Elevator Explosion Injures Former Wheeler Resident

Steve Johnson, 20, is undergoing treatment for second and third-degree burns about his face and head, and isolated first and second-degree burns on both legs in the Wichita Falls hospital after having miraculously survived an explosion of an elevator in Eads, Colo.

The explosion occurred Nov. 11 when the Geronimo Elevator exploded while Johnson was elevating a load of milo onto a truck for delivery to Amarillo. Exactly what detonated the dust explosion and blaze had not been determined. The mishap occurred at approximately 9 p.m.

Damage to the 50,000-bushel, 75-foot-high tri-level structure was estimated at between \$20,000 and \$25,000. The structure, according to H.C. Johnson, owner, and his brother, Robert, manager, was "totalled."

Both the senior Johnsons agree that Steve's escape was nothing short of miraculous and both his father and mother attribute his survival to his athletic talent.

A skilled acrobatic diver, both his parents said Steve's immediate reaction undoubtedly saved his life. They said that Steve somersaulted through the gaping hole made in the south side of the loading runway by the blast. This automatic reaction, they feel, extinguished the flames which enveloped Steve at the time.

Force of the blast was terrific as evidenced by the gaping hole blown through the north side of the wood-framed metal-covered structure. Milo was piled some 10 feet high over the Missouri-Pacific spur adjoining the elevator.

Additional evidence of the explosion's violence was to be seen to the south of the old building where the east-west south wall of the loading runway was utterly demolished.

Johnson purchased the elevator, believed to have been built in the late 1920's or early 1930's from the McNell Grain Co., of Thomas Okla., just prior to the 1970 wheat harvest.

It is one of four elevators in the Geronimo Elevator Co., chain owned by Johnson. Others are located at Galatea, Colo.; Wichita Falls, Tex.; and Geronimo, Okla. The Wichita Falls facility is a huge, concrete, many-tubed grain-handling operation.

The entire frame work of the Eads structure was sprung and the roof at the 75-foot level was blown loose from its anchor. Both H.C. and Robert Johnson said restoration was not feasible.

Steve was first admitted to the Eads hospital and then transferred on Nov. 17 to the Wichita Falls hospital.

He is a former resident of Wheeler and the grandson of Otis Reed of Wheeler. Mr. Reed has been to Wichita Falls to see him.

Along with Ronnie Hill, Rodney Weatherly and Pat Hill were named to the defensive team. Pat Hill was one of the three interior linemen chosen on defense and Weatherly, the hard hitting Mustang senior, was awarded one of the line-backer posts.

Two other Mustangs made the second team on offense as Noel Glazner and Jim Bob Brooks were chosen as offensive guards.

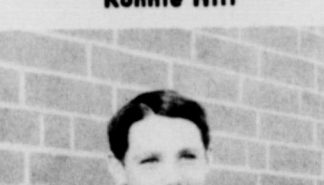

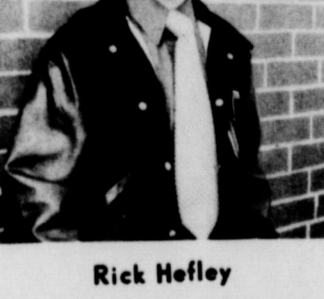

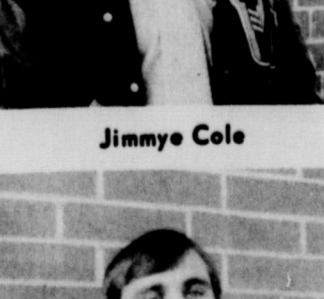

Local Group Attends Farm Bureau Con.

Wheeler County Farm Bureau was represented at the 39th annual meeting of the Texas Farm Bureau Nov. 14-17 in Amarillo by 8 delegates. Sessions were held in the Amarillo Civic Center.

State policies and recommendations on national issues were adopted by more than 900 official voting delegates from most of the 206 organized county Farm Bureaus. Total attendance at the convention was more than 1,500.

Registration got underway Nov. 14. Highlights of that day included Discussion Meet and Talent Find competition for young people and vesper services.

The Monday morning program included the annual address by TFB President, J.T. Woodson of Gober, an administrative report by Executive Director O.R. Long of Waco, and an address by William J. Kuhfuss, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation. Special conferences on Community Services, Young Farmers and Ranchers, Livestock, Dairy and Natural Resources were held that afternoon. The annual Queen contest, with 13 participants, was held Monday evening.

