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DURING ONCE-A-YEAR

Ballot order has been selected for 14 proposed constitutional amendments to be voted on at the November 7, 1972 election.

Major changes, including authorization for a constitutional convention, four-year terms for major state officials, higher state bond interest ceilings and equal rights for women are included in the list.

The amendments, in the order they will appear on the ballot, follow:

1. A salary raise for legislators from \$4,800 to \$8,400 a year.

2. To abolish Lamar Co. hospital district. 3. To provide for compensation of all justices of the peace on a salary

4. To establish a constitutional revision commission and call a convention to revise the state constitution in January 1974.

5. To allow tax exemptions for disabled veterans, their surviving widows and children and widows and children of armed forces personnel

killed on active duty. 6. To provide a minimum \$3,000 property tax exemption for resident home-

steads of those 65 and over-7. To guarantee that equality under the law shall not be denied or abridged because of sex, race, color, creed or national origin.

8. To provide four-year terms for governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general, comptroller, treasurer, land commissioner, secretary of state and other statutory state officers.

9. To allow soil and water conservation district directors to hold, or be compensated for more than one office.

10. To require that proposed constitutional amendments be described twice in clear language by statewide newspaper publication (633 papers).

11. To fix an annual salary of \$22,500 for speaker and lieutenant governor.

12. To permit state employees to serve on local governing boards. 13. To set a six per cent

weighted average annual interest rate for constitutionally-authorized bond issues. 14. To allow counties to reduce their permanent school fund and distrubute money to independent and common school districts on

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

grasses come out every year or two. A lot of the promoters of these grasses do a lot of good. On the other hand many are out to make a fast buck. Most good cowmen know one from the other and the stories folks tell about miracle grasses is as common to ranchers as shipping fever is to weaner calves. However, some folks get their noses so close to the grinds tone and so much blood squirting in their eyes that they don't have time to learn anything new except what is going on in front of their own emorywheel. We're all like that to a certain extent. It can happen to anybody. It's sort of a process like selfhypnotism. In other words, one just gets so durned busy he doesn't have time to learn anything new or different. And, if one persists in that state for a reasonable period, one may conclude he has all the

answers.

At the recent Northwest Texas Research Demonstration Program meeting held at Kelton, folks found out pretty quick we didn't have all the answers about growing grass and cattle. Of course, that won't deter us from going ahead and looking for some more answers. We have creceived many kind responses from folks who attended the program and barbecue indicating that they enjoyed this type of program. Wheat is growing rapidly. Before long the trucks will bring in a lot of stocker cattle from the southeast. Many different type of grazing programs for stocker cattle are used in our county. One of the most common programs is a "scavenger operation." That is, light weight cattle are used to graze out grain sorghum stubble and ''leavings" from summer hay crops. Last fall the county agent in Castro County reported that a result demonstration co-operator in his county placed 421 steers on 230 acres of grain sorghum stubble. The steers grazed the stubble for 114 days from October 17 to January 8. They were fed 4 pounds of a grain protein supplement daily. Grain sorghum made up 25% of the supplement. The protein level of the supplement was 15%. Total weight gained per steer for the 114 day grazing period was 162 pounds which was an average 1.42 pounds per head per day. Including the supplemental feed, each acre of sorghum stubble aftermath produced 2.6 pounds of beef daily. The sorghum stubble grazing phase yielded a per head net return of \$23.25. While this program may not fit your situation, it shows that grazing grain sorghum stubble can be profitable. With proper treatment

and variety selection, tulips can be a spectacular sight in your garden or flower bed.

To assure an abundance of blooms next spring, new bulbs should be planted each fall. In other words, treat tulips as annuals and discard the bulbs after they bloom. Unless the bulbs have been properly chilled, they will not produce the long, graceful stems and attractive large

Most bulbs shipped to the south by northern producers have been chilled prior to shipment. However, much of the chilling effect is soon lost if the bulbs are allowed to remain at room temperature until planted. Bulbs should be selected as soon as they appear on the market in the fall and then kept in a cool place until planting. The ideal storage as mentioned before is in the vegetable bin in the refrigerator.

Tulips do best in deep, fertile, well-drained soil. In areas having poor soil drainage, plant them in raised beds. Plant the bulb so the base is 6 inches below the soil line. This places the bulb in the cooler region of the soil and allows it to develop a better root system before the shoot appears above ground.

Tulips make a more effective display when planted in masses of one variety and color. This does not mean that you should confine your entire planting to one variety, but rather keep each variety together as a clump for greater effect.

Pansy plants planted on top of a tulip bed will provide an attractive show of

color during the winter and early spring. The tulip bulbs will push on up above the pansies when they are ready to flower.

Remember to make your selections early, keep the
