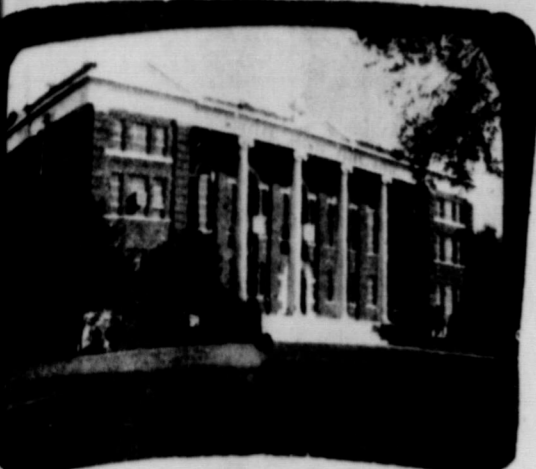

Ninety two barrows and gilts along with twelve steers and heifers will be judged at the Annual Wheeler County Livestock Show on Saturday morning, March 6 at Wheeler. The sale will be held as usual at the rodeo arena at Wheeler at 3:00 p.m. Judging of steers and heifers will begin at 9:00 a.m. followed by the judging of barrows and gilts at 10:00 a.m. Jerry Hawkins, Agriculture teacher at Clarendon Junior College will judge the stock. Frank Walker, Jr. auctioneer, will auction off the livestock at 3:00 p.m. Some \$100.00 prize money will be awarded to 4-H and FFA members competing according to David Cross, Wheeler Chamber of Commerce President. The Production Credit Association will award trophies and ribbons at the swine show and the Wheeler County Farm Bureau will present awards for the calf division.

BEEF CATTLE CO.

Beef Cattle Co. now produces 22 tons of beef per day. Construction of Beef Cattle Co. began in June, 1969. The 226 acre farm now has 80 acres of feed pens. The feedlot has 18,000 head in two locations. The operation employs 21 people full time and 6 part time, with an annual payroll of \$150,000. Local purchases for the company on gas, oil and supplies are estimated at \$5,000 with \$12-15,000 per month on electricity. 3,000 tons of hay were purchased locally during the past 7 months, and 240,000 lbs. of milo is fed per day. Beef Cattle Co. averages eight loads of hay and grain per day and fifteen visitors. Some of these people spend money for food, fuel, and lodging while in the Wheeler area.

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PAT'S PARAGRAPHS

 Maybe our snowy weather is over for awhile! Hope so, anyway! I did enjoy lots of snow ice cream while it was available.
 In my last column I spoke of alkaline substances in

home cleaning products. This week I'd like to pass on to you some things I learned about acids in cleaning products.

Probably the two best known acids for cleaning jobs at home are vinegar and lemon juice. Other acids that are useful are oxalic, hydrochloric and sulfuric.

There are two dry substances that form acids when dissolved in liquids. One is cream of tartar (known by cooks) and sodium bisulfate (sodium acid sulphate). You can use cream of tartar for several cleaning jobs such as sweetening coffee makers and brightening aluminumware. Sodium bisulfate is the main ingredi-

ent in many toilet bowl cleaners. Some acids help remove hard water deposits. Some aid in removing discoloration from aluminum, brass, bronze and copper. Other acids remove iron rust stains without a lot of rubbing.

Be sure to follow product labels because strong acids can eat away clothing, leat-

her and some metals. They can also irritate and injure the skin and eyes.

Vinegar is a weak acid, as is lemon juice. Weak acids are good metal cleaners. Oxalic acid is stronger and is especially effective as a rust remover. But it is also very poisonous. Hydrochloric and sulfuric acids are the strongest acids. They are used in some toilet bowl cleaners.

If a product has a toxic acid it will be labeled with one of these signal words: CAUTION; WARNING; POISON or DANGER. The skull and crossbones may also appear on the label.

