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Rabies Clinic Sat., Mar. 27

Dr. Tommie Hennard will hold a Rabies Clinic Saturday, March 27. The purpose of the clinic will be to vaccinate all pets against rabies. At the same time the City of Wheeler will have dog licenses on sale.

The clinic will be held at the Wheeler Veterinary Clinic on West Highway 152 from 1:00 until 5:00. Pet owners are urged to have their pets on a leash to better control them.

The vaccination will protect the animal for a period of one year. The shot will cost \$3.00.

The licenses will cost \$1.00 for males and spayed females and \$2.00 for females.

For those people who have had their dogs vaccinated, but have not purchased a license, it will be necessary to take the animal and proof of vaccination to the clinic to obtain the dog license. All dogs in the City Limits are required to be licensed and vaccinated.

Area citizens are urged to bring their animals in at this time to be vaccinated against rabies.

For those owners who are unable to bring their pets to the clinic, call 826-5821 during the time the clinic is being conducted and a member of the Key Club will be on duty to pick up the animals.

Cats Should Be Vaccinated

Although it is not required that cats be vaccinated, they are in danger in the fight against rabies and should be vaccinated, stated Dr. Hennard. The cost for vaccinating a cat will be \$3.00.

Blood Pressure Clinic April 1

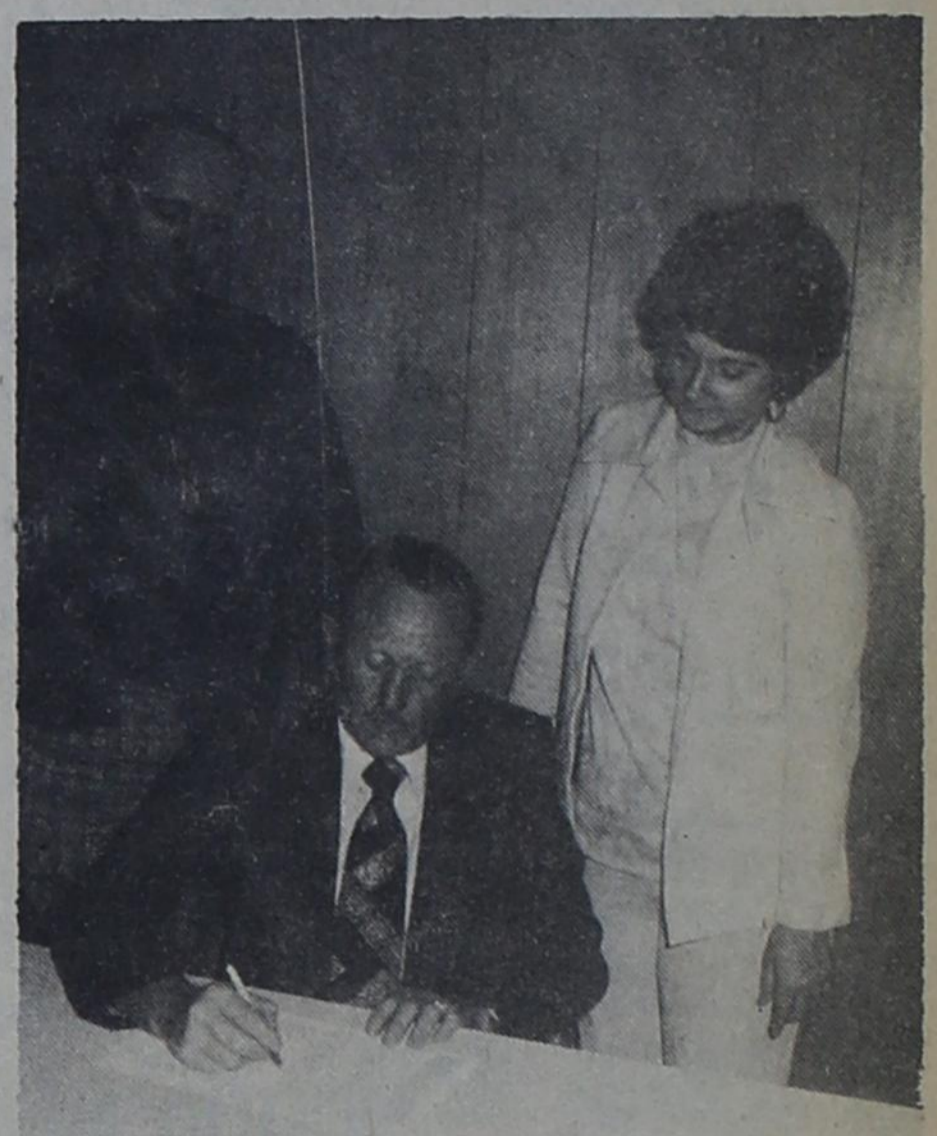

Kelly Girls Play College Basketb

