\$300 WILL BE HANDED OUT

The second \$300 of the \$1,000 Christmas Drawing will be given away Saturday, December 18. The third and final drawing will be Friday, December 24. \$400 will be given away Christmas Eve.

Saturday's and Friday's drawings will be held on the west side of the Courthouse Square at 2:30 p.m.

Sixteen people will be handed cash Saturday. The \$300 cash will be divided into 2-\$50; 4-\$25; and 10-\$10.

Some lucky person will receive \$100 cash Friday just in time for Christmas. The \$100 will be added to \$300 which will be divided as it was for the previous drawings.

Wheeler Merchants and businessmen donated the \$1,000 to show their appreciation of their customers.

Here's how it works - tickets were available and registration began Dec. 1 at each of the participating businesses listed in this story and elsewhere in the paper.

Accident Report In Co. in Nov.

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated five accidents on rural highways in Wheeler Co. during the month of November, according to Sergeant J.L. Dalrymple, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one person killed and no persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first eleven months of 1971 shows a total of 84 accidents resulting in eight persons killed and 24 persons injured.

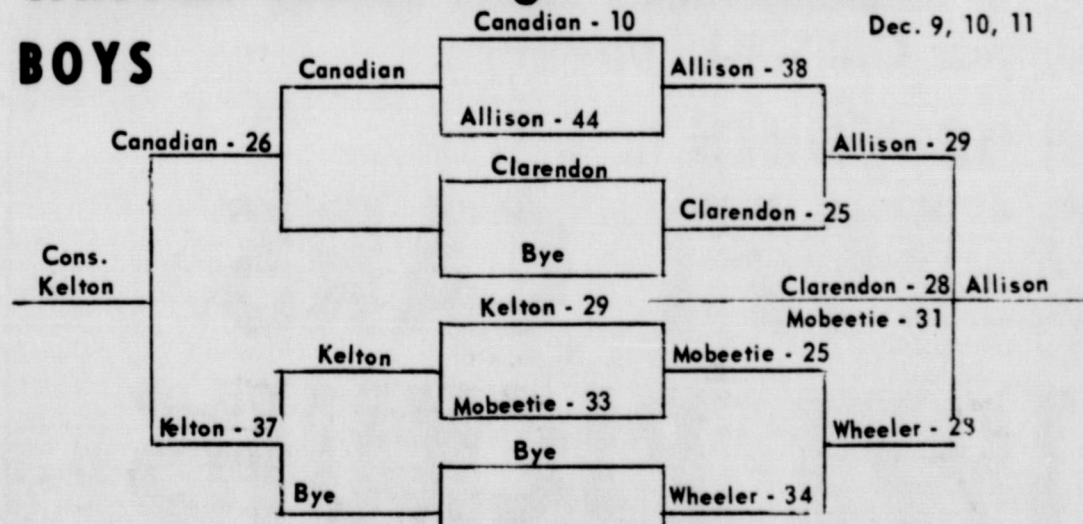

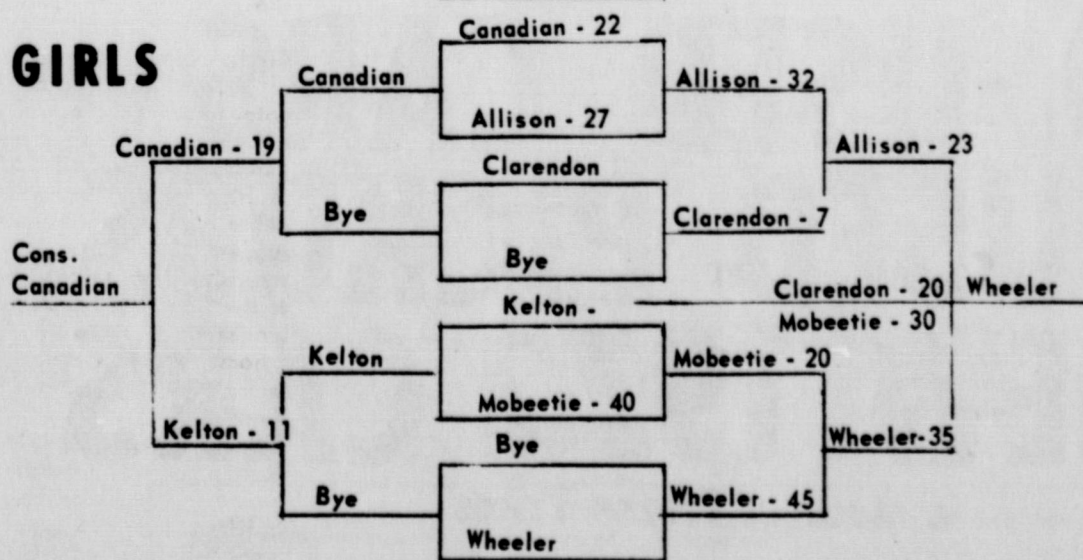

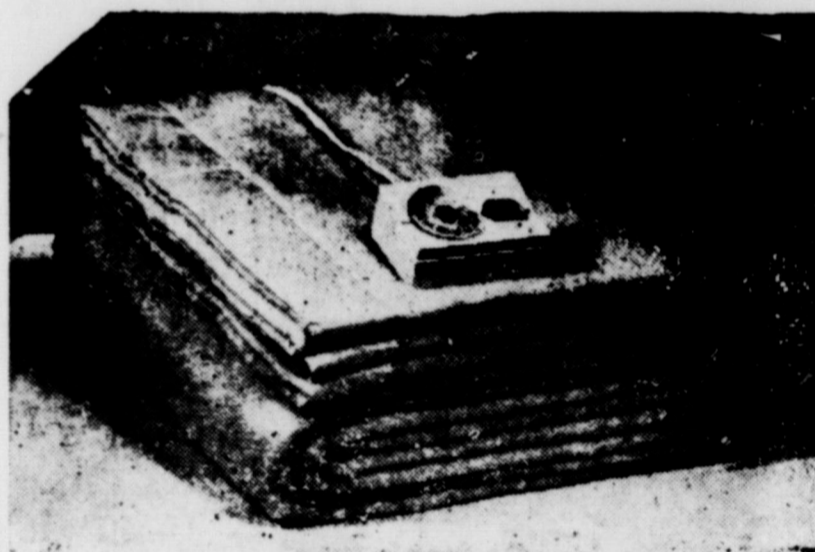

bird. Fill the body cavity lightly so stuffing will have room to expand. Bacteria grow when food is neither very hot nor very cold. So do not allow your dressing to stay at this temperature. Cook the stuffed bird until the stuffing temperature reaches at least 165°. The internal temperature of the thigh should be between 180-185° whether or not the cavity is stuffed. Many of you do not stuff the turkey, but cook the dressing separately. Cooked poultry may be safely frozen in a home freezer at 0°F. for up to six months. Use cooked poultry and stuffing stored in the refrigerator within 1-2 days.

A live, green Christmas tree is a symbol of the beauty and joy of Christmas but a dry tree is a fire hazard. Many of you have already selected a tree, some have not. If you are still looking, select a fresh-looking firm needled tree. Saw off the base at least one inch above the original cut, stand the tree in water and keep it in water until it is taken down. This also applies to you who already have your trees check the water level daily. This will help some in keeping it from becoming dry. Be sure to place the tree away from all sources of heat: fireplaces, radiators, or other heaters. Don't rely on "do it yourself" flameproofing available in aerosol cans. They are partly effective if the coating is thick enough. In short, there is no satisfactory home treatment which will retard fire in Christmas trees.