Here is a recipe that can be used as a salad or a dessert.
Whipped Strawberry Delight
 1 (9 oz) can crushed pineapple
 1 (3 oz) pkg strawberry gelatin
 1 c. boiling water
 1 Pkg. whipped topping
 1/2 c. milk
 2/3 c. chopped nuts
 Drain pineapple, reserve juice. Add enough water to make 1 cup of liquid. Dissolve gelatin in boiling water. Stir in milk and water. Chill until thick and syrupy.

Whip topping mix with until soft peaks form. Whip gelatin until fluffy. Beat in whipped topping. Add pineapple and nuts. Turn into a lightly oiled 5 c. mold. Chill until set.

I WONDER

I WONDER, an outstanding musical of the year is a Christian musical by Ronald K. Wells - To be presented at the First Baptist Church, Wheeler on March 7 at 7:00 p.m. by the youth choir from the First Baptist Church of Memphis, Texas. Everyone is cordially invited to attend.

I WONDER is the story of an atheistic professor with one goal - to destroy the faith of the few Christians in his class who believe the Bible.

The class has barely assembled when he begins his ridicule in the solo "God is Dead." They quietly murmur in the background, "I wonder, I wonder, I wonder." The students answer with, "If God Is Dead," and then join in the title song "I Wonder."

In dialogue the professor challenges the "fairy tales" of Genesis, and a student answers with the recitative, "The Creation," followed by a solo, "The Ballad of the Bible." The professor complains that that's for history, not the 20th Century. The students reply, "But Where Shall Wisdom Be Found?" using the words of Scripture.

The professor derides them for bringing Jesus Christ into their arguments, claiming he is no greater than Mohammed or Buddha. The students answer by detailing the main events of the life of Christ as "The Greatest Miracles." He counters by pointing to the technical miracles of today, especially in space exploration. And in "What Will You Say?" They answer the

