Across the Fence

Warmer temperatures and plenty of moisture have made fall wheat and rye grow rapidly. Lawns, flowerbeds and vegetable gardens are really growing. We expect a lot of east Texas cattle to be trucked up shortly to take advantage of the growth of our wheat.

Young lovegrass sowed in the summer is going to have a lot of growth on it before frost. We had an opportunity to see some lovegrass planted in May and in July on the Gordon Whitener farm near Wheeler last week. The July planting had less weed problem and looked better because of the lack of weed competition. Several folks have allowed me to observe lovegrass planted on tight land that incidentally is well established and giving good

animal performance. The grass dies out badly on terrace ridges. An 80 percent stand is about average on tight land. The increased growth as a result of being planted on better quality land grows high quality grass, however. Its ability to get started earlier in the spring on tighter land is also a distinct advantage. The big drawback of course is the possibility of not getting a good stand when moisture is limited whereas sandy soils outpoint it in this respect.

The milo crop is going to turn out well. We're having problems on "hot land" with lodging and we're afraid we're going to miss a lot of this milo that's falling down. By the way, a lot of this milo's been cut and the moisture is o.k. for storage. More than likely, a lot of low yielding milo will be cut for hay.

The Shamrock Chamber of Commerce is planning to honor 4-H members who turned in 4-H Record Books with a barbecue the first week in November, according to Charles Shields, Chairman of the Shamrock Chamber of Commerce. The program is held in Wheeler and Shamrock on alternate years and the purpose is to recognize outstanding 4-H members and their parents. Recognition is an important part of 4-H club work. Sixty-one 4-H'ers will be recognized. The awarding of the Gold Star Award, which is the highest 4-H award given on a county basis is the highlight of the program.

Although it's a little early to be thinking about winter and spring winds, now is the time to submit applications for seedlings that will be used for windbreaks.

Applications for windbreak seedlings are available from local county Extension officers, or from the Indian Mound Nursery, Box 337, Alto, Texas. It is important to apply early since orders are processed on a first come, first served basis. However, seedling shipments won't begin until mid-December.

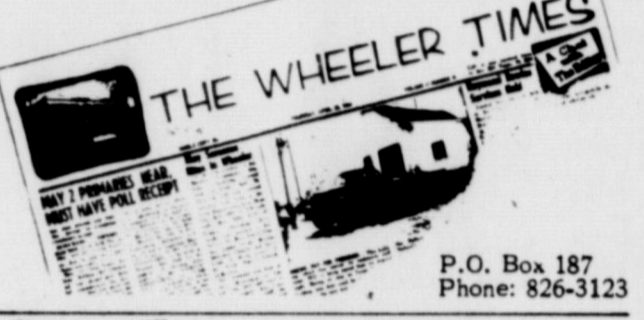
The seedlings come from the Texas Forest Service Indian Mound Nursery and are priced at \$2.50 per 100. The planter must agree to plant the seedlings for ornamental purposes.

Some 16 species of seedlings are presently available. These include baldcypress, black locust, black walnut, catalpa, Chinese elm, Cottonwood, Eucalyptus green ash, loblolly pine (drought-hardy), mulberry, bois d'arc (osage orange), ponderosa pine, slash pine, sweetgum and sycamore.

PAT'S PARAGRAPHS

 I recently made a trip through several states, and have decided again that Texas is the prettiest and friendliest state! (You'd never guess that I'm a Texan, would you?)

Consider the apple. Many of our most fascinating stories, fables, and legends are woven around apples. From Biblical times onward no single fruit has played a more important role in man's life, history and health than the apple.
 To the Persians, an apple symbolized immortality. Then King Solomon, in his wisdom, hailed the apple as a fruit of healing.
 And today we claim that an "apple a day keeps the doctor away". Greek and Roman myths abound in stories about the apple, symbol of love and beauty. Even today we refer to something (or someone) we prize as the "apple of our eye".
 The Scandinavian gods, so the story goes, had a miraculous apple tree, the fruit of which kept them

young. They once lost this treasure temporarily, when it was stolen by the evil spirit, Loki, and they immediately became old and feeble. Everything in the world went wrong until the tree was restored to them and their youth regained.
 British folklore, too, is filled with praise of apples. An ancient saxon coronation benediction reads, "Bless, oh Lord, the courage of this Prince and proper the works of his hands and may this land be filled with apples."
 To pay tribute to the apple, Captain James Handly of Quincy, Illinois, sparked the beginning of National Apple Week back in 1905, with "Apple Day". The idea spread, the October celebration is heartily supported and endorsed each year by apple producers and tradesmen from coast to coast.
 The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Consumer and Marketing Service reports plentiful supplies of apples coming to markets, now. Celebrate National Apple week by serving your family a delicious combination treat of apples and pork - you can almost smell how good it is!

