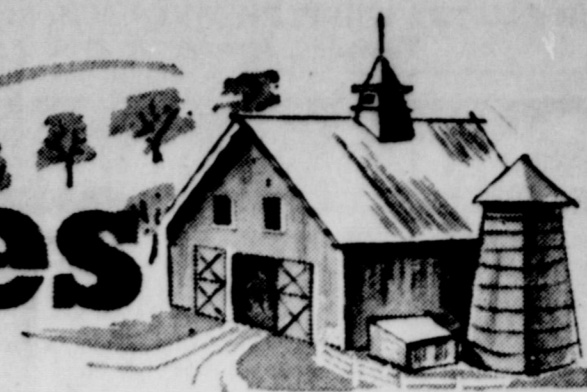

Polio, "The Crippler" is not licked yet. The Salk Vaccine is only the beginning, your continued support is needed. Make sure your porch light is on Friday night when the "Mothers March" on polio is conducted.

Four women's federated clubs will take part in the march from 6 until 7 p.m. Friday January 30. The clubs participating are '54 Study Club, Progressive Study Club, Thursday Review Club and the Wednesday Study Club.

Mrs. R. William Brown and Mrs. Nelson Porter are in charge of the Wheeler drive. They are working in close accord with the Wheeler County chairman, Mrs. Harold Sivage.

Members of the Wheeler volunteer fire department will "kick-off" the drive Friday evening at 6:00 p.m. when they cruise through the residential section of Wheeler in the fire truck blowing the siren.

Mothers participating in the march will wear white gloves signifying the hand of mercy. The public is urged to cooperate because funds are needed badly. Not only for polio research but for the research and treatment of virus diseases, arthritis and birth defects. It takes so little to help... GIVE and join the fight against POLIO.

Chamber of Commerce Membership Drive Begins

The 1959 Chamber of Commerce membership drive is underway... The board of directors and several key members of the Chamber met Monday night at Nora's Cafe to discuss and lay plans for the membership drive.

Virgil Jamison, local postmaster, and one of the top civic leaders in the county spoke to the group on the importance of a Chamber of Commerce. Jamison outlined some of the projects the local Chamber could tackle.

A film, "The Hugo Story" was shown to the small gathering. The film disclosed the steady growth, wealth and health economy experienced by residents of Hugo, Oklahoma as a direct result of their "working" chamber of commerce.

Following the program James Verden, chairman of the membership committee, presented each worker with a list of individuals in Wheeler to contact.

Verden explained that, "An enormous percentage of our nation's local chambers are trying, vainly, to operate on inadequate budgets. However, many of the smaller communities have compromised and have achieved outstanding results with volunteer manpower," he said.

"If you're demanding results from your chamber of commerce, you'd better be justified in making your demands. In other words, you'd better be doing something, either in the form of money or volunteering your services."

"The organization is what you make it, because you are the organization. You can get out of it what you put into it."

"Your local chamber can do much to build your community into a comfortable, profitable community - and you should be one of the supporting timbers in the building program," he concluded.

In launching the 1959 Chamber of Commerce membership drive, members of the Chamber have pledged to "Work together, to make our community and county a better place in which to live and make a living."

Childress Found Guilty Of Raping 12-Year-Old Daughter

A special venire jury found Pat Malloy Childress, 53, of Lela, guilty of rape Thursday night after deliberating for 80 minutes. James R. Tindell, former of the jury, read the following verdict. "We the jury find the defendant guilty of rape as charged in the indictment, and assess punishment at 20 years."

Childress will be sentenced by District Judge Lewis M. Goodrich sometime this week. District Attorney Bill Waters reported Childress will likely be sentenced to 20 years in the state penitentiary.

CAR TAGS GO ON SALE FEBRUARY 2

New license plates for 1959 will go on sale in Wheeler county February 2, County Tax Collector and Assessor Thurman Rives announced today. The plates will be reverse of 1958's, and will have black letters and numerals on a white background.

Rives stated that four and one-half million motor vehicle registrations were bought by Texans in 1958. "Don't be at the end of that long line. Get your vehicle registered early," Rives urged. "The registration deadline is April 1, but we hope car and truck owners will put on the new plates as soon as possible."

"Bring your certificate of title and your last year's registration receipt. Penalty for improper registration of a vehicle can be as much as \$200. Don't risk an illegal registration. Remember, too, that a portion of all registration fees stays in your home county to benefit your local community."

Paving Around Courthouse To Be Completed Soon

Curtis Kidwell, maintenance section foreman for the state highway department, said this morning that more than 1,500 yards of dirt had been hauled out of the parking area around the courthouse. And 680 yards of base material has been applied to the area, in preparation for paving of the parking area on the north and east sides of the courthouse.

Kidwell said the base will be rolled and packed next week. However, the actual paving will not begin until the end of February or early part of March. He explained the delay was necessary because of the cold weather. "As soon as we have a few warm days we can complete the project" he said.

