JAMES ANNE CRUMP, WHEELER PIONEER TO BE BURIED THURS.

Mrs. James Anne Crump, 85, passed away Tuesday, April 6, 1971, after several months of illness.

Mrs. Crump's home address was of Wheeler. She was born January 30, 1886, at Lometa, Texas.

She was the daughter of James Edward Stanley and Samantha Tension. She was married to A.B. Crump August 7, 1904 at Miami, Texas.

Mrs. Crump had lived in Wheeler since 1901. She attended school in Miami, Texas and the Baylor University. She was one of the first pioneers of Wheeler since her father, James Stanley who was a rancher, laid out the city of Wheeler and started building the town and served as the first Mayor. Mrs. Crump served as the State Democratic Committee Woman in 1951-52.

She was a member of the Baptist Church and of the Eastern Star. Survivors are her husband, A.B. Crump, Wheeler, 1 Brother, George L. Stanley, Shamrock. She was preceded in death by her daughter.

The funeral will be held at the First Baptist Church in Wheeler, Thursday April 8, 1971 at 2:30 P.M. Rev. Keith McCormick will officiate with Rev. Ross Dunn assisting. The burial will be in Wheeler Cemetery.

Private Citizens Hamper Firemen

N.D. Ware, Jr., Fire Chief of the Wheeler Fire Department reports the increasing number of curious citizens rushing to the fire station is getting to be a problem, and hampers the quick departure of the fire trucks.

When the whistle blows wait until the whistle stops blowing before going to see where the fire is. Citizens are asked not to follow the fire truck; if you have to go to the fire, stay back out of the way of the trucks and firemen.

Wheeler's firemen have been trained to handle the fires and private citizens get in the way.

Storm Warning Signals Given

As in the past, the firemen will be on the watch for the approach of threatening clouds. At the first sign of danger, the fire-whistle will signal a warning to citizens.

The signal to seek shelter is one 30 second blast, a pause, and a second 30 second blast. No all clear will be sounded; citizens will use their own judgement as to when danger is over.

Anytime the weather bureau issues a tornado alert, or a cloud is approaching Wheeler, a team of firemen will be on "look out".

The fire signal is a series of eleven ten second blasts. Remember the tornado alert is only two blasts.

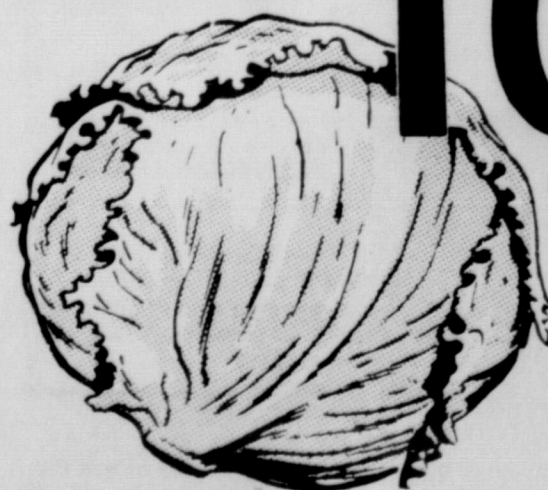

Across the Fence

Max W Hatter, CAA has applied to be designated as a disaster area. weather, declining stock prices, dwindling stock herds, culled to the bone, and wind eroded areas are all factors in the decision. Even if rains came this month it would take a long time to undo the damage inflicted by a drought that ran the middle of last summer. A lot of ranchers

say that by next week their hay will be exhausted, and they will have to make some decisions. You see, Mrs. Consumer, that cows are the ranchers' livelihood; and without them we don't want to think about it.

The fruit trees haven't been discouraged by the drought. Folks who want to have healthy and vigorous trees and quality fruit will want to start now preventing insect and disease losses. A spray program coupled with orchard sanitation practices can reduce insect disease losses. Wettable sulfur applied at full bloom or at petal fall help control brown rot of peaches and plums. The little white maggots (plum curculia) can be controlled by spraying now with Malathion. About 3 sprayings at 10 to 14 day intervals should control these major insects in home orchards. Oak Poisoning. We still need to be watching our livestock closely. The lack of green grazing will make the green buds and young leaves

of shinnery oak quite palatable.

