The annual Wheeler High School All-Sports Banquet was held last Friday evening in the school cafeteria with 175 people enjoying the festivities.

Rev. Don Cameron, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Pampa, was the principle speaker and the former football player from Mississippi brought an inspirational message to the gathering that honored the athletes of Wheeler High School.

Rev. Cameron is still active in athletics in the field of officiating high school football games in this area and has been one of the officials at a number

of Mustang contests.

One of the highlights of each All-Sports Banquet is the presentation of awards for excellence in athletics and this followed the meal which was catered by Dyers Bar-B-Q of Pampa.

The Fighting Mustang award, presented annually by the Pep Club, was won by Carroll Watson, senior Mustang guard and linebacker.

The Mustang Award, donated by an anonymous backer of Wheeler athletics to the football player that shows the greatest attributes of ability, desire, leadership, and character and selected by the coaching staff, was presented to Roy Don Chick, senior tailback.

The Best All-Around Basketball awards went to Brenda Errington, senior forward of the girls team and to Roy Don Chick, senior forward, representing the boys.

Coaches Bateman and Wiggins made the awards presentations. The squads representing Wheeler High athletics were introduced to the crowd and special recognition was given to 11 boys who took part in three sports for the Mustangs.

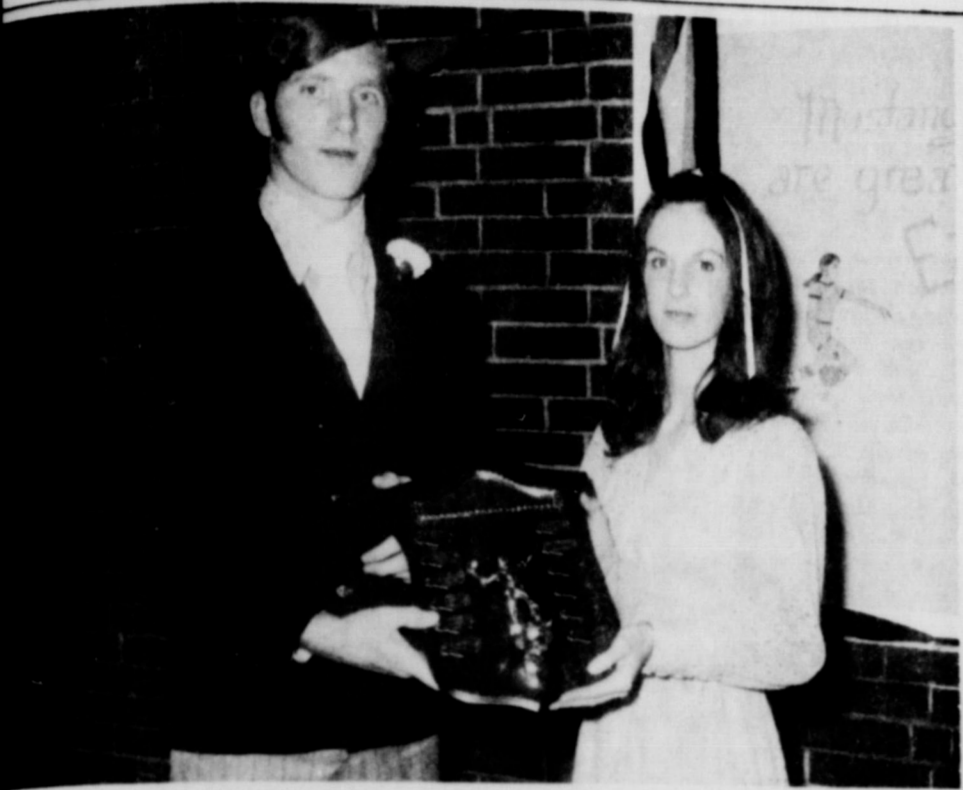

C.A. Elects Two Board Members

Two members of the Board of Directors were re-elected to their posts by stockholders of the Canadian Production Credit Association at the group's annual meeting held Thursday, April 24, 1971, in the Canadian High School Auditorium.

