Rogue Theatre Weekend Features

Showing this week at
Rogue Theatre on Fri-
day and Saturday nights is
"The Hunting Party" rated
"R". Gore and sex are mixed
but equally in the Levy-
Laven Production, directed
by Don Medford on location
in Spain. The reels aren't
completely unmissable, but
the film does contain many
of the excesses that tend to
offset the sensibilities of average
viewers. As a drama, the
film may generate some
interest along with the
scenes of Oliver Reed, Gene
Hackman and Gene Hackman.
The screenplay focuses on
Hacker's efforts to recover his
kidnaped wife, Gene Hackman,
from Reed's clutches. In the
process, it turns the tracking
down of the badmen into a
sport, with an enthusiasm
shared by his companions
until one of their number
is killed. Sex and violence
may be rampant, but there
is just one nude scene.
Best scenes involve Mitchell
Ryan as Reed's best friend
and the closing scenes as the
inevitable climaxes near.
Stars are Oliver Reed, Candice
Bergen, Gene Hackman, Simon
McLain, Mitchell Ryan and
D. J. Jones. The feature
runs 108 minutes.
Showing at the Prevue
on Sunday is "Fool's
Parade". Released from
Warner in Glory, W. Va., in
1955 are James Stewart, a
robber who served 40 years,
and a robber Strother Martin,
and young Kurt Russell,
sentenced for attempted
murder. Stewart has a glass
eye and a check for \$3,452.32,
which he saved in prison,
and intends to open a store
with his two friends. Prison
guard-Sunday-school-teacher
George Kennedy and bank
president David Huddleston
intend to rob them for the
check. Kennedy is aided by
Mike Keelin and young
Morgan Paul, but their
plans are spoiled by a train
conductor. Using dynamite
from a salesman William
Windom (Kennedy killed),
Stewart gets his cash. The
convicts find shelter on
the boat Anne Baxter's
houseboat-bordello. Russell
becomes original Kathy
Cannon, being forced into
prostitution, as Baxter is
blown up. Donner again
helps the convicts and the
girl takes refuge in a deserted
house. Disposing of Keelin
and Paul, Kennedy is killed
by Stewart's dynamite.
Huddleston is arrested as
Stewart and friends are
cheered.
Those who thought that
Stewart had no more tricks
up his sleeve will be sur-
prised by his dynamic per-
formance as a one-eyed
robber. The film is rated
"R" and is 98 minutes long.

Mustangs.

