Repulsing a Spearman drive for an early touchdown, the Wheeler Mustangs surged to their third win in a row last Friday night and sent the Spearman Lynx back to the high plains on the short end of a 7-0 score. Drenching rains of two days stopped at noon Friday but Nicholson Field was in surprisingly good condition for the home opener of the Mustangs and they sent the Lynx reeling to their third defeat. The win was the second via the shutout route for Wheeler and the Mustangs stout defense was called on several times to halt the visitors when they would get good field position around midfield.

The Mustangs found their backs to the wall early in the contest when a bad snap on a punt attempt caused a short 12 yard boot off the toe of Rodney Weatherly that carried to the Spearman 47. Staying on the ground, the Lynx picked up a couple of first downs with the second at the Mustang 14. Brock and Latham got four yards each but on third down, Beedy the Lynx quarterback, bobbled the ball and Ronnie Hill curled his 6'5 frame around the pignat at the Mustang 10 and Spearman's deepest penetration of the night went for naught. Wheeler punched the ball out to the 24 before having to kick and Weatherly's punt sailed to Davis at the Lynx 44 where he fumbled and

Ronnie Hill once pounced on the ball for the jubilant Mustangs. Davis redeemed himself on the next play however when he picked off a toss by Gary Fischer at the 29 and returned to the Spearman 42. Having failed on the ground, Spearman took to the airways but saw one pass fall incomplete before Beedy was thrown for successive losses of 9 and 11 yards by Ronnie Hill. A fine 53 yard boot by Brock sailed to Dale Stevens at the Mustang 25. Clearing blocks by Jimmie Cole and Jim Bob Brooks got Stevens to his wall of blockers on the west sideline and when one defender slowed him down at mid-

field it allowed the pursuit to catch him and knock him out of bounds at the Spearman 41. Cole picked up six at right guard and Fischer 1 on a keeper before Stevens got 15 big steps around his left end behind good blocking by the Mustang forward wall. Two plays picked up only 3 yards and then Fischer followed his fullback, Weatherly, through right guard for a first down at the Lynx 4. Three plays later, Weatherly punched it across from the one and Dale Stevens booted the extra point high and true to give the Mustangs a 7-0 lead with 8:09 to play in the second quarter. Although the Mustangs only allowed the Lynx to

get inside the Wheeler 40 just once more in the game and this to the 38, the seven point margin never seemed enough to subdue the dangerous and explosive Spearman offense. Right after the only touchdown of the game, the Mustangs had a chance to put the clincher on the board but saw the opportunity flutter away at the Spearman 12. The Mustangs recovered a loose ball on the Lynx 34 on the first play after the kickoff and when Stevens galloped for 18 yards on the initial play, it looked like the gold clad Mustangs were going to pad their lead. Two losses put the ball back to the 22 and after a pass was no good, Fischer kept at right guard for 10

yards but it was short by four for the first down. Just before the halftime break the Lynx got to the Mustangs 38 but a pass completion for a loss and two penalties put the ball back at midfield where Wheeler took over and ran the clock out. The Mustangs mounted a drive from their 46 early in the third period but the drive fizzled out at the Spearman 7 with the aid of three big five yard fines against the over anxious Mustangs for illegal procedure. The big play on the drive was a 16 yard scamper with a pitchout by Cole to the Spearman 16. On the next play, Cole gouged out 12 big yards to the 4 but a flag cost the horses five steps to the 21. Another five yarder on the next play moved the ball back to the 26 and instead of first and goal, the Mustangs faced first and 20. Stevens picked up eight of the yards at left end and then Cole swept the other flank for 10 more to the 8. Once more the red flag floated to the ground and the fine moved the pignat to the 13. Two plays could get only six of the needed seven yards and Spearman took over at their 7. A 36 yard punt return by Cole to the Spearman 15 was wiped out moments later by a 15 yard penalty but the relentless Mustangs ground it out to the Lynx 19 where Davis put the drive to a halt with his second pass interception. With less than two minutes to play the Mustangs held on downs at the Spearman 45 but they gave the ball back by a fumble at the Lynx 24 with just 34 seconds remaining on the clock.

