Mrs. Ruth Malin, wife of D. L. Malin, superintendent of schools at Allison, died Thursday, December 11 at 10:30 A.M. in the Methodist hospital in Lubbock, after a brief illness. She had been hospitalized on Tuesday.

Funeral services were held Saturday at 10:30 A.M. in the Sullivan Funeral Home Chapel at Vernon, Texas with Dr. J. E. Shewbert, pastor of the Methodist Church of Vernon, assisted by Rev. Jim Waller of Allison in charge of the services.

Mrs. Malin was born May 14, 1908 at Temple and was married to D. L. Malin, November 24, 1926 at Panhandle. The couple resided in Amarillo 10 years before moving to Hartley, Texas; then to Dora, New Mexico; and to Allison four years ago. She was a teacher in the Allison school and a member of the Methodist Church. Mrs. Malin was also a graduate of West Texas State College in Canyon.

Survivors include the husband, a daughter, Elizabeth Ann, student at Canyon College; two sons, Charles, Baltimore, Maryland, and Joe David of the home; her mother, Mrs. A. A. ## County Has First 4-H Awards Banquet

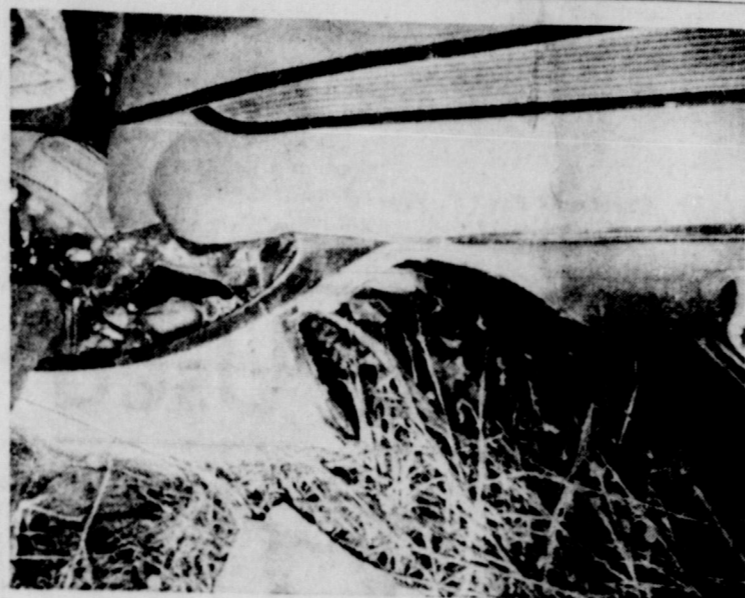

## Former Resident Dies in Fresno, California

George Brazil, former resident of Wheeler, and brother of Mrs. Sallie Meadows passed away December 10, 1958 at the age of 77 years, 7 months and 1 day, in Fresno, California.

George Brazil was born in Springtown, Texas May 9, 1881.

Survivors include his wife, Josie Brazil of Fresno; two sons, Torris Brazil and Ralph Brazil; six grandchildren and three great grandchildren all of Los Angeles, California. One daughter, Ruby, preceded him in death in 1931. Besides the family, two sister, Mrs. Sallie Meadows of Wheeler, and Mrs. Ofie (Mary) Cox of Paradise, California and one brother, Will Brazil of Amarillo and a host of nieces and nephews.

George was married to Jose Helm in August 1903 at Springtown. He moved by covered wagon to Wheeler County in 1905. Locating at Mobeetie until Wheeler townsite was surveyed when he bought a lot and built and operated Wheelers first hotel. In the spring of 1906, the hotel was located a sort distance north of Uncle Tona Mortons old home place. He kept the hotel until 1913 when he decided to farm out east of town. He didn't like farming and moved to Rogers, Arkansas in 1918 where he operated a grist mill for 8 years. Then tried farming again for a year and moved to Amarillo in 1928 and then on to Fresno in a few months, where he remained until death. He had been in ill health for several months preceding his death.

## Farmer Hospitalized Following Accident

Ebb Farmer, Wheeler resident and employee of the Carbon Black plant in Shamrock was seriously injured Saturday night in a car accident East of Mobeetie.

Ebb was rounding the curve a mile east of Mobeetie on highway 152 when he met a car that was traveling in the wrong lane. When Farmer swirled to miss the oncoming vehicle he lost control of his 1958 Buick, crashed into a guard post and overturned in the field on the north side of the highway.

