

The Wheeler Chamber of Commerce held its Annual Installation Banquet at the Wheeler Cafeteria Monday evening, January 11. David Cross, owner and manager of Garrison Service wasinstalled into the office of President.

Sam A. Thomas, Jr., Agriculture Development Manager with Southwestern Public Service of Amarillo, was the speaker for the evening. Mr. Thomas told of the changes in agriculture he has seen in the Texas Panhandle in the past 24 years. Mr. Thomas and his wife were residents of Mobeetie from 1946 through 1957.

One of the first major changes in agriculture Mr. Thomas witnessed was the introduction of irrigation to the great plains. Irrigation increased production and operation costs.

The most recent change has been the introduction of cattle feeding both small and large operations. Mr. Thomas predicts the feedlot operation will continue to grow and develop into a belt from Lubbock, Texas to Nebraska. Each week bringsnew inquiries from packers concerning the location of a plant.

The Wheeler Chamber presents an award each year to the outstanding area farmer. The award this year was presented to Paul Hathaway of Mobeetie. Mr. Hathaway began his farming operation in 1961 and at the present time he manages 2, 187 acres. Part of the land is under irrigation. Mr. Hathaway deals in wheat, cotton, alfalfa, milo, feed hay, cattle and swine. Hathaway helped to organize the first Mobeetie 4-H and FFA Fat Stock Show and is active leader in both 4-H and FFA. Paul Hathaway is a member of the Mobeetie School Board.

N. D. Ware, Jr. retired from office as Chamber President along with directors Garland Abernethy and John Manning.





Across the Fence

This is one of the coldest Januaries we've had the pleasure of experiencing. Cattlemen had to break thick layers of ice for several days. By the way, this is very important because a lot of animals are hurt by dehydration when a cold snap stays around First Natl Bk Wheeler 12-30- like that one did.

A lot folks are asking about the new farm program. We haven't heard when the signup will begin but do have some of the facts on the new program. Since we received about \$900,000 each year under the old cotton program, lets look at the new program. What about the new cotton

program? This part of the 1970 Agricultural Act is completely different from the program we have been operating under. As we understand it, any farmer, new or old, can plant cotton and self it on the domestic market along with farmers

that comply with the law. Penalties for overplanting have been suspended. Payments, which will run 35 cents per pound, will be increased by 30% for small farmers if the producer meets certain requirements. The preliminary payment made sometime after July 1 will be 15¢ per pound. Your allotment will be lost if you don't plant 90% of your allotment for 3 years. In the past, farmers with 10 acres or less could draw payments without planting. So under the new program you must plant at least 90% of your allotment to receive payments. Under the old program, a referendum had to be called and 2/3 of the cotton producers approve the sale, lease and transfer of cotton allotments out of the country. Under the new program, you can sell, lease transfer your allotment out of the comty. Under the new program, you can sell, lease or transfer your allotment out of the county with the approval of the ASC County Committee. Your 1971 allotment will more

ceive any payments for the

set aside acres. After you meet the set-aside requirements, you can overplant your allotment and the cotton produced on that overplanted acreage is eligible to be placed in the loan. As we see it, you have three choices. You may (1) plant 90% of your allotment, (2) 100% of your allotment or (3) you may plant the entire farm to cotton less the conserving base and set aside

The following are possible alternatives under the program: We will assume a farmer owns 300 acres. He has a 100 acre cotton allotment. 20 acres of conserving base and 180 acres of other crop land.

Alternative One: Plant 100 acres of solid cotton, set;a-side 20 acres of other of conserving base.

Alternative two: Plant 2 acres of solid cotton, set. a-side 20 acres of other cropland, maintain 20 acre of conserving base.

Alternative three: Plant 100 acres of 2x1 skip row (150 actual acres) set-a-side 20 acres of other cropland, maintain 20 acres of conserving base and pla 110 acres to solid cotton a

other crops. Alternative four: Plant 100 acree of any skip row pattern, designate the skip as set-a-side acreage, mai tain 20 acres of conserving base, plant the remainder cropland, to cotton or other crops.

Alternative five: Any cor bination of the above as la as 40 acres are maintained in some eligible conservin

Alternative Six: Sell lear or release the cotton acres Use the entire 300 acres in any way you wish even to planting 300 acres in any you wish even to planting 300 acres of cotton.
