FIRST LOOK TOWARD NOV. 8

In the majority of elections beyond the town or county level, the Wheeler Times endorses candidates. We certainly have no intent at this time to endorse either candidate for president, but the pros and cons that have emanated from the conventions deserve consideration. We present them to stimulate thinking, and this newspaper very strongly urges every voter to cast a ballot November 8 on the basis of good of country, The nation's welfare and the future welfare of America's citizens is of vastly more importance than any political party tag.

Where the Democratic party stresses economic aid, the GOP emphasis is on military aid and the need to contain Communism. Both urge stronger defense.

The Democrats urge repeal of the Connally amendment, the Republicans ignore this vital text that stands between us and yielding our destiny to the World Court.

The Democrats would give alms from the Treasury to businesses and workers injured by low-wage imports under GATT. The Republicans promise tariff protection instead.

The Democrats promise price supports at 90 percent of parity and new subsidies to the Farmers. The Republicans brand these subsidies as "cruel deceptions." Both parties would expand the Soil Bank.

The Democrats would care for the aged (all the aged) under Social Security. The Republicans promise a contributory system for those who need it. Both would aid medical students and build schools. The Democrats would give Federal aid for teachers' salaries, but the Republicans — disclaiming Federal control—would not.

The Democrats promise a \$1.25 an hour minimum wage, repeal of a Federal law permitting states to ban union shops, would soften the Taft-Hartley and Landrum-Griffin laws. The Republicans would boost the minimum wage, but don't say how much. Both parties would revise unemployment insur-

VANPOOL - BURTON MOTOR CO. WINS TOP FORD AWARD AGAIN

Vanpool-Burton Motor Company won its "varsity letters" again this year. The Ford agency received the "Four-Letter Award" from Ford Motor Company, for outstanding performance in 1959.

Presentation was made by Randall Baird, Oklahoma City Zone manager, to Pete Burton, sales manager and co-owner of the Vanpool-Burton Motor Company.

To receive the award Baird said it is necessary for a dealership to be outstanding in all phases of its operation, as shown in the four letters — F, M, S, and F — in the award; "F" for sound financing; "M" for efficient management; "S" for competitive spirit, and "F" again for completely modern facilities.

The honor is awarded on a competitive basis with other Ford agencies on a regional and national level. Only 20 of the 178 Ford dealers in the district received it. The district includes the Texas Panhandle and the entire state of Oklahoma.

This is the 11th year the award has been given to dealers by the Ford Motor Co.

One phase of the competition for the award should be of particular interest to automobile owners. In order for a dealer to be eligible, his service department must receive a minimum of customer compliments.

Approximately six months of investigation is necessary to determine whether a dealership is eligible, Baird said. First it's necessary for the field management to recommend the dealership. The recommendation is forwarded to district headquarters. Then each district department head personally inspects his phase of the operation. And if the agency passes this close scrutiny the recommendations are sent to Detroit for final approval.

Listings of ranchers will include the number of head, breed, sex, age, location, name, brand and other important information the cattlemen may furnish. With a circulation of 10,000, and printed in full color, the publication will mark the first time in the history of the area that ranchers may place their name before all active

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

WHEELER LOSES GRID BATTLE TO SHAMROCK

Oct. 26, 1939

The Wheeler Mustangs were sharply defeated in a football game here Friday night with the Shamrock Irishmen, 13-0, in a comparatively clean though slightly lopsided contest before a record crowd for the local stadium.

Although hotly contested throughout, the Mustangs had possession of the ball only three times during the entire game, most of the play being deep in Mustang territory. No doubt an important factor contributing to Wheeler's defeat was the loss of H. V. Compton, powerful blocking back, early in the second quarter when he received a fractured right elbow in attempting to block a punt.

Loss of Compton from the lineup disorganized and handicapped the Mustangs who were unable to hit their real stride against the invaders.

