

John Q. Public Wants A New Park

John Q. Public, whose address is the general Muleshoe area, learned Friday night at a public meeting what things John Q. and his neighbors think needs fixing. Mostly JQP wants a new park and a community center.

It was the report - back session of MAIF, the Muleshoe Area Improvement Forum, and was actually a summary of all the suggestions which John et al had made at group meetings last autumn. Friday's meeting, held in the American Legion hall, was well attended.

West Texas Chamber of Com-

merce had taken all the suggestions and gathered them together painstakingly into a general summary. For example, they even counted the number of times a particular suggestion was made, and from this set of figures, arrive at the consensus of opinion for their summary.

The suggestions also were broken down into short - range and long - range suggestions, after first classifying the suggestions into six general categories.

These general classifications

included: 1. Community Improvement and education; 2. Business Development; 3. Industrial Development; 4. Agriculture and Livestock; 5. Parks and Recreation; 6. Organization.

The summary was prepared by Ralph Duncan, manager of the community services department of WTCO which was present at all last autumn's initial sessions. General sponsor of the entire forum is Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce.

Said Duncan: "A total of 10-50 suggestions in 51 separate

project classifications for the development of Muleshoe and its surrounding territory were made during these sessions, the forum cards revealed."

In his report to Roger Albertson, last year's Chamber president, Duncan praised the people who attended the forum, saying "Most of these present entered into the spirit and purpose of the meeting."

At Friday night's report session to the general public, the 1050 suggestions were broken down into "long - range" and "short range" objectives.

The report classified the suggestions into 82 categories of the 1050 suggestions made. Of this number, majority were of the short - range variety, and work now will be started - immediately to carry out those immediate suggestions, those attending Friday night's meeting were told.

Community betterment topped the list of suggestions, 363 being made in that category. "Because of this (the high number) it is evident that your people are much interested in this phase of the community life."

Duncan said in his general summary. "Through careful planning we believe you can expect good results in completed projects, which should stimulate interest in the over-all program development."

In the field of community development, these short - range objectives were brought out:

1. Beautification: city - wide periodic clean - up program, include alley and street sanitation, maintenance of vacant lots and controlled and enforced sanitation.
2. Study traffic pattern for improvement.
3. Improve highway approaches to the city.
4. Improve street lighting.
5. More frequent garbage and trash pick - ups.
6. Safety controls at railroad crossings.
7. Elimination of offensive odors from stock pens.
8. Additional police.
9. Improvement to telephone service.
10. Enforce stock and pet (See PUBLIC Page 5)

Telephone Company Starts Vast Conversion, Improvement Plan

General Telephone Company this past week launched an elaborate eight - month "conversion program" in the Muleshoe plant which will bring ultra modern service to the area.

R. E. Saunders, district manager, said Saturday.

Temporary date for completion of the new system is Aug. 15.

When completed, the entire central office will have undergone a remodeling, changing the system from "terminal per line" operation to "terminal per station" equipment. "Stations" in telephone phraseology mean the customer.

Saunders said the company will spend "thousands of dollars" converting the plant here to the new type service, which, when completed, will convert the plant here to a seven digit system, an all - numeral numbering plan such as is being set up throughout the nation. The old letter prefixes are being replaced throughout the nation.

Cattle Feeding Show Increase

WASHINGTON (AP) - Feeders in 32 major cattle feeding states had 1 per cent more cattle and calves on feed for the quality slaughter market Jan. 1 than a year earlier.

An Agriculture Department survey found 9,550,000 head, compared to 9,462,000 a year earlier.

But the number on feed in the north central corn belt states was down slightly - 5,846,000, compared to 5,858,000 a year ago.

Feeders in the 32 states indicated they intend to market 3,950,000 cattle in the January-March quarter. This would be 4 per cent less than in the same period last year.

Poverty In Rural Areas Here? Local FHA Office Not Certain

Is there poverty in Bailey county - the kind the government's new poverty program can help?

The Journal asked that question of Clinton Kennedy, local Farmers Home Administration manager. FHA will make loans to low - income rural families, if they can qualify under the President's poverty program. That's why the question was directed at Kennedy.

"I don't know," was his answer. "We have had no inquiries so far, but we do know that the 1960 census revealed the fact that there were 465 rural families in Bailey county whose, well, we would like for

had incomes of less than \$3000," such persons to know what's available."

The program is new - brand new. To date, only 11 such loans have been made in the United States, and the first Texas loan was announced this week by Lester J. Cappleman, state director of FHA who is Kennedy's "boss."

Cappleman gave details on a loan being made to a family who operate a small farm near Long Branch in Panola County. The loan was made to a 57-year-old farmer and his wife, parents of eight children. It was a \$2500 loan, made for 15 years (See POVERTY Page 5)

P. T. A. president, Mrs. Clarence Mason, introduced the distinguished speaker for the meetings, Jess Osborn. He was appointed to the State Hospital Board for the Mentally Retarded by Governor Price Daniel and is still serving in this capacity. Previously Jess Osborn was State Representative, an of-

lice he held for ten years. Mental Retardation is an area wherein the general public is poorly informed and Jess Osborn did much to dispel this ignorance. He told the assembly, "There are approximately 13.63 in mental institutions in the United States today - 300,000 mentally retarded persons live in Texas alone. One Texas family in every nine is affected by mental retardation. One birth in every 33 live births will be a retarded child. There are 11,000 mentally retarded persons in Texas. Special Schools now, and a waiting list of 1,400 grows at the rate of 150 applications per month."

He continued, "Even with the wealth of knowledge, we know that much more can be done. It takes time and money - and education of the public to mental retardation itself. By 1970 we will need 90,000 good teachers for the Special Schools."