Evangel College women's basketball team won the Christian College Conference for the second year in a row. Also, finishing second in the Southwest Missouri District of the Missouri Association for Intercollegiate Athletics, small college division, which qualified them to compete in the second annual State Small college Tournament of the MAIA for women.

The women were seeded fourth in the tournament and placed third, defeating Missouri Southern State College, who had twice previously beaten Evangel. The women lost a heart breaker in the semifinals by 3 points to Missouri Western who had also previously beaten them by 23 points.

Linda Kelly, freshman at Evangel, finished the season as the leading scorer averaging 14.4 points per game and 7.7 rebounds. Janice Kelly finished the season as the second leading scorer averaging 12.4 points per game and 7.1 rebounds. She has been the all time leading scorer at Evangel totaling 798 points in her 4 year career for an average of 11.7 points per game.

Jancie and Linda are the daughters of Mr. and Mrs. E.O. Kelly of Allison. Janice plans to enter the teaching coaching field this fall and Linda plans to return to Evangel.

Evangel College is a Methodist College of the arts and science of the Assembly of God. It is located in Springfield, Missouri and has an enrollment of 110.

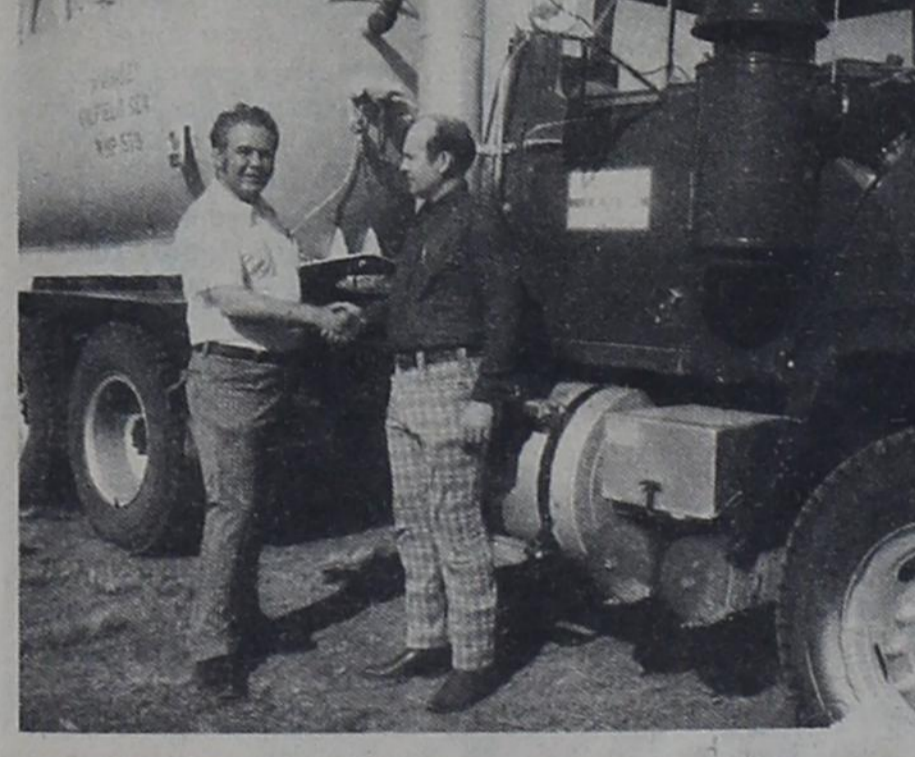

Early Farmer Watches His Costs, Profit

Just like today, costs of production and net income per acre of crops have been of major interest to farmers throughout the history of U.S. agriculture.

