.5 TO 5" RAINFALLS THURSDAY EVENING

A rain of 2.65 inches in less than an hour caused some flooding in Wheeler Thursday evening. The rain came the third night of severe weather warnings for Wheeler area.

A six foot section of basement wall caved in at the W.A. Goad, Jr., residence. The wall had leaked once before and the Goads had removed some of the items stored against the wall. Water in the basement reached a depth of 8".

Flooding occurred in the 600 blocks of Seventh and Stanley. An estimate of the damage to the paving on Seventh was not available. The yards at the Winslow residence and Joe Weatherly residence were heavily damaged by the water.

The bridge in the 500 block of East Seventh was almost covered with water. The

creek which runs through the park overflowed and put a large portion of the park under water.

The water from the west side of Wheeler went across highway 83 1/2 mile north of town. The water lacked a few inches running in the back door of the Ted Nelson home; a large portion of his fence was washed out by the water which reached a depth

of 5 feet in the draw. Nelson reported his 5 1/4 rain gauge was running over.

FARM PRODUCTIVITY EARNS WHITE HOUSE SALUTE

Texas farmers and ranchers helped earn recognition in President Nixon's recent White House salute to agriculture, according to Clarence A. Danklefs, Texas farm program leader.

The President, in a unique tribute to agricultural achievement, said "Thanks to American agriculture for making us the best fed, the best clothed people in America; thanks to American agriculture for providing the basic industry that is essential for any nation to be strong."

He cited specifically a 300 percent per man-hour productivity increase for agriculture in the last 20 years, comparing it with the 150 percent increase recorded by other American industry.

Danklefs, who is Chairman of the State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee, said

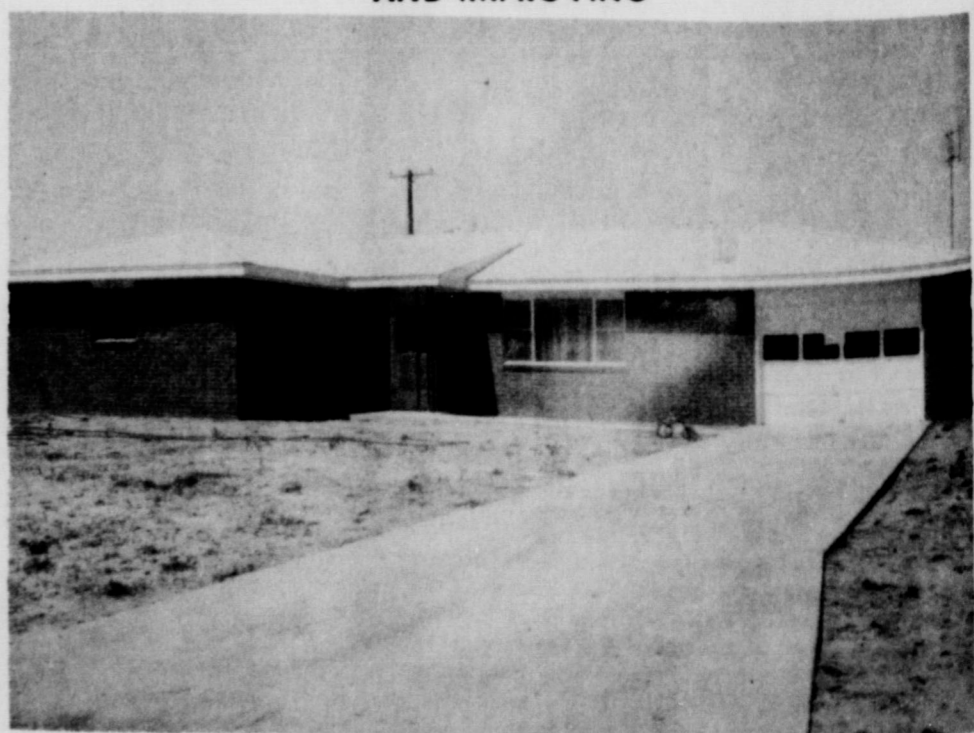

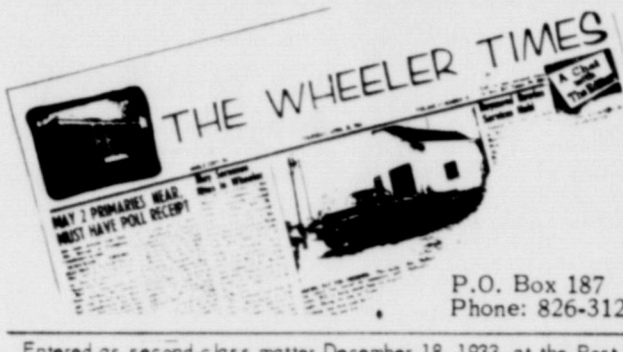

Across the Fence

Things sure look better after the rain. Of course the drought's not broken, but we're getting a temporary reprieve from it.

