

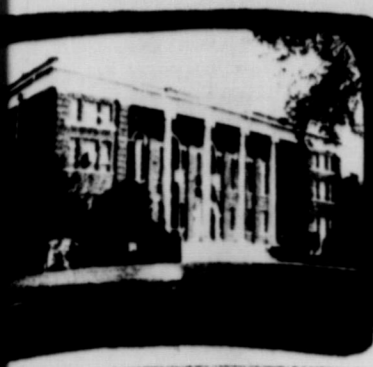

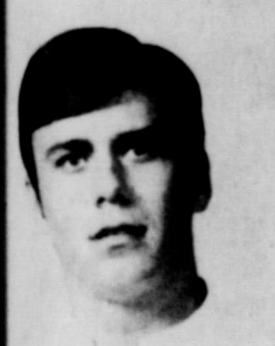

Herd Observes 20th Serv. Anniv.

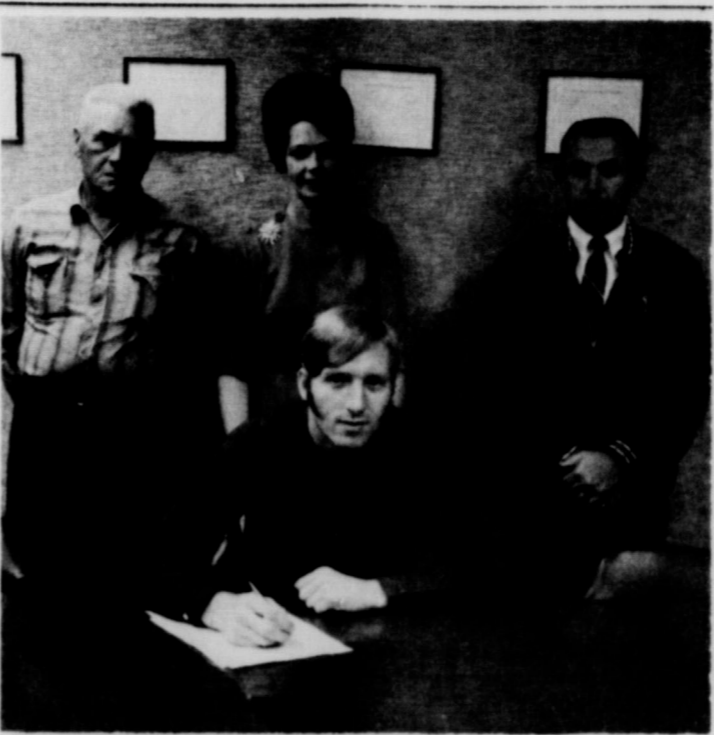

EMERGENCY LOAN FUNDS AVAILABLE THRU FARMERS HOME

More Emergency Loan Funds Expected for Texas Drought Area: Emergency loan funds are available, applications are being taken, and more money has been requested to combat the serious effects of the drought which grips Texas, Lynn Futch, State Director of Farmers Home Administration said today. President Nixon has asked the Congress to add \$65 million to the fund from which FHA finances its nationwide emergency farm loan program, Mr. Futch said. The Farmers Home Administration has already made 1503 emergency loans totaling \$15 million to farmers and ranchers in Texas to help them overcome the disastrous effects of the drought which has scorched parts of the state since the spring of 1970. Emergency loans are made to enable farmers and ranchers to continue normal operations which have been disrupted by natural disasters. These loans previously were available to 53 Texas counties, and last month, the Secretary of Agriculture increased the number to 235 counties. The impact of the drought has centered primarily in Texas and Oklahoma, but Mr. Futch said that emergency loans may be made outside of designated areas to eligible applicants who have suffered severe losses as a result of the drought. Current interest rates on emergency loans are 4 7/8 percent, repayable as soon as possible consistent with the financial ability of borrowers, Mr. Futch said. Application for loans should be made at county offices of Farmers Home Administration, usually located in the County seat town in which the farm property is located. The Wheeler County office is located at 112 West Oklahoma in Wheeler and the County Supervisor is John L. Manning.

Across the Fence

We don't have enough water in the county to lick a postage stamp with. The current drought is forcing home owners, as well as farmers, to make decisions about how to best use the available water.

If water is limited, a special effort should be made to save valuable trees. It takes years to grow a fine tree while shrubs and lawns can be replaced in short order once weather conditions become favorable. Use a mulch, if possible; flood irrigate or use a soaker hose; if you must use a

sprinkler, set it so the water will be soaked into the soil as it is applied; remember the evaporation rate is lowest in the evening hours and very early morning and soak the soil to a depth of 6 to 8 inches when you irrigate. Frequent watering is wasteful and encourages shallow root systems on plants.

We figured out a system at home that will water the lawn and flower bed from the washing machine. Every time a wash load of clothes is washed, twenty to thirty gallons of water travels through some plastic pipe to the lawn. The black plastic pipe doesn't look too pretty but it looks like its going to keep the lawn going.