WHEELER MUSTANGS TO INVAD LIAR OF GROOM TIGERS FRIDAY EVENING

Wheeler's undefeated Mustangs will be going for victory number four Friday night and the Groom Tigers promise to be a formidable foe. No one has to remind the Mustangs or their supporters how the Tigers have been the big spoilers in the past of Mustang hopes, especially when the Tigers play at home. The Mustangs once carried a 20 game winning streak to Groom only to see it snapped by the aroused Tigers and in 1969 the Mustangs went down to a 14-6 defeat on the same gridiron. The Tigers always seem to get their best effort of a cam-

paign when they see the black and gold of the Mustangs. Groom carries a one win and two losses record into Friday night's 8 P.M. battle but scouting reports show them to be a stronger ball club than their record indicates. Coach Bateman reported that they are a big ball club with 7 offensive starters returning from last years club. "They are a senior and junior ball club and have real good speed in their top halfback Ollinger," the coach said. "Groom runs out of a basic wing 'T' but will use dif-

ferent sets like the 'I' and slot formation to confuse the defense", Bateman added. The head mentor of the Mustangs told the weekly meeting of the Quarterback Club that the coaching staff was pleased with the win last week over the Spearman Lynx but that the Mustangs made more mistakes in that game than they had in their two earlier contests. "We are real proud of the way the boys fought back and came up with the big plays when they had to but crucial mistakes cost us chances to score at least two more touchdowns," Bateman said. "These kids are

real proud of their defense and it came through for them against Spearman." Ronnie Hill drew plaudits for his outstanding defensive play against the Lynx as he blunted several drives by recovering two fumbles and throwing the Lynx ball carriers for big losses. "Dale Stevens did a real good job running the football last week and he did an exceptional job of following his blockers", the coach said. All of the Mustangs should be ready for the Tiger contest with the possible exception of Lewis Britt, defensive end, who was in-

jured in the third quarter. "We'll see how Lewis comes along this week in workout before deciding," Bateman said. PEP RALLY Back the Mustangs and come to the pep rally at the gym Friday at 3 P.M. and boost the Mustangs to victory over the Groom Tigers. 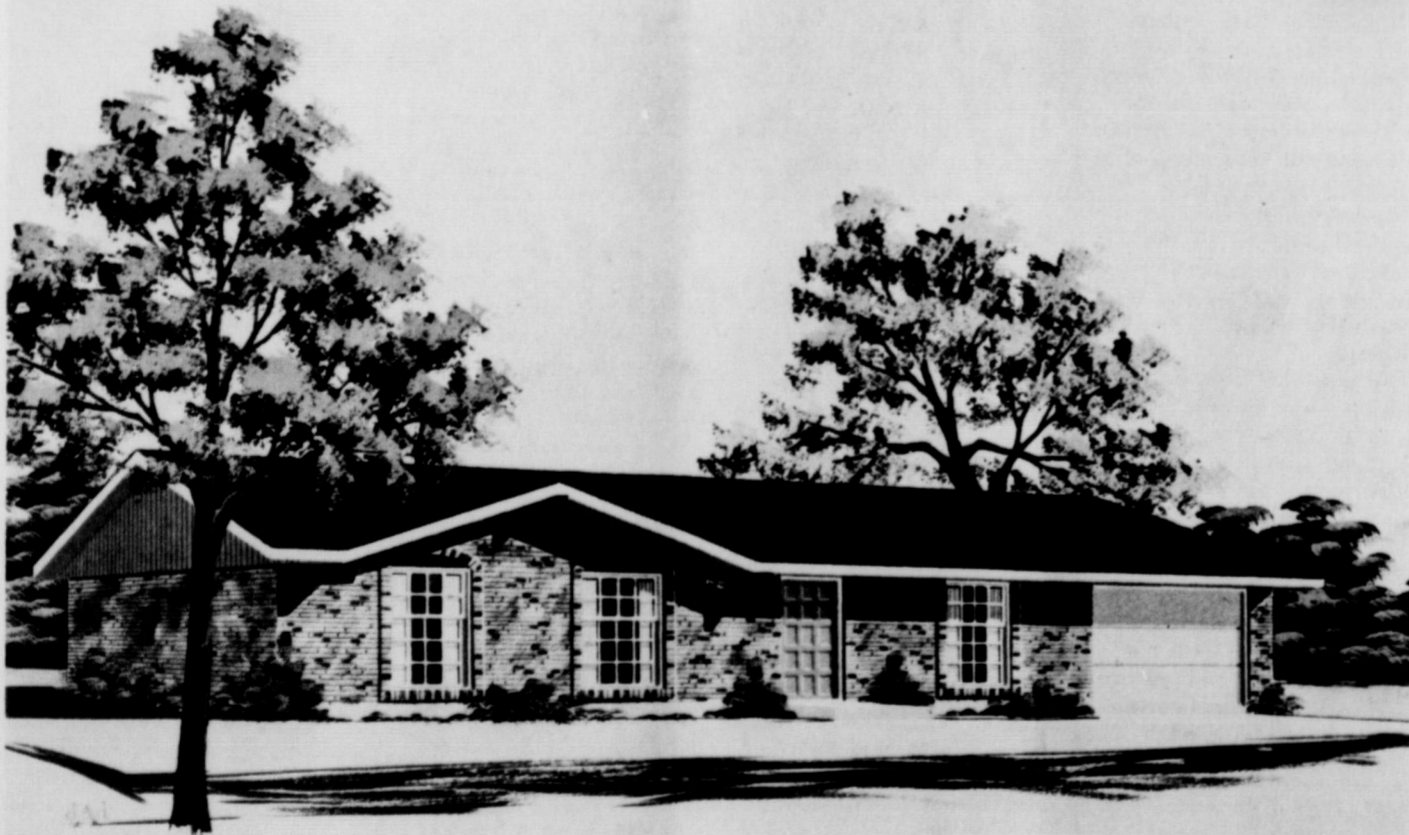

