The following problems will be discussed at the clinic: Hog Outlook, John McHaney; Producing the Meat-Type Hog, Breeding for a Meat Type Hog, and On-the-Farm Selection of Gilts, T. D. Tanksley; Swine Sanitation, Local Veterinarian; Swine Feeding and Management, T. D. Tanksley; and Problems Found Inside the Hog, Roy Snyder.

Each person attending will have a chance to judge and grade 12 hogs and the hogs will be slaughtered and their placing mailed out to each one attending the Clinic Swaim said.

HARE CHARGED WITH RAPE OF 12 YEAR OLD

James Franklin Hare, 39, is being held in the Wheeler County jail, charged with the rape of his 12-year-old daughter.

Hare is being held in lieu of \$10,000 bond, pending action by the Wheeler County grand jury. A new term of court has been set for November 24, at which time the grand jury will probably take action on Hare.

Hare, from Shelbyville, Ind., has been working as a truck driver for a gin in the Twitty community for about 6 weeks.

The Indiana man was brought to Shamrock Saturday night by three Amarillo men who spotted Hare's truck parked on a farm to market road to Kelton. The trio passed Hare's truck southeast of Wheeler, realized something was amiss, turned around and caught Hare and the 12-year-old together.

The men turned Hare over to Wheeler County Sheriff Bus Dorman, who says the Indiana man has served time in the Indiana State Prison.

NEGRO CHARGED WITH ASSAULT

Charles Patterson, 28-year-old negro, was arrested Wednesday afternoon near Kelton and charged with assault.

Patterson's 17 year old wife filed the charges after Patterson allegedly beat her in a cotton field near Kelton.

Patterson was placed in the Wheeler County jail Wednesday night to await action of the court. Deputy Neal Raymond made the arrest.

TEENAGE CRIME WAVE BROKEN IN WHEELER

County Sheriff Bus Dorman and Deputy Neal Raymond, with the help of several local citizens, have broken the crime wave which has plagued Wheeler for the past few months.

Four Wheeler teenagers ranging in ages from 13 to 17 years old, admitted Tuesday morning that they had committed 8 or 9 burglaries in the past few months.

The boys said they had burglarized the Pool Hall, and Lowell's Service Station. They entered the fire department, highschool cafeteria and American Legion Building on two separate occasions. They also admitted the theft of gasoline at the sand pit northeast of Wheeler and said they had attempted to enter the Griffin Service Station but had failed.

Early Wednesday morning not one of the burglary victims had filed charges. The last break-in committed by the boys came just four days after the county judge had warned three of them about a previous burglary. One of the boys is on probation.

Three Valedictorians From County Enrolled At Texas Tech

Enrolled in Texas Tech as freshmen this fall are 66 students who were graduated from high school as valedictorians of their classes.

The boys slightly outnumber the girls, 34 to 32. This year's total is 11 above last fall's 55 valedictorians.

\$617.00 Collected In Scout Drive

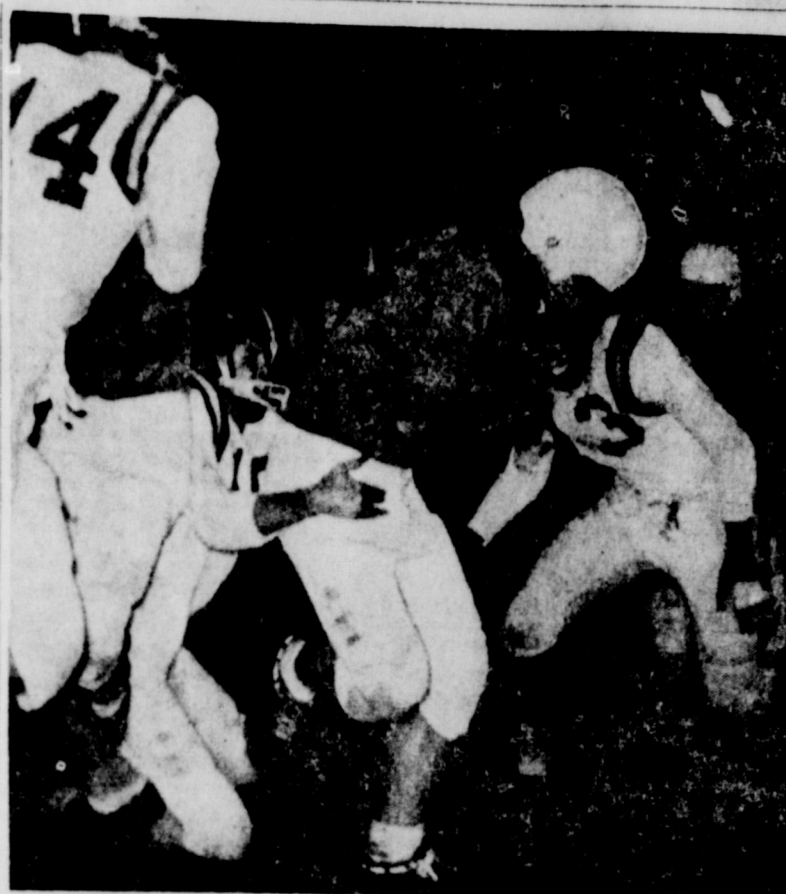
Max Wiley, auditor of the recent scout financial drive reported Wednesday morning that \$617.00 was collected in Wheeler during the drive.

