The average light bulb which is manufactured today will burn approximately 1,350 hours.

MUSTANGS HOPE FOR WIN TOUCH AT CLAUDE FRIDAY

Nursing their third successive defeat, the Wheeler Mustangs will be seeking a turnaround this Friday night when they do battle with the up and coming Claude Mustangs in Claude at 7:30.
This will be the third district game for both teams and they carry identical 0-2 marks into the contest, although the Wheeler Mustangs have the better season record.
In Claude, Wheeler will be facing a young, fast club that has only two seniors in the starting offensive lineup and they list the same number on the defensive unit.
In their loss to Clarendon last week, Claude held the Bronchos scoreless for three quarters, after Clarendon racked up three touchdowns in the second quarter, except for a field goal in the waning seconds of the game.
Using their speed and the good passing arm of Forbes, Claude runs from what is commonly known as the Denver City T and if past performances hold up, they will put the ball in the air about 30 times.
It was Claude last year that administered a 39-15 lacing of the Mustangs after two district wins and the local aggregation of Mustangs will not soon forget that pasting.
"We need a win bad and it looks like we are catching Claude at the wrong time as they are a vastly improved ball club since the first of the year," Coach Bateman said this week.

FROM YOUR STATE CAPITAL

Ballot order has been selected for 14 proposed constitutional amendments to be voted on at the November 7, 1972 election.

Major changes, including authorization for a constitutional convention, four-year terms for major state officials, higher state bond interest ceilings and equal rights for women are included in the list.

The amendments, in the order they will appear on the ballot, follow:

1. A salary raise for legislators from \$4,800 to \$8,400 a year.
2. To abolish Lamar Co. hospital district.
3. To provide for compensation of all justices of the peace on a salary basis.
4. To establish a constitutional revision commission and call a convention to revise the state constitution in January 1974.
5. To allow tax exemptions for disabled veterans, their surviving widows and children and widows and children of armed forces personnel

killed on active duty.

6. To provide a minimum \$3,000 property tax exemption for resident homeowners of those 65 and over.
7. To guarantee that equality under the law shall not be denied or abridged because of sex, race, color, creed or national origin.
8. To provide four-year terms for governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general, comptroller, treasurer, land commissioner, secretary of state and other statutory state officers.
9. To allow soil and water conservation district directors to hold, or be compensated for more than one office.
10. To require that proposed constitutional amendments be described twice in clear language by statewide newspaper publication (633 papers).
11. To fix an annual salary of \$22,500 for speaker and lieutenant governor.
12. To permit state employees to serve on local governing boards.
13. To set a six per cent weighted average annual interest rate for constitutionally-authorized bond issues.
14. To allow counties to reduce their permanent school fund and distribute money to independent and common school districts on a per-scholastic basis.

DISASTER AID APPROVED
Texas Employment Commission will pay disaster unemployment compensation to persons made jobless by tropical storm Fern September 9 - September 30 in 14 South Texas counties.

Counties covered in the assistance plan are Aransas, Bee, Brooks, Duval, Nueces, Refugio, San Patricio, Jim Wells, Hidalgo, Starr, Wilbarger, Jim Hogg, Live Oak and Calhoun.

Special aid determined in accord with U.S. Labor Department regulations will correspond in amount and duration to benefits paid under the state unemployment insurance program and manpower development and training act. Maximum is \$45 a week for 26 weeks.

Eligible include those who no longer have jobs or a place to work as a result of the storm or who were unable to reach work, who were injured or who were made heads of households as a result of deaths in the disaster.

ALLOWABLE REDUCED--
For the seventh consecutive month, Texas Railroad Commission reduced the statewide oil allowable.

A cut of .7 of a per cent sets the November production factor at 62.5 per cent of potential. The allowable has been slashed 19.6 per cent since last April.

A maximum production of 3,275,749 barrels daily will be permitted under the Nov. controls, compared with 3,305,129 this month.

BOND SALE OFFERED--
A total of \$31.5 million in veterans land program bonds will be offered for sale November 1.

Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong said sale of additional bonds is necessary to continue the program under which 20,000 applications for low interest rate land purchase loans have been made since last February. The interest ceiling on the bonds is 4.5 per cent.

APPEAL FILED-- Texas is appealing U.S. Secretary of Transportation John A. Volpe's decision to impose a 10 per cent penalty on the state's share of highway construction money from the federal trust fund.

The threatened cut—because Texas has not enacted a billboard control law under the highway beautification act—would cost the state about \$24 million a year. The appeal to Volpe noted legislative efforts to comply with the federal requirement and asked a decision on the penalty be withheld until the next regular legislative session.

SHORT SHORTS--
The Legislative Redistricting Board barely made its October 23 deadline for reapportioning the House of Representatives. The new Senate districts were announced a week earlier.

Enrollment in Texas junior and senior colleges reached an all-time high of 479,807 this fall.

The School Land Board will offer 401,847 acres of state land for lease at its oil and gas lease sale Dec. 7.

John W. Berry of Conroe received the 1971 Lady Bird Johnson Highway Beautification Award and \$1,500 cash prize.

Agriculture Commissioner White says pink bollworms and too much rain are threatening the Texas cotton crop.

Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin held that the bailiff of a district court need not be a deputy sheriff and that Bexar County Hospital District may not change the month of selection of its depository after selection for a two-year term in February, 1970.

Gerald McCathern of Hereford and Worth Jones of Hart were selected to the Board of Directors of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association.