Special conferences on Field Crops, Farm Labor, Research and Education, Services, Poultry, and Farm Bureau Women were held Tuesday morning. The annual banquet was held Tuesday evening with Dr. Earl L. Butz, Dean of Continuing Education and Vice President of Purdue Research Foundation, Purdue University, as speaker.

The business session convened at 10:30 Tuesday morning with voting on resolutions sent in by county Farm Bureaus. The voting session continued Wednesday until all recommendations were either adopted, amended or rejected. Final order of directors and the president.

Whether or not this inspection is made, it is very important that everyone who prepared meat knows how it is properly handled. There are several things you can do to prevent the danger of salmonella poisoning.

To reduce spoilage, meat should be refrigerated as soon as possible after you buy it. The meat should be unwrapped, or loosely

wrapped. You may wonder why this is done. Here's the reason. The slight drying of the surface of the meat helps keep bacteria from growing. Bacteria grows best in a moist, warm



"Turned On" Wedding

"I do," solemnly spoken by bride and groom, is usually enough to make a legally valid marriage. But suppose one or both of the parties is "turned on," either by drugs or by alcohol. This may create a situation once described as follows by Euripides: "The tongue hath sworn, but the mind is unsworn."



Marriage is a contract—a special kind, to be sure, but a contract nonetheless. The key to a contract is mutual assent, a meeting of the minds. And a mind not competent to assent is not competent to make a contract, no matter what the tongue says.

How clear must the mind be? The law's test is whether the person is able to understand the nature of a marriage contract at the moment he says "I do." If he is not, the marriage may be annulled.

But intoxication short of that which is usually overlooked. Since the law gives matrimony the benefit of the doubt, courts generally will not grant an annulment merely because the bride or the groom was a little high.

Furthermore, even if one of the parties was indeed "out of it" at the time of the wedding, the marriage may become valid because of what happens afterward. Take this case:

A man married a girl he scarcely knew, as the climax of a protracted drinking party. Seeking an annulment later, he pleaded in court that he had been in an alcoholic stupor at the time of the wedding.

But the girl pointed out that he had continued to cohabit with her for several days after he had sobered up. Result: annulment denied, because the marriage had been "ratified" by subsequent events.

What if one of the parties, although in good shape at the wedding itself, had concealed the fact that he was an alcoholic or a dope addict? Under these circumstances, most courts will grant an annulment to the spouse who has been deceived.

Thus, a bride won an annulment when she discovered after the nuptials that her bridegroom was a heroin addict. The court said this was the kind of vital information that, in all fairness, any bride had a right to know.

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area. So, you should allow air to circulate around the surface of the meat, and keep it in the coldest part of the refrigerator.

When you prepare meat on the cutting board, wash the board before preparing anything else on it. Also, wash your hands after preparing meat, and before preparing anything else.

reason for the moderate temperature is to allow the center of the meat to become done. At a high temperature the outside may appear done, or even burned, before the center is done.

Tender cuts of meat are most accurately tested by the use of a meat thermometer. Recommended final temperature in the center of the cut of beef are: rare (140°F), medium (160°F) and well done (170°F). Lamb is medium at 175°F. Poultry is done when the interior of the thigh muscle is 185°F. Fresh pork is heated to well done, 195°F, to ensure safety from a bacteria that especially attacks pork. Cured pork is required by federal law to be treated in a manner that will destroy this bacteria,

so all government inspected hams should be safe. Tenderized hams are partially heated and ready-to-eat hams are heated to doneness during processing. All hams may be heated to a temperature of your liking, but an internal temperature of 165-170°F should be used for hams that have not been heated during processing.

Timetables are a helpful guide in planning how long a piece of meat will take to become done. Variations in time, due to differences in oven temperature, amount of bone, amount of fat, and amount of aging, make the use of a thermometer necessary for palatable meat. Moist heat methods (braising, boiling or stewing) will produce well done meats all the time. Less tender cuts prepared by a moist

method, are done when a fork may be inserted and removed from the meat easily. It is not necessary to use a thermometer in these cuts.

If you have any questions about preparing meat, or would like to have a chart showing approximate times to allow for cooking meat, let me know.

Here's a recipe I received from Judy Morris of Wheeler. 1 can cherry pie filling 1 small can crushed pineapple with juice ½ cup sugar

Mix together and let stand overnight in refrigerator. Add and mix in: 1 cup miniature marshmallows 1 cup crushed nuts 2 large bananas, sliced thin

Chill till ready to serve.