Questions Answered At Farm Bureau Meet

The Farm Bureau held their regular meeting last Thursday night at Shamrock to re-group workers for the translator financial drive and answer pertinent questions on the Translator System.

O. E. Setliff was on hand to answer the questions. Glenn Bell, chairman of the financial drive, gave a general run-down on the progress being made by the drive workers. He confirmed the report that approximately \$16,500 had been raised at that time.

Some of the questions asked by the drive workers during the meeting were:

1. QUESTION: Does it take a person with a commercial radio license to operate and maintain the translator? ANSWER: No, it does not, however, it does take a

person with a second class radio license to operate the translator.

2. QUESTION: Will converting a VHF signal to UHF cause it to lose some of its strength? ANSWER: No, it will not.

3. QUESTION: What is Grade A television reception as good as television viewers receive within a 60 mile radius of Amarillo.

4. QUESTION: Who will determine if we are getting Grade A reception? ANSWER: (A) a panel of farm bureau members; (B) representatives of the television stations being rebroadcast by the translator; (C) FCC regulations require that translators must offer Grade A reception.

5. QUESTION: Why did the Tucumcari system cost only \$11,000 when our system will cost (Continued on Page 5 No. 2)

Personally, I prefer to run this farm out here on Sweetwater Creek. Nobody issues me any mandates.

Tuberculosis Battle Must Continue in Wheeler

A warning that over-optimism could lead to loss of ground in control of tuberculosis was voiced today by Dr. H. E. Nicholson, president of the Wheeler County Tuberculosis Association.

Dr. H. E. Nicholson commented on findings in a survey of the prevalence of tuberculosis made this fall in 48 Texas counties.

"These counties," he said, "reported 14,841 tuberculosis patients known to health authorities. Of this number, 10,367 are in hospitals or under other medical care. That leaves more than 4,000 patients in these 48 counties alone who presumably are under no medical care. It is these unhospitalized cases which produce the new cases. In the U. S. in 1957, 69,000 Americans developed tuberculosis. Each of those 'caught' TB from someone who had the disease.

"The 48 counties," he continued, "are scattered throughout the state. They are not confined to what we call 'high incidence' areas - areas near the Mexican border and in cities with concentrated population. This survey shows we are not dealing properly with that most dangerous of tuberculosis health hazards - the unhospitalized contagious patient.

"During the last decade," Dr. Nicholson added, "we have watch-

ed the death rate from tuberculosis drop sharply. Unfortunately, the number of new cases found each year doesn't drop in proportion."

In another survey, just concluded and reported in the November issue of the American Review of Tuberculosis and Pulmonary Diseases, it was found that the percentage of children infected with the tuberculosis germ was the same in 1947 as in 1957 among kindergarten children in Kansas City, Mo. In that city, 35,995 kindergarten children were tuberculosis tested during those years. The death rate per 100,000 people fell from 31.5 in 1947 to 11.7 in 1957, yet the percentage of children infected with the germ remained the same.

"The Wheeler County Tuberculosis Association, working with other health agencies, is determined that this rate of 'catching tuberculosis' will be made to drop, even as the death rate is being made to drop," Dr. Nicholson concluded.