After the base is packed a prime coat will be applied, asphalt and kerosene. The prime coat will be allowed to sit 5 days before the asphalt and gravel is applied. The final step will be to roll the gravel into the asphalt.

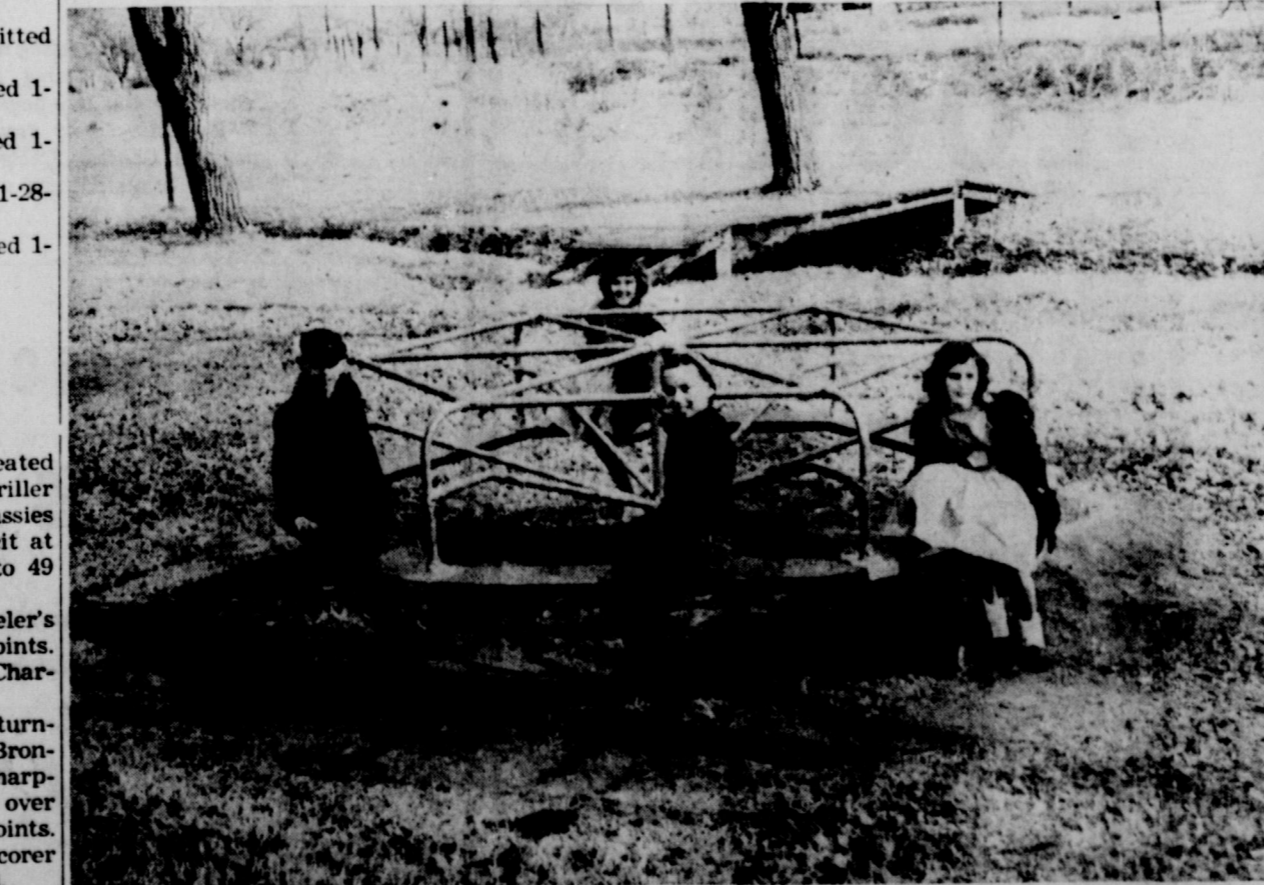
Wheeler-Mcbeetie Are Tied In Conference Play

Farm Bureau Leaders Attend District Meet

Several Wheeler County Farm Bureau leaders attended a district wide policy execution planning meeting Monday January 27th at Amarillo, according to an announcement by Clarence Zybach, President.

The meeting, sponsored by the Texas Farm Bureau, is one of 12 such meetings being held over the state to discuss state and national issues affecting agriculture and muster support for the Farm Bureau's legislative program in Austin and Washington.

Those attending from this county were: Clarence Zybach, Geo. Richardson, Sam McMurtry, Chairman, Clifford Walsler and Rayburn Hall.

Among the more important items discussed at the meeting was the state's rural road-building program, fear of losing the county rural road fund, which is expected to come under fire during the current legislative session. Other important state issues which were discussed included animal health legislation, taxes, agricultural research and education, transportation, water, milk labeling and county commissioner's precincts.