Almost 2 hours elapsed before a motorist noticed the wrecked car and found Farmer pinned in

the wreckage. John Allen Neece and employee of the Carbon Black plant in Shamrock said he found Farmer about 7:30 and by the time Neece removed him from the car and rushed him to the Wheeler hospital almost 3 hours had elapsed.

Farmer was treated for fractured ribs, bruises, minor lacerations and exposure from the extreme cold. His physician said Farmer will be released from the hospital Monday.

Deputy sheriff Neal Raymond and Highway patrolmen R. F. Logan and Travis Underwood investigated the accident.

The Buick was a total loss. No charges were filed.

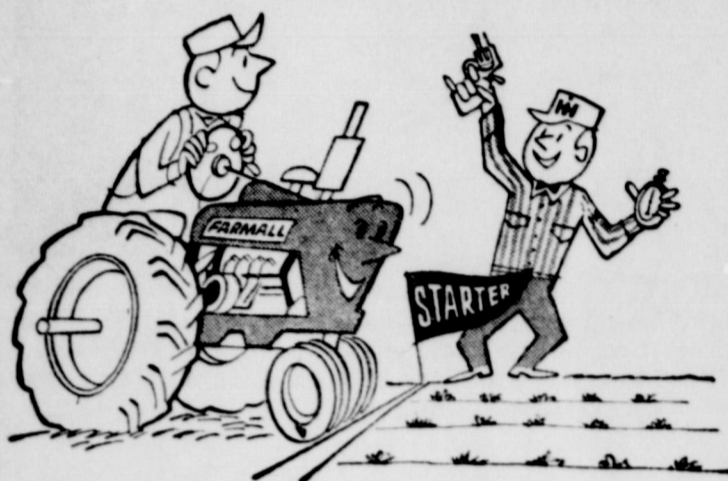
John Hodges of Wheeler, recently sold a Black Angus bull to the Ellis Angus Farms in Jola, Kansas.

**Brown Resigns At Board Meet**

Superintendent of schools Earl Brown handed in his official resignation last Thursday night at the regular meeting of the Wheeler school board.

The following is a copy of Brown's resignation:  
Gentlemen:

In June of 1952, I became superintendent of the Wheeler Independent School District. Some of you were members of the Board which gave me my first contract for one year. Later, you gave me a two-year, and then a three-year contract. At the regular meeting of March 14, 1957, you extended this contract to June 30, 1959. All of these contracts were given by unanimous votes by all members of the Board.

During this time, I can truthfully say that I have never had the privilege of serving with a finer, more dedicated, or more efficient school board. The unanimous cooperation which we have had, the spirit of fellowship among members of the Board, and the genuine friendship which has been demonstrated toward me, have made a very difficult job much easier and the position of superintendent more attractive.

It now appears that this situation has changed somewhat, and dissatisfaction has grown up among some people of the community, and possibly among some members of the Board. That a part of this must be a result of some of my actions, there can be

no doubt, for I assure you that I know I have made many mistakes. However, I have given my best to the job of improving the Wheeler Schools and carrying on the type of program which would be most beneficial to the boys and girls who are in attendance. As to the success of my efforts, you and the people of the community must be the final judges. Personally, I believe that the improvement of the system as a whole is obvious, and I trust that I am not leaving myself open to the charge of being egotistical in making this statement.

My wife and I have put forth considerable effort in doing our parts as members of the community, helping to promote interests of the town, and in sponsoring movements to aid in extra-curricular activities in school. These things we have done as parents and to do our parts as good citizens. We liked Wheeler and Wheeler County before we came here, and we love it more now. I would be giving a false impression if I were to say that we dislike the community or school, or that we look forward to leaving.

However, because of the problems which seem to be developing, and I do not want to be, even remotely, the cause of community division, I am asking that you do not consider renewal of my contract which expires on June 30, 1959. I do ask that you give me your continued cooperation during the remainder of the school year, and I pledge you mine, in order that we may complete another school term as efficiently as possible. If you feel that you can do so in good conscience, I would appreciate any support and words of recommendation which you may give when you have inquiries from places where I shall make applications for positions in the future.

I assure you that I appreciate the opportunity of serving with you and the many courtesies which you have shown me.

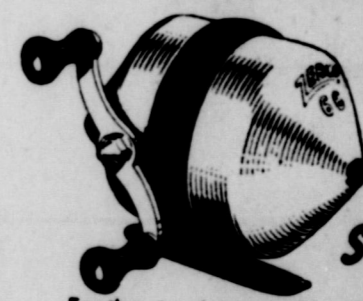