MAIL EARLY FOR CHRISTMAS

Postmaster Jamison said today, "Christmas may seem quite a way off, but nevertheless, we're starting our annual 'Mail Early For Christmas' Campaign immediately, because there's every indication that the 1958 Christmas season will set an all time mailing record."

The Postmaster said further that right now is the time to plan your Christmas card and gift mailings. The first thing to do is check your Christmas card list very carefully - make sure that each address particularly on mail to larger cities includes full name, street and number, city, zone and state.

He went on to say that by a little advance planning, a lot of headaches can be avoided when the Christmas rush is on. The Postmaster suggests that you stock up now on heavy wrapping paper, sturdy corrugated cartons, strong cord, and paper adhesive tape, for use in securely packing and wrapping your Christmas gifts. Remember, also, that you can include your Christmas card or letter inside your gift package if you'll just add the appropriate First Class mail stamps to the postage for the package itself.

Be sure to use only First Class four cent, or seven cent Air Mail postage on your Christmas cards. All cards sent by First Class mail may include a personal handwritten message, whereas a signature only is authorized on cards that are mailed at the three cent, Third Class rate.

The Postmaster says it's especially important to include your return address on every Christmas card envelope. Besides being socially correct this is a big help to both you and your friends in

keeping your mailing lists up-to-date.

Through the fine cooperation of the public during recent years, Postmaster Jamison reports that great progress has been made in getting the Christmas mails through on time. He is making many advance preparations to handle the 1958 Christmas mail rush, with extra mail clerks, carriers, and expanded facilities all around.

Speaking further about his plans, the Postmaster said, "With over 170,000,000 people in the U. S. A. today, that means more Christmas mail than ever before,

and that's why the needs your help in Christmas mailings.

Christmas cards are most distant points mailed first, preferably December 10th, nearby points should be mailed December 15th, or at before Christmas.

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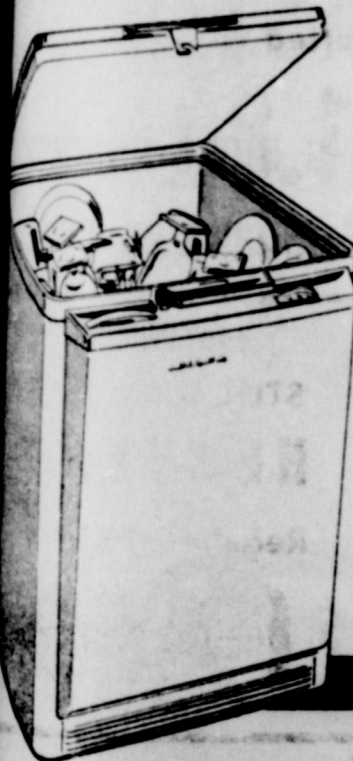

County Agents Attend Extension Conference

The County Extension Agents attended the State Extension Conference recently in College Station where they were brought up to date on the latest research being carried on in Agricultural Fields in Texas, according to Bryan Swaim, County Agent.

Swaim said it would be impossible to point out all the research being carried on and new improvements brought into the service of the field of agriculture, but he said we could expect great research and information improvement in the next five years. One will be the use of machines that have already been purchased and will be put into operation as soon as possible where estimates of certain crops or livestock production as to expense, risks of moisture, average growing conditions, etc. can be put in and the expected returns will come out in a matter of seconds. This is being used and has been used in big business for several years and has proven to be very helpful and it will prove very helpful to the Agricultural industry of tomorrow. Changes will be made in the insecticide fields, but to what extent still remains to be seen. Several things are in the mill. More uses for all agricultural crops are being sought, one such research item is the discovery of using