Consider these balance sheets from the books of a couple of farmers back in 1850.

A corn farmer of Cheshire County, New Hampshire, listed his costs of production at \$36 per acre. These included \$2 for ploughing, \$7.5 for harrowing, \$2.5 for furrowing, \$20 for 20 loads of manure, \$2 for putting manure in hills, \$1 for planting corn, \$4 for hoeing it twice, \$1 for cutting up corn, \$4 for husking and \$1 for harvesting.

He valued the corn fodder at \$10 per acre and the value of remaining manure in the soil at \$10, bringing his net cost to \$16 an acre.

His excellent yield was 75 bushels an acre at \$70 each for a gross income of \$52.50. Deducting his costs of \$16 an acre left a net income of \$36.50 an acre.

Another farmer from Rock Haven, Indiana, calculated his costs of producing timothy hay.

He figured his costs to be \$7.50 an acre, including \$1 for seed, \$2.25 for sowing, \$2.25 for rolling, \$4 for harvesting and \$2 for baling.

An acre yielded two tons of hay, which sold for \$10 a ton baled. Deducting his expenses of \$7.50 left a net income of \$12.50 an acre for his timothy.

Boating Season Is Drawing Near

Spring was delayed by a few cold days, but Texas boaters will soon be heading for the lakes and another season of skiing, fishing, and just plain boating.

Some boats will be in the same shape if they were last fall and if the skipper is planning on an active water season, that might not be too good.

Many boating accidents are the result of carelessness and lack of common sense. Over 63 Texans drowned during 1975 and many of these fatalities occurred while boating.

A thorough check of the boat and its required equipment before going on the water will insure at least a safe start. A few of the things that should be checked before leaving home include checking the boat for cracks or chipped paint cleaning the fiberglass hull and applying a new coat of wax, which will produce better speed and more fuel economy; inspecting the controls and throttle for cracks or breaks and replacing them if defective.

Take a look at your personal flotation devices (life jackets). Be sure they are serviceable and conform to US Coast Guard specifications which includes a serial number stamped on the preserver.

A quick thorough check of the running lights will ease your mind if you are caught out on the lake after dark or in a storm. Replace any bulbs that don't shine but be sure to check the battery for low voltage first.

PERMITS WERENT BORN YESTERDAY!

The permit system for water pollution control is no new thing in Texas. Fourteen years ago-back in 1962, five years before the TWQB was established--the first permit was issued to an industry, specifying how much of what the company could discharge into the waters of the state.

Every city, town and industry which discharges treated wastes to Texas waters is required to have a numbered permit issued by the Water Quality Board. All told, 3,126 permits are in force, 1,844 of them held by cities and towns and 1,282 by industries.

Each permit contains specific information as to the quantity and the quality of the discharge which a city or an industry may make, and many contain numerous "pages," in cases where the permit holder has more than one "outfall," or discharge pipe, since each outfall is regulated separately.

Some years before the TWQB was created by the Texas Legislature, the need for a permitting system was recognized as a means for abating water pollution. At that time the system was handled by a predecessor board with the necessary technical work being done by the State Department of Health.

Then, several years after the TWQB was established, the term "permit" was changed to "waste control order," as a more descriptive term. In 1972, however, when the federal water pollution control law was amended drastically, those at the federal level preferred the term "permit." So, to avoid confusion for permit holders, since both federal and state requirements must be met, Texas went back to that term.

Since it was established before Texas had a state agency whose work was devoted solely to water quality management, the permit system is considered the backbone of water pollution control in the state. When the TWQB became a full-fledged agency in 1967, it had that system, ready-made, as a starting base for further water pollution abatement and water quality management for the future.

To keep pace with changing conditions, permits are amended, or cancelled when they are no longer needed, and new permits are issued as new wastewater treatment facilities are built.

Texas was among the very first of the states to establish a permit system for water pollution abatement and, while it may not be absolutely perfect, it has helped the state gain a tremendous amount of ground toward better water quality in all of our rivers and streams.