Young oak buds and leaves may contain as much as 15 percent tannin during April but the content decreases as the season progresses. Tannins are toxic to cattle, sheep and goats. Animals may consume up to 50 percent of their diet without ill effects, 50-75% of oak leaves and buds cause sickness and oak leaves in excess of 75 percent results in death.

Animals suffering from oak poisoning exhibit emaciation, edema, constipation or diarrhea and mucus and/or blood on the feces. The animals appear drawn, have a rough hair coat and a dry nose. They are depressed and show evidence of discomfort.

Since supplemental feeding alone will not prevent losses it is usually best to defer use on when oak pastures until the leaves are fully developed. One alternative is to control oak on an area large enough to support the livestock during the critical period of the year. If grazing the area is absolutely necessary, adequate phosphorus nutrition and the use of supplemental feeds containing 10 percent hydrated lime may reduce losses. It would need to be fed ahead of time however.

In the event that animals show symptoms of oak poisoning they should be removed from the pasture, and put on adequate feed and water, the use of a mild laxative such as mineral oil may be helpful.

Summer Grazing Study—Twenty-three Angus heifers have been secured for our Ermelo Weeping Lovegrass Study. The grass is greening up rapidly. We'll put out some nitrogen and phosphate this week and figure that last month's moisture from the blizzard of '71 will carry us until the next rain. We plan to worm them because of the high stocking rates are showing for 2½ pounds average daily gain. We'll try to keep you informed as the study progresses.

Bagworms—Bagworms are destructive pests on many evergreen and deciduous shrubs and trees, and sometime on neglected fruit trees. Late March and early April is the time to control them. First we suggest removing

the bags from infested plants and destroying them. They when temperatures stay above 60 degrees for 6 to 10 hours during the day, start applying control measures. The pesticide applications should be continued at 7 to 10-day intervals until the infestation is eliminated.

Sevin, chlordane, lead arsenate or toxaphene will effectively control the bagworm. Directions for mixing and applying the materials are given on the label container and should be carefully followed.

SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

The high winds we have had in the last few days have caused some wind erosion damage. Perhaps this should be a warning to us to be a bit more careful to leave a good cover crop on our soil. The fields that had a good residue cover were not damaged by the wind erosion, but the fields that were cleaned and tilled received considerable damage.

James Verden is planning to build some diversion terraces and a waterway on his place just west of Wheeler. These structures will stop water erosion on one field and protect another field from silt damage. The waterway will be in the bottom of a draw and will permit runoff water to pass through his place at a safe velocity an will not erode his farm with water erosion. D.C. Daberry plans to

build an erosion control structure on his place east of Shamrock. This structure will prevent an overfall from cutting back into his field and will prevent severe water erosion by letting runoff water down to a lower elevation through pipes.

Contact the technicians of the Soil Conservation Service that assist the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District for assistance in solving an erosion problem of any kind.

This effort, he said will be an outgrowth of the Kiwanis initiated Operation Drug Alert program which began here and throughout the United States and Canada last fall. Operation Drug Alert was aimed at bringing to the community in general an understanding of the drug problem.

Some 3,500 Kiwanis clubs either operated Operation

One of the primary tools of the program was a booklet entitled "Deciding About Drugs" of which up to the present, some 2,750,000 copies have been distributed to young people through schools, churches, Kiwanis clubs, and other similar groups.

This year a "younger piece" in comic book form will be distributed. It is entitled "What if they call me chicken," and deals with the more common pressures that lead to drug use among young people.

Operation Drug Alert is the result of a survey undertaken late last year by Kiwanis which passed this question to 500 leaders in all walks of life in Canada and the United States: "In your judgement what do you identify on our national scene as the greatest single need or opportunity for service to which a men's service club organization can apply itself in the next two years?"

On the basis of recommendations received from this group of leaders, Kiwanis identified the need for a program of drug abuse education as providing the most significant challenge to its member clubs. Operation Drug Alert was set up as Kiwanis' major emphasis in 1969 and will continue until 1971, although it has no real terminal date.

The Operation Drug Alert plan has been reviewed by the American Medical Association, the American Pharmaceutical Association, the National Association of Retail Druggists, and the National Coordinating Council on Drug Abuse Education and information, among others.