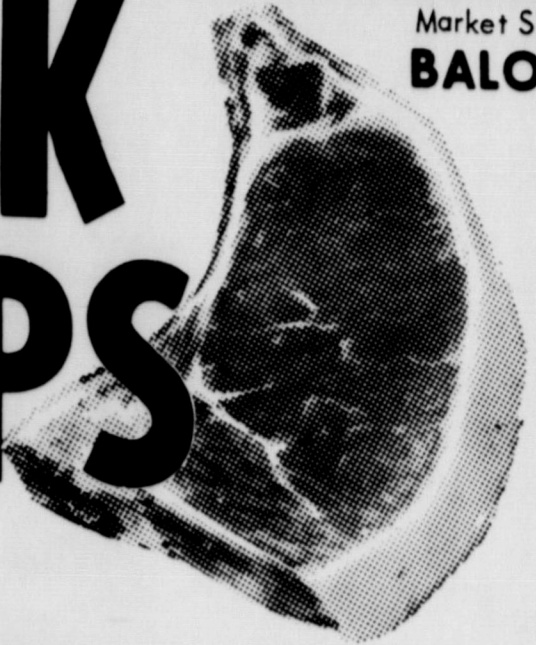

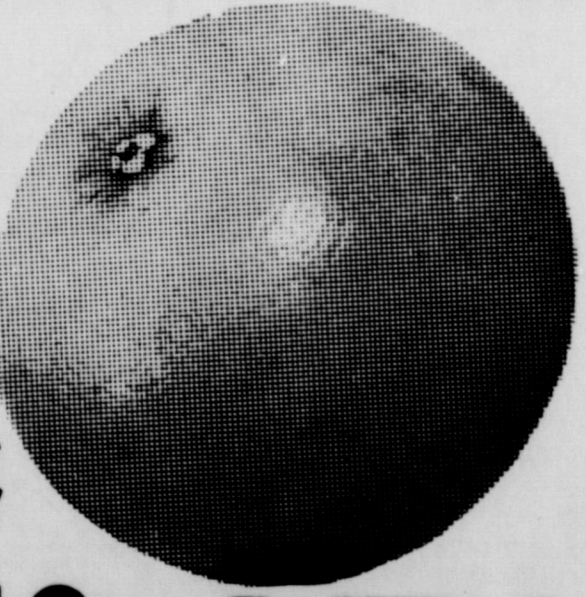

Across the Fence

Water standing in fields was a sight most folks had to get used to. A lot of wheat will go into the ground now. Some folks were fortunate enough to already have theirs sown by now. We saw Buster Walsler near the 9 mile station, sowing his last week. Buster has a fair cotton crop. Of course, this rain is too late to help it. Bill Cantrell out at Twitty had a lot of his wheat sown before the rain, we understand. We hope that the army worms will leave our wheat alone this year.

