Set-Aside Farm Programs

The set-aside feature of 1971 farm programs for feed grain, wheat, and cotton should help producers concentrate on the crops they can produce best, according to Louis Grayson, County Executive Director of the Wheeler Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

Under the new programs, a producer agrees to set aside a pre-determined number of acres of crop land from production and devote it to approved soil-conserving uses. He then can plant his remaining crop land to any crop he wishes except for sugar cane and for quota crops such as peanuts, tobacco, rice and extra long stable cotton.

In this way, Grayson said, a farmer can plant the crops that he prefers to grow and which give him his best net returns. Agricultural specialists who helped develop the new programs point out that this greater freedom to plant will eventually lead to the concentration of certain crops in areas of the country where they can be grown most efficiently. They expect more corn production concentrated in the Corn Belt, more small grains in the Great Plains, more soybean production in the Southeast, and an expansion of cotton production in the

most efficient areas. One of the basic ideas behind the set-aside feature, according to Grayson, is that producers in all of these areas can be better off because they will be producing the crop they grow best as a lower cost. He added that some farmers for years have been locked into certain patterns of producing their crops because of the acreage control features of past programs. A farmer who had allotments or bases for several crops was encouraged to grow them, and this discouraged specialization which could lead to production. The set-aside idea seems to fit with trends that have been building in farming over the years. These include the trend in which American farms have grown fewer in number and larger in size, and the trend for producers to become more efficient and more productive. The efficient, competitive producer will be in the best position to take advantage of growing world demands for farm products, Grayson said.

New Conservation Program Offered

The new Rural Environmental Assistance Program (REAP) for 1971, emphasizing a broad attack on the environmental problems created by the Nation's farming operations, was announced today by Secretary of Agriculture Clifford M. Hardin.

Announcement of the new program, formerly known as the Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP), permits resumption of the Federal cost-sharing of various beneficial conservation practices with farmers, but under a restructured program in line with modern day needs to better both the on and off-farm environment. It makes farmers partners in the venture between the Federal government and State, city and local governments to deal with the pressing problem of pollution.

"The restructured program will be used to help preserve our environment, demonstrate good environmental enhancement practices, and return more public benefits at less public cost," Secretary Hardin pointed out.

Although the specific level of funding for 1971 has not been determined, the 1971 program will be funded, and the Congress will be requested by the Administration to provide funds for the 1972 program, the Secretary said.

Emphasis on the farm side will be on those practices contributing the most to the improvement of conditions for both the general public and farmers. Major considerations in authorizing cost sharing of any practice installation will be the resulting public benefits such as pollution abatement, enduring soil and water conservation, recreation, wildlife, and open space as well as the degree of permanency achieved. As a result, the practices offered under the program have been structured to provide enduring benefits, significant pollution control, and enhancement of the environment for all.

A major thrust will be to reduce water pollution which results in large part from agricultural, industrial and municipal wastes. Water retaining and retarding measures on farms such as dams and ponds, permanent grass cover, waterways, buffer strips, and tree plantings will be stressed. These will be directed toward reducing silt in streams, rivers, lakes

and other bodies of water and toward reducing pollution from animal wastes, fertilizers and pesticides. Off-farm benefits will be promoted by concentrating funds to solve community environmental problems through special projects and pooling agreements. Under these, for example, the funds available to a community could be used exclusively to get permanent cover and other water control measures on farmland in a watershed to reduce the build-up of silt in a municipal water supply reservoir.

Under the program, the Federal government will pay about 50% of the cost practices that achieve permanent benefits. Practices that provide temporary benefits will be available only under certain circumstances and at a reduced level of Federal cost-sharing. Practices that are good farming techniques that should be performed routinely and practices that are income-producing to the farmer will be de-emphasized in favor of those having benefits for all citizens.

The program will be run in each county or parish by locally elected farmer committees. Under broad Federal and State guidelines, the committees will select the practices best suited for meeting the needs of their area; determine which farm land needs treatment; and within the county's allocation of funds fix the amount of cost sharing to be provided each farmer. Thus, the program provides for a high degree of local determination. The 1971 program will reflect changes desired by the President and, consistent with a House-Senate conference report, will make provision for continuation of 1970 program practices and procedures at the option of county committees. It recognizes that privately-owned land is a major source of pollution, but that good management of this land can also be a major factor in improving living conditions for all citizens. By sharing the cost, the program will enable farmers to undertake measures that their limited resources would not otherwise permit. Recommendations will go to the Congress during the next few months to modify the program's basic legal authority.

The cows gained 1 1/2 pounds each day the past month. We were pleased because for four days straight the drinking trough was frozen and ice had to be broken. We believe now that we have twice as much grass as we need to last until spring.

1971 4-H and FFA Livestock Show—Well, the Wheeler County pig Show is now called the Wheeler County Livestock Show. We have eight 4-H steers and heifers and 41 hog entries not counting the FFA entries from the high schools. This looks like the largest number of 4-H entries we have ever had for the livestock show.

Half of the entries are from Mobeetie. Other entries are from Wheeler, Allison, and Shamrock. The Wheeler Chamber of Commerce sponsors the show. The Production Credit offices and the Wheeler County Farm Bureau furnish ribbons and trophies.