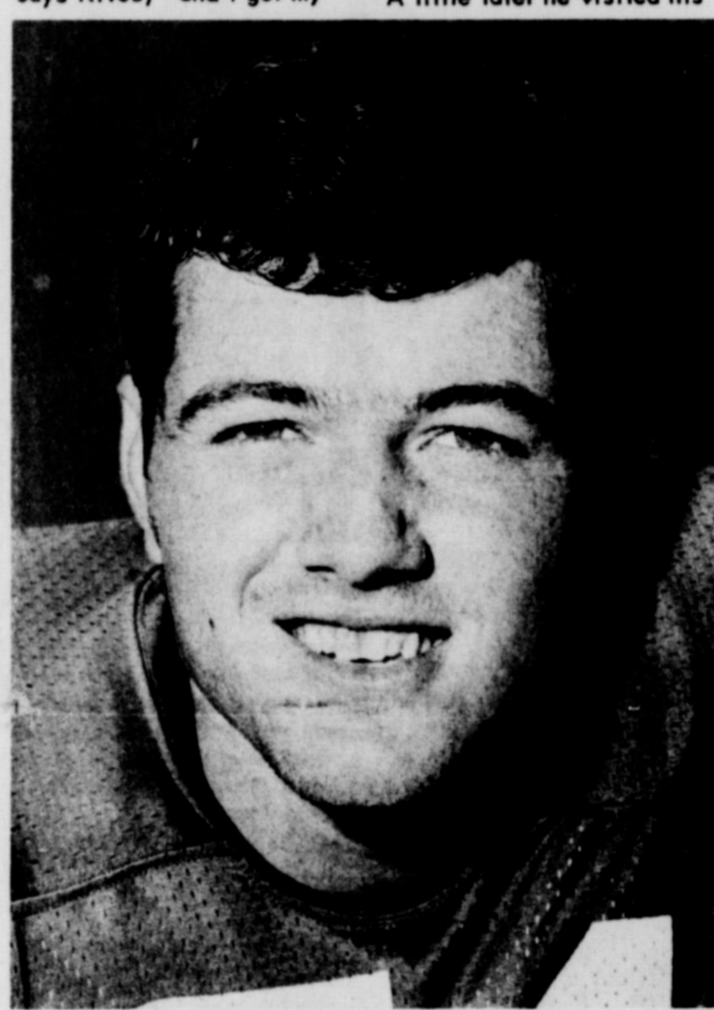
The next Mustang drive

FARMERS HOME, COMMERCIAL LENDERS JOIN IN MAKING LOANS

Texas Farmers will be
able to tap the largest sup-
plemental credit in history
this year through the Farmers
Home Administration, State
Director Lynn Futch an-
nounced today.
"We project that more
than \$81 million will be
available to Texas farmers
in fiscal year '72 as a
result of cooperative efforts
between the Farmers Home
Administration and com-
mercial lenders," he stated.

farm programs are also higher
because of a substantial
boost given the farm owner-
ship program by President
Nixon when he announced
that National funding would
be \$50 million this fiscal
year, \$82 million above 1971
levels, Mr. Futch said.

The cooperative effort
involves having the com-
mercial credit source and Far-
mers Home Administration
make simultaneous loans to
a borrower, with the private
lender having first claim on
the security.
"The farm ownership
program is aimed to reach
\$30 million -- \$15 million
of government money, with
private lenders participating
at a level of \$15 million,"
Mr. Futch continued.
"Projected figures for
the farm operating loan
program is \$51 million of
which \$22½ million--triple
last year's figure--comes
from regular commercial
lenders."

If this legislation is
passed, Mr. Futch said,
notes of farm borrowers for
operating purposes would be
sold to investors who, in
turn, would be insured against
loss of the notes. The
investors' money would re-
plenish a revolving fund and
would be available for more
loans, as is the case now
with farm ownership loans.
"It will continue to be
our policy to assist people
in finding the credit need-
ed to begin farming or to
help finance farm operations,"
he said. "We therefore com-
mit government funds only
when we cannot involve
private money to serve agri-
culture's credit needs."
"To assure this, county
supervisors of the Farmers
Home Administration are
required to contact another
lender with respect to every
application for farm owner-
ship or operating funds.
We are pleased with the
fine cooperation extended
by banks and other credit
sources to make this plan
work," he concluded.

MASTER MIX

2 cups shortening
 9 cups all purpose flour
 1/4 cup double acting baking
 soda
 1 tsp. salt
 Combine flour, salt and
 baking powder. Stir well.
 Sift into a large bowl. Use
 fingertips or pastry blender
 to distribute shortening
 throughout dry ingredients
 until the mixture resembles
 coarse corn meal. The
 mix is ready to store on your
 pantry shelf until used.

Nut Ball Coffee Cake

Yield 12 balls
 2 cups mix (don't pack)
 3 tbsps. granulated sugar
 1/2 tsp. butter
 1 tsp. nutmeg
 2 tbsps. butter
 1 tsp. cinnamon
 1/3 cup milk
 1/2 tsp. cinnamon
 1 egg, beaten
 1/4 cup brown sugar
 1/4 cup finely chopped nuts
 Blend mixture, granulated
 sugar, 1/2 tsp. each of cin-
 namon and nutmeg. Add milk
 and egg. Beat until thor-
 oughly mixed. Dip by spoonfuls
 into melted butter, then in
 brown sugar and 1 tsp. cin-
 namon mixed together, and
 in nuts. Place closely to-

gether in deep 8 inch pie
 pan. Bake at 375° for 20
 minutes.

Cinnamon Pinwheels

Yield 8 rolls
 2 cups mix (don't pack)
 1 cup sugar
 1/2 tsp. salt
 1/4 pound candied cherries
 1/2 cup milk
 2 tbsps. sugar

Make a well in mix and
 add milk. Stir with a fork
 about 25 times. Turn onto
 waxed paper and knead 6
 times. Roll onto 8 x 12 in.
 rectangle. Spread with butter.
 Sprinkle with sugar mixed
 with cinnamon. Roll up as
 for jelly roll. Cut into 1
 inch slices. Place side by
 side in greased pan and
 bake at 450° for 15 m. n.

Minute Muffins

Yield 12 muffins, 2 1/4 in.
 in diameter
 3 cups mix (don't pack)
 1 cup milk
 1 cup sugar
 3 tbsps. sugar
 1 egg beaten

Blend mix and sugar. Com-
 bine milk and egg and add
 to mix. Stir quickly until
 just mixed. Batter will look
 lumpy. Rub muffin pans
 lightly with shortening.
 Fill 1/2 full. Bake at 425°
 for 20 min.

