### Lefors B-Team Cancelled

The B Team's game with the Lefors B Team scheduled for Saturday morning in Wheeler has been canceled due to injuries on the Lefors squad. Coach Bill Wiggins announced this week that it will be touch and go the rest of the season for the Mustang B teamers because of the lack of boys on the varsity squad. "Some kids that we counted on decided they didn't want to play this year and consequently our whole program is hurt, especially the B team," Coach Wiggins said.

Three weeks of preparation come to an end Friday night when the Wheeler Mustangs get the 1971 football season underway with an 8 P.M. contest against the strong Lefors Pirates on the Pirate gridiron.

Following two scrimmages with Shamrock and Chilli-cothe, the Mustangs will have several new faces dotting their offensive and defensive lineups that take the field against a veteran Pirate lineup.

Graduation took four Mustang regulars and their ranks were further depleted when one starter moved and another decided not to participate his senior year.

Filling these shoes has been uppermost in the coaching staffs minds as Coach Jim Bateman and his staff begin their second season tutoring the Mustang grid-ders. "Depth and lack of speed will definitely hurt us this year," Coach Bateman said in assessing his teams prospects.

"The boys have really worked hard this year and their attitude has been great and the seniors have really helped in motivating our younger kids," the coach said. "This first ball game is real important and we expect the kids to really get with it."

Three senior transfers have helped the local crew with Ronnie and Pat Hill coming from Clarendon and Sandy Richardson transfer-

ring from Allison. The Lefors Pirates return 8 offensive and 9 defensive regulars to the units that will take the field against the Mustangs and they will certainly not forget the 26 14 posting the Mustangs handed them last year.

David White, 150 lb. Sr. quarterback leads the Pirate offense that operates out of the Denver City T and his big gun in the ball totting department is Mike Robbins, a 185 lb. fullback.

The Mustangs will counter the Pirate power with an all letterman backfield paced by Rodney Weatherly and Jimmy Cole at fullback and tailback respectfully. Gary Ficher begins his second year as the Mustang quarterback and junior Dale Stevens rounds out the backfield from his wingback slot.

Offensively, the Mustangs will start a forward wall of Jerry Beaty and J.C. Brooks at ends, Ronnie and Pat Hill at tackles, Noel Glazier and Jim Bob Brooks at guards, and Rick Hefley manning the center position.

On defense the Mustangs will make a few position changes with Ronnie Hill and Lewis Britt at defensive ends, Pat Hill and Noel Glazier at tackles and Jim Bob Brooks at nose guard. Weatherly and Hefley will back the line and the secondary will be composed of Fischer and Stevens at cornerbacks and Cole and Beaty at safeties.

Wheeler has always backed their athletic teams and it is hoped that the town will close up and go to Lefors and back the 1971 Mustang grid-ders at the 8 P.M. kickoff.

### FARMERS HOME ADMINISTRATION TOP \$155,000,000 MARK

John Futch, Texas State administrator of the Farmers Home Administration, has announced that the agency extended credit to rural Texans in amount of \$155,456,817 during the 1971 fiscal year ending June 30, 1971. This was a 10 percent increase over the amount of \$141,000,000 in 1970. Futch said that there was a sizeable decrease in the percentage of loan delinquencies as compared to previous years. Due to the severe drought in the spring and early summer of this year it is expected that the demand for emergency credit to farmers and ranchers this fall and winter will substantially increase the volume of farm loans in fiscal 1972, with all other programs also expected to be expanded. The program is administered in Texas through 144 county offices and the state office in Temple.

