Cashing in on a fumble recovery on the first play of the third quarter, the Canadian Wildcats went on to subdue the Wheeler Mustangs 10-0 in a titanic defensive battle last Friday night before a record throng at Nicholson Field.

Keith Popham struggled yards through the Mustana defense to barely nudge the pigskin into the end zone on fourth down and this proved to be enough even though Steve Carter booted a 40 yard field goal with 2:22 to play in the game.

The loss knocked the Mustangs from the undefeated ranks and left the Wildcats with a perfect slate.

The Mustangs had six turnovers in the game and the big one came on the first play of the second half. Dale Stevens, who gouged out 105 yards for his nights efforts, was jarred loose from the ball at the Mustang 30 and Russell Ashley recovered for the Wildcats.

Steve Carter got 18 big yards on third down to set the Wildcats up with a first and goal from the Wheeler 4. Rick Hefley pulled Carter down to save the touchdown.

Larry Bucher was slammed to the turf for no gain and Carter got only one at right tackle as the Mustangs dug in. Holding Carter for no peared as if the Mustanas were going to hold but a good second effort by Popham enabled him to fall across into the end zone.

Carter booted the extra point to give the Wildcats the 7 point margin that they never relinquished. Nine minutes remained to play in the third period.

Even though the Wildcats came up on the long end of the score, they were never able to cross the 50 yard line under their own power. The only times they were in Mustang territory came as result of a punt, a penalty, a pass interception and a fumble recovery.

Twice the Mustangs penetrated the Wildcat 20 but couldn't get the points on the board.

Taking over at their 27 after a punt, the Mustangs and assisted with the program roared to the Wildcat 27 in five plays with Stevens getting 26 on a trap at left guard down to the Canadian

## MUSTANGS AND BRONCHOS WILL GET DISTRICT COMPETITION UNDERWAY FRIDAY

With all the non conte. ence battles behind them, the Wheeler Mustangs and the Clarendon Bronchos kick the district race off Friday night at Nicholson Field when they square off at 7:30 p.m. Records are forgotten

when these two old rivals get together and this year will be no exception. The Bronchos come into the fray on the short end of a 1-4 record but their losses have been to some of the most powerful teams in Panhandle football.

Clarendon opened the season with a win ove Childress but has suffered losses to White Deer, Phillips, Canadian, and Stinnett since then. The only common opponent has been the Canadian Wildcats.

The Wildcats whipped the Bronchos 19-13 and came out on top of the Mustangs last week 10-0.

Clarendon will bring a veteran ball club to Wheeler and one that was generally picked in pre season as the team to beat in District 2-A Last year the Mustangs whipped the Bronchos 7-0 to give the Mystangs two wins out of the last three encounters with Coach Clyde Noonkester's crew.

For the second week in a row, the Mustangs will be faced with a punishing attack as the Bronchos use the running of Tommy Shields, Steve Carter, and Elray King, all juniors, to gobble up yardage either out of the Wishbone T or I formation, and the passing of Mac Tomlinson, nifty Broncho quarterback, to

keep the defenses honest This backfield will be operating behind a veteran line with such people as Scotty Lindley, Eddie Helms, Steve Ellis and Mike Leeper, all of whom have played big parts in other Mustang and Broncho

battles. Coach Bateman and his staff have been working the Mustangs hard all week getting ready for the Clarendon visit.

"We feel like Clarendon is just as good or better than Canadian so you can see that the Mustangs are in for a hard night of football," the coach said.
"The Shields boy is a terrific runner and they have so much speed it scares

The B Team has an open date this week and it is hoped that the remaining three games on the schedule can be played.


Tony Hefley on the Claude 25 that was returned four yards. Lamb got the six points off right tackle and Bateman put the extra points on the board for the

animal performance. The grass dies out badly on terrace ridges. An 80 percent stand is about average on tight land. The increased growth as a result of being planted on better quality land grows high quality grass, however. It's ability to get started earlier in the spring on tighter land is also a distinct advantage.

The big drawback of course is the possibility of not getting a good stand when moisture is limited whereas sandy soils outpoint it in this respect.