More than 300 members and guests of the agricultural credit organization met at the Association's county area of the north-Panhandle attended the business meeting and luncheon.

Re-elected to the Board of Directors were L.F. Hedges of Canadian and Lawrence Ellzey of Amarillo. Both were re-elected to three-year terms.

Other board members elected were H.Y. Kealey of White Deer, C. B. Henderson of Amarillo, Hugh F. Parsell of Canadian and Wallace N. Baker of Booker.

The Canadian Production Credit Association, owned and operated by its more than 650 stockholders, was organized in 1934. On March 31, 1971, the Association had a loan portfolio of \$28,755,000, assets totalling \$30,525,000 and a net worth of \$4,525,000.

The Association serves the area of Hemphill, Gray, Roberts, Wheeler, Ochiltree and Lipscomb Counties. The central office is in Canadian and branch offices are operated in Pampa, Amarillo and Wheeler.

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BASEBALL CONTEST TESTS BOYS' SKILLS MAY 22

Local contest for the official Major League Baseball Pitch, Hit and Throw Competition (PH&T) will be held on May 22 at Kidlerics Field in Shamrock.

All boys, aged 9 through 12, in the Wheeler, Briscoe, and Allison areas who register for PH&T are eligible to participate in the contest. Registration will continue through May 20.

PH&T is a nationwide youth program sponsored by Major League Baseball with Phillips Petroleum Company and local Phillips 66 dealers. Local winners advance through district and division contests until eight boys-four representing the National League and four the American League-have won the right to compete for national championships at the All-Star Game in Detroit, on July 13.

Don Fritsche, Junior High Principal, Shamrock, PH&T coordinator for this area, announced that the local contest will be held at Kidlerics Field, May 22 at 10:00 a.m.

Fritsche said competition will continue until all the registered boys have completed the three events-pitching for control, hitting for distance and throwing for accuracy.

When the competition is completed, the winners and runners-up will receive handsome plaques and jacket patches.

All of the local winners will advance with local winners from other areas to compete in the district contest at the Amarillo Giant's Baseball Park, Amarillo, on June 5.

The four winners from the

district competition will move up to the next level, the division competition scheduled for the week-end of June 13 at The Astro-dome in Houston. All of the division participants will compete in a junior-size baseball uniform loaned for the purpose.

On the trip to Houston each boy will be accompanied by his parents. They'll be feted at a banquet with major league stars and they'll be taken on a sightseeing trip of the city.

The division competition will take place either prior to a regular league game or between games if there is a double-header.

The eight boys who will go to the All-Star Game to compete for the national championships will be those with the highest scores in their age group and their league among all the division contest winners.

The parents of the eight boys also will win a free trip to Detroit to watch their boys compete for the national championships at the All-Star Game and they will have box seats for the game.

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Bowen Is New Combinationman

Keith Bowen has been named combinationman at Wheeler replacing E.C. Bobbitt who transferred to Wellington, according to an announcement by Sherron T. Lee, Division Manager for General Telephone Company.

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Contracts Let For Highway Work

Cooper and Woodruff, Inc. of Amarillo was awarded a contract for grading, structures, base and surfacing work on 15.2 miles of FM 48, FM 1046 and FM 3182 in Wheeler County. Low bid was \$548,352.82.

The project extends from State Highway 152 at Old Mobeetie northward and eastward to US 83 from FM 1046, 4.2 miles north-east of Mobeetie southward 6.0 miles to State Highway 152.

O.V. Johnson, Supt. Resident Engineer of Wellington, is the Highway Department engineer in charge of the project which will take an estimated 200 working days. The work will be under the supervision of District Engineer V.J. McGee of Childress.

Man Probated In Rape Case

Dwayne Watson, 29, of Shamrock was given a 10-year probated sentence here Tuesday in 31st District Court after he entered a plea of guilty to a charge of rape of a 14-year-old girl.

The all-male jury deliberated on punishment for about an hour before returning with the probated sentence.

District Judge Grainger McIlhenny presided over the trial.

