Mr. Garner was born in Plainview and grew up in Allison. He had lived in Porterville, California, for the past five years. He was a member of the Oddfellows Lodge.

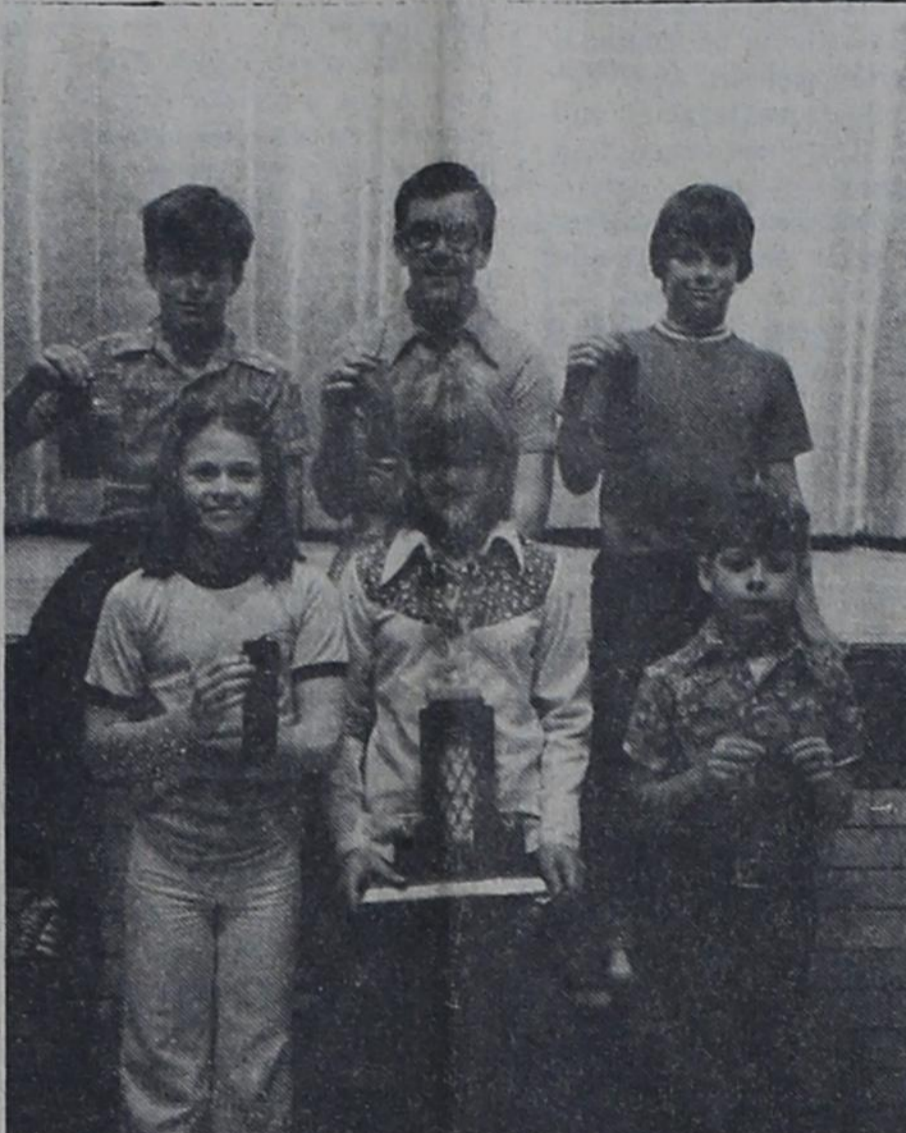

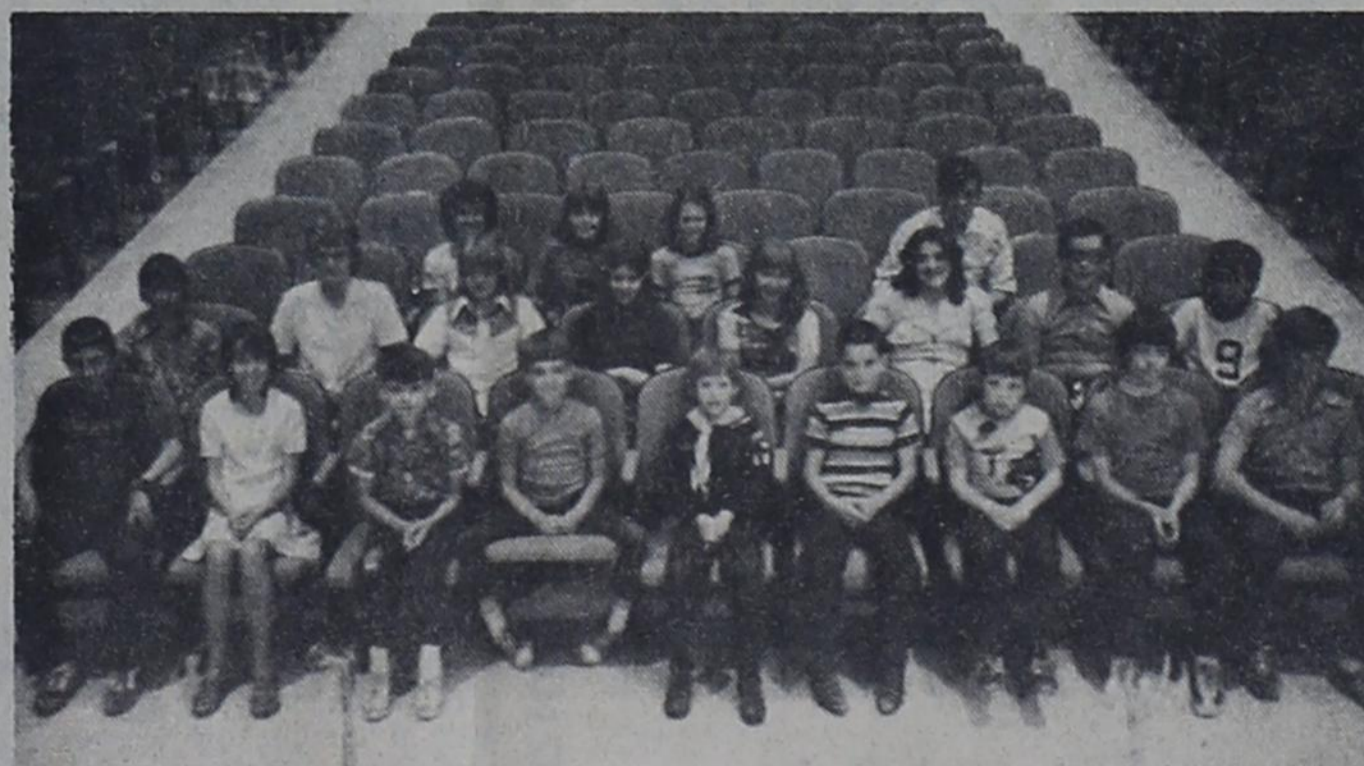

AREA ELECTION RESULTS

Wheeler voters went to the polls Saturday, April 3, to elect a mayor, three councilmen, two members to the Wheeler School Board and a member to the Parkview Hospital Board. One hundred fifty-seven voters cast their ballots in the city election, about 200 cast their ballots in the school election and 221 votes were counted in the hospital election.

In the city election, the mayor and three councilmen ran unopposed. Harrison Hall was elected to a second term as mayor with 119 votes. Charlie Wagner received 131 votes in his election to fill the unexpired term on the Council. 139 votes were cast for Louis Stas for place 4 on the council and 138 votes were given David Cross for place 2. A number of write-in votes placed on the ballots.

Unofficially, a vote difference of one vote placed Larry Jennings back on the Wheeler Board of Trustees. Jennings received 105 votes with his opponent, Betty Hennard receiving 104. Doyce Watson ran unopposed for Position 4 on the board and received 175 votes.

Three names appeared on the ballot for Wheeler representative on the Parkview Hospital Board. Dub Coad was named to the Board with 135 votes. Tommie Hennard received 81 and Don Denton was given 5 votes.

In the Kelton election for Hospital Paula Britt received 10 votes.

Area Results

Voters in Allison cast 42 votes for Domet Miller, 37 votes for Larry Elmore,

and 47 votes for Hiram Begert.

Four names were on the Briscoe ballot for school board with three to be elected. The number of votes were not available. Named to the board were Richard Meadows Thurman Horn, and J. P. Meek.

Kelton voters named two members the board of trustees. Billy Buckingham received 26 votes and George Davis received 23 votes.

