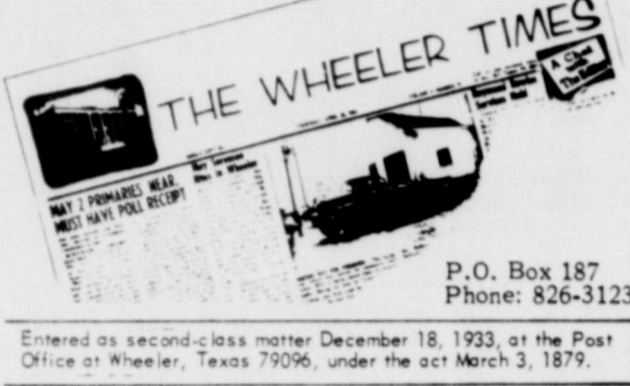

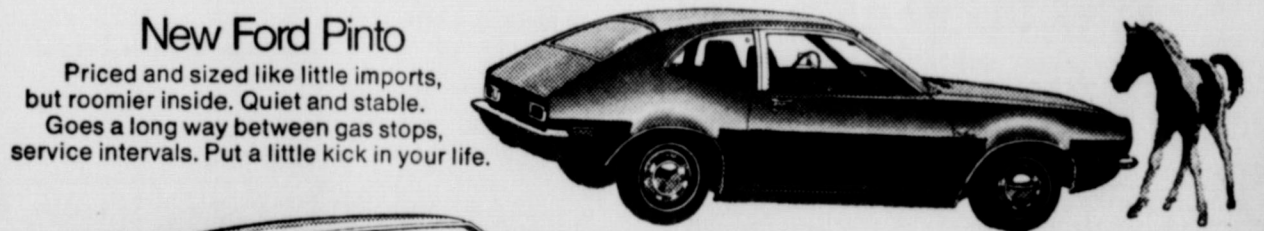



Zone 2 voters in the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation district will elect a farmer or rancher who will serve as their supervisor and representative on the Soil Conservation District Board for the next five years. The Northern boundary of subdivision 2 or Zone 2 is the same as the southern boundary of the Pagan Precinct and Wheeler Precinct. The southern boundary is the Collingsworth County line. The eastern boundary is the Oklahoma line from the dirt road east of Kelton southward to the Collingsworth County line. The Western boundary is the Gray County line from road one mile north of U.S. Hwy 66 southward to the Collingsworth County line. Shamrock, Twitty and part of the Kelton Community are located in Zone 2.

A qualified voter is a Zone 2 landowner who is over 21 years of age or older. Wives of eligible landowners can vote and should do so since they have an interest in their soil conservation district.

BEEF CATTLE NUTRITION
The major mineral problem in Texas is the lack of phosphorus. Phosphorus deficiency reduces the calf crop and those born weigh less at weaning time. When green grazing is available, so is phosphorus ordinarily, but when the grass is brown, this mineral declines very rapidly. One practical way besides putting out a high phosphorus mineral block is to keep bonemeal out the year round in a weather protected trough.

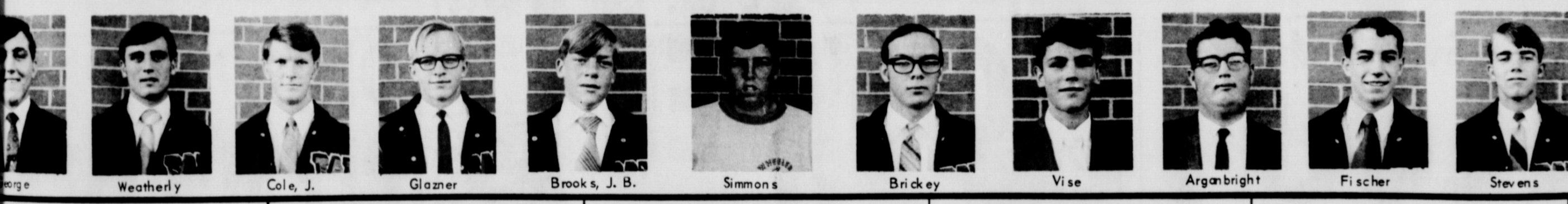

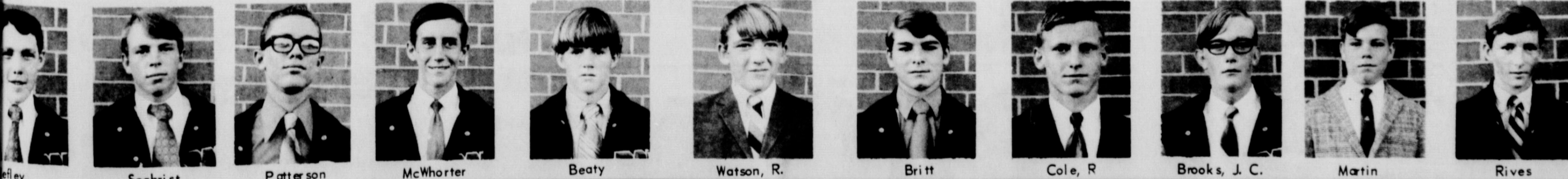

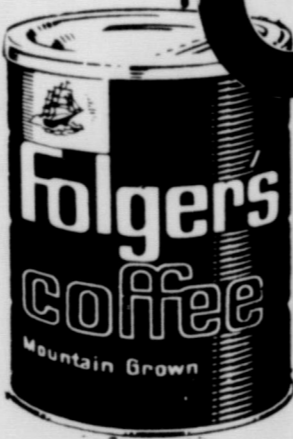
