

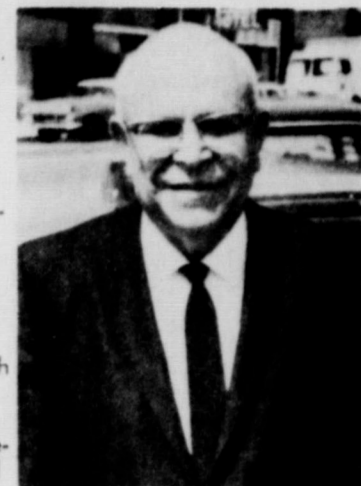
MOTHERS TO MARCH FOR DIMES MONDAY EVENING

A letter of appreciation was sent to Dr. and Mrs. Akin in behalf of the hospital, staff and community.



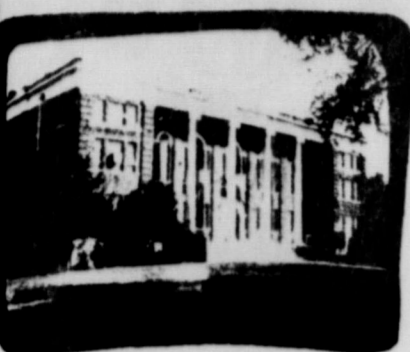

FEDERAL LAND BANK INTEREST RATES LOWERED TO 8%

Jack Williams, Manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Shamrock, received word today that The Federal Land Bank of Houston has reduced the interest billing rate on variable rate loans to 8%. "This reduction affects more than 90 million dollars of variable rate loans to more than 2800 farmers and ranchers throughout Texas," Williams stated. The variable rate loan plan which was introduced by the Houston Bank in July 1969 lets the interest rate "float" over the variations in the money market. In large measure, therefore, the rate in any specific year will reflect the changes in prices which the Bank must pay for the

Alcohol, Drugs Sermon Topics

Subjects of many sermons Sunday will be alcohol abuse and drug abuse. A speaker from Texas Alcohol Narcotics Education (TANE) will occupy the pulpit in the Church of The Nazarene, Wheeler, on Sunday, February 7, 1971, at 11:00 a.m. "Problems of alcohol and drug abuse are growing daily. It is going to be up to the people who care, to do something about these problems," said Rev. Albert F. Tucker, TANE Executive Director. "We find people who care in Texas churches," he said. TANE's purpose is to prevent, through education, problems that arise from use of alcohol, narcotics, and other dangerous drugs. "We do not speak in local churches with the idea of reaching drunks and dope addicts, but to reorient to the people on the problems and what is being done about them," Rev. Tucker said. A non-profit, education organization, TANE has been in existence since 1935. Programs include the speakers bureaus, made up of more than 150 men; public school assembly programs; publishing; production of audio visual aids; legislative information service; research; a free film lending library; an annual school on alcohol and narcotics education, sponsored jointly by TANE and Baylor University, held each February in Waco, and public information service. TANE's books and film strips have been distributed throughout the United States and the English-speaking world. Some have been translated into other languages, for use in South America and the Far East.