A lot of stocker-calf raisers will be getting some calves to go on wheat before long. Since there are so many kinds of shots and so many area variations, a person needs to consult his vet and get lined out on what ones can be given concurrently and the time needed between treatments that should be given together. After all, it isn't simply a matter of unloading the cattle, throwing on a brand, and kissing em' goodbye at the unloading chute gate. Along this vein, we have a publication in our office free for the asking called "Healthy Stocker and Feeder Calves", #1098, that you'll find helpful in pampering stockers for profit. We also can get a copy of the proceedings of the North Plains Sub-Area Stocker Management Shortcourse held last week that tells what was said there on stocker cattle.

Along with the good must come some of the bad. We're sure that there are lots of wet hay bales and wet hay in the windrows. Some of this hay is ruined. We don't have an estimate yet of the damage but it will be costly to cattlemen trying to get hay put up.

We had a large crowd, close to 300, attending this year's Northwest Texas Research Demonstration Program. All seemed interested in grazing management and wintering cows. We hope everyone who enjoyed the barbecue will let your Chamber of Commerce and Farm Bureau Directors know it. They have been a sponsor of this program for many years.

Dodder, a parasitic weed with a peculiar name can spell real trouble for alfalfa unless it is carefully controlled.

It shows up as a straw-colored tangled mat of vines wound among alfalfa and certain weeds.

Dodder can literally suck the life out of a valuable alfalfa crop if it is allowed to spread unchecked. It is most often introduced on a farm by contaminated crop seed, although it can also be spread by combines, mud

or manure on animals and farm equipment. Dodder is a parasite, and must live on a host plant to survive. The emerging seedlings are rootless and leafless with a fine yellow thread-like stem about one to three inches long. The seedlings rotate slowly until they find an object to vine on. If the object is the stem of a suitable host plant, the parasite twines around the host and sends suckers into it.

The seedling in direct contact with the soil then withers and the dodder thrives at the expense of the host plant. If it fails to reach a host plant, the seedling will die.

After becoming attached to the alfalfa or other host, the dodder produces many stems in a tangled mass and grows as much as three inches per day. A single plant may spread ten feet or more in a year.

Be cautious about buying bargain alfalfa seed, because it may be contaminated with dodder.

This bargain seed can be extremely costly in terms of yield loss and later control expenses.

Dodder seed that is in hay can pass through an animal's digestive tract and still germinate later. The seed can remain viable in the soil and produce seedlings over a prolonged period of time, which makes control even more difficult.

Animals fed hay that is contaminated with dodder should be confined to a feedlot or the field where the hay originated. They can also be put on non-host fields where crops such as cotton, corn or grain sorghum will be grown the following year.

Be sure to clean forage equipment thoroughly before moving from a dodder-infested field to a clean field. Use compressed air and water to clean the equipment.

There is very little danger of spreading viable dodder seed if the forage is harvested before the parasite

matures, and the alfalfa is made into alfalfa meal, silage, or even fed green. Any equipment that thoroughly stirs the surface soil and exposed it to drying will give good control on small dodder seedlings.

Dodder can also be controlled by mowing or shredding the host plants below the point where it is attached. It is important to control dodder before it has time to produce seed.

Chloropham (CIPC) can be applied in a granular form at six pounds of active chemical per acre on moist soils. This will control the parasite for about four weeks. Application should be about five days before irrigation when the alfalfa is at least four inches tall.

This provides shade to keep the soil surface cool and moist, which in turn prolongs the persistence of the CIPC. The shade also retards later emergence of dodder, other herbicides such as dichlorobenzil (Casoron) and DCPA (dacthal granules or wettable powder) or registered for use in alfalfa grown for seed only.