With three to be elected to the Mobeetie Board of Trustees, Gene Harrison led with 82 votes. He was followed by Gordon Estes with 79 votes. Paul Math-

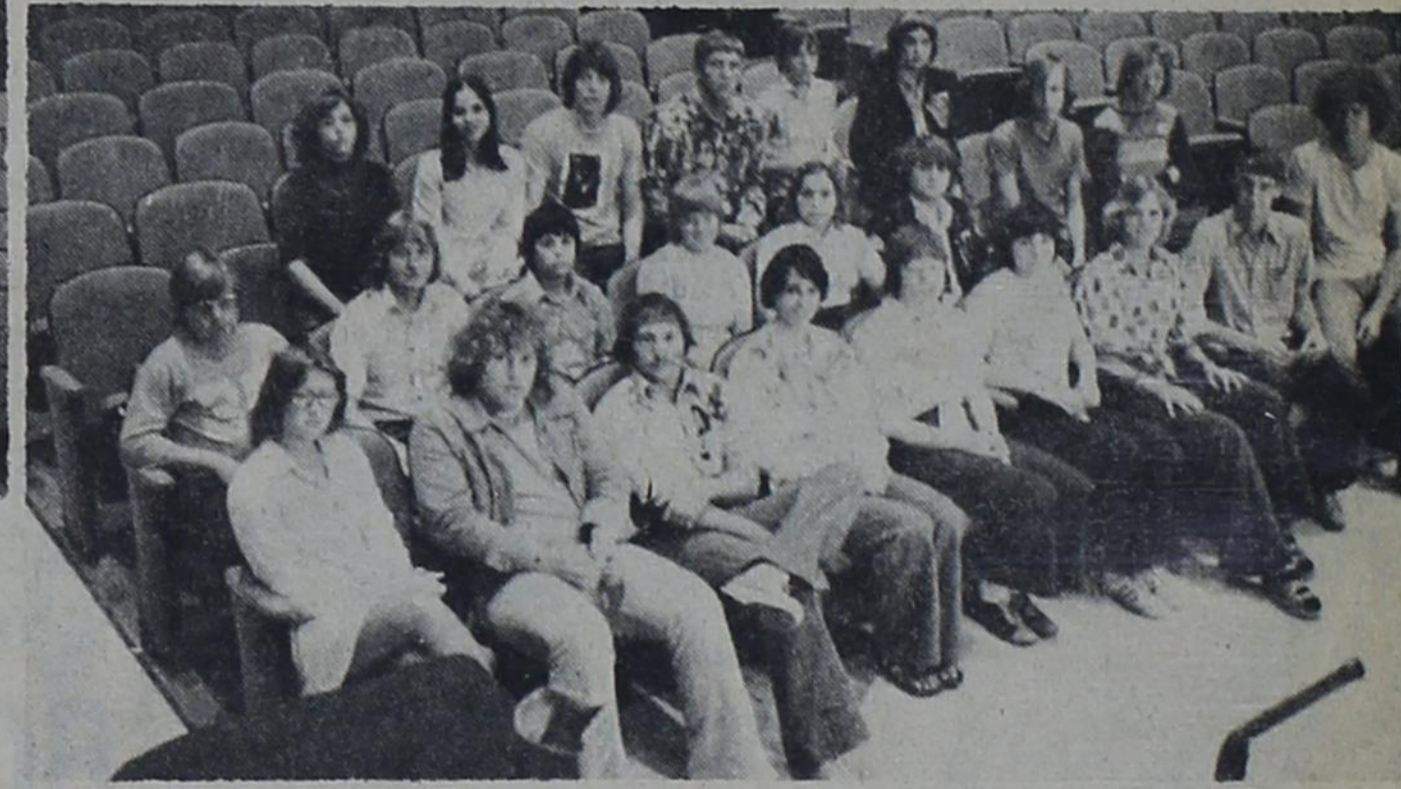
away received 70 votes. Douglas Corse received 43 vote, Calvin E Stuart 28, Ted R. McCurley, 22 and Dale Dyson, 42.

Three members were elected to the Mobeetie City Council. Elected were Johnny Velasquez, 61 votes, Walter Coward, 51 votes, and Melba Burch, 41. Dale Corcoran received 38 votes.

GUY HARDIN IS ASKING SUPPORT FOR RE-ELECTION

Guy Hardin, veteran Shamrock attorney, announced today he is a candidate for re-election to the office of District Attorney of the 31st Judicial District, subject to the action of the voters in the Democratic Primary May 1.

Hardin has held the post since 1969. He is a graduate of Baylor University School of Law and began his law practice in Shamrock in 1940. He served as County Attorney of Wheeler County from 1953 to 1956 and from 1961 until 1969.

Hardin has served his community and profession in many capacities. He is a member of the First Baptist

Church, Boosters Club, past president of the Shamrock Jaycees, past adjutant of the DeShazo-George Post of the American Legion, and past president and fire chief of the Shamrock Volunteer Fire Department.

