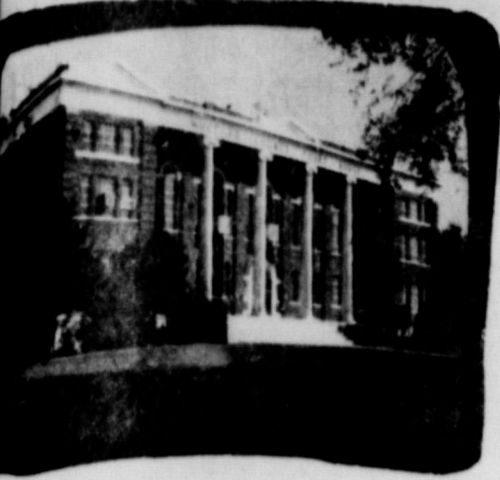

## QUARANTINE HALTS ANNUAL RODEO

Gerald Johnson, president of the Wheeler Riding Club announced Wednesday morning that the Wheeler Rodeo has been postponed indefinitely. Rodeo activities were slated to begin today, Thursday, with the parade at 4:00. The three day affair has been cancelled due to the

quarantine placed on horses in Texas. The state of Texas was placed under quarantine Tuesday on movement of horses in order to stop the spread of Venezuelan equine encephalomyelitis. The disease, which is deadly to horses, can also affect humans with

symptoms similar to flu. The quarantine also prevents the movement of horses within the counties. A vaccine is available which can be given by a veterinarian; The horse remains in quarantine for fourteen days after the vaccination is given. The riding club was able

to stop the preparation of 1439 lbs. of beef ordered for the barbecue. The cutting and wrapping of the meat was scheduled for Wednesday morning. The meat was re-loaded on the delivery truck and sent back when the event was cancelled. The riding club members

have been spending long hours at the rodeo arena in preparation for the rodeo. The all new steel arena was nearing completion with portable stands to be rented from Elk City; The stands had not been delivered.

### GAME CANCELLED

Due to Circumstances the game scheduled between Corky Guthrie's team and Bill Stewart's team will be cancelled. Last Monday's game ended the season for these two teams. The other games will be played as scheduled.



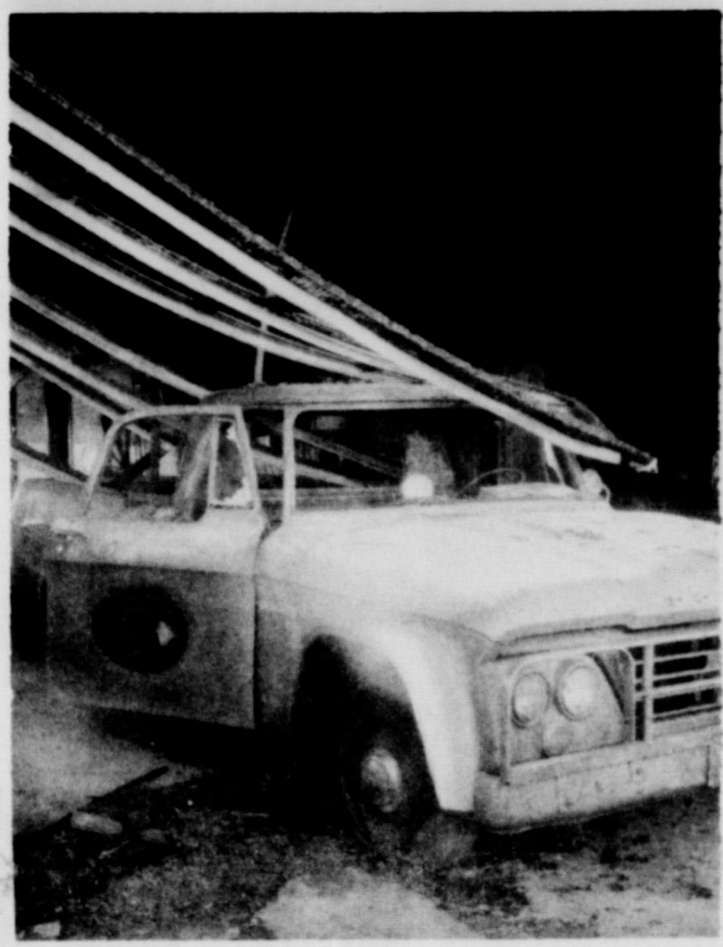

## FIRE DESTROYS HIGHWAY BARN TUESDAY

A fire Tuesday evening destroyed the State Highway barn located at the north edge of the Wheeler City limits. No estimate of the cost of the fire was available. A faulty nozzle on a gas pump is blamed for the fire. An employee of the highway department in Wellington was filling his pickup with gas; he went to the restroom while the pickup was being filled. The pump failed to shut off

and gas fumes apparently were ignited by the hot water heater in the building. The heat was so intense, it was necessary for the employee to exit through the restroom window. One vehicle, the pickup being filled with gas was destroyed in the fire. A truck and a sign pickup also located in the building were heavily damaged by the smoke but were not destroyed.