However, none can deny that Shamrock had a smoothly-working well-timed machine that clicked repeatedly on cleverly executed plays. That the score was no higher also proves the Mustangs, though on the defensive, stayed "right in there" to the final play. No alibis nor excuses are offered, other than the loss of Compton. It was a decisive victory for the Irishmen.

Shamrock made its first touchdown after gaining possession of the ball on Wheeler's 41-yard line when Stephen's punt was blocked. Five running plays and a short pass put the piek-in on Wheeler's 11-yard strip and Puett, Irish back, plunged over for the counter. Kick for extra point went wild.

The first half ended with the ball in Shamrock's possession on the Wheeler 10-yard line.

Shamrock again scored in the first few minutes of the third period on a pass from the 13-yard line. Allen to Wilson. Wilson's kick from placement was good for another point, making the score 13 to 0.

Wheeler's first downs came late in the final period, but they lacked the power to follow up and Shamrock regained the ball when a pass was intercepted, retaining it until the final whistle.

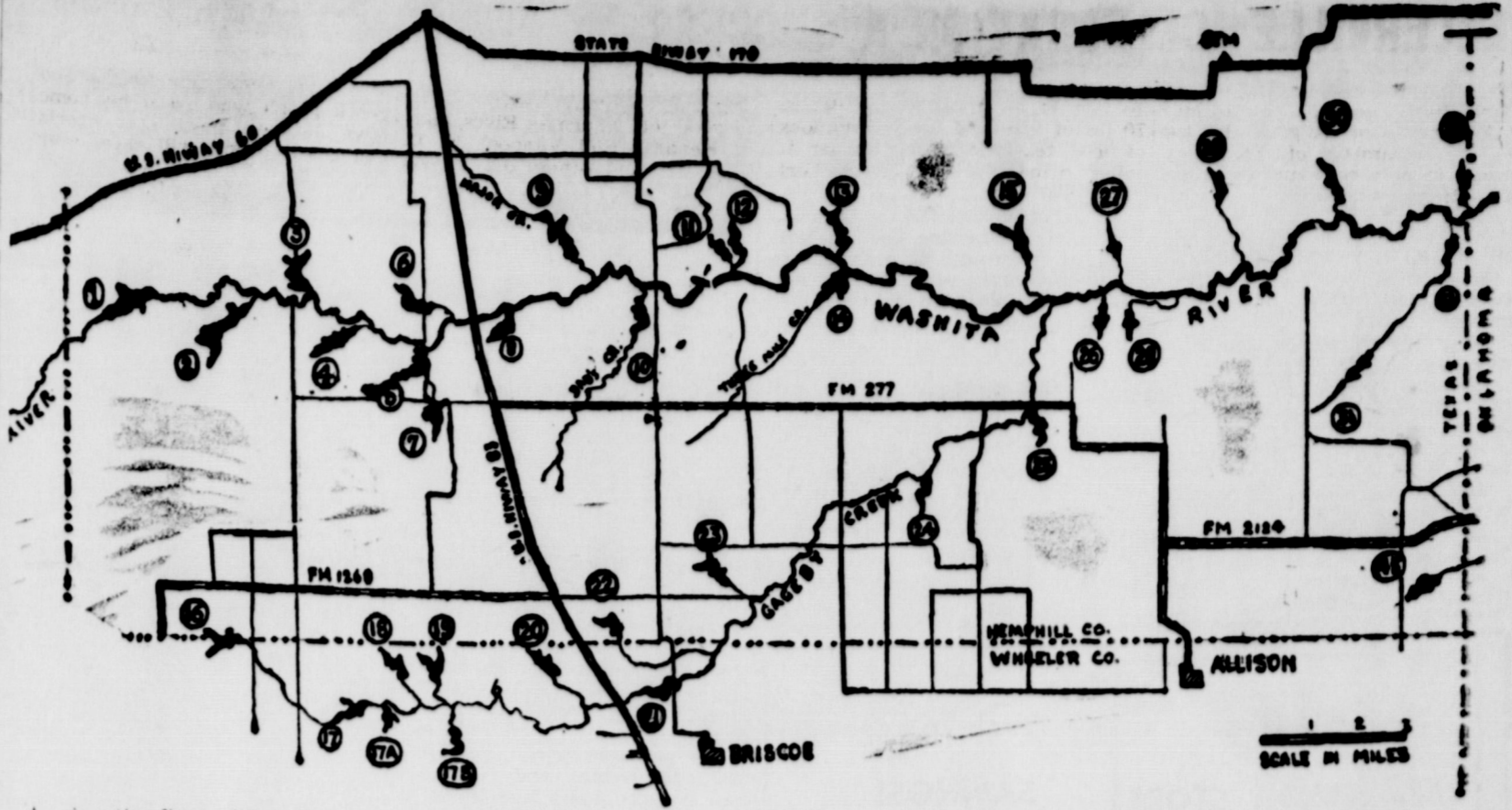

A gigantic five million dollar flood control and water conservation project on the Upper Washita River watershed in Texas and Oklahoma is nearing reality. The Commissioner Court of Wheeler County and the Board of Supervisors of the Wheeler County Soil Conservation District have signed joint agreements for maintenance and operation of the flood prevention structures. Site 16, a 23 acre permanent pool, on the Tom Grammer and C. W. Bowers place has been strip-

ped of grass and top soil. Heavy equipment will move in soon. Work will begin with the next two weeks on site 17, 33 acre permanent lake on the Clifford Vanner farm; and site 17A, a 25 acre lake on Lloyd Lee and Chiffor Walter. The 26 acre lake on Farms Hefley and Carville Ranch is approximately 30 percent complete. All of the pipe through the dam is completed and partly covered. The site is known as 17B. Site 18 on Wiley McCray, Farm Hefley, S. W. Williams and Ernest Lee is half completed. The brown down pipe is being covered and the spillway on the 31 acre structure. The dam is completed on site 19 which is approximately 18 acres. Workmen still lack a little concrete work, some fences and then the grass will be planted on the structure. Site 19 is located on Earl Williams, Farmer Burgess, Farmer Hefley and Wiley Mc-

