9 FUNNELS IN WHEELER AREA

Briscoe Hit With Heavy Hail

Nine confirmed sightings of funnels were reported by the Wheeler fire department Tuesday evening during a period from 7:30 until 9:00. The clouds dumped "door knob" size hail at the Skinny D'Spain place south and east of Briscoe.

The Wheeler fire Department went on watch at 7:30. Sightings were first reported 5 miles northeast of Wheeler. The watch lasted until 9:00.

Of the nine funnels sighted and confirmed by the department, three were on the ground. The area where funnels were spotted were in a tri-

angle from Wheeler to Briscoe to Allison.

The sirens were sounded at Allison around 9:00 and residents took shelter, but they received only a small amount of hail and 2 1/2" of rain.

Briscoe and south were the hardest hit by the storm which broke window lights and windshields. The C.E. Williams of Briscoe had their car and pickup windshields broken.

Skinny D'Spain reported the hail started at 7:15 and continued for an hour; he reported the ground was as

white as if it had snowed. No rain gauge was available but he estimated the rain at more than 2 inches.

Mrs. Colie Parker, 6 mi. N.E. of Briscoe reported a small amount of hail and 3" inches of rain. This gives the Parkers 7 inches of rain in the past week and a half. Mrs. Parker watched her barometer during the worst of the cloud and at no time did the barometer drop to the point of danger.

The crew at the Frank Walker No. 1 Well, left the drilling sight as a large funnel approached from the southwest; the funnel was estimated to be 2 miles from the rig and rapidly moving in the direction of the tower. The funnel lifted and marble size hail covered the ground with an estimated 3 inches of rain. From their location 2 east and 4 north of Wheeler the crew at the Walker Well watched four funnel clouds appear to touch the ground.

Four units of the Wheeler Fire Department went on watch Thursday evening at 9:50 after an unconfirmed tornado was reported 2 miles west of Kellerville. No funnels were reported in the Wheeler area as this cloud approached Wheeler; 0.79 inches of rain fell.

Wheeler received 0.5 inches of rain from the cloud Tuesday evening.

A reminder--The tornado warning in Wheeler for residents to take shelter is 2-30 second blasts of the fire siren; no all clear signal will be sounded. The signal has not been sounded this year.

bundles for which separate letter drops will be provided at the Post office. Mr. Whitener urged that when the plan goes into effect, for obvious reasons, customers should not use the word "City" on mail addressed for local delivery, but spell out the name, and use the ZIP Code.

Mr. Whitener emphasized that all mail mailed at Wheeler will receive a Wheeler Post Mark, but only that for "Local" delivery will be processed in Wheeler, all the rest will be sent to Amarillo for processing and dispatch.

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Amarillo has a new \$110,000 mail sorting machine, with capability of sorting 21,000 letters per hour into 160 separations, with only six operator positions.

Area Mail Processing is a program whereby virtually all mail originating in the Wheeler, Texas Post office will be post marked with a Wheeler Texas post mark and then in bulk to Amarillo for further preparation and dispatch.

Mr. Whitener, Postmaster stated that the only noticeable change for the customers of the Wheeler Post office would be the location of their mail into "Local" and "Out of Town" bundles for which separate letter drops will be provided at the Post office.

Mr. Whitener emphasized that all mail mailed at Wheeler will receive a Wheeler Post Mark, but only that for "Local" delivery will be processed in Wheeler, all the rest will be sent to Amarillo for processing and dispatch.

Across the Fence

I see where several
farming corporations
got big enough to go broke
in the last few months:
namely CBK Agronomics,
Gates Rubber Co.'s Big
Creek Farms, Multiponds
Inc., Great Western Land
Co., and Black Watch Farms.
There are a lot of reasons
given as to why this hap-
pened, such as too much
high priced overhead and
costly expert help and
advise. Of course, the reason
aren't all the same for any
one outfit. With this kind of
corporate set-up, Dad Corp.
can't say to Ma Corp., "you
just gotta make the kids un-
derwear outa flour sacks until
we get the cattle sold this
fall and see if we got any
money left".

