Cholera Means State Quarantine

The Texas Animal Health Commission has ordered a statewide quarantine on the movement or sale for movement of all hogs except for purposes of slaughter. This quarantine shall be effective March 29, 1971, and shall continue in force and effect for sixty (60) days.

Hogs for slaughter can move to a packing house or to a market without a permit. The important thing to remember is that any hog leaving a farm without a permit will have to be slaughtered.

Agricultural Clinic Set for Tues.

"If They'd Eat It" will be the topic discussed by Max Hatter, County Agricultural Agent at the upcoming Agricultural Clinic scheduled for Tuesday night, April 6 at 7:00 P.M. at the Shamrock High School. His topic will pertain to the recently completed winter grazing cost study on Ermelo weeping lovegrass through the Northwest Texas Research Demonstration Program.

Another topic to be discussed by Ed Gamett, Extension Farm Management Specialist, will be "You, Can Take It With You." This presentation on estate planning will attempt to create an equitable compromise between minimizing

the amount of taxes due, and distributing the property as desired to the designated heirs and assuring a financial source of security.

The wheat grazing has turned into a disaster. With rain, wheat may head up to 4-6 inches tall. It all adds up to a lot of nothing. The livestock markets have also gone a little haywire. Most folks seem to be selling calves that weigh anything. This doesn't even make sense. One man sold a 300 lb. steer last week for 44¢ a pound. It brought \$136.00 and a 560 lb. steer brought 27¢ and \$150.00.

We attended the Pertorance tested bull sale last Thursday at the Kilgore Beef Cattle Center. Prices paid for the bulls seem reasonable. We got a glimpse of the Simmental crossbred bulls. The average daily gain for them was a little higher than for other purebred bulls these were a number of Wheeler county folks at the sale and from our area.

Last week the Allison-Briscoe Young Farmers hosted a Grazing Management and Livestock Herd Management meeting. About 25 attended. We talked on our winter cost study on grazing Ermelo Weeping overgrass. Frank Tidwell from the Security State Bank at Cheyenne, Okla. was on the program also. Frank is a big booster of lovegrass.

On April 5 and 6 the Shamrock Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring a meeting on Managing Credit, Organizing a Business for Profit, April 5, on April 6 the subject matter will cover Estate Planning (You can't take it with you) and Grazing Ermelo Weeping overgrass in the winter ("If They'd Eat It").

Ken Wolf, our economist in Agribusiness will teach the first night's session. This will be real good information for any business man in Wheeler County. Ralph Hutinson, Booker, Texas has an interesting enterprise. He has about 21,000 pounds of catfish concentrated in a small pond. People fish there and pay him 85¢ a pound for the fish caught. You can catch them in a building that is heated and cooled and they'll dress them for you. In a few weeks he'll have a cafe operating there where people can buy a plate of catfish. He buys catfish fingerlings from Arkansas and feeds them out in ponds on a special ration. He reports that anytime you have over 1200 fish to the surface acre, you'll need to aerate the water to supply oxygen. This looks like a very specialized business and one where a man won't have all the answers when he begins such an enterprise. For the right man the knowledge and plenty of capital, we be-

lieve it'd work. Cage culture of catfish is receiving a lot of attention right now. We have information from our wildlife specialists on this. **GUAR PRODUCTION ON SET-A-SIDE ACRES FOR 1971?** During 1971 many Wheeler County farmers may consider planting guar as an alternative crop on set-aside acres and taking less

government payment. Listed below are the major points to consider in planting guar on set-aside acres:
1. Guar may be planted for harvest on set-aside acres. At the time of certification the farm operator will designate the exact location of his set-aside acreage.
2. Guar cannot be harvested on conserving base acres.
3. There will be a flat reduction rate of \$10.00 per acre for all acres of set-aside which are harvested.
4. Dates for 1971 are not

confirmed at this time. In 1970 a farmer who planned to plant guar for harvest on diverted acres was required to certify these acres with the ASC office by May 1; he still had until October 1, 1970 to decide whether he would

harvest the guar. If he did not harvest, his payment reduction was reinstated.
5. The profitability of planting guar on set-aside acres will depend on a for guar, b. Expected prizes and c. Cost of production.

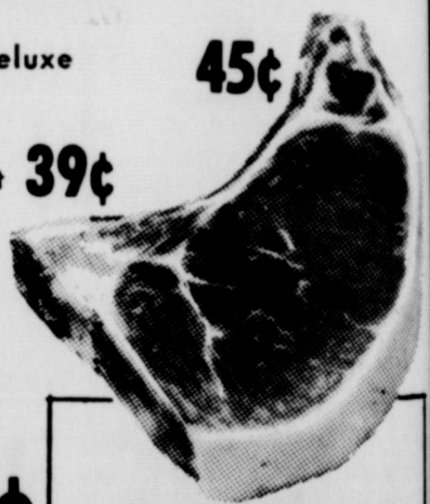