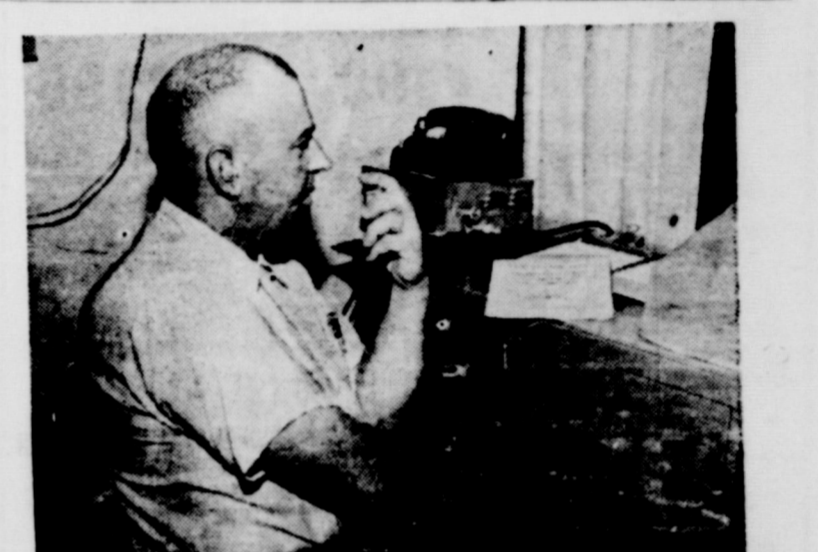

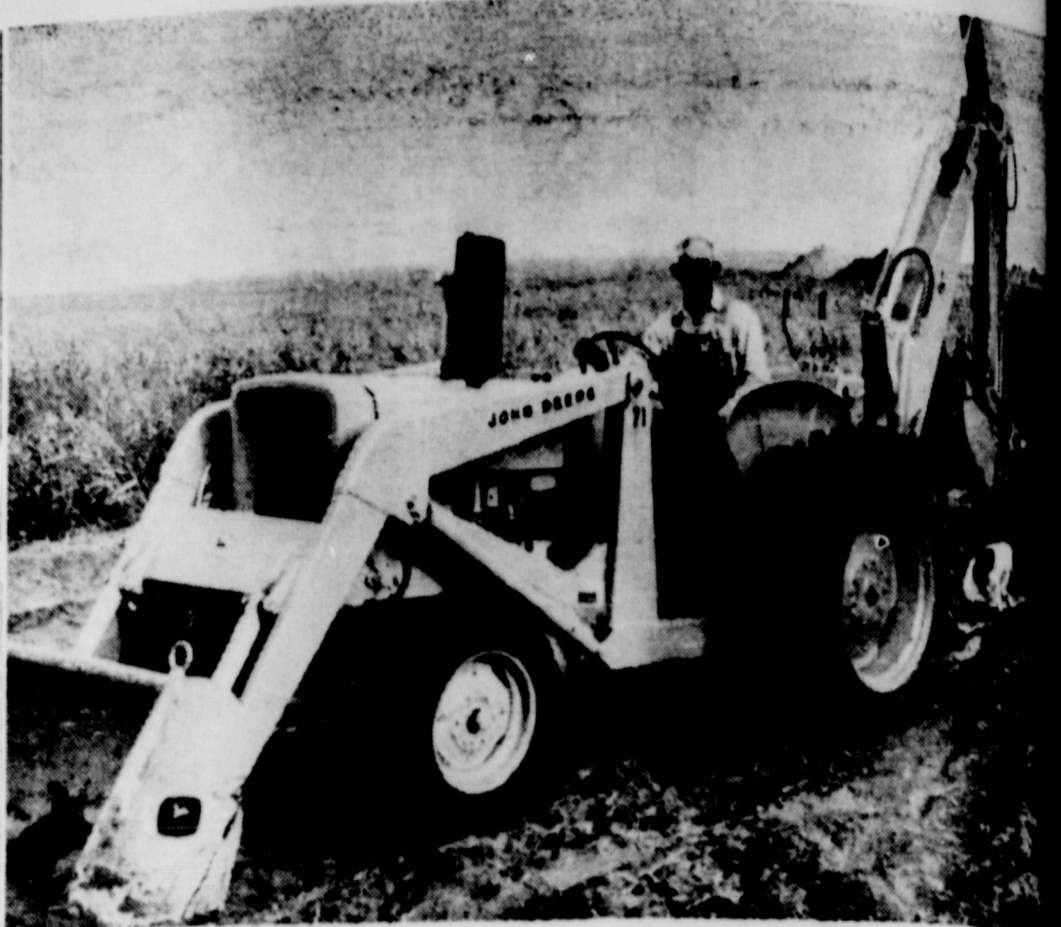

ance—obviously upward.

The much discussed civil rights plank—strongly before—are closely akin, differing in details and cans being more lenient to Southern thinking.

It should be noted against this background Vice President Nixon and Ambassador Lodge in their stance speeches stressed the overriding importance of leadership of the free world. "A life-or-death struggle Communism," said Lodge, "is the issue of this election. Presidential nominee echoed these sentiments. He would not "try to buy the peoples' votes with money."

As millions of Americans, including hundreds of Countians pause—now that the conventions are most are arguing with themselves whether to be saddened. From now to November 8 sound thinking of full study of all phases of the issues is imperative.

These were probably the most efficient conversations conducted in free America. In fact they were so efficient seemed rather superfluous. The nomination of President Eisenhower expressed approval of his President in a press conference in March that they would not to consider candidates for the Presidency but Mr. Nixon.