The highway barn, according to Curtis Kidwell, maintenance superintendent, was built in 1951 at a cost of \$22,000. Employees began the work of cleaning up the smoked pickup and truck Wednesday morning.

### Rites Read For Clarence Crowder

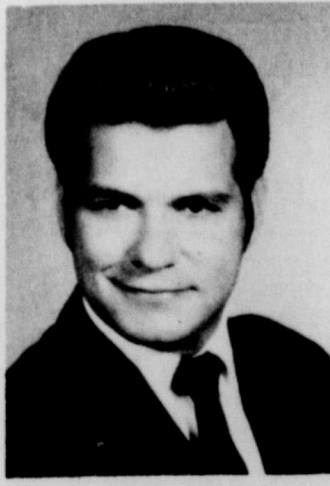

Crunch, Crunch, Crunch! Cabbage, Celery, Cucumbers! This trio of "c" vegetables has many things in common.

They are all deliciously crunchy when served raw. They all contain Vitamin C, even though cabbage has a far greater amount. They are all green vegetables in one form. They all combine together to make great tasting slaws and salads! They are all on the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Plentiful Foods List for July. What better reasons for serving this trio of vegetables for summertime eating.

FAVORITE VEGETABLE SLAW  
2 cups shredded cabbage  
1 tomato, diced  
1/3 cup peeled, chopped cucumber  
Several finely chopped onion tops  
1/4 cup chopped red and/or green pepper  
1/4 cup chopped celery  
2 tablespoons sour cream  
2 tablespoons sugar

PANAMINT CABBAGE SALAD  
2 cups shredded green cabbage  
1 cup shredded red cabbage  
1 cup sliced celery  
1/4 cup chopped cucumber  
1/2 cup shredded carrots  
French dressing

2 tablespoons vinegar  
salt and pepper  
Combine all chopped vegetables in bowl; salt and pepper to taste. Into sour cream, beat sugar and vinegar. Mix lightly with prepared vegetables and serve at once on crisp lettuce leaves. This salad is especially good with steak or fish.

they have in store for your family in the way of vitamins. Look for the freshest choice of these plentiful foods to get the most from your grocery money.

Bright orange, mature carrots and deep orange vegetables such as sweet potatoes offer the most in Vitamin A. Dark green leaves of leafy vegetables are richer in nutrients particularly vitamins A and C, than light green leaves. Use the tops of beets, turnips, and other root vegetables in addition to spinach, kale and collards to provide a good amount of vitamins in the diet.

Make full use of vine-ripened tomatoes in summer when they are plentiful and inexpensive. Tomatoes that ripen on the vine in summer sunlight are twice as rich in Vitamin C as those grown in greenhouses in winter. You can tell the difference in the taste. Eggs, too, are plentiful in July says the Consumer and marketing service. It's amazing what hard-cooked eggs can add to vegetable dishes in the way of nutrients and decoration!

Here are several tasty recipes to get you started on the summertime habit of serving egg-vegetable medleys to your family.  
SUPER SUPPER SALAD  
2 T. unflavored gelatin  
1/4 C. cold water  
2 C. diced chicken  
2 C. chicken broth  
1 1/2 C. cooked, mixed veg. (peas, carrots, sweet corn, string beans)  
2 hard-cooked eggs  
1/4 C. chopped stuffed olives  
Soak gelatin in cold water 5 minutes, then dissolve in hot chicken broth (canned chicken may be used). Cool. Set mold in cold water and decorate the bottom with slices of egg and olives. Cover with a thin layer of chicken broth and let set. Then arrange chicken and vegetables in alternate layers, pouring a little broth over each layer and allowing it to set before proceeding. Letting the mold stand in ice water will quicken the process. When firm, remove salad from mold and cut into fairly thick slices. Serve individual portions on lettuce with mayonnaise garnish.

TOMATO FLOWER SALAD  
6 chilled tomatoes  
lettuce  
1/2 C. chopped celery  
1/2 C. chopped cucumber  
1 T. minced onion  
1/2 C. cooked sweet corn  
1 T. chopped green pepper  
2 hard cooked eggs, chopped  
2 T. mayonnaise  
1 t. salt  
black pepper  
Cut stems ends from tomatoes. Cut tomatoes four times from the top almost

through to the bottom, to form eight attached "petals". Spread petals over lettuce-lined plates. Combine other ingredients, and put filling into centers of "flowers". Chill. Serve with a dollop of mayonnaise garnish and a sprinkling of paprika. They make a nice colorful salads.