Advice and counsel have been sought from these and other related organizations as well as from other associations whose members are interested in the problem.

This year, in addition to the continuing Operation Drug Alert, Kiwanis clubs throughout the United States and Canada will devote part of their effort to a new and corollary major emphasis program called "The Quality of our Environment."

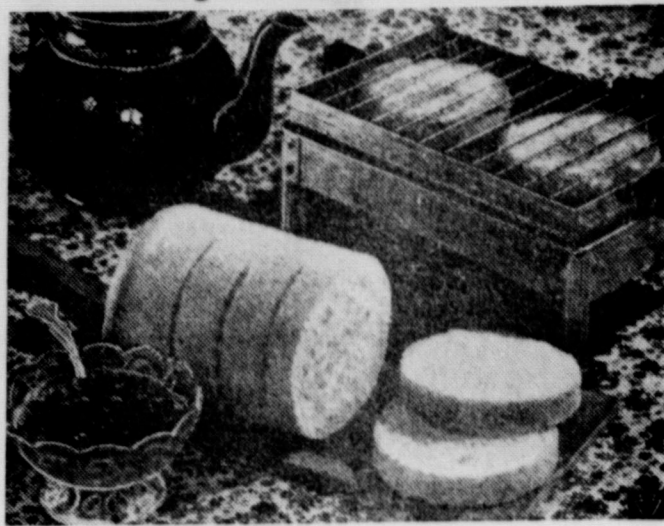

Combine 1 1/2 cups flour, yeast, sugar and salt. Add hot tap water (115 to 120°); mix until dry ingredients are moistened. Beat until smooth, about 2 minutes on electric mixer or 300 strokes by hand. Blend in oil and eggs. Add flour to make a stiff batter. Beat until batter is smooth and elastic, about 1 minute with electric mixer or 150 strokes by hand. Cover and let rise in warm place (80 to 85°) until light and bubbly, about 1 hour. Stir down. Divide into 3 well-greased and corn meal dusted 1 pound coffee cans. Cover and let rise in warm place, until doubled, about 30 minutes. Bake in preheated 375° oven 15 to 20 minutes, or until done. Let cool completely in coffee cans. Invert and shake to remove loaves. To serve, slice and toast.

*Spoon flour into dry measuring cup; level. Do not scoop.
NOTE: If self-rising flour is used, omit salt.
†Two 4 1/2 x 8 1/2-inch loaf pans or six #303 cans can also be used.

Rugged, weather-resistant redwood and hardwood furniture is a favorite of many as the outdoor living season approaches. If you will be shopping for redwood furniture, Mrs. Jane Berry, Extension Housing and Home Furnishings specialist, suggests that you consider some pointers from the Summer and Casual Furniture Manufacturers Association: Select furniture that has a rich red color penetrating deep into the wood.

Choose pieces with seating edges and end boards free of knots and bark-like material. If knots do appear on the table or benches, they should be tight and hard. Make sure all edges are rounded and sanded smooth. A sign of better quality in redwood furniture is a table top that is screwed rather than nailed to the base. Redwood and hardwood furniture are both easy to maintain. Suds and hose redwood to get it ready for summer use, and before storing at the end of the season, give it a coat of penetrating sealer. Varnish or shellac should not be used on the redwood pieces. Hardwood swings, benches and seats should be washed down and waxed occasionally with paste auto wax during summer usage. Be sure to store them during the winter season.

Care should be taken in the use of abrasives. Regular use of harsh abrasives will gradually scratch the shiny finish off sinks, bathtubs and kitchen appliances. Once the surface has become dull and rough, it will get dirty faster and stain deeper. Coarse abrasives will also damage plastic ware, glass and non-stick finishes on cookware, painted woodwork and plated and highly polished metals.

Abrasives are used in scouring powders and pads. In most cases the larger the particles, the harsher the cleaner.

Abrasives can be recognized by their feel, which is rough and gritty. Labels on containers of abrasive powders seldom use the term "abrasive" but usually state that they are "cleansers."

Abrasives are important as a cleaning products because they help scour off tarnish, stains, hardened particles of food and grease and other unwanted substances.
