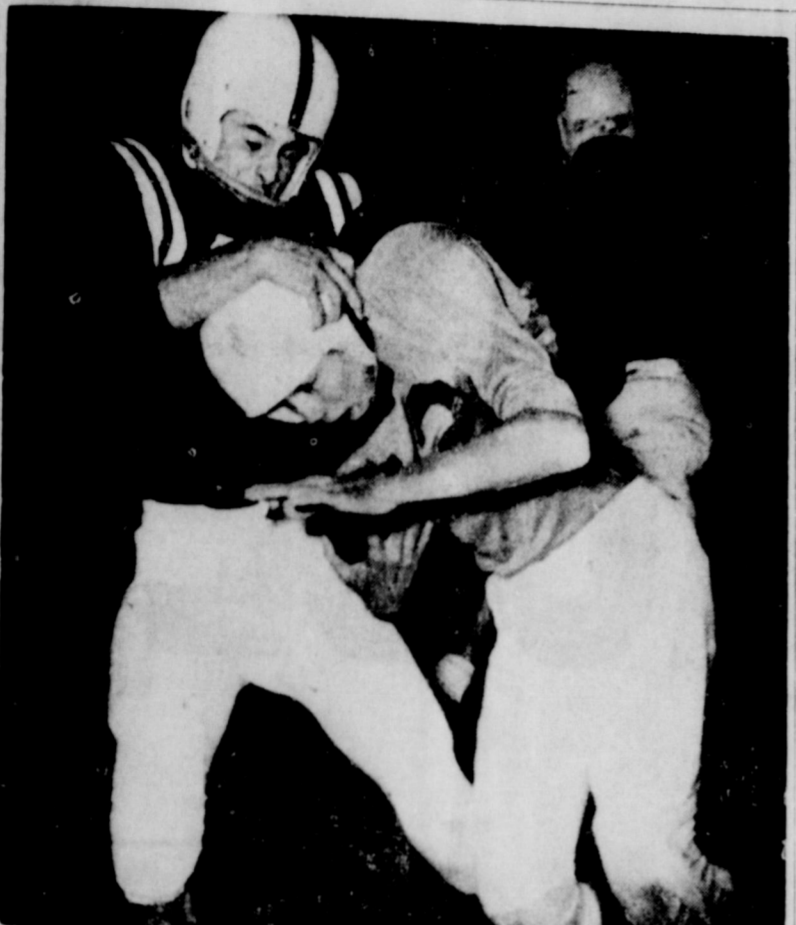

Dorman Captures Wanted Men Following Chase

Cooperation between sheriff's officers of Wheeler and Gray counties resulted in the capture Sunday night of three Oklahoma men wanted in Hutchinson County on theft warrants.

Wheeler County Sheriff Bus Dorman noticed the men, V. M. (Slick) Simmons, his son, Alvin (Hoot) Simmons and Geen Hargrove, all of Sayre, in the bus station at Shamrock Sunday night and recalled they were wanted by Sheriff Hugh Anderson of Berger on the theft warrants.

However, the men went out a rear door of the bus depot, got into their car and headed toward Highway 66. Sheriff Dorman and Deputy John Topper chased them at a high rate of speed toward McLean, where Gray County Deputy Jimmie Shelton and Constable J. D. Fish joined the chase and the men were stopped.

According to Sheriff Dorman two of the men had switch blade knives and one had a pistol. The men were turned over to Gray County authorities.

