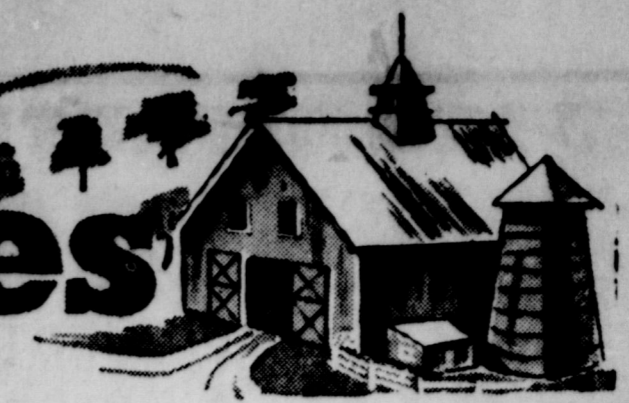

SERVICES HELD AT KELTON FOR HENDERSON

Funeral services for John Edward (Ed) Henderson, 68, prominent Kelton community farmer, were held at 2:00 Tuesday afternoon in the Kelton Baptist Church.

Mr. Henderson died at 5:00 Sunday afternoon in the Shamrock General Hospital where he had been a patient about a week following a heart attack suffered while he was hunting on his farm east of Kelton.

Officiating at the last rites were Rev. A. G. Roberts, pastor of the Lefors Baptist Church; Rev. Eroy Harris, pastor of the Kelton Baptist Church; and Rev. A. N. Motes, pastor of the Kelton Methodist Church.

Pallbearers were Leonard Rathjen, Levi Reid, Ollie Elliott, C. P. Anderson, Charlie Whitley, and Tommy Killingsworth.

Richardson Funeral Home was in charge of burial in the Kelton Cemetery.

Mr. Henderson was born May 10, 1890 in Waco. He was married in Hill County on Sept. 22, 1912 to Miss Eva Wall of Hillsburg. They moved to Wheeler County from Hill County in 1915.

He was a farmer and was a deacon in the Kelton Baptist Church. Surviving are his wife of Kelton, one daughter Mrs. Irvin Hink, and a son C. O. (Buck) Henderson, both of Kelton. Two sisters, Mrs. J. A. Tucker of Shamrock and Mrs. Frank Jennings of Rockwall and a brother, George Henderson of Wheeler. Also surviving are 5 grandchildren and 2 great grandchildren.

Television Translator System In Operation At Turkey, Texas

A current financial report was not available Wednesday afternoon on the Farm Bureau Translator System. However, Wilson Leeper, president of the Television Communication Engineers, Inc. of Fort Collins, Colorado, R.

M. Sinks of the firm's Dallas office and O. E. Settiff of Turkey stopped by the Times office Wednesday to discuss the progress being made on the translator system.

Mr. Leepers and Mr. Sinks are experts in the field of electronics. They plan to make a survey, in addition to the one made by Settiff, of Wheeler County and determine its potential as a Translator System area.

Settiff also informed the Times that the Translator System was completed and put into operation Monday at Turkey, with "better than expected reception."

Settiff has invited several Wheeler County Farm Bureau members to visit Turkey next week and inspect the operations of the system there.

At the last report the Wheeler County farm bureau had collected approximately \$24,000 in their campaign to raise \$50,000 for the Wheeler County system.

In girls semi-finals Friday, Mobeetie downed Briscoe 52-45 and Wheeler topped Canadian 52-49. In girls losers bracket games,

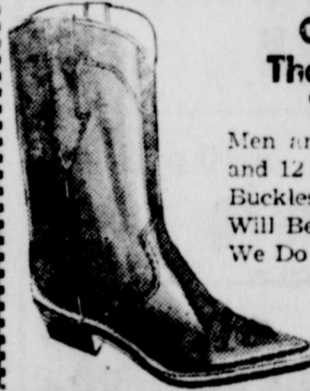
scores were Kelton 61, Allison 57, and Miami 38, Shamrock B 19.