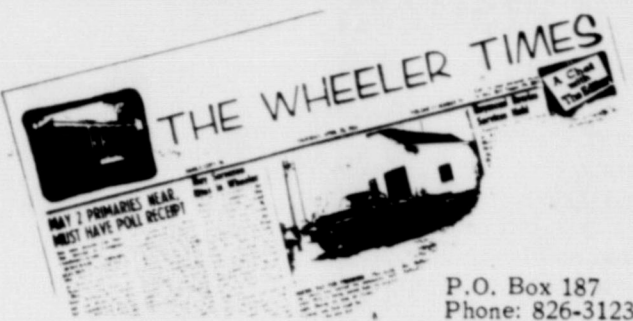

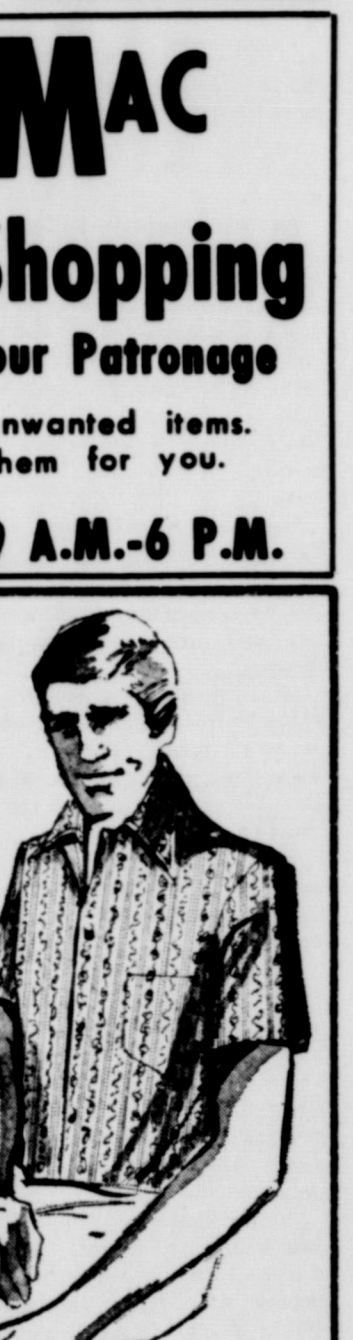

## Across the Fence

Six 4-H members from Wheeler County will be attending the District 1 4-H Leadership Camp in Claudcroft, New Mexico, July 19-23. They will be learning principles and practices that can mean more money from the operation of the farm or home. They will get leadership training that will be of lasting benefit to them. Those attending include Kathy Meek and Cindy Meek from the Briscoe 4-H club; Johnnie Porter from the Shamrock Public Speaking club; Mark Burrell from the Kelton 4-H club; Dale Adams from the Shamrock Longhorns club; and Dwight Smith from the Shamrock Public Speaking club.

The leaders accompanying the group are Miss Pat Palmer County Home Demonstration Agent and Mrs. Judy Morris, Extension Secretary.

The expenses for the trip were paid by the county 4-H Council from money raised by last year's 4-H Hootenany.

Using wide strips of black plastic in your garden can cut down weeding time, conserve moisture, and lead to cleaner fruit and vegetables.

To use the plastic, hoe up all weeds, lay the plastic piece in place and cover the edges with dirt. If the garden is up, you will have to work the plastic around the plants. One of the secrets to success with the plastic

is to punch holes in it with a potato fork, or something about this size, in order to get moisture into the soil.

The plastic is also excellent to use in ornamental plantings too, a much thinner layer of bark can then be used around the shrubs, flowers, and bushes.

Gardeners will be limited to the flat areas of the yard when doing this because the bark will tend to wash off plastic under-coatings on steep ground.

Black plastic is fairly inexpensive and can be obtained in most garden supply stores or lumber yards. We've tried it on some of our result demonstration work on watermelons and find it fairly satisfactory. However, the hailstorm we had in June, knocked holes in it the size of your fist.

Since feed represents more of the total cost in pork production than in any other livestock feeding enterprise, hog producers need to take a careful look at their feed buying and handling before spending money.

In a complete swine operation from farrowing to market, the feed cost can represent 55 to 85 percent of the total production cost. Producers who are thinking about processing their own feed should give no consideration to any kind of mixing on the farm until a volume of about 100 tons per year is reached.

Bagged feed should be used until production consumes six tons every two weeks. When this level is reached, bulk feed should be considered. There must be adequate facilities to re-

ceive bulk shipments cause hog feeds in bulk tend to become stale, less palatable after and storing for more than two weeks.

Producers who choose to process their own feed consider costs for equipment, hazards in grain, the use of grain substitutes, storing grain, contracting for future, and the use of a

Regardless of the feed handling or processing, feed waste can become a serious problem. Poorly adjusted self feeders, spills from bulk and mixed feeds on the can contribute to losses that amount up in costs 100 pounds of feed was per day represents a loss of about \$1,000 per year. Careful planning of a storage space in feed can cut down a great waste. The type of location and location of finished feed bins are also important considerations. More detailed information is available from Fact L-922, "Buying and Handling Feed for Pork Production" and another bulletin B-972 "Farm Feed Processing", both available at the office.