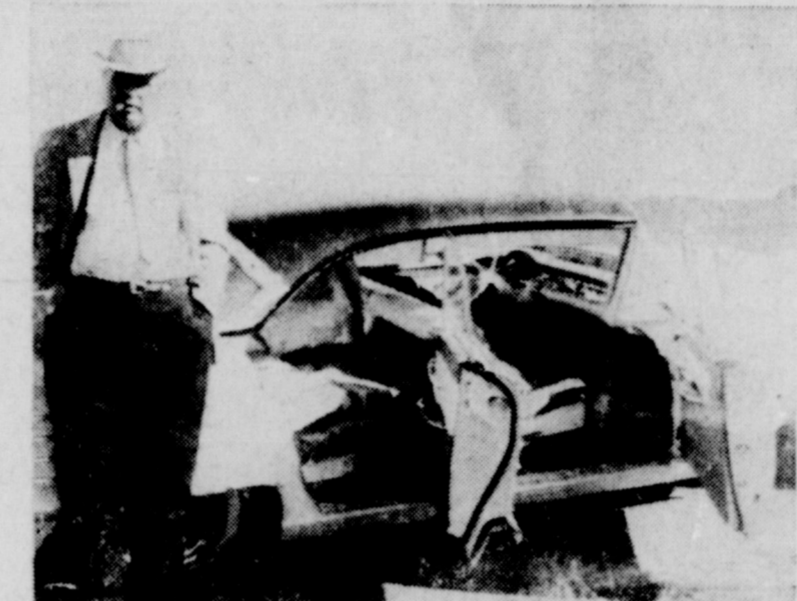

Masons, Stars And Rainbow To Have Buffet Dinner

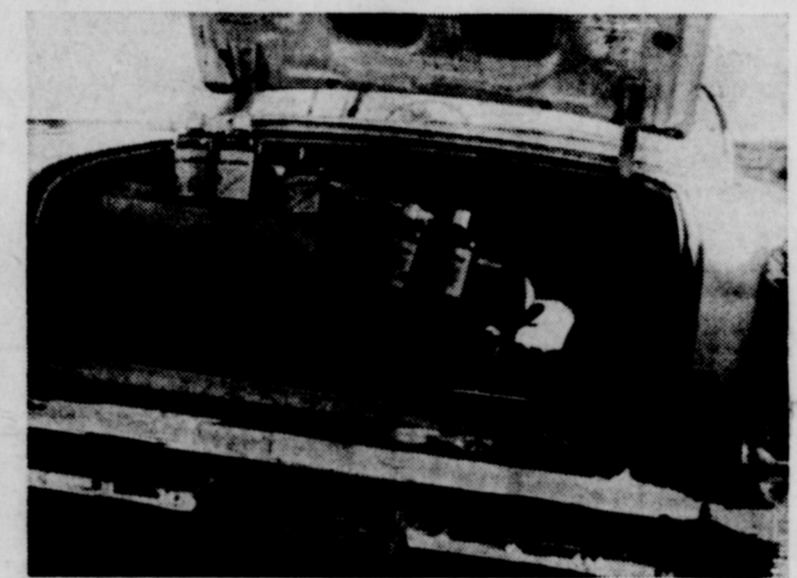

More Workers Needed \$16,500 Raised By Farm Bureau Workers

Glen Bell, chairman of the finance drive to raise \$50,000 for the Farm Bureau sponsored Television Translator System, said Wednesday morning that approximately \$16,500 had been raised for the project.

Bell said he was "happy" with the progress being made, but indicated that more workers were needed, especially in the Wheeler and Shamrock area. "Approximately 80 percent of the people in the county have never been contacted", he said.

"Between 50 and 75 percent of the people we have contacted have made their donation, and we feel confident that we can raise the money needed to construct the system", Bell continued.

The regular Farm Bureau meeting will be held tonight at Nunn's Cafe in Shamrock at 7:30. The purpose of the meeting will be to re-organize and regroup the workers. O. E. Setliff, engineer for the project, will also be on hand to answer questions on the system.

Farm Bureau members, drive workers and everyone interested in the project, are invited to attend this meeting.

Firemen Extinguish Grass Fire

Members of the Wheeler Volunteer fire department were called Monday afternoon to extinguish a grass fire north of Wheeler.

City employees were burning trash at the dump yard when the blaze leaped the fire guard and spread into the adjoining pasture.

Firemen were on the scene minutes after the alarm and quickly extinguished the fire.

New Signs To Be Erected In Wheeler

Deputy's Bullets Puncture Tire On Get Away Car

An Oklahoma bootlegger was fined \$500 and costs Monday after he was caught by the Wheeler County Sheriff's Department.

Wheeler County Sheriff Bus Dorman said Liquor Control Officers chased O. C. Maxwell, 33, Elk City, and Bill Kelley, 26, also of Elk City, from a Lefors Package Store but lost them following a 100 mile per hour chase.