SPOT CLEANER
1 tsp. detergent
1 tsp. white vinegar
1 qt. water

You may have to use more detergent in hard water. The vinegar neutralizes the alkaline in the detergent.

For those of you that enjoy fondue, or those of you that would like to try preparing fondue, here's a good one for entertaining, or as a dessert.
Refreshing Fruit Fondue
1 1/2 cups syrup
2 tbsp. toasted sesame

seeds or finely chopped nuts
4 cups bite-size pieces peeled fresh fruits, chilled
Bring syrup to a boil over medium heat. Continue cooking 10 minutes or until syrup is slightly thickened and reduced to 2/3 of its original volume. Stir in sesame seeds. Pour into small fondue pot or chafing dish. Arrange fruits in individual bowls around heated syrup mixture or in compote dish. To serve use long fondue forks or bamboo skewers to spear fruits and dip into syrup mixture. Makes about 1 cup syrup plus 4 cups fruit, or 4 to 6 servings.

Suggested Fruits: Apples, pears, peaches, pineapple, and bananas. (Dip bananas, apples, pears in citrus juice-orange or lemon. To keep them from turning dark.

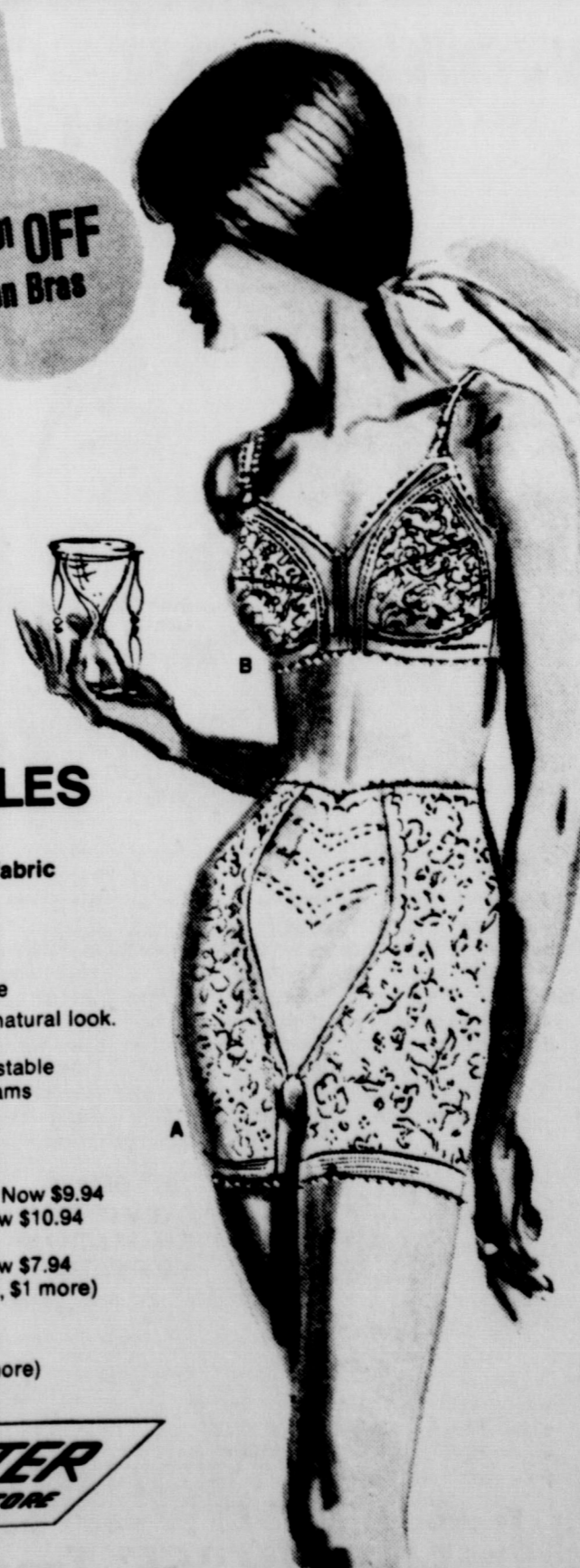
