AN APPOINTMENT WITH DEATH

Text: It is appointed unto men once to die, but after this the judgment. Hebrews 9:27.

Death is a reminder. Paul tells us that death entered the world by sin. So death passed upon all men, for that all have sinned.

The universality of death proves the universality of sin. It proves that everybody needs a Saviour. Only he who conquered death can conquer sin.

Man in every branch of science fights death. He fights it valiantly and courageously, but always unsuccessfully. Everyone still dies. No one has been able to change that fact for 6,000 years. Therefore, man is not his own Saviour. He cannot deliver himself from death. Man must look elsewhere for victory. And where in history is there record of any one else triumphing over death except Jesus Christ of Nazareth.

The text says: after this the judgment. Life therefore is a sacred trust. What you do with it is up to you, but what you should do with it remains with God. He is the Judge. The Bible makes that very plain. "For none of us liveth to himself and no man dieth to himself. For whether we live, we live unto the Lord and whether we die we die unto the Lord.

Death does not end it all. At the end of the road you will find God waiting for you. How will you act when the summons reaches you? Your moment to get ready may be brief. You may have none at all. God makes no guarantee.

This is the moment to do some thinking about it. Will the man in the tower turn on the landing lights for you as you touch down into eternity? Will there be a blaze of light to welcome you on the other side or will it be a lonesome road for you full of frightening shadows and tormented by demons of regret? Will your last words be, "If only I had it to do over again"? It's up to you. It's your life that is at stake, a fact big enough and important enough to convict me of my need of a Saviour. 



Although Thanksgiving Day had been celebrated occasionally in America since early Colonial days, it remained for Abraham Lincoln, in 1863, to sign the first national annual Thanksgiving Proclamation, according to Dr. R. Gerald McMurtry, director of the Lincoln National Life Founda-tion. His signing of the document is depicted in the above painting, created by the nationally-known artist, Dean Cornwell. The scene is historically correct and shows Lincoln in his White House office just after

he had completed his signature on the document. Lincoln's Thanksgiving Proclamation of 1863 marked the beginning of an unbroken series of proclamations, although there was some deviation as to date, by United States Presidents. Lincoln selected the last Thursday in November, which was the last feast day of the church calendar year. For a few years starting in 1939, the third Thursday was named. Since 1941, Thanksgiving has been observed on the fourth Thursday in November.
