertainment and visiting.

Editor's Note: Mrs. Jack (Margie) Jones watched all the commotion on the television Wednesday, August 26, about "Women's Liberation" and wishes to express her feelings on the matter. Margie came to the United States from Berlin, Germany in 1961 and became a citizen on June 3, 1966.

Women were equal with men in Germany in 1945-48. Our fathers and husbands were still somewhere in prison camps. We lost a war but life had to go on even without our men.

So we took their place. We started to clean our city up. We scraped bricks—saving the ones that could be used and pushed wheelbarrows filled with rocks.

We wore men's pants (at this time women did not wear slacks) and boots. We shoveled dirt and our hands had calluses.

Oh yes, we were equal. We didn't have time to go to a beauty salon. We even forgot what lipstick was, as make-up was nonsense. Our

faces got so dirty you could not have seen it anyway.

We learned the language of men.

When the men came back, we were willing and happy to give them their jobs and responsibility back. Slowly we changed back to the feminine types.

I love being a woman and enjoy being treated like one. No, I don't want to be equal; it's bad enough that I have to mow my lawn and take the trash out—that is as equal as I care to be.

I wonder if the women that cry for liberation and equality would like to go to Viet Nam or work in a coal mine.

God made woman for man; she was to be a fit helper. That's what I like to be, a helpmate for my man.

## Across the Fence

 Maize crops are coming along real well in some parts of the county. Leo Lamb of Wheeler, says that it's been his observation that deep plowed land has the best crops on them also the key to the better maize crop was rain coming at the right time. Because rain doesn't always come at the right time, interest in irrigation is high in a drought year. Johnnie Burrell, Twitty, has just completed a new well when we were by there last week. It looks like it's going to be a good one. Johnnie plans to use the water on alfalfa and grass. We believe that watering grass would make a real profitable venture for a man with cattle. Several people are doing this and they're raising cattle cheaply. With sparse grazing, mama cows aren't milking and calves are lighter. To overcome this, some producers are creep feeding their calves. Creep feeding is a management tool in the production of calves that depends on the judgement of the individual cattleman for its success. The ultimate goal is to increase profit. In most tests run on creep feeding, figures are on the wrong side of the profit ledger for calves on good pasture. Increased value of feeder calves is seldom enough to pay for the additional feed and labor. Performance testing shows that the average creep-fed calf gains one-tenth of a pound more per day than his non-creep-fed counterpart. This amounts to 25 pounds at weaning. However, if put-on cost is greater than the sale price, profits are lost. The practice of creep feeding varies widely from farm to farm. If profits are to be

gained, the herd manager must pay close attention to several factors. Feeders should be placed where the herd congregates, such as near water or shade. A ready supply of clean, fresh, inexpensive feed is a must at all times. Winter creep-fed calves will probably need a ration containing 14 to 15 percent protein. In summer on pasture, a protein content of 12 percent is sufficient. In view of the present situation, creep feeding might offer better possibilities than in the more normal years. Stockmen interested in more information on the subject are invited to contact us for a copy of B-792, "Creep Feeding Beef Calves." **GARDENING** Late summer is the time to repot house plants, but soil as it comes from the garden is not usually suitable for the potting job. Mix two parts of good garden loam,

two parts peat humus or shredded peat moss and one part of sand. Well rotted manure or shredded leaf mold may be substituted for the peat humus. This type of mixture, provides the three most needed conditions for potted plants—support, good soil aeration and ability to hold water and plant nutrients. After the potting mixture is prepared, it should be placed in a shallow pan less than six inches deep, then moistened and placed in a preheated oven at 180 degrees F. for 30 minutes. Clay pots should be thoroughly washed and placed in the oven. This heat treatment will kill a sease and insect organisms and weed seed. But, don't sterilize plastic pots, just wash them with hot water. Use clean tools and keep the hands clean when doing the potting job or the soil may be reinfected with harmful organisms. Of course, there is always an easier way to do the job; go to the garden supply center and buy a prepared mix.

After a discussion the 1970-71 school year budget was adopted as follows: 100 Administration - \$27,533.00, 200 Instruction - \$183,893.00, 400 Health Services - \$100.00, 500 Pupil Transportation - \$15,100.00, 600 Operation of Plant - \$24,800.00, 700 Maintenance of Plant - \$3,750.00, 800 Fixed Charges - \$2,400.00, 900 Food Services - \$2,500.00, 1000 Student Body Activities - \$5,000.00, 1200 Capital Outlay - \$3,000.00, 1300 Debt Services - \$7,166.00. The total being \$325,462.00.

The tax rate for 1970-71 was set at \$1.85 per hundred valuation, (same as 1969-70) of which \$1.37 per hundred valuation allocated to local maintenance and \$.48 per hundred valuation allocated to service bonds.