Annual weeds are coming on strong in many cotton yields since recent rains. MSMA or DSMA sold under such trade names as Ansan, Burno, or Caconate give effective control of these weeds if the air temperature is at least 75 degrees F. or higher. Other weeds controlled with these herbicides are cocklebur, Johnsongrass, nutgrass, and lake weed. If careless weeds appear with the above mentioned weeds, MSMA mixed with either Caporal, Cotaran, Herban, or

Karmex gives good control. Do not spray MSMA, DSMA, or any of the herbicide combinations after cotton begins squaring. Be sure to read the labels on all chemicals prior to application.

Pork producers may want to consider the use of barley and wheat to replace part of all of the grain sorghum in swine rations since sorghum prices are at a new high this year. Oats may be used to replace up to 25% of the grain sorghum in market hog rations and up to 30% in the brood sow ration during gestation. The following table gives the comparative value of the various small grains to grain sorghum in swine rations.

As an example, if grain sorghum is selling for \$2.80 per 100 lbs. the producer could pay up to \$1.68 per bushel for wheat to replace all or part of the sorghum in the ration. However, if

wheat is selling for more than \$1.68 per bushel, that grain sorghum would be more economical grain.

Grazing and Haying on set-aside acres should receive additional attention. Since the designation of disaster areas and recent rains, producers will want to consider planting forage crops on all of their set-aside acreage. In counties like ours, declared as disaster areas, forage crops can be grazed all summer with owned livestock or leased to others. Hay can also be harvested for the owner's use or for sale at not more than \$30 per ton.

Each producer must make written application at the local county ASCS office before grazing or harvesting hay from set-aside acres. Producers who made earlier application must complete another request before June 30 to participate in the extended period of forage harvest. Any questions concerning the status of set-aside acres should be directed to local ASCS personnel. Extending the harvest period and expanding the eligible acreage to 100% of the set-aside portion gives producers the opportunity to supplement their income with forage production.

EMERGENCY LIVESTOCK FEED PROGRAM

We understand that about six farmers have applied for emergency livestock food. Our county is now qualified for the livestock feed program due to drought conditions which exist. There is some concern among our farmers and especially ranchers concerning the sign-up requirements. Farmers already familiar with the "red tape" involved with government programs are accepting the feed program more readily than ranchers who are not accustomed to the necessary paper work.

The financial statement requirement can be compared to that required by banks, PCA or other financial institutions. Farmers may or may not qualify but the possibility should be explored in either case. The required financial statement is held in complete confidence by the ASCS.

In order to qualify for assistance the individual must show that the drought conditions will result in a financial hardship to him and his family as a result of excessive feeding, culling or default on existing financial obligations. In addition, farmers and ranchers may be forced into unsound borrowing positions as a result of the drought. These factors will allow the producer to be eligible for the livestock feed program.

Eligible Livestock Livestock owned by the producer for six months and that have been in the county at the time it was designated are eligible for the program. Livestock for purposes of participation in the program are segregated into primary and secondary.

Primary livestock include the owners foundation breeding herd and replacement offspring of cattle, sheep and goats. These livestock are eligible for grain at a reduced rate or 75% of the CCC loan and support price value of feed grains (corn, grain sorghum, barley, and oats.) Secondary livestock include all hogs, steers, yearlings, etc, not kept for replacements. These livestock are eligible

for grain at the full CCC loan and support price value. An animal unit is the basis for determination of the total amount of grain or hay the producer is eligible to receive under the program. An animal unit is defined under this program as 1 cow, 1 horse, 1 bull, 2 calves, 5 sheep or 5 goats. Each animal unit is eligible for 10 lbs. of grain or 15 lbs. of hay per day for the pre-

scribed period for that county. Primary and secondary livestock are eligible for grain on a formula basis. An example of how this program works for the qualified producer is:

Assuming the delivering county loan rate for grain sorghum (1970 price) is \$1.63 loan rate, plus .34 price support total price is \$1.97. \$1.97 primary live-

stock times .75 is \$1.48 cost to farmer of whole grain sorghum or grain sorghum content of processed feeds for primary livestock.

Producers may receive payment for 2/3 of the transportation cost for hay not to exceed \$20 per ton. If the producer hauls his own hay he may receive 6¢ per ton per loaded mile (one way).

These are a few of the general aspects of the program. Farmers should check with their ASCS office concerning further details.