He served for many years as a member of the Grievance Committee for the State Bar of Texas. He has also served as Director of the Texas District and County Attorneys Association.

Mr. Hardin stated that he is an advocate of diligent and fair prosecution and that he believes this to be a vital factor in maintaining responsibility to society.

Hardin and his wife, Sue and family reside at 200 South Wall.

In making his announcement, Hardin said: "During the time I have served as District Attorney, I have tried to serve well, and I am asking your support in my re-election bid. If re-elected as District Attorney, I pledge to continue to serve to the best of my ability."

Draft Boards Are Terminated

Colonel Melvin N. Glantz, State Director of Selective Service announced that all Selective Service Local Draft Boards in Texas will be terminated on May 8, 1976. Similar actions will occur in all states on that date as Selective Service continues to reduce its operational capability. On February 28th all draft board offices were closed. Texas has 525 members assigned to the 96 draft boards of the state. These board members who have served in an uncompensated capacity are responsible for classifying Selective Service Registrants. Since all registrant processing has been halted there remains no active mission for the draft boards.

Only a small standby draft organization will remain to maintain emergency plans and train a small pool of reserve and national guard officers in procedures for restoring Selective Service System in the event of a Nation emergency.

Fishing License A Real Bargain

The purchase of a Texas sportfishing license for \$4.25 opens the tackle box for anglers after bass, crappie, catfish or one of the other 28 species of freshwater fish in our state.
 Texas has over 29 million acre-feet of conservation water storage in over 160 reservoirs. These reservoirs have over 5,000 acre-feet capacity and are located from the Texas Panhandle to Brownsville.

 This Texas sportfishing license is valid for one year from the date of issue.
 You do not have to have expensive fishing gear to go along with that new fishing license. Large fish are caught each year by anglers using a jug line, trot line or throw line. Regulations for this type of fishing along with county regulations are listed in the 1975-76 guide to Texas hunting and sport fishing available at all P&WD offices and most sporting goods stores.
 The fringe benefits that go along with angling include setting up a tent and cooking those fish over an open fire in designated areas along our lakes or you can fish in comfort in one of the air conditioned barges or fishing docks in operation on most major lakes.
 The crappie spawning season in spring is one of the highlights of the fishing year and anglers reap a harvest of these good eating fish weighing up to two and one-half pounds.



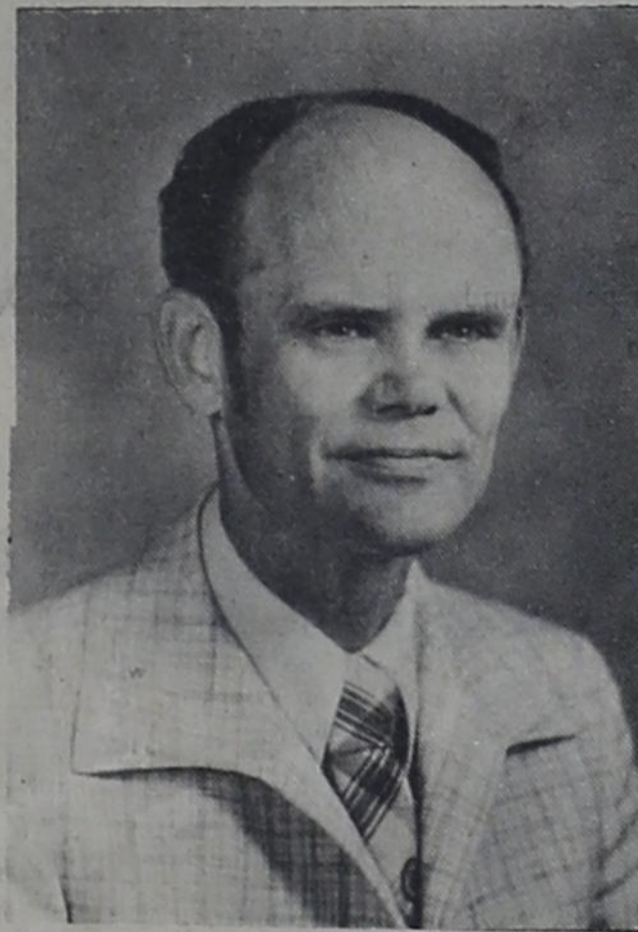

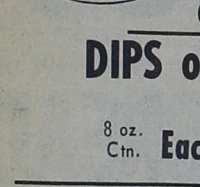