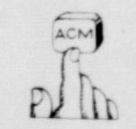

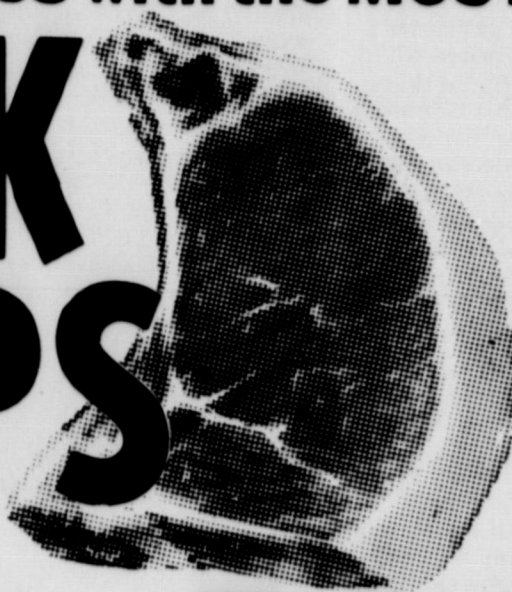

Wheat is growing rapidly. Before long the trucks will bring in a lot of stocker cattle from the southeast. Many different type of grazing programs for stocker cattle are used in our county. One of the most common programs is a "scavenger operation."

That is, light weight cattle are used to graze out sorghum stubble and "leavings" from summer hay crops. Last fall the county agent in Castro County reported that a result demonstration co-operator in his county placed 421 steers on 230 acres of grain sorghum stubble. The steers grazed the stubble for 114 days from October 17 to January 8. They were fed 4 pounds of a grain protein supplement daily. Grain sorghum made up 25% of the supplement. The protein level of the supplement was 15%. Total weight gained per steer for the 114 day grazing period was 162 pounds which was an average 1.42 pounds per head per day. Including the supplemental feed, each acre of sorghum stubble aftermath produced 2.6 pounds of beef daily. The sorghum stubble grazing phase yielded a per head net return of \$23.25. While this program may not fit your situation, it shows that grazing grain sorghum stubble can be profitable.

With proper treatment and variety selection, tulips can be a spectacular sight in your garden or flower bed.

To assure an abundance of blooms next spring, new bulbs should be planted each fall. In other words, treat tulips as annuals and discard the bulbs after they bloom. Unless the bulbs have been properly chilled, they will not produce the long, graceful stems and attractive large flowers.

Most bulbs shipped to the south by northern producers have been chilled prior to shipment. However, much of the chilling effect is soon lost if the bulbs are allowed to remain at room temperature until planted. Bulbs should be selected as soon as they appear on the market in the fall and then kept in a cool place until planting. The ideal storage as mentioned before is in the vegetable bin in the refrigerator.

Tulips do best in deep, fertile, well-drained soil. In areas having poor soil drainage, plant them in raised beds. Plant the bulb so the base is 6 inches below the soil line. This places the bulb in the cooler region of the soil and allows it to develop a better root system before the shoot appears above ground.

Tulips make a more effective display when planted in masses of one variety and color. This does not mean that you should confine your entire planting to one variety, but rather keep each variety together as a clump for greater effect.

Pansy plants planted on top of a tulip bed will provide an attractive show of

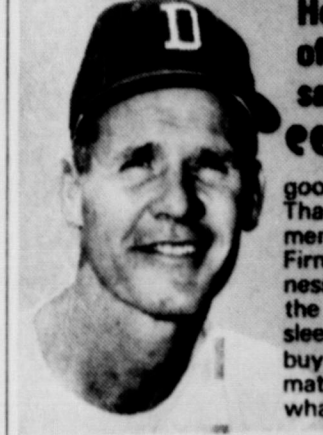
color during the winter and early spring. The tulip bulbs will push on up above the pansies when they are ready to flower.

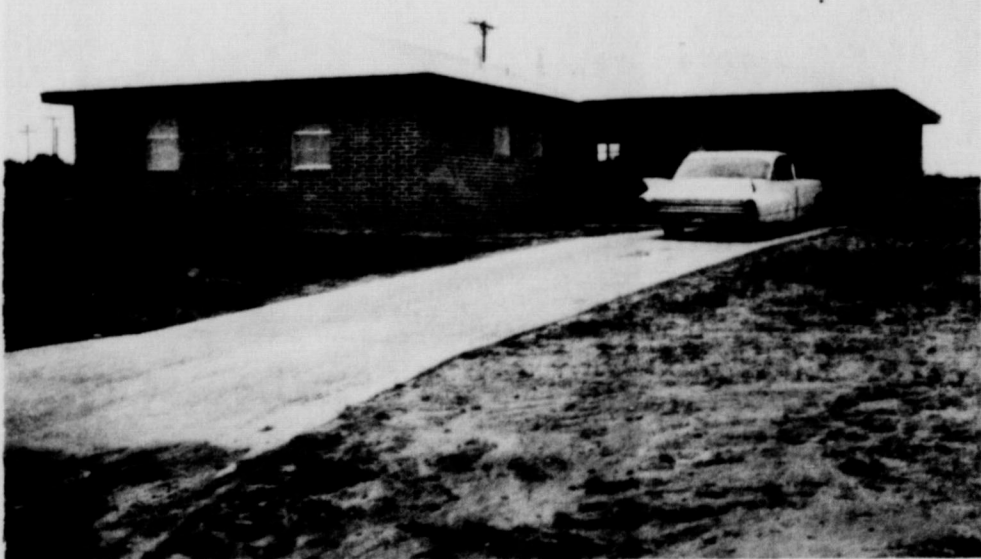