Or how about a crisp, tender, juicy suckling pig baked to perfection with a tart, shiny red apple in its mouth! Tempting? You bet! Pork and apples just naturally go together. Try these Apple-Smothered Pork Chops 6 loin pork chops, 1 in thick ¼ tsp. salt ¼ tsp. sage 3 tart apples 3 tbsp. molasses 3 tbsp. flour 2 cups hot water 1 tbsp. vinegar ½ tsp. salt 1/3 cup raisins Sprinkle chops with ¼ tsp. salt and sage. Brown slowly in hot skillet. Place in large baking dish. Pare, core and slice apples in ¼ inch slices or rings; arrange on chops. Pour molasses over apples. Add flour to fat in skillet; cook until brown, stirring constantly. Add water; stir until mixture boils. Add vinegar salt and raisins. Pour over chops and apples. Cover and bake at 350° F. about 1 hour or until apples are tender. Makes 6 servings.

Mystery spots on your carpet call for quick action. When family members and pets can't give you clues needed immediately to detect the spot, remove it as follows
 Blot up liquid with tissues or scrape off semi-solid material with a knife or spatula. Use a spot cleaner of 1 qt. warm water, 1 tsp. gentle detergent (not soap) for fine fabrics, and 1 tsp. of white vinegar. Dab on the cleaner with a clean cloth. Wipe gently from the edges of the spot into the center. Keep the carpet from becoming too wet by blotting it with a dry, clean cloth. Dry the carpet quickly with air from a fan or a vacuum cleaner.
 If the detergent spot cleaner has taken away some of the spot, use this cleaner again. Dry the carpet, then brush the carpet tufts back up gently.
 However, if the detergent spot cleaner has not taken away the spot, try a dry-cleaning solvent used for clothing. Follow the directions on the bottle. Also, be sure to dab on a cleaning fluid gently with a cloth. Work from the outside of the spot toward the center. Dry the carpet, then brush carpet tufts gently.
 Hesitant about throwing those plastic drycleaning

bags into the trash as soon as you get them?
 If you have young children, they are dangerous to have around the house.
 Another problem with the bags has become evident since wet look vinyls have become popular on the fashion scene. Any printing dye on the plastic bag can be transferred to any vinyl clothing it hangs next to in the closet. If it does rub off, it cannot be removed.
 If you take off the plastic bags, your clothes hang more freely and breathe better even though they are exposed to dust and fumes.

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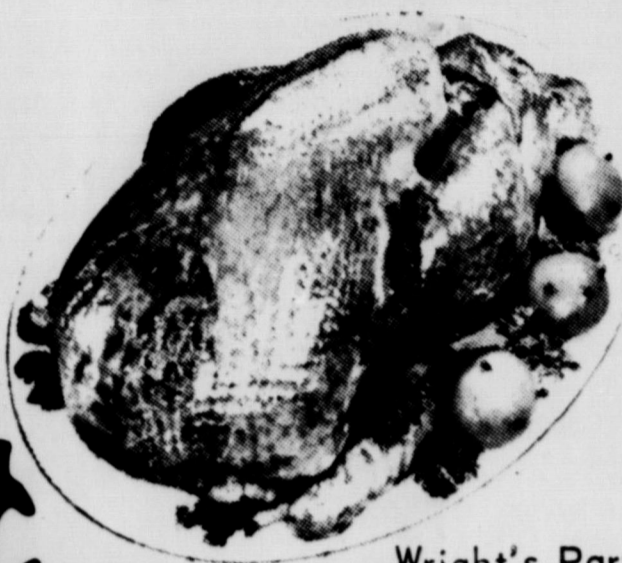