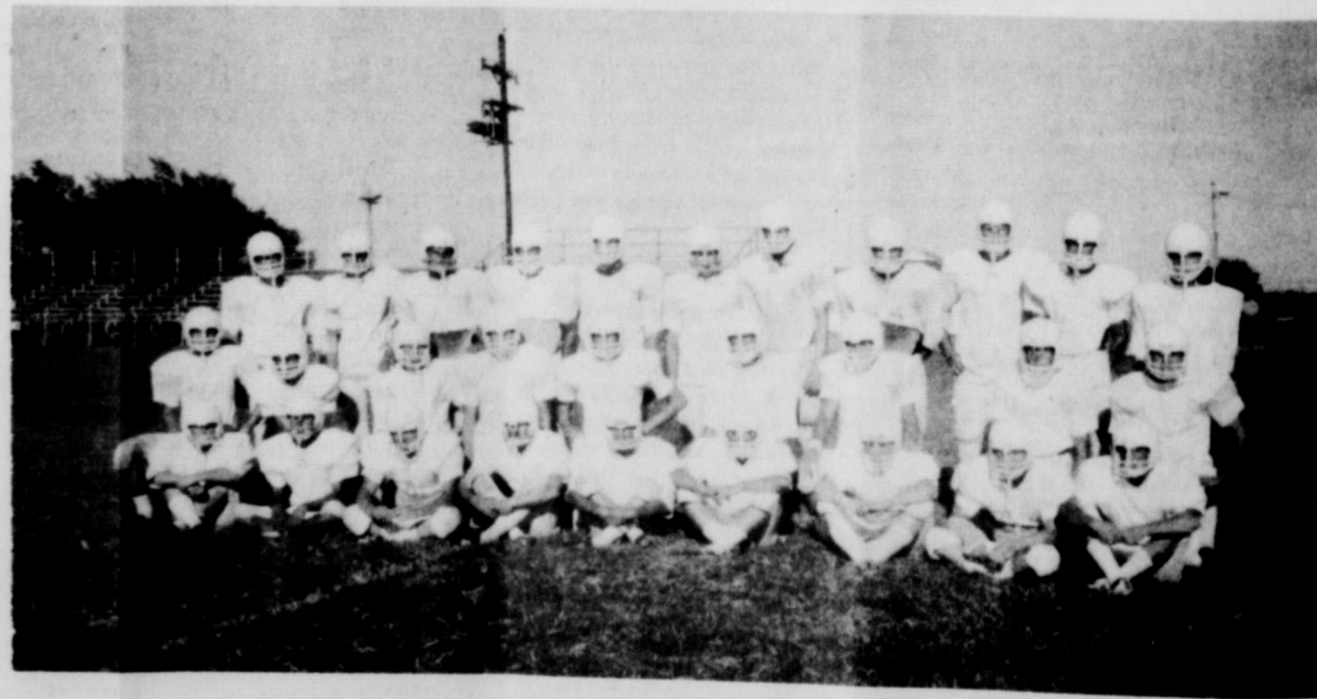

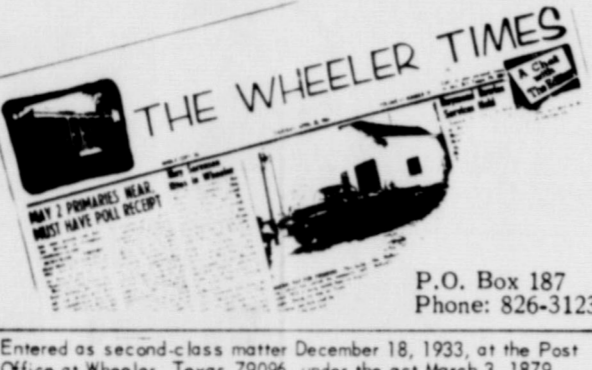
## Legal Notice

**AN ACT**  
relating to the recording and  
rerecording of livestock  
brands and marks, and de-  
claring an emergency.  
**BE IT ENACTED BY THE**  
**LEGISLATURE OF THE**  
**STATE OF TEXAS**  
Section 1. (a) This Act  
shall apply to every county  
in this State. In all the  
counties, each owner of any  
livestock mentioned in Chap-  
ter 1 of Title 121 of the Re-  
vised Civil Statutes of 1925  
shall within six months after  
this Act takes effect, have  
his mark and brand for such  
stock recorded in the office  
of the county clerk of the  
county. These owners shall  
record the marks and brands  
whether the brand and marks  
have been previously record-  
ed or not.  
(b) The owner shall have  
the right to have his mark  
and brand recorded in his  
name who according to the  
present records of the county  
first recorded the brand and  
mark in the county, or in  
event it can not be ascer-  
tained from the records who  
first recorded the brand and  
mark in the county, then the  
person who has been using  
such mark and brand the  
longest shall have the right  
to have the brand and mark  
recorded in his name.  
(c) After the expiration of  
six months from the taking  
effect of this Act, all rec-  
ords of marks and brands now  
in existence in the county  
shall no longer have any  
force or effect and after the  
expiration of six months, only  
the records made after this  
Act takes effect shall be  
examined or considered in  
recording marks and brands  
in the county.  
(d) Immediately upon the  
taking effect of this Act the  
county clerk of the county  
shall have this Act published  
in some newspaper of general  
circulation in the county for  
a period of thirty days. The  
publication shall be paid  
for by the county out of the  
general county fund.  
Sec. 2. All clerks in re-  
registering brands shall  
comply with Articles 6890  
through 6899, inclusive, of  
the Revised Civil Statutes  
of Texas, 1925, as amended,  
and with Section 1, Chapter  
273, Acts of the 41st Legis-  
lature, 1929, as amended  
(Article 6899a, Vernon's  
Texas Civil Statutes), and  
shall also be aware of and  
comply with Articles 1484,  
1485, and 1486 of the Penal  
Code of Texas, 1925.  
Sec. 3. All brands and  
marks registered under the  
provisions of this Act shall  
be reregistered every 10  
years in the manner pre-  
scribed in Section 1 of this  
Act.  
Sec. 4. The importance of  
this legislation and the crowd-  
ed condition of the calend-  
ars in both Houses create  
an emergency and an impera-  
tive public necessity that  
the Constitutional Rule re-  
quiring bills to be read on  
three several days in each  
House be suspended, and  
this Rule is hereby suspen-  
ded; and that this Act take  
effect and be in force from  
and after its passage, and  
it is so enacted.

