Burgess To Be Installed As Kiwanis President

At 7:30 p.m. Monday, January 5, officers for 1959 will be installed in the Kiwanis Club. Officers taking over for the new year are: Watson Burgess, president; Carroll Killingsworth, vice-president; Thurman Rives, Secretary; Adrian Risner, Treasurer. Directors are: Max Wiley, Bob Douthit, Bryan Swain, N. D. Ware Jr., Walter Dunn, David Britt and Don Earnay.

The newly elected president Watson Burgess is the manager of the Southwestern Public Service Company in Wheeler. Watson served this past year as vice-president of the Kiwanis Club and president of the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce. Watson and his wife, Estelle, are members of the Church of Christ. They have two boys, Jerry 16 and Mike 10.

In outlining the Kiwanis work program for 1959 Watson named N. D. Ware Jr. as chairman of the Kiwanis Committee on Boys and Girls Work; Gordon Stiles is chairman of the Key Club Committee; Frank Wofford is chairman of the Committee on Vocational Guidance.

And the very capable George Gandy will head the committee on Agriculture and Conservation; C. J. Meek was named chairman of the Committee on Public and Business Affairs; the committee on Support of Churches in Their Spiritual Aims is headed by Judge Geo. Hefley.

The musical portion of the program for the installation night banquet will be furnished by the Wheeler Trio, composed of Mrs. R. J. Holt Jr., Mrs. David Britt and Mrs. Harrison Hall.

Clayton Cook, Lieutenant Governor elect of the Texas-Oklahoma Division 6, will act as the installation officer.

Wives of Kiwanians will be hostesses at this annual installation, which will be held in the fellowship hall of the Methodist Church in Wheeler.

County Employs Coyote Trapper

Landowners will be interested in the announcement recently that Wheeler County has employed a coyote trapper, effective January 1.

Clois Hanner, commissioner in precinct 3, and Ernest Henderson, commissioner-elect in precinct 4, said the hunter was being hired jointly by the two precincts to work in the south part of the county.

Landowners wishing the services of the hunter are asked to contact Henderson or Hanner.

The man will employ cyanide bombs as well as traps, the commissioners said, but will not place them on land until he has secured the consent of the landowner.

Wheeler County has not had the services of a coyote trapper in recent years. The state employed trappers several years ago and up until about five years ago the county paid bounty on coyotes.

METHODISTS FURNISH CITY WITH HYMNS

Those beautiful church hymns heard everyday in Wheeler are from the "Carillon Bells" instrument which was recently installed at the Methodist Church in Wheeler. This announcement was made by Rev. Carlton Thomson who said that the bells were presented to the church by a member of their congregation.

This "Carillon Bells" instrument is known as a "Coronation" Carillon and is an exclusive development of Schulmerich Carillons, Inc. of Sellersville, Pennsylvania. The instrument consists of 25 miniature bell tone generators of bronze bell metal which are struck by metal hammers, producing exact true bell tones almost inaudible to the human ear. These bell vibrations are then amplified over 100,000 times by means of specially designed electronic equipment, producing true bell music with all the depth and richness of traditional cast bells of massive proportions.

The instrument which has been installed in The Methodist Church provides the tonal equivalent of 79,462 pounds of cast bells tuned to the finest English standards. The range is G below Middle C to G two octaves above and it is interesting to note that the low G bell is equal in tone to a cast bell weighing 13,250 pounds.

The "Carillon Bells" instrument will be played from a special keyboard located at the organ console. Selector switches will permit the bells to be heard within the church alone, from the tower alone, or both together.

Automatic daily programs on the "Coronation" Carillon will be provided by means of the Schulmerich "Auto-Bell" Roll Player which is included. Over 40 hymn selections have been ordered by members of the church. This instrument, which is neither a phonograph nor a wire-recording device, actually plays the bells through the use of perforated plastic rolls. These rolls actuate the circuits which strike the "Carillon Bells" tone generators, duplicating the performance of an artist at the keyboard. Made of a durable plastic material, the rolls are formed as an endless belt and the Roll Player can be set to play a single desired selection or an extended program.

