HOME DEMONSTRATION NEWS

Now is the time to be thinking about party refreshments to be served for the holiday season. The following fruit cakes are favorites of mine. One is cooked and the other uncooked. I would like to share these with you.

Lemon Nut Fruit Cake

Sift together:
2 cups flour - 1 teaspoon baking powder
Sift over:
1 lb. chopped pecans - 1/2 lb. candied cherries, chopped - 1/2 lb. candied pineapple, chopped
Beat:

6 egg yolks
Add:
1 lb. brown sugar
1 lb. butter
1 1/2 oz. lemon extract (3 tablespoons)
Pour over nut and fruit mixture
Beat until stiff:
6 egg whites
Fold beaten egg whites into fruit and nut mixture. Let set overnight. Cook in tube pan well lined with wax paper at 300° F oven for 3 hours.

Refrigerator Fruit Cake

Combine:
1 cup chopped nuts
1/2 lb. miniature marshmallows
1/2 cup thin cream
1/4 cup red cherry juice
1/2 lb. crushed graham crackers or vanilla wafers
1/2 lb. chopped dates
20 maraschino cherries

Text: It is appointed unto men'once to die, but after this the judgment. Hebrews 9:27.

Death is a reminder. Paul tells us that death entered the world by sin. So death passed upon all men, for that all have sinned.

Although Thanksgiving Day had been celebrated occasionally in America since early Colonial days, it remained for Abraham Lincoln, in 1863, to sign the first national annual Thanksgiving Proclamation, according to Dr. R. Gerald McMurtry, director of the Lincoln National Life Foundation. His signing of the document is depicted in the above painting, created by the nationally-known artist, Dean Cornwell. The scene is historically correct and shows Lincoln in his White House office just after he had completed his signature on the document. Lincoln's Thanksgiving Proclamation of 1863 marked the beginning of an unbroken series of proclamations, although there was some deviation as to date, by United States Presidents. Lincoln selected the last Thursday in November, which was the last feast day of the church calendar year. For a few years starting in 1939, the third Thursday was named. Since 1941, Thanksgiving has been observed on the fourth Thursday in November.