## Across the Fence

By Max Hatter CAA  
What this country needs now is a good general rain. There are some parts of the county that haven't received hardly any rain. Wheeler got over 3 inches of rain in August. On our grazing study research, we recorded some of our best grazing gains this summer.

Kellerville has organized their own 4 H club. Mr. and Mrs. Van Horn were selected by the group to be leaders. Mrs. Jackie Brown will lead a clothing project group. Rex Immel will lead the hog project group and Van Horn will lead the beef cattle group. Preparations were made last Thursday night to select calves and pigs for the March Wheeler County show.

Last week we had the opportunity to show our grass observation plot to Directors for the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District. We shared information on clipping studies and protein content from the grasses on the plot. Crabgrass, surprisingly yielded about as many pounds of grass to the acre as the love grasses, and the crude protein content of close to 11% was equal to most of the grasses on the plot. Ranchers have long realized the value of crabgrass to cattle. However, we must point out that the crabgrass didn't recover from the clip-

pings. The love grasses had a good 8 to 10 inches of regrowth a month after clipping.

Preparations are now in full swing for the upcoming Northwest Texas Research Program and Barbecue on Tuesday night at 7:00 P.M., September 28 at the Kellton School. The most recent information on grazing studies and other research in progress will be unveiled at that time. We hope a lot of folks will make their plans to attend.

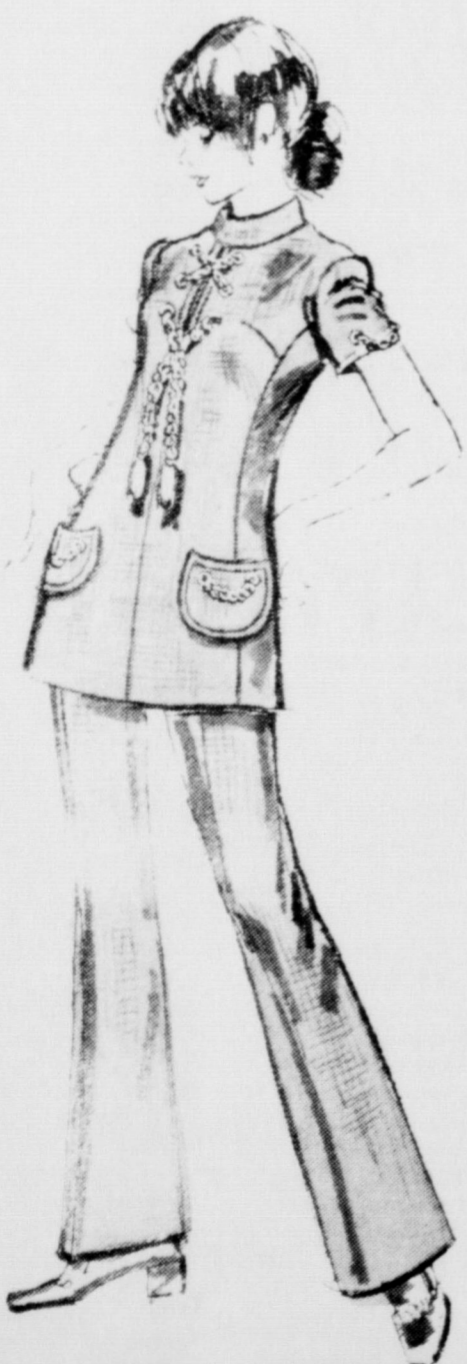

fusing action--becomes in-  
visible once heat and steam  
from an iron are appli-  
ed. It surely is nice to use for  
all these things to make that  
this pamphlet shows, and  
for hems in knits.