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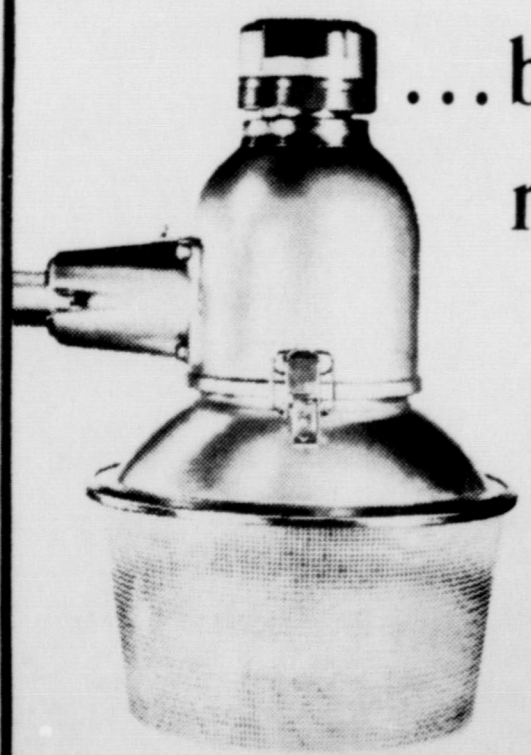
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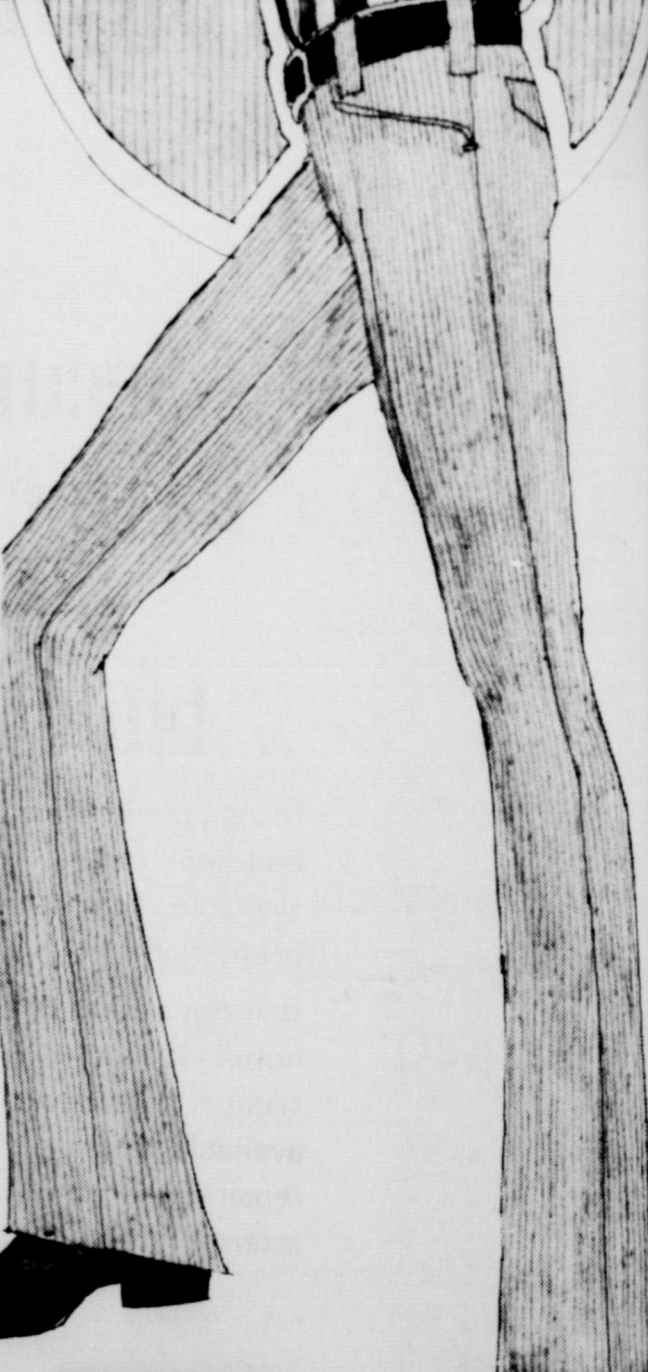
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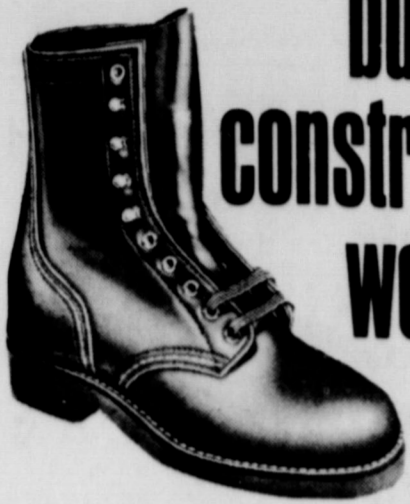

Anyone can bid on a pig and we would encourage them to come out and do so.

There will be a registration fee of \$3.50 to cover the luncheon and incidental expenses. Livestock Losses - A lot of livestock has been lost due to the blizzard. There is no accurate way to determine the economic losses but several lost cattle, many of which have been shipped in as stocker calves from East Texas and Louisiana. We were in Mobeetie this past week and saw helicopters feeding some cattle that owners couldn't get to. It looks like many will have a massive fence rebuilding job where fences have been cut so cattle could be fed. There is an old adage that January Shakes 'em, February Breaks 'em and March takes 'em. Watch those cows closely now because the blizzard we had really hurt some of the "losers" and March might really finish them unless we give 'em extra feed, medication and care.

Noticed that the ACP program had been changed to Rural Environment Assistance Program (REAP). It is our understanding that soil tests will be required of all producers who plan to participate in this program after April 1 before an approval can be issued on all Conservation practices of sodding and seeding grasses. If you plan to carry out one or more of these practices in 1971, you should take a soil sample and send it to one of the approved laboratories for minimum and maximum fertilizer needs. Persons taking samples and submitting them to the laboratory should enter the ASCS farm serial numbers on the application forms in the upper right hand corner. We have mailing cartons, instructions and sample bags at our office in Wheeler.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (HJR 21)
Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article XVII, Section 1, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:
"Section 1. The Legislature by a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each House, to be entered by years and may, on the journals, may propose amendments to the Constitution, to be voted upon by the qualified electors for members of the Legislature, which proposed amendments shall be duly published one week for four weeks, commencing at least three months before an election, the time of which shall be specified by the Legislature, in one weekly newspaper of each county, in which such a newspaper may be published; and it shall be the duty of the several returning officers of said election, to open a poll for, and make returns to the Secretary of State,

