





Annual weeds are coming on strong in many cotton yields since recent rains. MSMA or DSMA sold under such trade names as Ansar, Burno, or Caconate give effectove control of these weeds if the air temperature is at least 75 degrees F. or nigher. Other weeds controlled with these herbicides are cocklebur, Johnsongrass, nutgrass, and lake weed. If carelessweeds appear with the above mentioned weeds, MSMA mixed with either Caparol, Cotoran, Herban, or



Pork producers may want to consider the use of barley and wheat to replace part of all of the grain sorahum in swine rations since sorghum prices are at a new high this year. Oats may be used to replace up to 25% of the grain sorghum in market hog rations and up to 50% in the broad sow ration during gestation. The following table gives the comparative value of the various small grains to grain sor-

ghum in swine rations. As an example, if grain sorghum is selling for \$2.80 per 100 lbs. the producer could pay up to \$1.68 per bushel for wheat to replace all or part of the sorghum in the ration. However, if

Grazing and Haying on ceive additional attention. Since the designation of disaster areas and recent rains, producers will want to consider planting forage crops on all of their set-aside acreage. In counties like ours, declared as disaster areas, forage crops can be grazed all summer with owned ivestock or leased to others. Hay can also be harvested for the owner's use or for sale at not more than \$30

Each producer must make written application at the' local county ASCS office before grazing or harvesting hay from set-aside acres. Producers who made earlier application must complete another request before June 30 to participate in the extended period of forage harvest. Any questions concerning the status of set-aside acres should be directed to

local ASCS personnel. Extending the harvest period and expanding the eligible acreage to 100% of the setaside portion gives producers the opportunity to supplement their income with forage production.

EMERGENCY LIVESTOCK

FEED PROGRAM We understand that about six farmers have applied for emergency livestock food. Our county is now qualified due to drought conditions which exist. There is some concern among our fam concern among our farmers and especially ranchers concerning the sign-up requirements. Farmers already familiar with the "red tape" involved with government programs are accepting the feed program more readily than ranchers who are not accustomed to the necessary paper work.

The financial statement requirement can be compared to that required by banks, PCA or other financial institutions. Farmers may home Monday. or may not qualify but the possibility should be explored in either case. The required financial statement is held in complete confidence by the ASCS.

In order to qualify for must show that the drought conditions will result in a financial hardship to him and his family as a result of excessive feeding, culling or default on existing financial obligations. In addition, farmers and ranchers may be forced into unsound borrowing positions as a result of the drought. These factors will allow the producer to be eligible for the livestock

feed program. Eligible Livestock

Livestock owned by the producer for six months and that have been in the county at the time it was designated are eligible for the program. Livestock for purposes of participation in the program are segregated into primary and secondary.

Primary livestock include the owners foundation breeding herd and replacement offspring of cattle, sheep and goats. These livestock are eligible for grain at a reduced Vernon. rate or 75% of the CCC loan and support price value of feed grains (corn, grain sorahum, barley, and oats.)

Secondary livestock include all hogs, steers, yearlings, etc, not kept for replacements These livestock are eligible Galmor and family, Mr. and

loan and support price value. An animal unit is the basis for determination of the total amount of grain or hay the producer is eligible to recieve under the program. An animal unit is defined under this program as 1 cow, 1 horse, 1 bull, 2 calves, 5 sheep or 5 goats. Each animal unit is eligible for 10 lbs. of grain or 15 lbs. of