We've also been reading
where a couple million fam-
ilies left the farm the past
20 years, sold out to the
neighbor, and took what they
had left and moved along
side of or into town. Over
300 farm families left Whee-
ler County in just the past
10 years. The reasons given
for this was that they were
too little an outfit. They just
didn't even have the flour
sack and a "toe" sacks cost
too much to be using them
up that way anyhow. You
don't have to wonder how
little is too little. A couple
of million families figured
that out all by themselves
without any help or expertise
that cost cash money. Our
area cannot help but feel the
economic pinch from such a
long siege without adequate
rains. Most of us are well
aware of the results if we
are not prepared or have
planned for emergencies. The
drought area covers all but
75 Texas counties. Our ASCS
people are mailing details
of the grain program to far-
mers to help those who need
grain to preserve their cattle
herds. We understand a fi-
nancial statement is enclo-

Do you have any insurance

answers to the name of
Drought.

What kind of insurance or

to draw on in this emergency?
Many ranchers have an in-
surance policy for this emer-
gency. This policy is includ-
ed with long range plans
used by these ranchers to
stay in business for many
years both good and bad.
This policy may not be in a
safety deposit box but is
included in their overall
conservation plan of opera-
tions. Included are year to
year plans for needed con-
servation plan of operations.
Included are year to year
plans for needed conser-
vative practices to conserv
water including ponds or
wells for extra water for
use in dry years. These
plans include what is to be
done each year in order to
prepare for long dry periods
and what is to be done when
these droughts occur.

This year to year prepara-
tion may include keeping a
forage reserve such as
leaving forage in a pas-
ture for later use or put-
ting up extra hay for use in
emergencies. The pay off
in this insurance policy
would be the using of hay
or grazing reserve forage in
times of emergency such as
short periods of dry weather.
We all know that in order
for a grass plant to sur-
vive, even in years of nor-
mal rainfall, it must have
leaves to manufacture food
for continued growth and
survival. To produce beef
we must produce grass. If
our grasses are damaged by
dry weather and then grazed

by the same number of live-
stock carried in a normal
year, it may take a number
of years for these grasses to
recover. This may mean
years of lower beef produc-
tion and lower profits.

To have a complete and
effective plan to rely on in
times of drought we must
include the use of forage
reserves, supplemental
feeding and in extended pe-
riods of drought, as we are
in now, reducing herd
numbers. Having a flexible
livestock operation in which
stocker numbers can be
easily balanced with grass
production, older cows and
low producers are culled, or
herd numbers are reduced is
essential. This will keep our
grasses alive and in shape
to continue in their role of
beef production. Remember,
it is not the number of
calves sold each year that
determines profit but the
number of pounds of beef
that is marketed!

PAT'S PARAGRAPHS

Well, another school year is over, and a busy summer is ahead. Seems like summer is always as busy, if not a busier time for most families! Here's a statement which I read that some of you Mothers may agree with, "Isn't it wonderful how school vacation runs out at about the same time as your patience?"

Seriously, this summer can be the best ever for you and your family.

The secret to getting rid of those extra bulges and pounds this summer is following a sensible diet, then sticking to it.

Fad diets, such as the rice or grapefruit diet, are popular now. But, fad diets are not based on solid nutritional practices.

Diets need to be formulated so that you can eat a variety of foods, and at the same time include those goods that are favorites. A reducing diet should be easily adaptable to a regular eating program once you've reached your weight goal. Otherwise, you'll be right back where you started overweight.

Exercise is also a vital factor in weight reduction. Regular exercise helps burn up calories and also helps strengthen and firm up flabby muscles and extra fat.

One of the soundest, easy to follow reducing diets is the Daily Food Guide. This guide is divided into four food groups (milk, bread, and cereal, meat, fruit and vegetables). If you choose low calorie foods from each of these groups in the amount recommended, you will consume daily approximately 1200 calories, a safe reducing level for most normal adults.

Don't lose more than two pounds a week with diet. This means cutting down 500-100 calories per day.

The Daily Food guide includes two servings from the meat group; four or more from the fruit and vegetable group, four from the bread and cereal group, and two servings (for adults) from the milk group.

