ALLOW GOD TO SPEAK TO YOU DAILY

Nothing can replace daily reading of the Scriptures, with real meditation. David said in Psalms 1:1-2 "Blessed is the man that walketh not in the counsel of the ungodly, nor standeth in the way of sinners, nor sitteth in the seat of the scornful. But his delight is in the law of the Lord; and in His law doth he meditate day and night." Jesus told His followers, "And ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free." Jno. 8:32. Again Jesus told them in Jno. 15:3 "Now ye are clean through the word which I have spoken unto you." Let us all study the Bible carefully that we may follow the instructions given therein and receive the blessings promised the follower of Jesus in these Scriptures.


Let us realize that when we are reading the Bible, that God is speaking to us. We are not reading the works of men, but of God. God gives us instruction and it is our duty to follow such instruction. 