I think you would agree with me that if we knew it was going to rain tomorrow, we would be busy getting fertilizer out today on our

permanent pastures.

We are usually hesitant to put out fertilizer during a dry period. There is a possibility that it may lay on top of the ground for a period of time and that it might be lost.

Let's look at the situation more closely. Phosphorus and potassium will not evaporate or volatilize

from any soil and will not leach or otherwise be lost from any soil except almost pure sand. Therefore, phosphorus and potash can be applied at any time, including the fall or winter. In fact, it would be an excellent practice, as far as the grass is concerned, to make this application in the fall or winter and then apply the nitrogen during the growth season.

The plant nutrient then that we are really concerned about is nitrogen. During the long, dry period in 1970, the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station had several situations, including research plots, where ammonium nitrate was broadcast on coastal bermuda grass but did not receive any moisture for about 70 days or a little over 2 months. When it finally did rain in late summer, the grass responded very well to the nitrogen application. This indicated that nitrogen from ammonium nitrate lying on hot dry ground had no

serious losses.

Therefore, it seems quite safe to go ahead and apply fertilizer on dry sod and expect a response when the rains do come.

This, of course, is based on a fertilizer application that contains enough nitrogen to produce a response. Generally, it requires about 40 pounds of nitrogen per acre to produce some increased growth and 60 to 100 pounds per acre to produce some increased growth and 60 to 100 pounds per acre to produce desired amounts of quality forage for good grazing and hay production.

Therefore, fertilizer should be applied now to pastures to take advantage of the first moisture to get the grass growing. If we wait for a rain to apply fertilizer, then we have to wait 'till the ground is dry enough to get equipment in on it and then get another rain which could mean the loss of a grazing period or hay crop-

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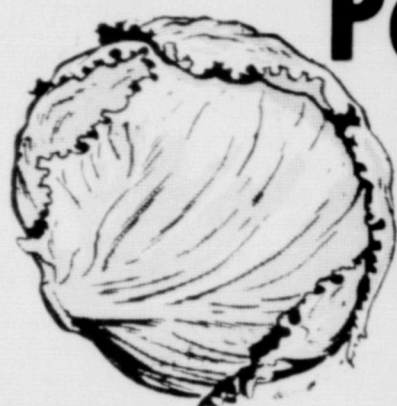

Looking for a new idea? You might have some of the 4-H girls out at Kelton show you what they've been doing. They've learned to crochet, and for their first project they've crocheted purses. They are circular in shape and will be lined with felt or other fabric. As well as learning something new, these girls also have something they can use!

We have 18 enrolled in the home study course, "Your Preschool Child". Even though the enrollment deadline was Friday, May 21, there will be several extra lessons printed. So, it's not too late if you'll let me know before Monday, May 31, the day the first lessons is going to be mailed.

Drupes make dandy desserts! What a drupe, you say? A drupe is the plant name for a flesh fruit enclosed in a hard stone—peaches, plums, cherries, apricots—in plain language! And canned cling peaches are plentiful this month says U.S. Department of Agriculture's Consumer and Marketing service.

Few Homemakers ever will have occasion to know the names of the many varieties of cling peaches grown for canning. Varieties are developed with emphasis on ripening to help equalize the tonnage of fruit delivered to the canneries during the harvest season. This guarantees instant processing of top quality fruit at the peak of its flavor, ripeness, and aroma.

The cling peach does not lose its rich golden color from heat and water in the canning process.

Hot cling peaches make a tasty garnish with main dishes. They are easy to boil, broil, or barbecue, and they stay hot longer than most foods.

They go great with everything from meat loaf to chicken. And don't forget breakfast! Dress up cooked cereal with a tempting layer of hot peach slices sprinkled with brown sugar. —M'm! M'm! Or try hot cling peaches and pancakes or waffles. It's easy, quick and sure to make the family happy. Another breakfast pleaser is Quick Peach Muffins.

QUICK PEACH MUFFINS
1 can (1 lb.) cling peach slices
2 cups biscuit mix
1 tablespoon sugar
1 egg
2 tablespoons melted butter or margarine
2/3 cup peach syrup
Drain peaches, saving 2/3 cup syrup. Combine biscuit mix, sugar, egg, melted butter, and peach syrup. Mix quickly and fill greased or paper-lined muffin tins 2/3 to 2/3 full. Arrange one or two peach slices on each muffin. Bake in 400 degrees F. (hot) oven for 20 minutes. Makes 12 muffins.

If desired, a 14-oz. package of muffin mix can be substituted for the biscuit mixture. To make, using muffin mix, follow directions on

package, substituting peach syrup for the liquid. Fill greased or paper-lined muffin cups 2/3 to 2/3 full. Arrange one or two peach slices on each muffin. Bake in 400 degree F. oven for 20 minutes.

Be watching next month as June is dairy month. This is the time of the year for abundant supplies of milk and other dairy products. Although the "regular" price won't decrease, some feature should be found on these products.