Texas Plan to Combat Mental Retardation is an organized time schedule of events geared to the needs of each community. The late President Kennedy initiated the Mental Retardation program in October, 1961, establishing grants for the various states for the purpose of combating mental retardation. Texas is one of the states participating in this grant.

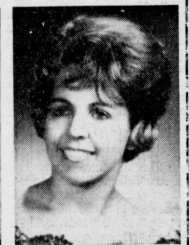

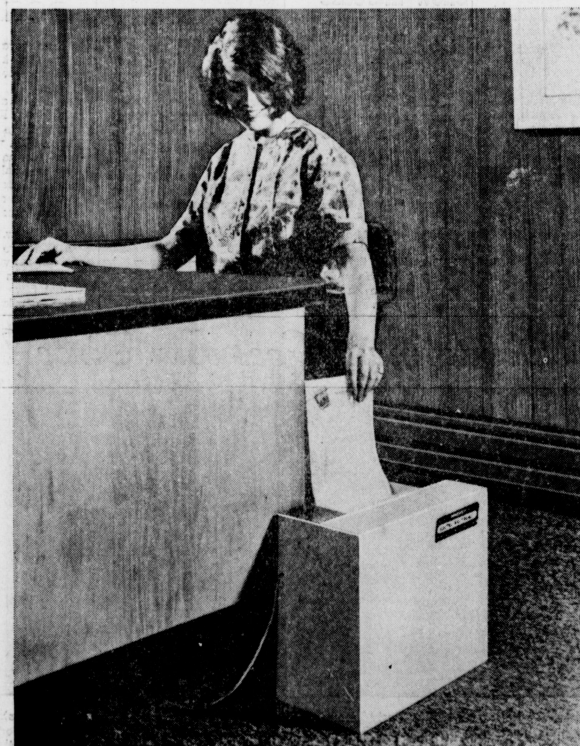

NOTICE TO PARENTS OF SCHOOL AGE CHILDREN

The school census is being taken during the month of January this year. All children who are six years old or before Sept. 1, 1965 but will not be 18 or older on or before that same date should be counted in this census. It is very important that all children six to 18 years be counted in this census. The child should be counted even though he may not be in school even though he or she may be married.

If you, as a parent, have not received and filled out a school census blank on or before January 31 you are being overlooked and should do one of the following:

1. Phone the school office and ask for a census blank.

to re-finance a mortgage which is overdue against his 25 - acre farm. The loan also will provide money with which to buy a cow, for a male and to carry out some land development work and pay operating expenses on his 1965 truck crop which will consist of two and a half acres of tomatoes and cucumbers. The family of 10 also will raise a large garden and some pigs to meet the family's food needs. Improvements made with the loan will enable this family to make a 50 - percent increase in their gross income.

That income, incidentally, totaled only \$1540.

At the state office 75 applications for "economic opportunity loans" have been received.

The loans are authorized by the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964, which includes a rural credit service involving \$33 million in Federal funds.

In addition, three other loans have been approved in Texas; one to a 31 year old farmer who lives in Harrison County near

Marshall, Texas. There are five children in this family. The total amount of the loan is \$2,500. The funds will be used to purchase 12 acres of land, and move and repair a house to be located on the 12 acres being purchased. This will provide a more adequate dwelling for the family.

The third loan made this week in Texas, according to Mr. Cappelman, was one made to a widow living near Hempstead in Waller County. A loan of \$820 is being used to assist this widow in purchasing livestock and drilling a well so that she and her family will have sanitary water supply for domestic purposes.

The Farmers Home Administration County Supervisor for Washington and Waller Counties, Temple Evans, has developed a farming program on the small acreage which should result in an increased gross income of approximately \$400 per year.

The fourth loan was made to a couple living in Bell County who operate a small farm. The loan funds will be used to en-

able them to add an additional source of income through the construction and equipping of a small repair and farm implement repair shop. With this additional source of income, the family will be able to raise their level of living from \$1,200 per year to approximately \$2,000 per year after the business is in operation. This will amount to a 50 percent increase in their gross income from all sources.

The State Director of the Farmers Home Administration in Texas stated that all personnel are enlisting the assistance of rural agricultural and business leaders, school teachers, ministers, welfare workers, charitable organizations and others to assist this agency in informing low - income rural families of the opportunities available to them in the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964.

According to Mr. Cappelman, the 1964 Agricultural Census showed approximately 375,000 rural families; both farm and non - farm, living in the country and in communities of less than 2,500 population, receive a gross income of \$3,000 a year or less from all sources. This means we have a real challenge in Texas in providing opportunities for these families, to improve their level of living.

All of the loans bear a 4 1/2 percent interest. Economic Opportunity Loans may be made in amounts up to \$2,500 to finance small family businesses, trades, services, and farming enterprises.

The rural families eligible for anti-poverty loans are confronted with such problems as limited resources; low incomes; indebtedness beyond their present ability to repay; lack of management skills, and an unsatisfactory level of living. To help overcome these problems and assure success of the new businesses or farming enterprises, borrowers will be provided with intensive and continuing management aid by local county supervisors of the Farmers Home Administration.

To be eligible for the new rural credit program, an individual applicant must:

1. Live in a rural area which

Children who attend school will bring home the forms Monday, and they are to be returned to the school Thursday.

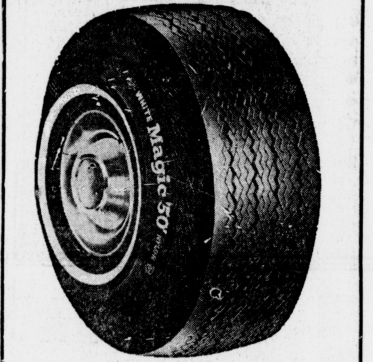
It's all a part of the annual head-count for all school-age children and pre-school youngsters. The census started Jan.