of the number of legal votes cast at said election for and against said amendments; and if more than one be proposed, then the number of votes cast for and against each of them; and if it shall appear from said return, that a majority of the votes cast, have been cast in favor of any amendment, the said amendment so receiving a majority of the votes cast, shall become a part of this Constitution, and proclamation shall be made by the Governor thereof."
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on May 18, 1971, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing that the Legislature may propose an amendment of the Constitution at any session of the Legislature."

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PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 15) Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article III, Section 24, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:
"Section 24. (1) The State Ethics Commission is created as an agency of the State. The commission consists of nine members. Three members shall be appointed by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Texas with the advice and consent of the Associate Justices serving on the Court, three members shall be appointed by the Presiding Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals of Texas with the advice and consent of the other Judges serving on the Court, and three members shall be appointed by the Chairman of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission with the advice and consent of the other members of the commission, of each group of three appointees no more than two shall be attorneys engaged in the active practice of law. In addition thereto there shall be two ex officio members, one from the House of Representatives and one from the Senate to be elected on the first day of each Regular Session of the Legislature by a majority of the membership of each House for a term ending on the first day of the next Regular Session.
(2) With the exception of the initial appointees, each member shall hold office for a term of six (6) years and until his successor is appointed and has qualified. In making the initial appointments, each appointing officer shall designate one (1) appointee to serve a term of two (2) years, one (1) appointee to serve a term of four (4) years, and one (1) appointee to serve a term of six (6) years. Interim vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as vacancies due to expiration of a full term, but only for the unexpired portion of the term in question. The membership shall designate one of its members to serve as chairman for a period of two (2) years.
(3) The members of the commission shall be reimbursed for actual and necessary expenses incurred in the performance of their duties.
(4) The commission shall recommend the compensation, per diem, and mileage allowances of members of the Legislature, and may recommend the salary of the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the Lieutenant Governor

proved before that day by resolution of either House of the Legislature.
(b) All rates of compensation, mileage allowances or per diem rates and all changes and recommendations made by the commission thereof shall not take effect until approved section by section by resolution of both Houses of the Legislature.
"All votes on these resolutions or parts thereof shall show the individual votes in the respective journals of both Houses.
(8) The commission shall investigate any alleged violation of any rule of ethics promulgated by it and report its findings to the appropriate State agency, official, legislative body, grand jury or district attorney.
(9) Until otherwise provided by the commission, each member of the Legislature shall receive from the public treasury an annual salary of Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and per diem not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first 120 days only of each Regular Session and for 30 days of each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than 140 days. In addition to the per diem, the members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and fifty cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller to each county seat now or hereafter established; no member to be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after adjournment of the Regular or Called session.
(10) The commission is further authorized to recommend to each Legislature changes which will update, improve, and effect economy in the legislative process."
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the 18th day of May, 1971, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to create a State Ethics Commission empowered to set rules of ethics for members of the Legislature, State officers and legislative officers, to investigate and recommend compensation for members of the Legislature and the Lieutenant Governor and recommend improvements and economy in the legislative process."

Is Calamity Jane still around? If so she is running me a poor second. After experiencing the worst drought and sweltering heat in the history of the Texas Panhandle all summer, in September 1970 I was shaken with the news I was to be the grandmother of twins sometime the following February.

By Christmas I had recovered from both the news and the drought enough to be looking forward with pleasure to a trip to California and seeing my new grandchildren.

On Wednesday January 27th, I received a call that the twins had arrived and the next day Jess took me to Amarillo to catch the plane to L.A. On the way to the airport I said "You'd better give me some money while I'm thinking about it" but somehow the conversation went on and somewhere over Arizona I reached in my purse for a Kleenex and the realization struck me that he hadn't given me any money. I opened my billfold and counted, \$1.16 total!