Capture all the delicious  
butter-like goodness of fresh  
pears by canning your own  
this month! It is not hard,  
and what better thing to  
look forward to during long,  
cold winter months than the  
flavor of "summery" fresh  
pears. With fresh pears so  
plentiful this month, accord-  
ing to the U.S. Department  
of Agriculture's Consumer  
and Marketing Service, why  
not "can-a-pear"? Whether  
you decide upon pears "as  
is" or in combination with  
other fruits for jams or con-  
serves, the re-

sults will be worth many  
times the effort.

To start your "can-a-  
pear" campaign, look for  
fresh, ripe pears that are  
firm, clean and free from  
blemishes--not misshapen,  
silted or shriveled--and  
with good color for the var-  
iety. Bartlett's should be  
pale yellow to rich yellow;  
Anjou or Comice should be  
light to yellowish green;  
Bosc should be greenish  
yellow to brownish yellow;  
Winter Nellis should be me-  
dium to light green!

Pears which are hard  
when you find them in the  
grocery store will probably  
ripen if kept at room tem-  
perature, but it is wise to  
select pears that have al-  
ready begun to soften, to be  
reasonably sure that they

will ripen satisfactorily.  
Avoid pears with slight  
weakening of the flesh near  
the stem, as this indicates  
immaturity and the pears  
will not ripen. Also avoid  
spots on the sides or blos-  
som ends of the pears,  
which mean that corky tis-  
sue may be underneath.

Most good canning book-  
lets or cookbooks give di-  
rections on how to can pears  
by either the "hot pack"  
or "raw pack" methods.  
Follow directions carefully  
to insure proper sealing of  
jars.

Or try putting your tal-  
ents to work in this attrac-  
tive combination of fresh  
chopped Bartlett pears,  
orange, crushed pineapple  
and maraschino cherries!  
**TUTTI-FRUITI JAM**  
3 c chopped or ground pears  
(about 2 lbs.)

1 large orange  
1/2 c. drained crushed pine-  
apple

1 pkg. powdered pectin  
1/4 c. chopped maraschino  
cherries (3 oz. bottle)

1/2 cup lemon juice  
5 c. sugar

Sort and wash ripe pears;  
pare and core. Chop or  
grind the pears. Peel the  
orange, remove seeds and  
chop or grind the pulp. Chop  
cherries. Measure chopped  
pears into a kettle. Add  
orange, pineapple, cherries  
and lemon juice. Stir in the  
pectin. Place on high heat  
and, stirring constantly,  
bring quickly to a full boil  
with bubbles over the en-  
tire surface.

Add the sugar, continue  
stirring, and heat again to a  
full bubbling boil. Boil  
hard 1 minute, stirring con-  
stantly. Remove from heat,  
skim and stir alternately  
for 5 minutes. Ladle jam  
into sterilized jars and seal  
immediately. Makes about  
nine 6 oz. jars.

Try also this delicate  
Pear Butter--so good on  
breads, pan cakes and waf-  
fles. Use sound, ripe fruit  
and wash, remove stems,  
but do not peel or core.  
Slice into a large kettle and  
add a small amount of water  
to start cooking. Cook until  
very soft. Press through  
sieve for fine consistency.  
To each cup pulp, add 1/2  
cup sugar and spices, if  
desired--1/2 teaspoon cinna-  
mon to 3 cups pulp. Cook  
until thick, stirring frequen-  
tly to prevent scorching.  
Pour into sterilized jars  
and seal while hot.

Make your own jellies,  
jams, preserves, spiced  
pears, and pear relishes--  
in combination with other  
fruits. "Can-a-pear" while  
supplies are plentiful!

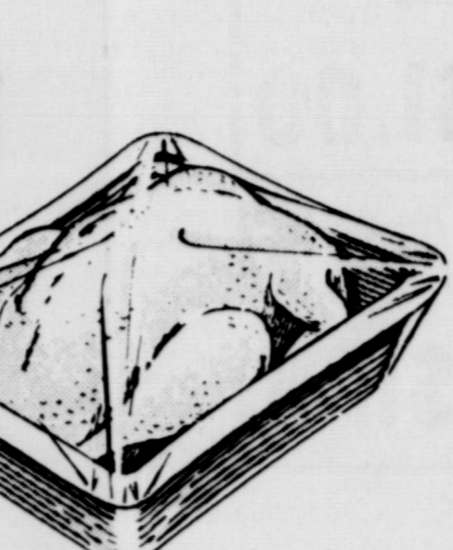

winter bouquets by drying them.  
The variety of materials  
suitable for making winter-  
arrangements is limited only  
by the imagination of the  
individual collecting the  
material. The success we  
have in using these materi-  
als for making arrangements  
is dependent upon the way  
we prepare the specimens  
before using them. The fol-  
lowing plants produce excel-  
lent flowers for use in  
winter bouquets if they are  
properly dried.