Speaking of milk group, June is dairy month. Dairy products will be featured this month, and will be in plentiful supply.

Sour cream offers a collection of recipe ideas for the novice cook or the "old hand" to tempt their family. Whether it is mixed with or on top of another food sour cream combines superbly with salads, main dishes, baked goods, or desserts.

Sour cream makes an ideal salad dressing and is low in calories. One tablespoon of sour cream has 25 calories whereas one tablespoon of mayonnaise has 100. French type dressing has 65 calories per tablespoon.

See what sour cream does for Applesauce Cake:

1/2 cup heavy sour cream
3/4 to 1 cup sugar
1/2 cup unsweetened thick applesauce
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon cinnamon
2 cups sifted flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon soda
1/4 teaspoon cloves (ground)
1 cup chopped raisins

1 cup chopped nuts
Mix sour cream, sugar, and applesauce. Sift the dry ingredients together and add to the first mixture with the raisins and nuts. Mix Well. Pour into a well greased bread pan and bake in a moderate oven, 350 degrees F. for about 1 hour.

As mentioned before, June is dairy month, the month when dairy foods are given special emphasis.

Yogurt, after being dismissed for years as a health food, is becoming more and more popular.

While consumption of some dairy products is declining, the yogurt market is growing and show prospects for continued growth.

Yogurt is a thick, smooth-textured, cultured milk product prepared with a mixed culture of lactic bacteria. It is usually made with fresh, partially skimmed milk that has been enriched by the addition of nonfat dry milk.

The nutritive value of yogurt is the same as in milk-high in protein and calcium. Plain, unflavored yogurt is a cousin to sour cream, but has only one-third the calories. One cup plain yogurt contains only 160 calories; fruit yogurt of 2.5% fat has about 250 calories per eight ounce cup.

Yogurt should be stored at a temperature of 40 degrees, and should be consumed within three to four days. If stored for longer periods, the acidity may increase to produce a sharper flavored product.

When cooking with yogurt, stir or fold it into the other ingredients. The custard-like texture of the yogurt will be broken down by any vigorous beating, so treat it lightly. Yogurt also thins out during cooking--even more than sour cream. To prevent so much separation, add a small amount of flour or cornstarch to the yogurt before using for cooking.

Yogurt can be eaten from the carton or spooned over fruit for a dessert. It is also good in dips, toppings and salad dressings similar to those composed of

sour cream as a base.

Some of you may have gardens this summer and will want to do some canning. I have information on canning in my office.

Also there is a pamphlet entitled, "Frozen Foods". This includes how to cook

and how to freeze foods. Come by my office for this one.

Here's a recipe using a dairy food-cheese! (Did you know a medium slice or 1 ounce cube of Cheddar type cheese equals about three fourths of a glass of milk in calcium?)

For a quick and nourishing lunch or snack fix Ham, Cheesers, hot, Openface sandwiches that go great with milk.

HAM "M CHEESERS" (yield: 1 2/3 cups spread)

1 cup (4oz.) shredded Cheddar cheese
1/2 cup finely chopped cooked ham
1/4 cup pickle relish
1/4 cup light cream or half & half

In a bowl combine cheese, ham, relish, and cream. Spread on bread, rolls, or toasted English muffins and broil until cheese melts.

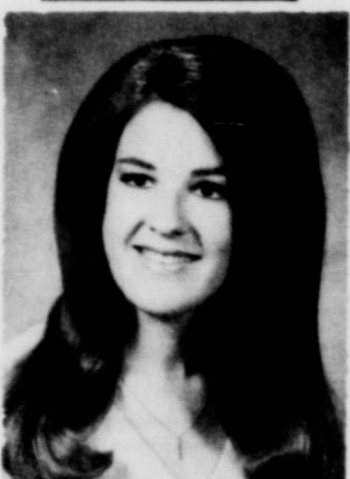

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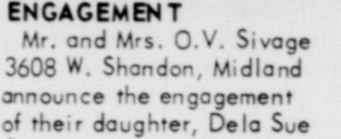