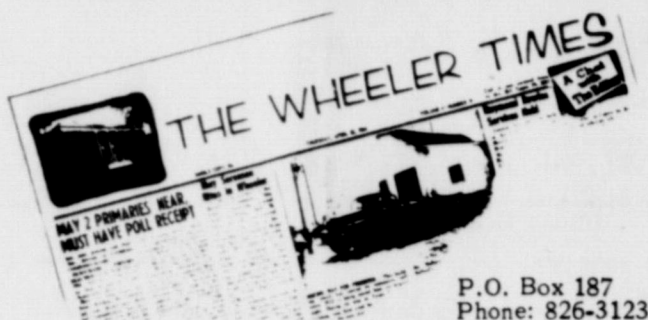
Burning is another control method that will prevent dodder seed production, but flaming will not kill dormant seed buried in the soil.

If the fields are severely infested with dodder the most effective and economical control measure may be to rotate to a non-host crop. The parasite will still germinate, but the plants cannot survive in cotton, grain sorghum and other row crops.

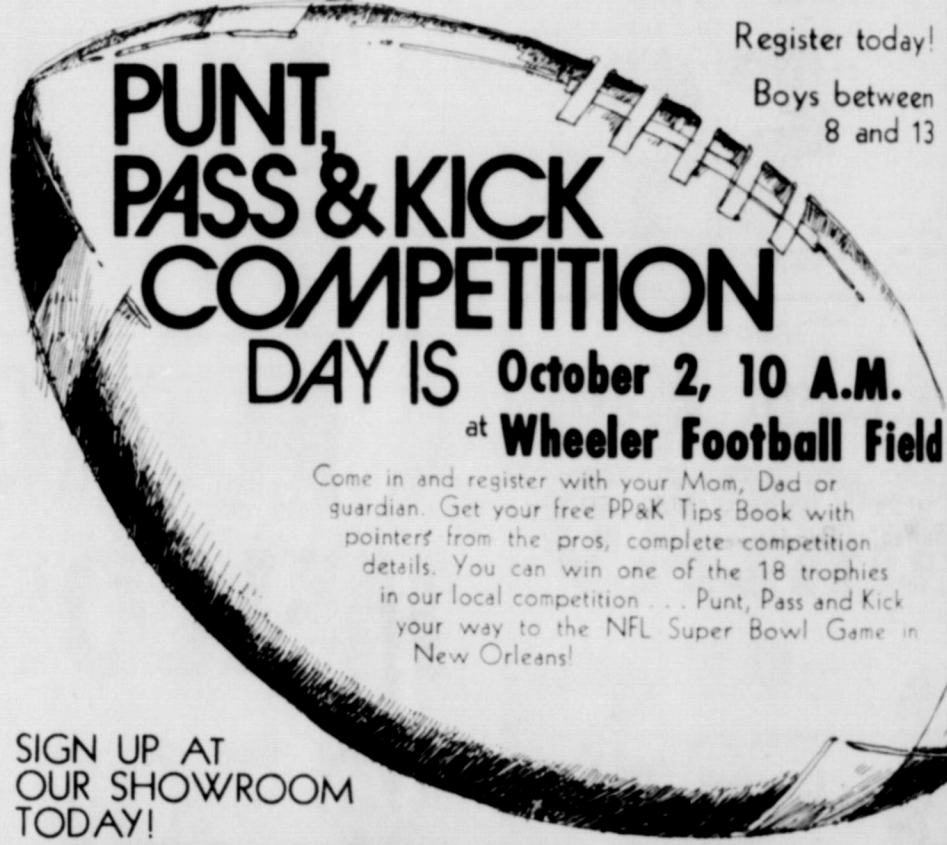

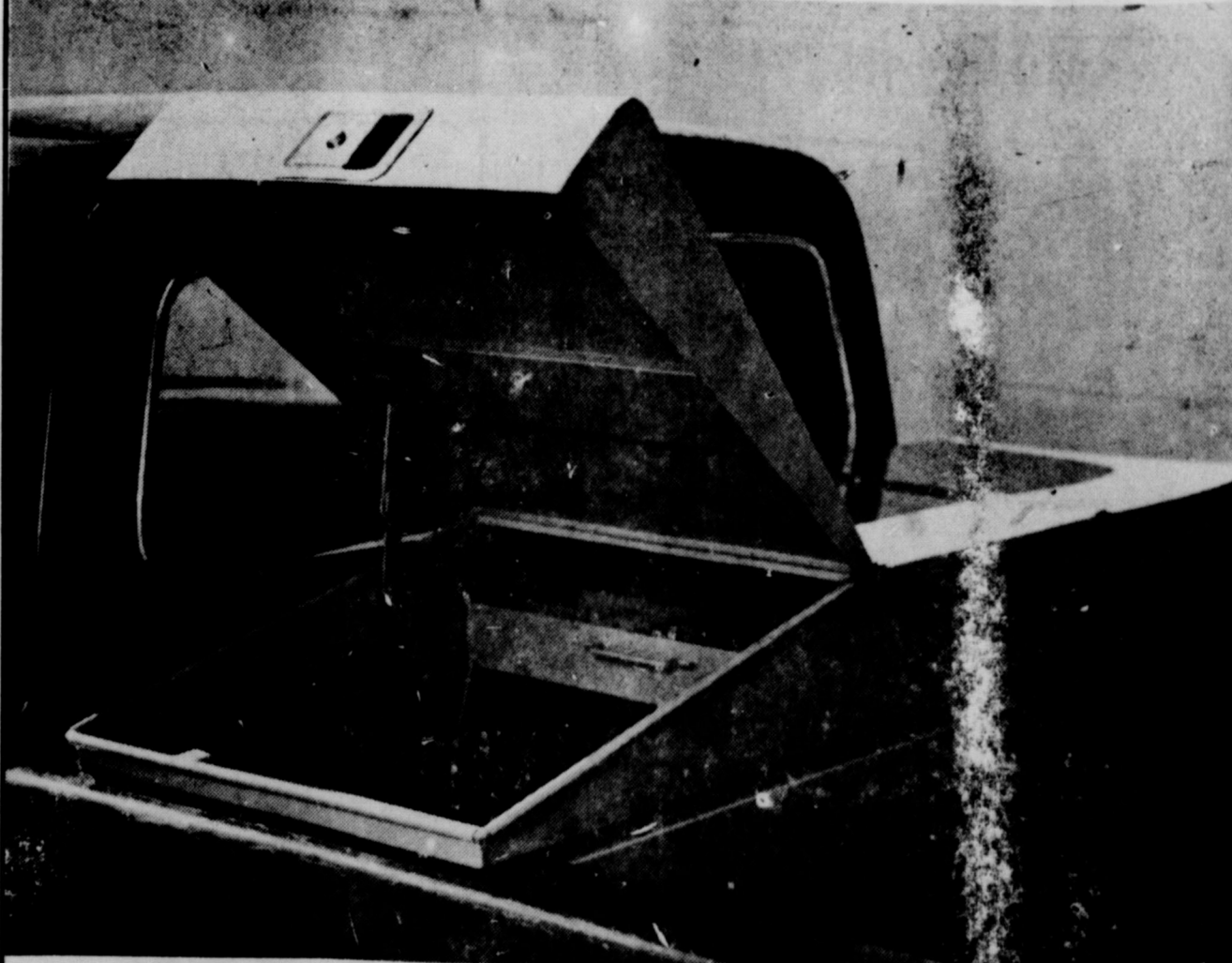

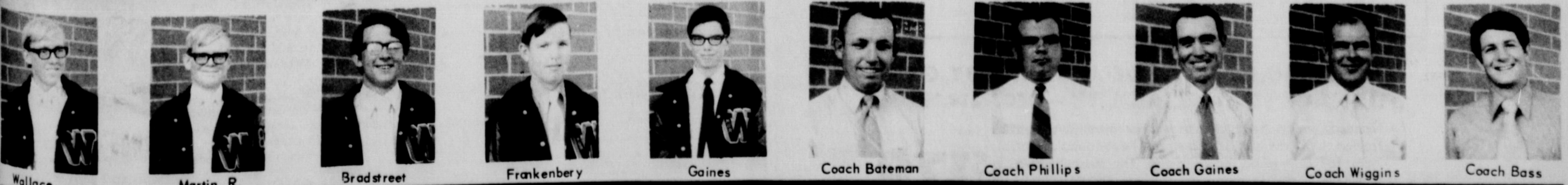