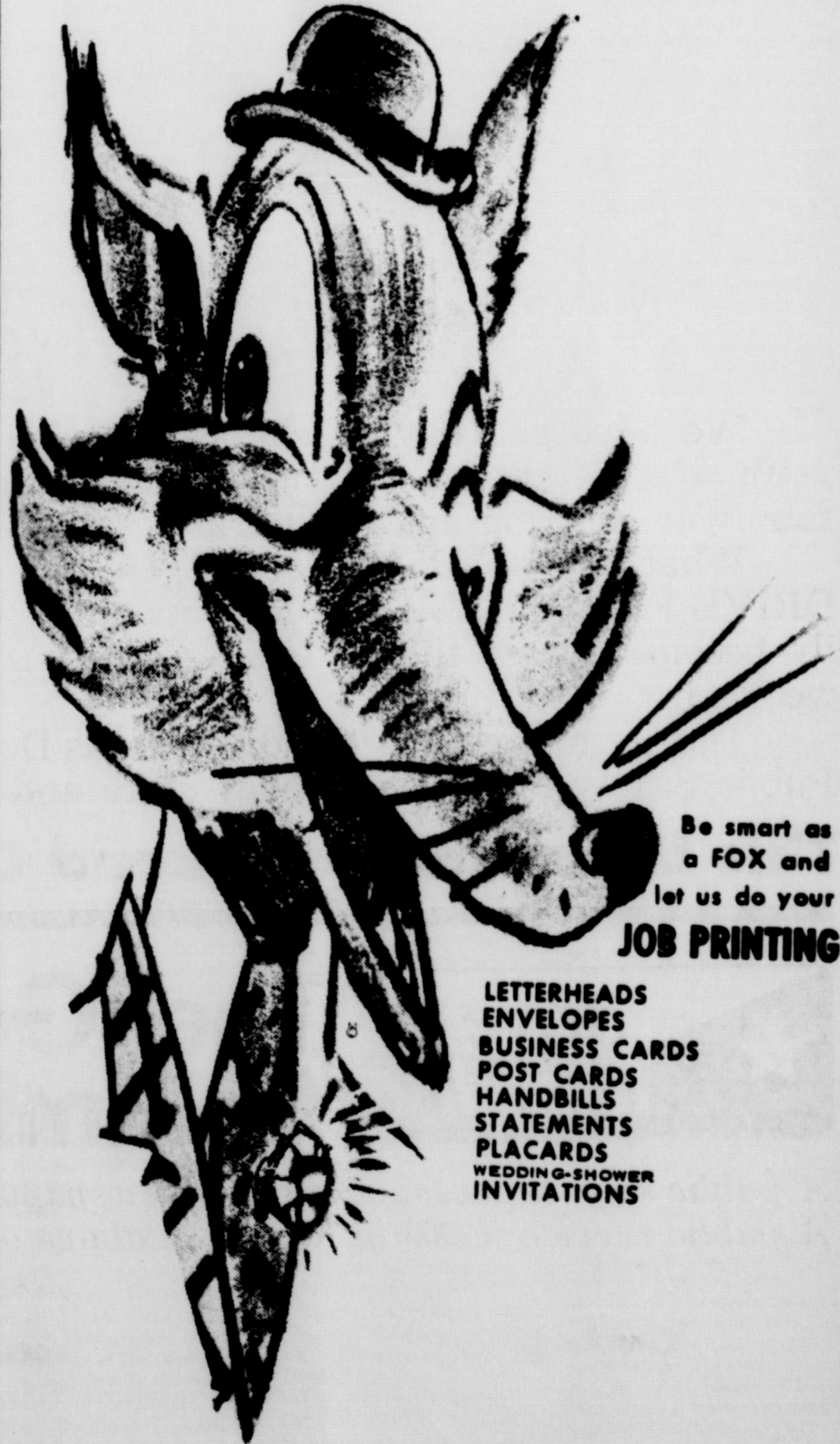

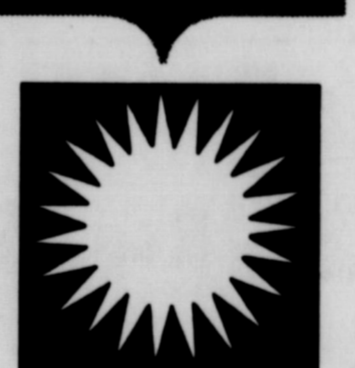

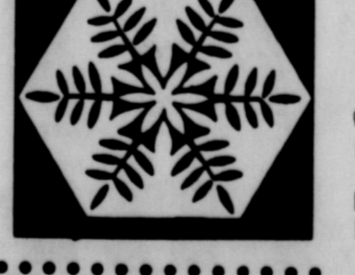
