RAT CONTROL DRIVE TO BE HELD IN COUNTY

A rodent control drive will be held January 12th through January 16th according to County Agent Bryan Swaim. It will be sponsored by the Wheeler County commissioner's court in cooperation with the Extension Service and Rodent Control Service and will be handled through the following: Shamrock and Wheeler Chamber of Commerce offices; Ray Brown, Allison Producers Grain; Ray Richardson, Highway Grocery, Mobeetie; Elliott Grocery, Kelton; and W. F. McNeil, Court House, Wheeler.

The rat bait will be available for only one week. This is made possible to help give rodent control over the whole county. Therefore, anyone desiring bait should stock enough to last at least seven days as bait must be eaten five days in order to give results.

Swaim said everyone should take advantage of this drive and distribute enough bait to control their mice and rats as this would help keep down diseases as well as save many dollars of feed and stored articles wasted each year by rodents.

"Let's make this a COUNTY WIDE DRIVE," Swaim said.

Wheeler Television System To Install Additional Channel

The owners of the Wheeler Television system announced this week that its subscribers will soon have the opportunity to view an additional station over the now three channel system.

Laura and Corky Guthrie said the power supply, tuners and transmitters are ready and the new antenna should arrive within a few days. With a break in the weather they plan to have the new station in operation within 2 or 3 weeks.

The locally owned system now carries channels nine, four and five. The antenna to be installed will enable viewers to watch channel 7 out of Amarillo, giving one channel on NBC, one on CBS and two channels carrying ABC.

COUNTY BEEF CALF SHOW TO BE SATURDAY

Saturday, January 10th is the date set for the annual Wheeler County Beef Calf Show, sponsored by the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce, Farm Bureau and Kiwanis Club. It will be held at the Show Barn behind the Fire Station in Wheeler according to County Agent Bryan Swaim. Calves will be weighed in at Fat Jones' Paymaster Gin, and in place at the barn not later than 10:00 a.m. Saturday morning and judging will start at 10:30 a.m. Saturday. The calves will be judged by Bill Palmeyer, County Agent, Matador, Texas.

There will also be a judging contest for 4-H and F.F.A. teams that wish to practice judging. This will be held following the judging of the calves Swaim said.

The calves will be by Wheeler County F.F.A. or 4-H boys and prizes will be awarded as follows: First place, \$7.50; Second place, \$5.00; Third place, \$3.00; Fourth place, \$2.00; and each additional place \$1.00 each.

The calves will be divided into two classes after the weigh-in by Livestock Chairmen Frank Walker and Lyndon Sims.

Loan Associations To Consolidate In County

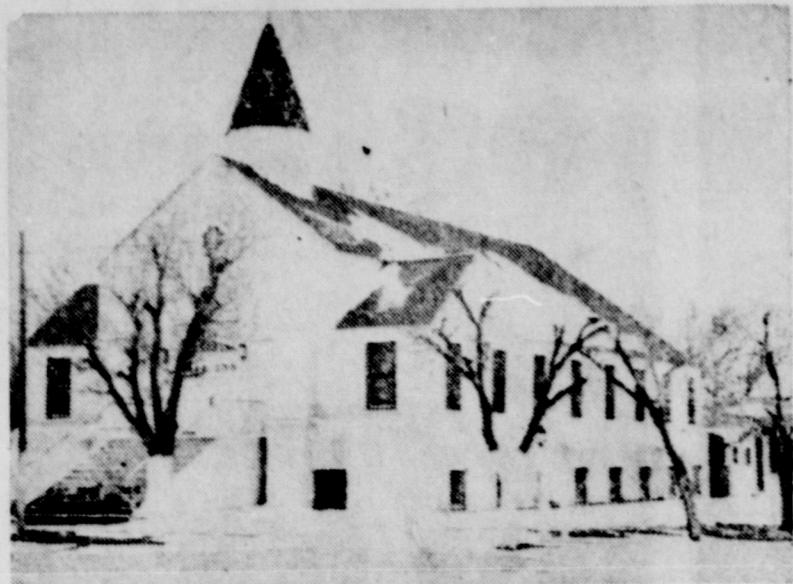
The Wheeler County and The Wellington National Farm Loan Associations, which have operated as a group in Shamrock for the past two years, have consolidated, effective January 1st.

A new charter, covering the two counties, Collingsworth and Wheeler, has been granted by the Farm Credit Administration under the name "Wheeler-Wellington National Farm Loan Association of Shamrock, Texas."

According to Rayburn L. Smith, Secretary/Treasurer, the Association is moving its office to 111 North Main Street in the recently remodeled Chester Payne Building. Miss Glenna Hefley, who is known to most Wheeler County residents, will continue as Office Assistant. Glenna has been in N.F.L.A. work since 1947, beginning with R. H. Forrester at Wheeler and moving to Shamrock when the group office was established. Smith was Secretary/Treasurer of the Donley County N.F.L.A. from 1943 until he accepted the present position upon Mr. Forrester's retirement. ALLOW GOD TO SPEAK TO YOU DAILY

Nothing can replace daily reading of the Scriptures, with real meditation. David said in Psalms 1:1-2 "Blessed is the man that walketh not in the counsel of the ungodly, nor standeth in the way of sinners, nor sitteth in the seat of the scornful. But his delight is in the law of the Lord; and in His law doth he meditate day and night." Jesus told His followers, "And ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free." Jno. 8:32. Again Jesus told them in Jno. 15:3 "Now ye are clean through the word which I have spoken unto you." Let us all study the Bible carefully that we may follow the instructions given therein and receive the blessings promised the follower of Jesus in these Scriptures.