Another striking feature is that despite predicted battle over both party platforms, the Democrats was accepted after a minority report and a few protest over civil rights planks and the Republican was adopted without incident. Another switch from national policies is that both candidates, rather than their followers of victory, have warned that this campaign will be the hardest-fought and the closest in history.

Yet, out of all the weary hours of the two conventions, statesmanship and ringing advice of Arthur Barry Goldwater inspired new hope, new confidence in those who have sought to stem Americanism into socialism—and those who have merely watched ing alarm.

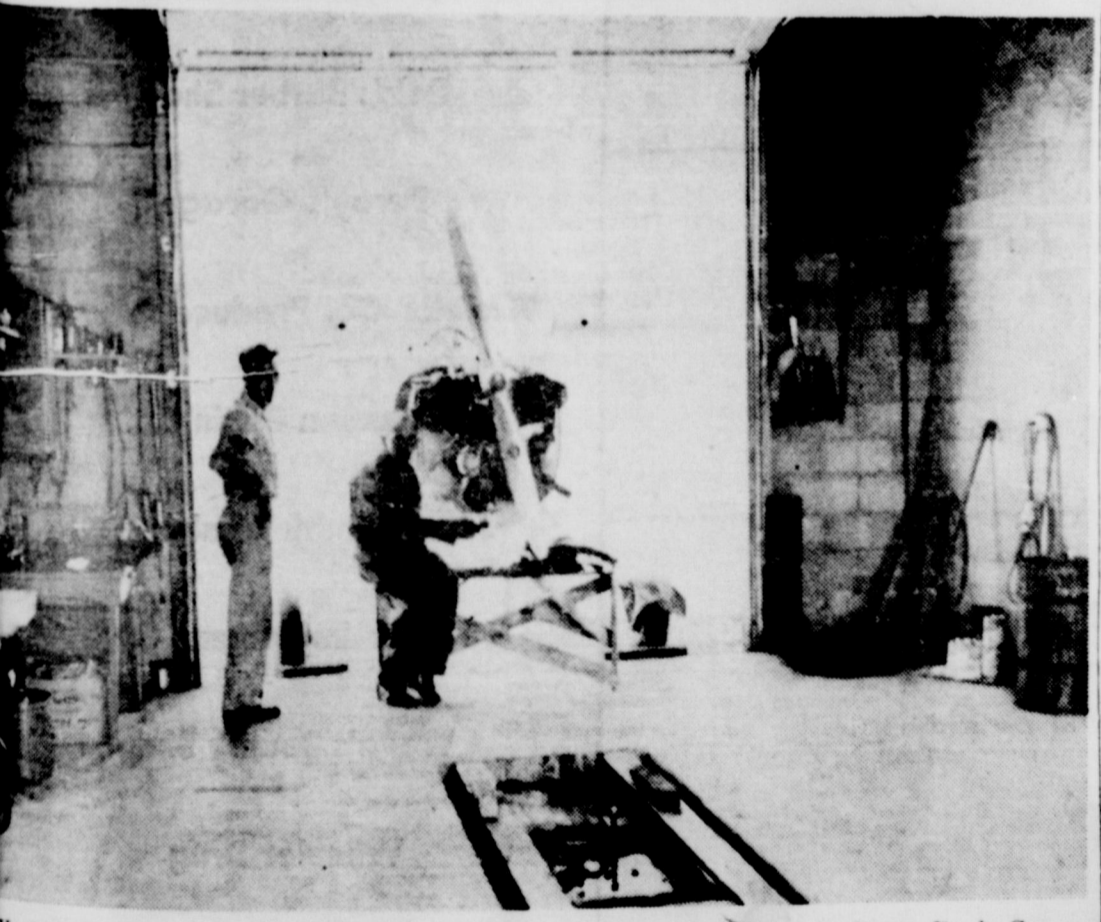