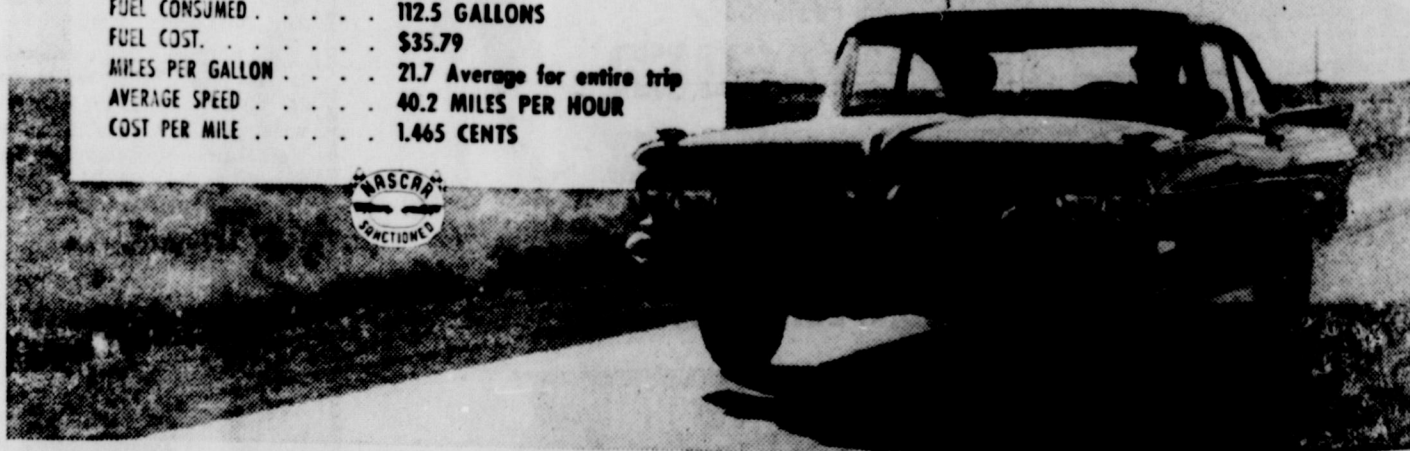

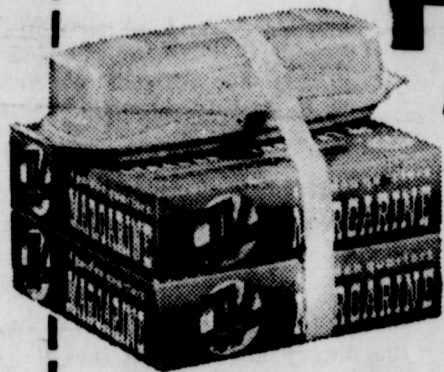

THE BIBLE

The Bible is God's inspired word. When compared with the Book of books, the best of this world's literature pales into insignificance. The world's history is very dependent on the Bible. Little or nothing would be known of the period before four hundred B. C. Nothing would be known of a Savior without the Bible. It is actually a book about a 'man'. The man who was also divine, the Son of the true and living God. The Old Testament gives many prophecies of this one and the things he was to do. The New Testament gives us the fulfillment of these things. He is the WAY, the TRUTH and the LIFE. (Jno. 14-6). All that they have succeeded in doing is make monkeys of themselves, but that is in the wrong direction to prove their theory.

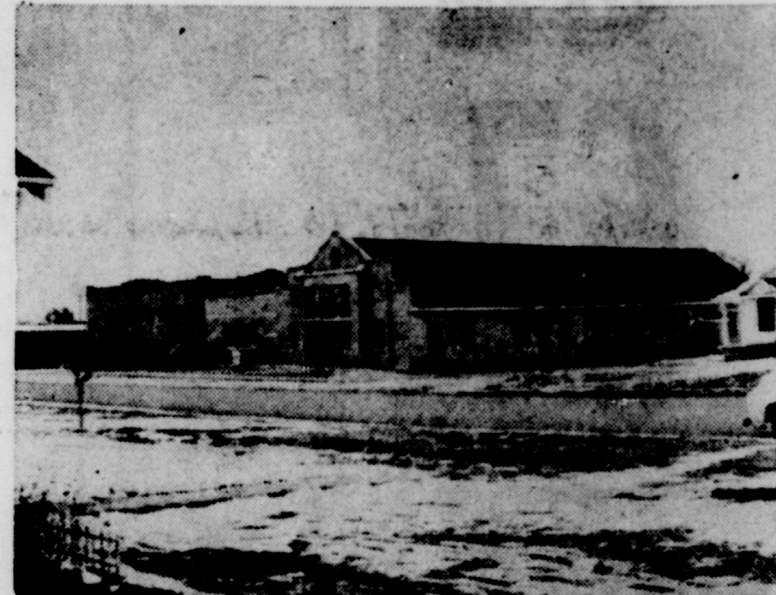