Family Cake
 yields 8x8x2 in. cake
 2 cups master mix (don't
 pack)
 1/4 cup sugar
 1 egg, well beaten
 1/2 cup milk
 1 tsp. vanilla

Blend mix and sugar. Add
 milk and vanilla. Beat until
 well mixed. Add the egg.
 Continue beating until well
 mixed. Pour into 8x8x2 inch
 pan with bottom rubbed with
 shortening. Bake at 375°
 for 30 minutes. Frost with
 your favorite icing.

Pineapple Upside Down cake
 yield 8x8x2 inch cake
 1 recipe Family cake
 1/2 cup packed brown sugar
 3 tbsps. butter, melted
 12 half-s pineapples,
 drained

Blend butter and brown
 sugar. Spread into a 8x8x2
 inch pan. Arrange pineapple
 over sugar mixture. Prepare
 Family Cake batter as di-
 rected and pour over pine-
 apple. Bake at 350° for 45
 minutes. Cool slightly. In-
 vert on cake platter while
 still warm. Serve with whip-
 ped cream if desired.

Here's a recipe that I
 got from Jean DeArment of
 Wheeler. It is delicious! It
 freezes real well, too.

Creamed Enchilladas
 1 small can green chilies,
 chopped
 1 can cream of chicken soup,
 without water added
 1 can cream of mushroom
 soup, without water added
 1 small can evaporated milk
 2 cans boned chicken or
 turkey
 1/2 package (small) Doritos
 Mix above ingredients
 together. (Soup is mixed
 straight from the can, without
 water added or being heated.)
 Grate cheese over mixture
 to your taste. Top with re-
 maining 1/2 package of Dor-
 itos. Bake at moderate oven
 about 325° till the cheese
 melts and bubbles and the
 mixture is thoroughly warmed.

Here's a recipe that would
 be especially good for the
 holidays, for entertaining at
 a coffee, a brunch, or just
 anytime. I got this recipe
 from the Home Demonstration
 Agent in Hereford.
Fruit-Nut Muffins

1 tsp. baking powder
 1 cup flour
 1/2 pound candied pineapple
 4 cups chopped pecans
 1 cup sugar
 1/2 tsp. salt
 1/4 pound candied cherries
 1/2 pound dates

Beat eggs. Add sugar and
 continue mixing. Sift flour,
 baking powder, and dates
 and add to mixture. Add
 pecans and stir. Bake in
 miniature muffin tins at
 350° for 15 minutes. Just
 like having miniature fruit-
 cakes.

Across the Fence

Times have changed! When I was a boy, tractors were beginning to take over for horses and mules in agriculture. In fact, a few years earlier, the number of horses and mules in a community was a good indication of the amount of farming going on. Not so today. Preliminary figures released by the USDA office after the VEE vaccinations, showed Dallas (Tarrant Co.) had close to 20,000 horses and Houston (Harris Co.) close to 30,000. Not everyone in those places has a horse, but that's a lot of horses for no more use than they have for horses. We've got a lot of horses here in Wheeler Co. also but at least we're using them. We figure on the average, that every family in the county has at least one horse. And

that's one thing that folks in the city can't boast about. There's not many of us left. In 10 short years since 1960 the number of people living in rural areas shrunk from 10% to less than 5%. Now at 4.8%, the percentages of folks living in rural America is at an all time low. Carry your head high. You have survived this transition. A lot of folks in the cities tend to forget that folks in the cities wouldn't have anything to eat if we all moved to the city.

They're learning more about leadership! 4-H Adult leaders attended a two-day Project Training Workshop in Amarillo, Nov. 16-17.

The meeting featured agricultural and home economics specialists from throughout the state. Adult leaders from the county attending included Mrs. Evert Smith, Mrs. Bill Smith, both of Shamrock, Mrs. Jack Meek and Mrs. Jeff Puryear of Briscoe, and Patricia Palmer, County Home Demonstration Agent. The conference was conducted at the Episcopal Church Conference Center, north of Amarillo. Vegetable gardening was taught by Sam Cotner, Extension area vegetable specialist at San Antonio, with the horse and pony project being handled by Don D. Householder, assistant in horse production at Texas A & M University. Dr. John Coleman of Bushland spoke on veterinary science, and money man-

agement was taught by Ed Garnett, area economist at Amarillo, and Jimmie Lou Wainscott, Gray County home demonstration agent. Food and nutrition was the topic of Miss Sally Springer, Extension specialist from College Station, and Mrs. Argen Draper, Deaf Smith Co. home demonstration agent. The last area was home furnishings and was handled by Mrs. Charles Warminski of Carson Co. and Mrs. Don Mitchell of Hutchinson Co., both 4-H adult leaders. Mrs. Evert Smith of Shamrock led a public speaking workshop.