When I arrived in L.A. my s-in-law, Richard Huyck was 20 minutes late to meet me. Ther I was, \$1.16, didn't know the name of the hospital where Eileen was nor a number to call where Richard worked and I knew there was no one at their home. It was 15 or 20 miles across town and that \$1.16 wouldn't buy a taxi fare around the airport. I couldn't cash a check and knew no one at all. I felt quite like a cat someone had taken off to get rid of.

Finally Richard arrived and after 20 miles of congested freeway traffic, I beheld two beautiful identical baby grandsons. It was worth it all!

After 12 days of cooking, dishwashing, cleaning, ironing, diaper changing, bathing, feeding and rocking I awakened about 6 o'clock in the morning to hear Richard up and about. I got up to prepare breakfast. He said I could just make a pot of coffee; he would shower, dress and leave early for work. Eileen hadn't had much sleep. She and I could eat breakfast when she was ready. I put the coffee to perking and went back to bed. I had no sooner got the cover tucked around me comfortably when I heard a deep low rumble. Before I could have counted to 10 it became as loud as a jet plane flying at low altitude and the windows were rattling. I remembered a morning or two before the whole area was enshrouded in a thick fog and now, I thought, a jet plane has missed the airport and is about to crash right here in this bedroom with me!

Out of bed I jumped and the floor threw me back against the bed. I made a second try and bumped into the wall. With the bedroom door swinging back and forth I made the third attempt to get out. I made it into and through a short hall and into the living room.

Through the windows and between me and dim daylight I could see water in the swimming pool jumping up here and there as high as my head. By then I had decided it must be an earthquake. I ran on into Richards and Eileen's bedroom where he stood with dripping hair, clutching a bathrobe and trying desperately to get a baby out of a bassinet before it overturned. Eileen was screaming for me to get the other children. As I ran to meet them, cry-

ing in the hall, I yelled, "What in heavens name is this, an earthquake?" "You bet it is, a bad one" said Rich.

We got all the children in the bed with Eileen and braced ourselves in a doorway, each, where we stood in utter helplessness as dishes crashed on the floor, books tumbled from shelves and pictures fell off the wall. Furniture was moved from against the walls; lamps, vases, etc. were dumped into the floor, both medicine cabinets in the baths were emptied into the laboratories beneath them. There was the smell of alcohol from a broken bottle, mixed with the odor of sewer gas, spilled detergents and dust as we stood there in half darkness.

Electric lines had been broken and the fear that gas lines were also broken and gas was escaping kept us from lighting matches. We opened all doors and windows and stood almost paralyzed from fright and cold for sometime.

Tremor after tremor came until about 8 o'clock. Then Richard ventured out to the car and turned on the radio to see if he could hear what the extent of the damage was.

Men at the radio stations downtown L.A. were saying the windows of many of the buildings were broken, that old structures had some shattered walls but for such a violent shake there was apparently small damage. It was not until 9 or 9:30 and after the electricity had come back on in that area, that we heard about the hospital being demolished and freeway bridges shattered. Then later news revealed that the Van Norman dam was damaged and the residential area below was in danger.

People were ordered to evacuate the area below the dam and in the path of the water should the dam break. Many of the residents were temporarily housed in homes of Rich and Eileen's neighbors. We didn't offer to keep any because we felt they had been disrupted enough without being awakened in the middle of the night by two crying babies.

I didn't see any of the worst damage except on TV and in the newspapers. No one was allowed in the worst hit areas except newsmen, repair crews and those who were searching out the dead and injured. All freeways leading north were closed and water was declared unsafe to drink until it had been boiled.

I left on Saturday morning to come back to one of the worst snow storms in the Panhandle in recent years: ne week later.