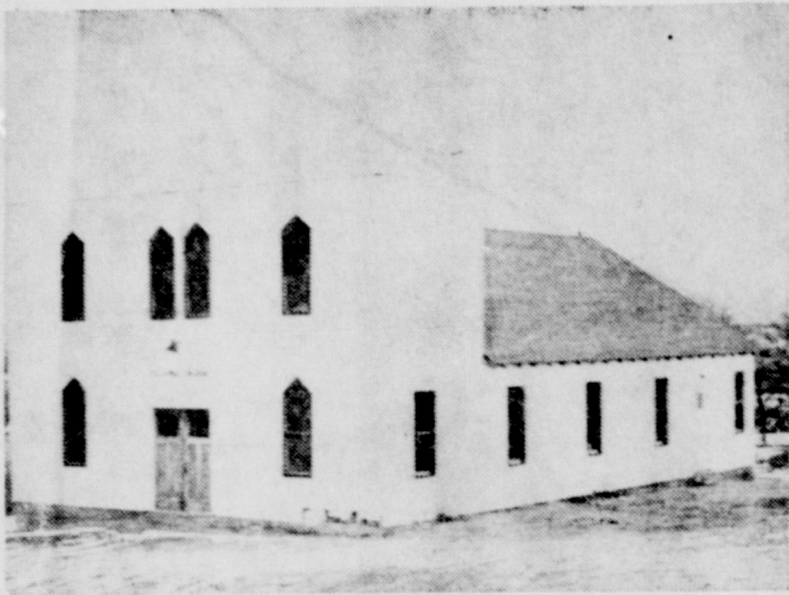

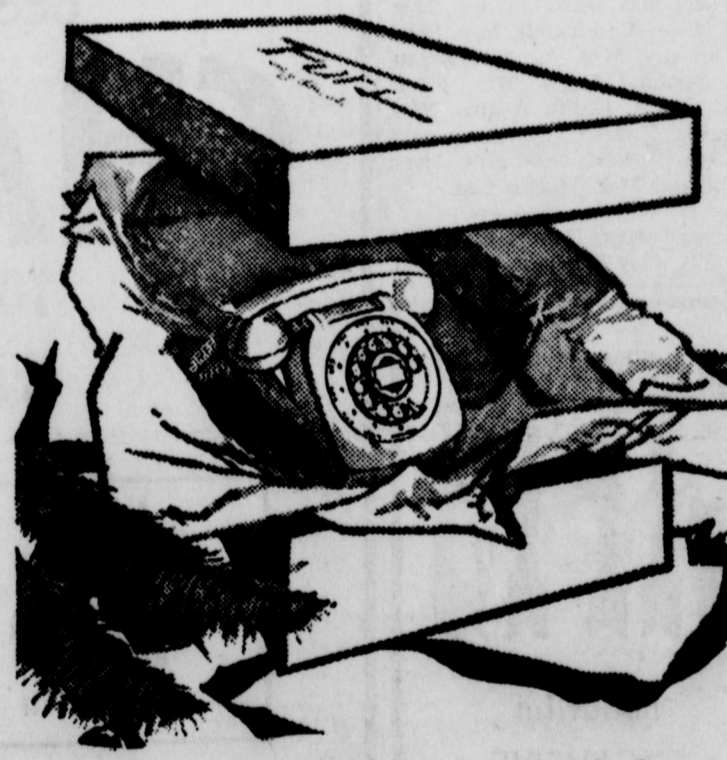

"This year it will take all of us to make the Drive a big one, so let's start out with a lot of help," Mrs. Sivage said.

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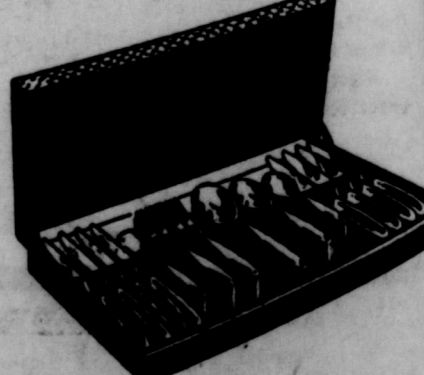
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