The afternoon program concluded with general training sessions on public speaking and crafts. Young 4-H club members from the Panhandle spoke to the leaders on how they can assist the youth in their clubs. A recreation training program ended the day's activities.

The project area group sessions were the major part of the Wednesday morning meeting, with the general sessions on public speaking and crafts rounding out the morning.

The afternoon session was a summary of the workshop, with a question and answer period being conducted by Dr. Ed Schlutt, 4-H and youth specialist from the state office at Texas A & M University. The conference was adjourned at 2:00 p.m.

Notorious pest gang up on county peach trees. Masses of gum found around the base of the trunk of peach trees are a good indication that the peachtree borer larva is causing its damage. Borer larva feed in the trunk of the peach tree at or near the ground level causing large amounts of gum to build up at the ground line. Infested trees may be killed in one to three years depending on the number of larvae present and the size of the tree.

Paradichlorobenzene (PDB) crystals (moth crystals) applied around the infested trees will control peachtree borers when applied properly. All weeds and grasses should be removed from the tree trunk for about a foot. Then the PDB crystals are placed in a circular band around the tree about 2 inches from the trunk.

A mound of dirt 6 to 8 inches high should then be packed against the tree. Care should be taken to make sure crystals are not placed in contact with the tree since damage to the trunk will result. Next spring

the mound should be leveled back to the original ground line. Place ½ ounce of PDB crystals around 2 to 3 year old trees, ¾ ounces around 4 to 5 year old trees and 1 ounce around older trees.

To be most effective this procedure should be carried out within the next two weeks.

Joseph S. Taxhimself, an average farmer-rancher was somewhat unorthodox in the way he filed his income tax. He was content to pay more taxes than he was suppose to. He failed to

make certain management decisions before the end of the year. When his taxable income was above that anticipated for next year, he went right ahead and sold his calves, and milo crop, instead of waiting until 1972. His biggest mistake was not in buying supplies now such as fertilizer, feed and chemicals before the end of the year to reduce this year's income. We suppose that's why he has to pay so many taxes and why he got the name - Joseph S. Taxhimself.

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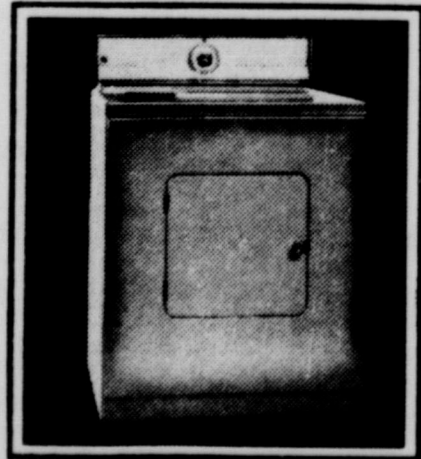

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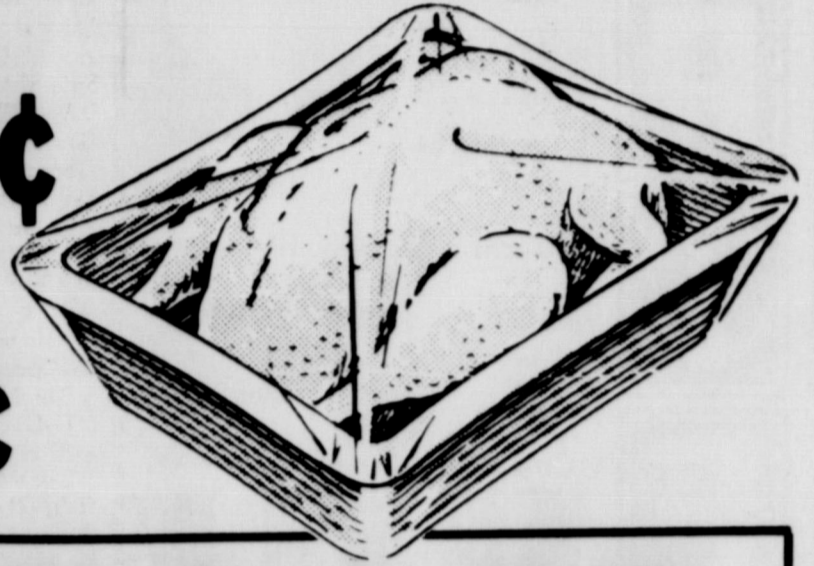
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