Cockscomb, Globe amar-  
anth, Baby's Breath, Straw  
flower, Statice  
Use only choice materials  
for drying, selecting those  
flower heads with the long-  
est stems. It is usually best  
to prepare several times as  
many specimens as you think  
you will need; thereby, allow-  
ing you to discard any flow-  
ers that are damaged in the  
drying process. An ideal  
place to dry the specimens  
is in an airy attic which has  
little or no light. The winter  
bouquet material should be  
thoroughly dried by hanging  
them in small bundles upside  
down on a line or from rafters

in a comparatively dust-free  
corner of the attic or store-  
room where the light is dim.  
Once the material is thorough-  
ly dry, it should be stored in  
dust-free boxes until ready for  
use. Allow ample room in the  
boxes to prevent damage to  
the individual heads.

The ornamental grasses, as  
well as many of the native  
grasses, produce attractive  
plumes which can be used in  
winter bouquets. By cutting  
the flowering grass heads  
just as they mature, but be-  
fore they begin to expand or  
shed, and tying them in small  
bundles, they can be dried  
in the same manner as the  
flowers discussed in the pre-  
vious paragraph. Pampas grass,  
as well as the Fountain  
grass, are some of the bet-  
ter cultivated grasses that  
can be used in this way.  
Many of the native grasses  
produce smaller heads but  
when gathered and used in  
arrangements, also look very  
attractive.

The flowers listed below  
are too delicate to be dried  
by hanging but can be some-  
times successfully cured  
by using a drying agent such  
as 1/2 cornmeal and 1/2 borax  
mixed together thoroughly.  
Since we are interested only  
in the layer of the drying  
agent in the bottom of the  
box, then lay the flowers  
in the box and gently fill  
in around the individual  
flower heads with additional  
material. The drying agent  
should be carefully packed  
between the petals to hold  
them apart while they dry.  
Large, double flowers are  
difficult to dry successfully.  
These plants will have to  
be treated very gently or they  
will not survive long enough  
to use in an arrangement. It  
will take considerable prac-  
tice before you learn the  
technique of packing the  
drying agent around some of  
the more delicate specimens.

Anemone, Marigold, Cle-  
matis, Cosmos, Daffodil,  
Dianthus, Chrysanthemum  
(single), Pansy, Sunflower,

& Zinnia.  
Many of the more attractive  
flowers and leaves which  
cannot be preserved by dry-  
ing can be cured with gly-  
cerine for use in winter bou-  
quets. Using the glycerine  
treatment, many of the fall  
leaves will retain their bright  
colors and last a long time.  
There may be some color  
change when using this meth-  
od; however, the dark,  
silky appearance of the  
leaves makes them even more  
attractive in many instances.  
When properly cured, the  
material will last a long time  
and is usually less brittle,  
making it easier to arrange  
them than most dried materi-  
als. Plant materials which  
can be preserved with the  
glycerine method include the  
following:

Bamboo, Chestnut, Mag-  
nolia, English Ivy, Elaeag-  
nus, Iris leaves, Oak, Mul-  
lein, Sea Grape, Sansevieria,  
& Strelitzia.  
When curing plant materi-  
als with the glycerine meth-  
od, the bottom four to five  
inches of the stem should  
be placed in jars containing  
a solution of one part glycer-  
ine to two parts of water.  
The absorption of the glycer-  
ine can be facilitated by  
crushing the ends of the  
more woody stems before  
placing them in the solution.  
The effect of the solution  
is noticeable on the leaves  
as it rises through the fol-  
iage. The material should be  
allowed to remain in the jar  
until the entire leaf is cured.  
After the glycerine solution  
has penetrated the entire  
surface, remove the speci-  
mens from the containers and  
hang them upside down until  
the curing process is com-  
pleted, and they are thorough-  
ly dry. Leaves preserved by  
the glycerine method can be  
used with either fresh flow-  
ers or in dry arrangements. In  
using dried materials for  
winter bouquets, the indivi-  
dual is restricted only by  
his imagination and good  
taste, as dried arrangements

need not be placed in a con-  
tainer of water as fresh ma-  
terials do. With a little imagi-  
nation and experience, you  
will be amazed to learn of  
the many things that you can  
use for making this type of  
arrangement. Each area of the  
state has many different  
plant varieties that can be  
used for dried arrangements.