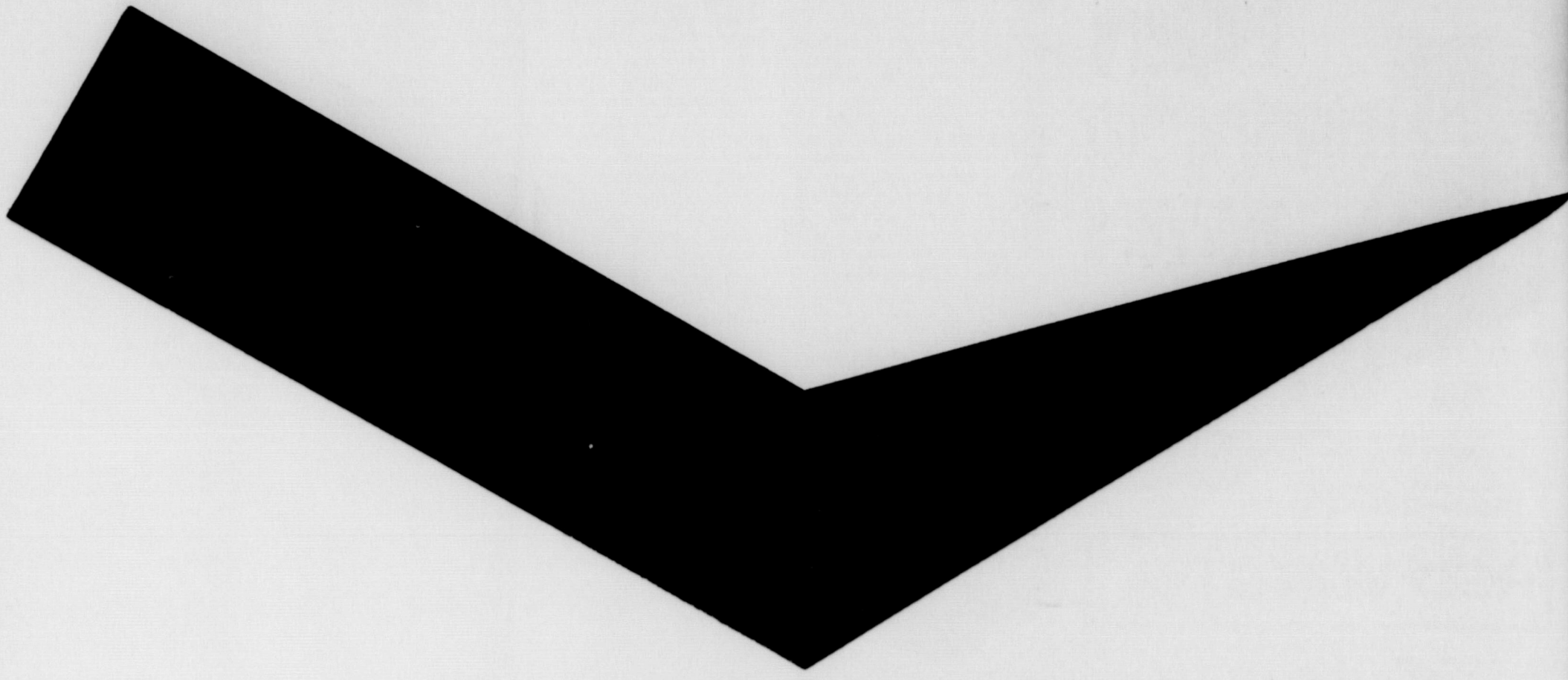
But I felt safer on the inside on Sunday as we watched the swirling snow and Channel 7 in Amarillo. Monday morning about