The state officers radioed ahead to Sheriff Dorman and Deputy Neal Raymond, who stopped Maxwell and his young partner in Wheeler County.

Charges of transporting liquor in a dry area were filed in Wheeler against Maxwell and a fine of \$400 and costs levied. Maxwell was then returned to Gray County and charges of transporting liquor in a wet area without a permit were filed there.

He drew a fine of \$100 and costs on that one, plus confiscation of 32 cases of illegal booze by the state liquor control board.

County sheriff Bus Dorman said this was the largest load of liquor ever confiscated in Wheeler County. Dorman said his deputy Neal Raymond was largely responsible for capture of the men.

The bootleggers were apparently headed for Elk City. Deputy Raymond picked up their trail a few miles this side of Mobeetie and gave chase.

The deputy's red light and siren failed to slow Maxwell as he raved toward Wheeler at 110 to 120 miles per hour. However, deputy Raymond was able to get close enough to fire 6 shots at the get-away-car. Two of the bullets punctured the right rear tire and ended the chase 3 miles west of Wheeler.

The get-away car, a 1958 Oldsmobile, contained 32 cases of liquor, valued at \$2,000 Dorman said.

ERNEST HENDERSON ELECTED IN PRECINCT FOUR WRITE-IN CAMPAIGN

Ernest Henderson was elected county commissioner in Tuesday's General Election in a write-in campaign that pulled more voters to the poles in precinct four than had the August Democratic primary when Henderson edged out Dean McMurtry by 2 votes.

A total of 992 tracked to the polls to give Henderson a 65 vote victory over McMurtry.

The unofficial returns show Henderson polled 421 votes. Dean McMurtry, 356 and L. L. See, incumbent commissioner who had been eliminated in the July primary, 215.

This was 26 more ballots than was cast in the August runoff and

been. Henderson replied that rather than see some of his supporters subpoena and forced to explain in district court how and for whom they voted, he would resign the democratic nomination.

This he did, and the matter of naming a democratic nominee was dumped in the lap of members of the Democratic Committee. The committee declined to accept the responsibility, stating the decision should be made by popular vote. The write-in campaign ensued with all three candidates in the July primary announcing their candidacy.

PHILOSOPHER ADVISES EXPERTS ON HOW TO LIGHTEN WORK LOAD



(Editor's note: The Sweetwater Creek Philosopher on his chin-ery farm on Sweetwater creek tackles the problem of the small farm this week. Tackling a problem of course is not solving it.)

Dear editor:

There has been a lot of discussion in the newspapers the past year over the plight of the small farmer, and lots of experts have been worrying about him. They are afraid he'll get discouraged and have to give up farming and move to town.

As a result, a lot of thinking has been going on about the problem, and I was reading in an article last night where some experts studying the matter have decided one way to keep the farmer on the farm is to make his work lighter. For example, they said, farmers ought to use their brains and figure out short cuts for themselves, and they threw in a suggestion of their own as a starter. Why not, they said, "put cows up on a platform so the dairyman can milk them as he stands?" This would save a lot of stooping.

The main trouble with this is that I doubt if it takes any more work to stoop to milk a cow than it does to reach to build a platform for them to stand on, not to mention getting the feed up there to them twice a day. Personally, if I was milking a bunch of cows, which I'm not, and was opposed to stooping, I'd come out in favor of longer-legged cows or shorter-legged men.

The trouble with using brains and science to lighten the load of farming is that this works up to

a certain point, but it generally stops at the edge of the field, leaving nobody but the farmer to go up one row and down another, in between rains.

Science is wonderful, but I've noticed that in the most modern business, with every labor-saving device known to man, or on the most modern farm, with every scientific improvement available, still the man who gets the furthest ahead generally is the one who works the hardest, with the longest hours.

That's where science breaks down. However, it's where I take over.

After years of studying the problem, I know how to lighten the work on a farm. It's simple. Just skip about half of what you're supposed to do. Understanding, of course, that this is for the well-run farm. On mine, I skip about three-fourths.