Do you ever use buttermilk

**BUTTERMILK MUFFINS**  
1 3/4 C. regular all purpose  
flour  
2 tsp. baking powder  
1 tsp. sugar  
3/4 tsp. salt  
1/2 tsp. baking soda  
5 tbsp. butter  
2/3 cup buttermilk  
Sift together flour, baking  
powder, sugar, salt and bak-

ing soda in a mixing bowl,  
cut in butter until it resem-  
bles coarse meal. Make well  
in center, add buttermilk and  
stir until mixture clings to-  
gether. On well floured sur-  
face knead slightly (about 10  
times). Pat or roll to 1/2 inch  
thickness. Use 3 inch diam-  
eter biscuit cutter. Dip in flour  
cut and place biscuits on  
baking sheet. Bake 10-12  
minutes in 450 degrees oven.  
Makes 1 dozen.

FRESH, CLEAR, SPRING AIR

Now is the time to clear the air for next spring. It  
about time to seed winter cover crops that will pro-  
ect your farmland from wind erosion and insure u of hav-

Some land users rely on tillage operations to control  
wind erosion but as we all know from experience these  
are expensive and not always effective. A cover crop of  
oat, barley, rye, or a small grain and winter legume  
crop, rye is especially good in our sandyland.  
In order to conserve moisture this cover crop may be  
killed by sweeps or killed with a contact herbicide  
when it begins to tiller. This cover crop will also add  
needed organic matter to our soil.  
Covering the soil with a blanket of cover crops will  
keep you and I of waking up this spring to a beautifully  
clear morning.  
The Soil Conservation Service at Wheeler is interest-  
ed in assisting any land user in the Wheeler County Soil  
Conservation District in planning and applying  
soil or water conservation measure.

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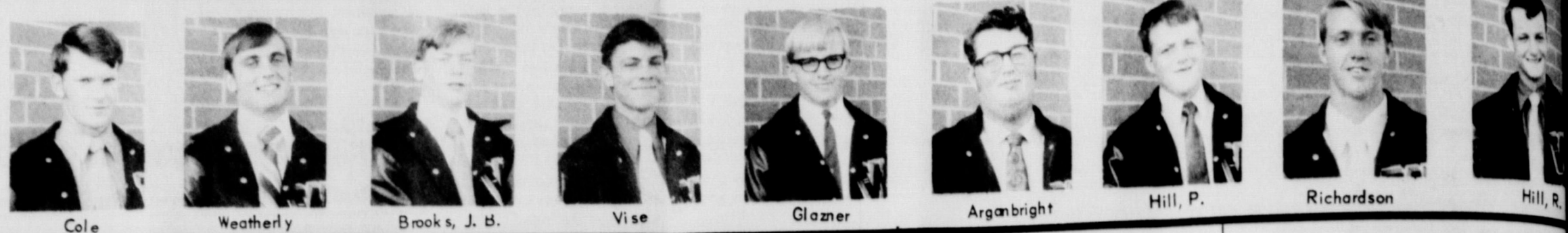

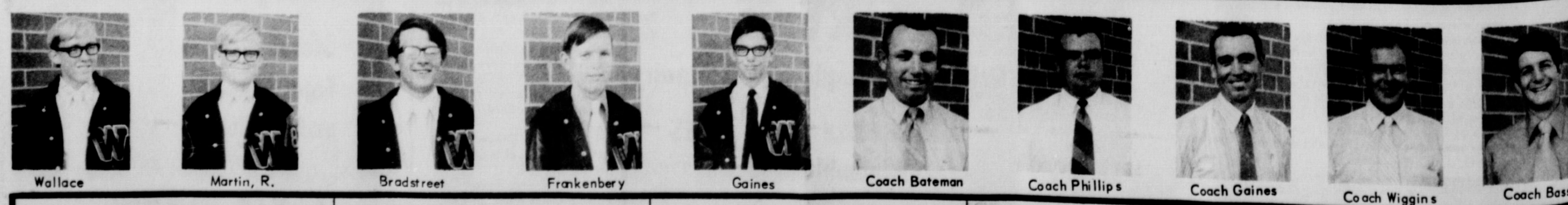