Automatic operation of the "Auto-Bell" Roll Player is controlled by a calendared clock which can be set to play the carillon at any time of the day. It is planned to have a selection played on the bells each day at 12 noon and 6 p.m. to bring the great hymns of the church into the lives of the people of this community.

Vanpool-Burton Moves Into New Location

Pete Burton and Bud Vanpool, owners of Vanpool-Burton Motor Co. in Wheeler, announced Monday that the Ford Motor Company had officially okayed their purchase of the Thomas Garage and Implement Co. building as a new location.

The service department of the Ford garage was moved Monday and the office and parts department will be moved as soon as carpenters complete the remodeling of the new building. Burton said they hoped to be in their new quarters by Monday, January 5.

The Vanpool-Burton Motor Co. is presently located at 117 West Oklahoma in Wheeler. Their new location will be directly across from Bill Chapman's Service Station, in the building formerly occupied by the Thomas Garage and Implement Co.

Several changes are being made in the building according to Pete and Bud. A new durolite ceiling is being installed in the front office area. The 35 x 30 ft. show room will be divided into three departments, an enclosed office, an enclosed parts department and the new car show area. The office and parts department will be enclosed with knotty pine paneling.

The big garage door on the northeast corner of the building will be replaced with show windows and the interior of the show room will be painted a light tan.

Pete and Bud also purchased the property on the east side of the building for future expansion. They plan to use the paved lot on the east end of their property for a used car lot.

FARM BUREAU TO CONDUCT FINAL DRIVE

A public meeting on the proposed Farm Bureau Television Translator System was scheduled for Monday night in Shamrock, however, because of the inclement weather only a few Shamrock residents attended the meeting.

A delegation which recently inspected a similar system in Turkey, Hall County, planned to report to the crowd on their findings, said Glynn Bell, county chairman of a campaign to raise money to finance the installation.

The final drive to raise the necessary money to construct the system in Wheeler County will continue Friday January 2 and continue through Saturday, January 3.

Workers will converge on Shamrock and Wheeler in a final all-out push to reach their \$50,000 goal.

"The reception over the translator system at Turkey and Quitaque was better than expected," Mr. Bell said.

Plans to install the TV translator system is being sponsored by the Wheeler County Farm Bureau, a non-profit organization. Approximately one-half of the \$50,000 needed to install the system has already been raised, most of the amount having been contributed by residents of the north part of the county.

"The final fund drive has been set for Saturday, January 2 and 3. Please be ready when solicitors call on you. We must finish the drive so that our engineers can start construction," Bell said.

Completion time is estimated at 45 days from the date the money is available.

Two column by five inch ads then started appearing regularly in the Saturday Honolulu Star-Bulletin. The ads were written just the way Musa-shiya talked—in colorful pidgen English which is used throughout the Orient. Here is an example of one of Musa-shiya's ads:

"Well here come storek again—but Musa-shiya, the shirtmaker, is able prepare. Wonderful accumulation of baby things in dry goods selling corner of Musa shop. Everything for the baby—especially diaper. Exclusive of storek, which find most easily, many persons not finding little shop of Musa-shiya the shirtmaker in King Street, Makai side, between fish market and river."

Tourists started sending copies of Musa-shiya's ads to their friends in many countries. Soon Musa-shiya was receiving orders from all over the world as well as doing a thriving business in Hawaii.

And that is the story of how a well planned, small advertising campaign made an unknown Japanese shirtmaker not only wealthy but world famous.

Your local newspaper doesn't promise to duplicate this story for its advertisers, but it does take your sales message into the homes of your customers where full and careful consideration is given your suggestions. Who knows, perhaps you too can be a Musa-shiya.
