



Are you ever confused when you go to the store to buy home cleaning products? No wonder buying them is more confusing than ever before! Labels and ads are complex chemical terms.

All these different ingredients in cleaning products confused me, so I decided to do a little study on them. This week I'll share part of what I learned with you, and in the coming weeks I'll continue with more.

The common ingredients are alkalis, acids, detergents, abrasives, bleaches snaitizers, and spirit sol-

First | began by studying these questions about alkalis. WHAT ARE SOME COMMON NAMES OF ALKALIS?

kalis for household cleaning are baking soda and ammonia. Other common alkalis are borax, trisodium phosphate (TSP), washing soda (sal soda), and lye. WHY ARE ALKALIS IMPOR-TANT IN CLEANING PRO-

Alkalis are very effective in removing a heavy accumulation of dirt without rubbing. They work especially well to remove grease because they react with it to form an emulsion. An emulsion is a mixture in which oily or solid particles sre held in suspension and will not separate from the rest of the liquid. The greasy particles thus held in suspension will not be deposited again on the surface you are cleaning. WHAT HARD CAN ALKALIS

Very strong alkalis are potentially dangerous to adults and children. When misused these substances can severely burn the eyes and skin and if swallowed

cause internal injuriesor The law requires that the dangers of a product and the precautions that should be used in using them appear on the label. So read the label and follow what it says.

Because alkalis readily remove oily dirt, they also take oil from your hands as you work. For this reason, many people prefer to wear waterproof gloves while cleaning. Concentrated doses of these cleaners can loosen paint surfacesthat you only aimed to clean. Also they will darken aluminum surfaces. HOW DO ALKALIS COMPARE



Chapter Active In Nat'l Program

This itching and scratching is accompanied by the appearance of scabs on the upper part of the neck, shoulders, rump and tailhead. These scabby areas are caused by small mites, too small to be seen by the naked eye.

Efforts should be made to detect scabs in its early stages to prevent spread of disease and economic loss to herd owner. We hope that all cattle herd owners will cooperate with Mr. Mills on his inspection tours.

We noticed quite a number of cattle lice last week when we accompanied the livestock inspector who was looking for scabies mites. The inspector, Dave Mills is continuing his inspection tour and will be in the south part of the county this week.

There is no profit in feeding cattle lice. These parasites are among the most damaging to beef cattle. Infested cattle spend a lot of time rubbing against fences, posts and other ob-



A good job of managing crop residue is pictured above on the E. O. Kelly farm. By plowing to leave stalks or residue on the soil surface erosion due to water or wind is lessened. Other benefits are reduction in moisture loss, fewer trips over the field, retarding runoff, and maintaining a cooler soil temperature during the hot summer days. The latter is important to keep from killing soil bacteria which fix nitrogen and aid in the decay of organic material.



The Agriculture Research Service reports that under controlled conditions on a 40 acre tract heavy rains (21/2 inches in one hour) followed the next day by short, high intensity rains could remove as much as 8,000 cu-bic yards of soil. This would cover the average city lot 14.3 feet deep in sediment. Sediment is the number one water pollutant. It comes from construction sites, bare city lots, unpaved roads and un protected farm land. If you have a problem on your site, lot, road or farm, contact the Soil Conservation Service in Wheeler.