Our traditional holiday foods are turkey and dressing, cranberry sauce, sweet potatoes, etc. Other countries have other traditional holiday foods. In Austria, on Christmas Eve, the dinner is usually fried carp. In Czechoslovakia, a young pig is a part of the meal. The favorite dish in an area of France, around Paris, is oysters. English people have turkey, roast potatoes, mince pie, plum pudding. In Scandinavian countries, especially Sweden, the smorgasbord is first, then the fish course (cod with cream sauce), followed by a Christmas ham. Finally, the meal is topped off with a white steaming rice pudding or porridge. In the Anduras (Central America) tamales are the Christmas food.

Here's a good ol' United States recipe, that's a make ahead salad.

Merry Christmas Salad
 1 cup drained diced peaches
 1 c. drained pineapple tidbits
 1/2 c. diced Maraschino cherries
 1 pkg. strawberry gelatin
 1 cup hot water
 1 tbsp. cherry juice
 1/2 c. whipping cream, whipped
 1 c. combined peach and pineapple juice
 1 pkg. (1g) cream cheese
 1 tbsp. lemon juice
 1/2 tsp. salt
 2 tbsp. mayonnaise
 1 c. miniature marshmallows
 Drain fruits and chill. Reserve juice. Dissolve gelatin in hot water. Add fruit juices and chill until partially congealed. Blend cream cheese with lemon juice, salt and mayonnaise. Fold in whipped cream. Beat chilled gelatin until light and fluffy. Fold into cream.

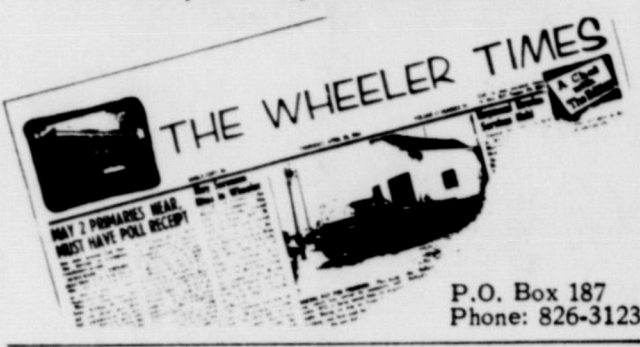

Narrow-row cotton production is now a reality on the Texas High Plains and interest is spreading. The first significant acreage was planted in 1969, when 18 cooperative demonstrations were conducted by county agricultural agents and farmers. In 1970, 3,000 acres were planted in narrow-row, requiring 25 broadcast strippers. A dramatic jump to 20,000 acres requiring about 70 harvesters came in 1971. It is predicted that 1972 will see 50,000 acres in narrow-row production, and this figure should double to 100,000 acres in 1973 when the first commercial dwarf variety becomes available. Seven different companies now manufacture broadcast strippers. The number of of broadcast harvesters can be expected to increase to more than 150 by 1973. Although many production problems promise of stabilizing the future cotton production in West Texas.
