There was an extra-large turnout at the Grazing Management Conference Tuesday night in the Kelton School Gym according to Max W. Hatter, County Agent. About 250 people attended the program and free barbecue spon so red by the Wheeler County Farm Bureau, Wheel er Chamber of Commerce and Shamrock Chamber of Commerce.

Master of Ceremonies for the evening was Bill Brooks. District Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service.

James Reneau, Shamrock, introduced the first speaker of the evening, Mr. Frank Tidwell, the Agricultural Advisor for the Security State Bank of Chevenne, Okla, who gave a very in teresting and informative discussion of weeping love grass entitled, Over 200 Cow Unitson 480 Acres of Weeping Lovegrass." Mr. Tidwell's story was that of a Rodger Mill's County farm er who started with a field of shinnery and put in a lot of work to convert it into a lush field of weeping love grass. Tidwell brought along supporting slides which showed the land before, during preparations and as it is today - a very profitable venture for the farmer.

Max Hatter, County Agent, then presented slides on Wheeler County's demonstration of Weeping Lovegrass. The plot is located south of town on Mr. Verbon Smith's place. The story was some what the same here. The ground was a shinnery patch only two years ago. Mr. Smith cleared it out and planted Ermelo Weeping Lovegrass on the plot. In April of this year a demonstration was set up on this area. Thirty heifer cows were put in after a corral and cross fencing with a was completed. Fertilizer was applied in April and

central watering location July and the stubble was mowed once during the four month period. In April the calves gained an average of 169 lbs. beef per acre. In May, 50 pounds. In June because of the drouth the stocking rate was cut to 10 which was still a very decent stocking rate. view work is arecognition of superior academic achievement and an unusual educational opportunity. Students who rank at the top of their class are invited to serve as Law Review candidates. After completion of apublishable article, candidates become members of the Law Review staff, moving up to positions on the Board of Editors Members edit and supervise the work of fellow board members and of new candidates.

Texas Tech's Law Review published its first two issues in the 1969-70 academic year. The fall 1970 issue-Volume 2, Number 1- is scheduled for distribution in November to more than 600 subscriber sprincipally for libraries of other law schools and of attorneys.

The fall 1970 issue will contain lead articles by Chief Justice John Brown of the Fifth Circuit U.S. Court of Appeals and Texas Tech Law Prof. Reed Quilliam. Also included will be approximately four student notes and 12 case comments. all written by the student

members of the Law Review. Sims, who married the former Twyla Standlee, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Standlee of Knox City, Texas, is a second year law student. He was graduated from Texas Tech last year. Sims has been on the dean's list and was president of the student chapter of the American Society of Civil Engineers. Mr. Mannins said the year begun July 1 appears certain to set a record in the rural housing program. The agen cy is geared to virtually double its housing services, with \$1 4billion in authority nationally to insure home loans for families of low and moderate income.

Key to the program's rapid growth is a new position of equality for rural America in the nation shousinggoal, Mr. Manning said. Rural areas have half of the na tion's bad housing, and they now have half of the nation's housing goal for the 1970's.

We expect the sharp up trend in rural housing to continue. In the Farmers Home Administration, we fully expect to do our part in bringing rural housing up to modern standards for every family.

Mr. Manning said progress in rural housing has been speeded up through new authorizations put into ef fect by Farmers Home ear lier this year. We now make loans to rural home si te development organi za tions and we work with rural builders to assure that homes they build on a multiple basis will meet quality standards for Farmers Home lo an in sur ance. The County Supervisor

asserted that the rural hous ing program is one of the main channels pouring private capital into rural community progress. Farmers Home Administration insured loans serve families or organizations unable to secure home fin an cing through other sources.

Eligibility covers people of low and moderate income, including senior citizens, in rural towns of not more than 5,500 people, plus farm and non farm residents of the country side. If a loan cannot be covered by a local lending institution, Farmers Home advances the loan from a revolving fund, then finds an investor elsewhere to take over the government-insured loan note.