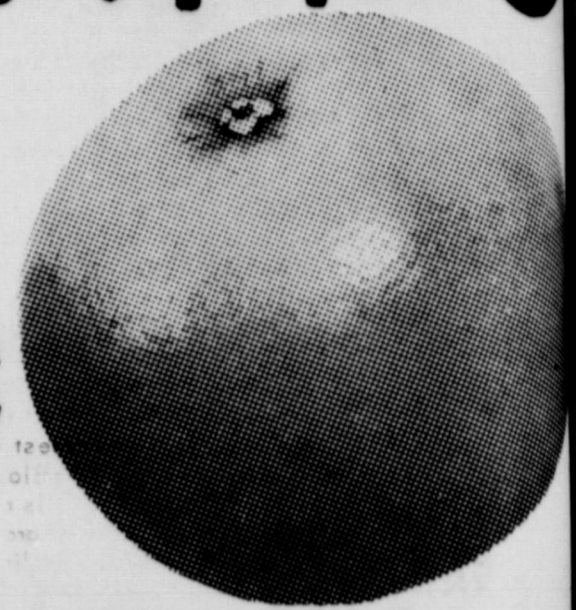

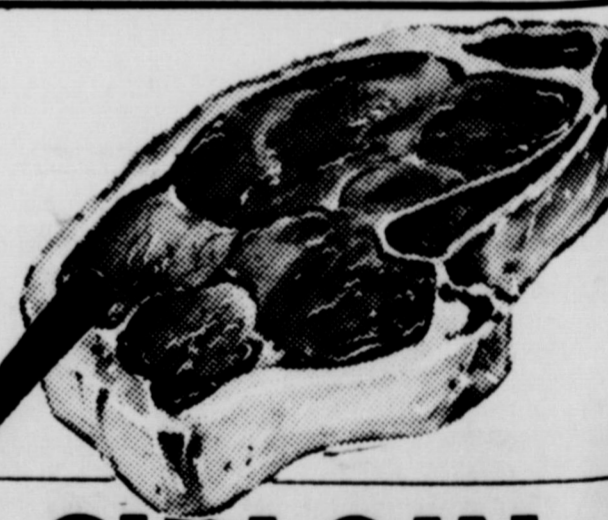

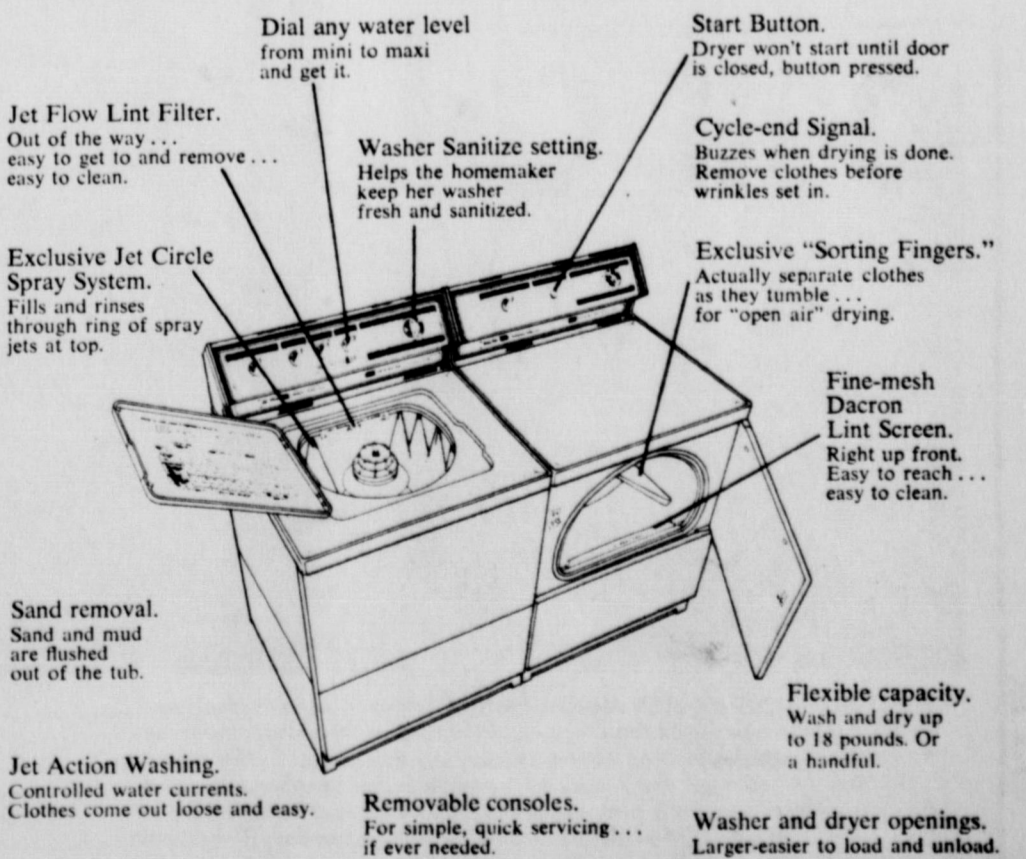

PIZZA

Pizza Sauce
1 1/2 lbs. ground beef
1 lb. sausage
3 T. salad oil
2 cloves garlic
4 large onions
2 cans tomato paste
2 cans tomatoes
1 T. oregano or Italian seasoning

2 t. salt
1/2 t. pepper
1/2 cup parmesan cheese
1/2 lb. grated cheese (or more)
1/2 lb. mozzarella cheese
1 cup cottage cheese in beaten egg

Cook garlic onions in salad oil. Add tomato paste - Cook 3 minutes. Add tomatoes and seasonings plus meats. Cook slowly 1 1/2 hours. Spread out crust and sprinkle all cheese on top. Bake 30 minutes at 400 degrees.

Pizza Dough
1 pkg yeast
1 cup warm water
2 T sugar
3 1/2 cups flour
2 T. shortening
1 1/2 t. salt

Soften yeast in warm water. Let stand for 5 minutes. Add sugar and add 1 1/2 cup flour. Beat well. Add shortening and salt. Add rest of flour. Put in pan and let rise until double in bulk. Roll like pie crust (thin) Spread over greased pan.

Makes 8 to 10 servings.

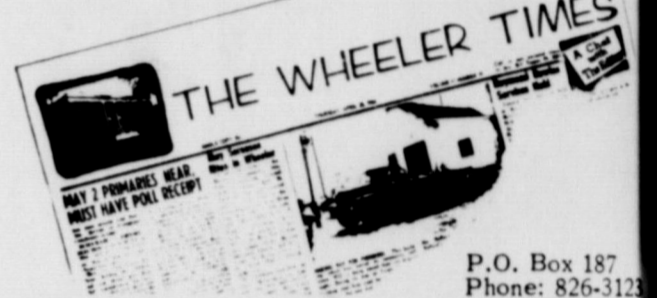

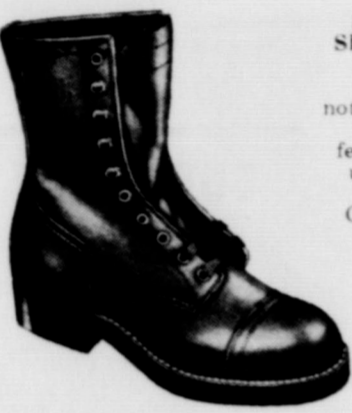