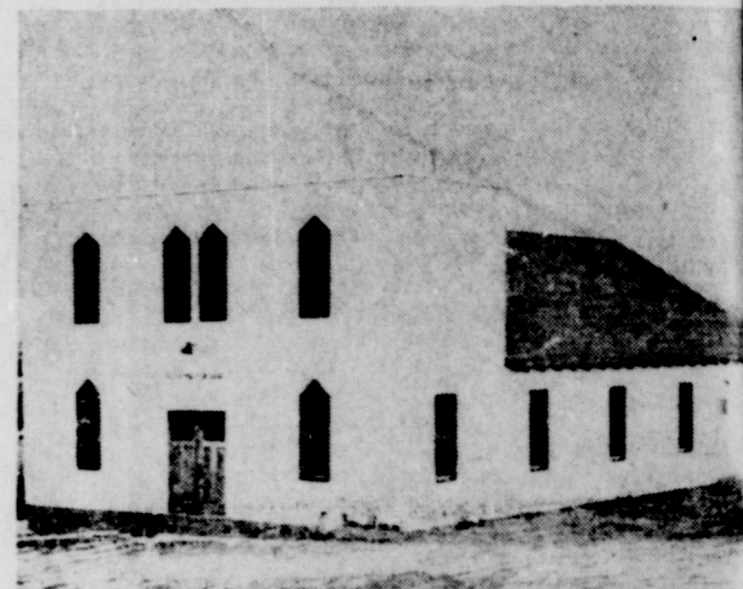
Let us realize that when we are reading the Bible, that God is speaking to us. We are not reading the works of men, but of God. God gives us instruction and it is our duty to follow such instruction. All the promises are to those who read and follow the advice given in the scriptures. 2 Tim. 2:15 "Study to shew thy self approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth." But just reading will not bring about the desired results. One must also be ready to obey. All of the promises are to the one who obeys the scripture. Jas. 1:22 "But be ye doers of the word, and not hearers only, deceiving your own selves." Notice verse 25 of the same chapter, "But whose looketh into the perfect law of liberty and continueth therein, he being not a forgetful hearer, but a doer of the work, this man shall be blessed in his deed."

That God requires obedience of one before he can enter into heaven is plainly taught in the scriptures. Heb. 5:9 "And being made perfect, He became the author of eternal salvation unto all them that obey Him;" Rev. 22:14 "Blessed are they that do His commandments, that they may have right to the tree of life, and may enter in through the gates into the city."

Obeying from the hearts because one desires to please his Father in Heaven, is far from the legalistic idea shown by the Pharisees of old. If one displays the love for God that is pictured as the love that will save, he will desire to obey God. Then let's read the Bible with the thought in mind that we want to know what instructions the Father has given to us and we want to know that we might follow. The instructions are plain enough to be understood and followed. The ones who refuse to obey are the ones who will be punished. 2 Thes. 1:7-8 "And to you who are troubled rest with us when the Lord Jesus shall be revealed from heaven with His mighty angel, in flaming fire taking vengeance on them that know not God, and that obey not the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ." 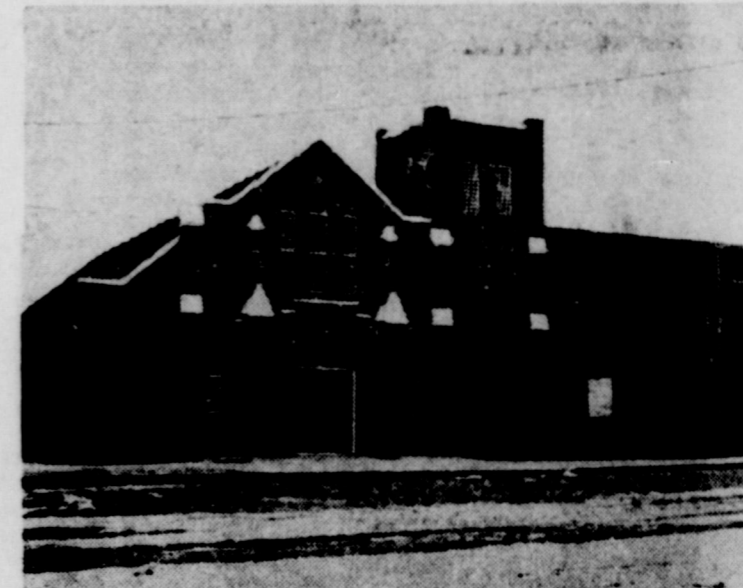

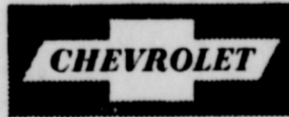