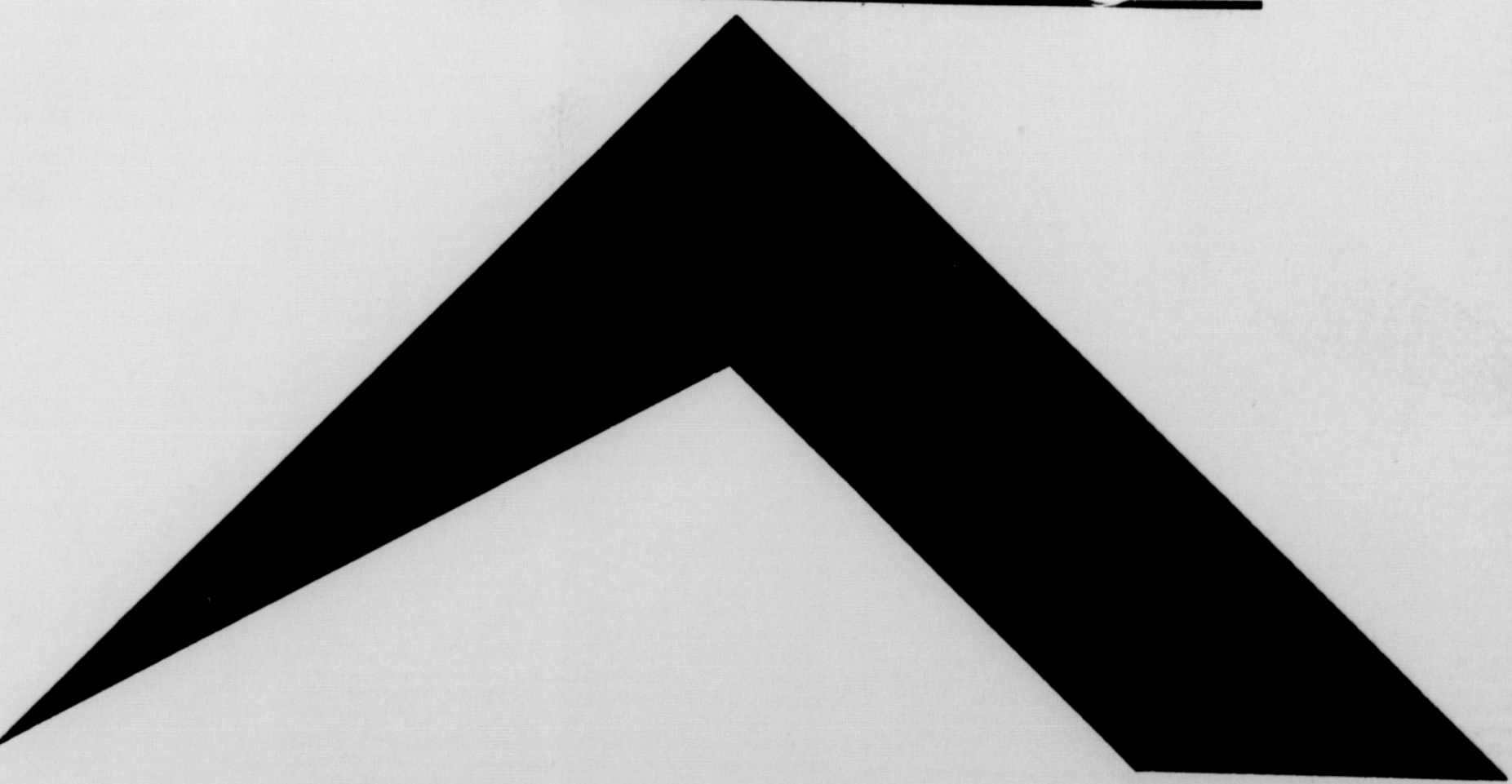
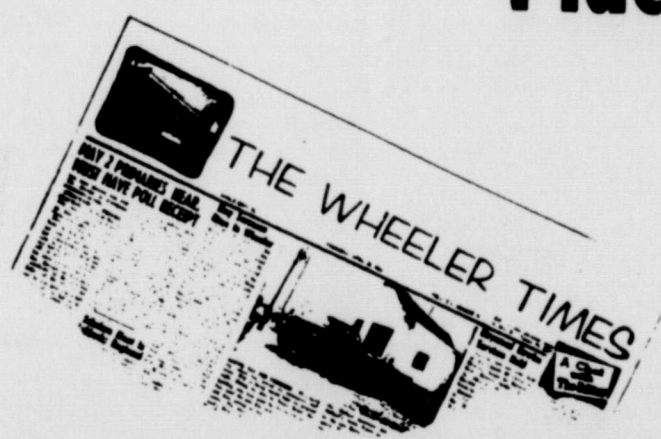
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