National-level issues to be analyzed included federal pre-emption of state's rights, production payment issues, labor monopoly, the federal budget, taxes, and inflation.

On January 29, there will be a County wide T. V. Translator System meeting. The meeting will take place in the Grade School Auditorium, to begin at 7:30 p.m. O. E. Setliff, of the Adler Translator System, will be present to answer your question. The Wheeler County T. V. CASWELL IS HOMEMAKER OF TOMORROW
Carol Jean Caswell has been named 1959 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow at Wheeler high school.
She received the highest score in a 50-minute written examination on homemaking knowledge and attitudes taken by graduating senior girls in her school. She will receive a homemaking pin manufactured by Josten's, which represents the slogan, "Home is Where the Heart Is." Her examination paper will be entered in competition with those of other school winners in the state to name the state Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow.
The test is designed and judged by Science Research Associates.
Each state Homemaker of Tomorrow will receive a \$1,500 scholarship from General Mills, an educational trip April 4-10 with her school advisor to Washington, D. C., colonial Williamsburg, Va., New York City and Minneapolis, and she will be a candidate for the title of All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow. The school of each state winner will receive a set of the Encyclopedia Britannica. General Mills will award a \$500 scholarship to each state runner-up.
There are 12,260 participating schools throughout the nation, which have enrolled 349,150 senior girls, the largest number of participants in the five-year history of this \$106,000 scholarship program. Growth has been steady since 1955 when 187,463 girls in 8,040 schools participated.
The 1959 All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow will be announced in Minneapolis April 10 at the American Table Dinner in the Leaning Tower Hotel's "Hall of States."
The scholarship of the All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow will be increased to \$5,000. The national runner-up will receive a \$4,000 grant, third place winner a \$3,000 award and fourth place winner a \$2,000 scholarship.

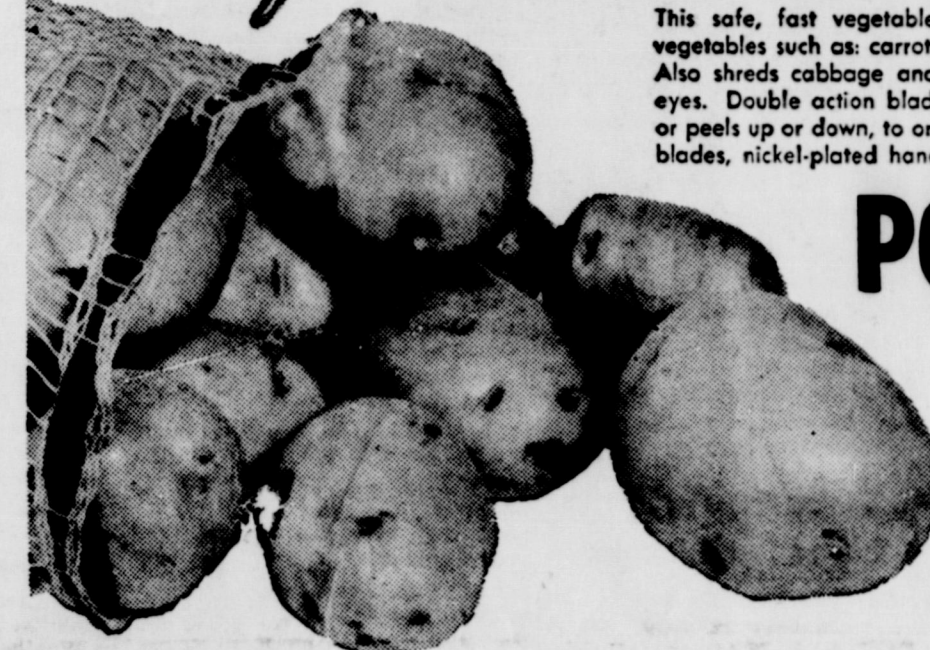

PHILOSOPHER SAYS GOVERNMENT NEEDS NEW SOURCE OF REVENUE

(Editor's Note: The Sweetwater Creek Philosopher on his shinnery farm on Sweetwater Creek must be a little tax-conscious, his letter this week indicates.)

Dear Editor,
I was sitting by the fire the other night flipping through a magazine when I ran into an article saying the United States government is looking for inventors, and it went ahead and listed a long string of things this country needs to have invented.

Now I never have invented anything, outside of a few excuses, but I've had a lot of experience trying to keep other people's inventions running, and what impressed me by that list was what it left out. It left out what looks like the Federal government itself ought to be the first to think of and put at the head of the list.

What this country needs, over and above all other gadgets and labor-saving devices and handier hydrogen bombs, is a new source of tax revenue.

It doesn't make any difference whether it's President Eisenhower in Washington, Governor Daniels in Austin or the governor of any other state, including Alaska, and the mayors of most cities and towns, everybody is looking for a new source of tax revenue.

Right now, everybody seems to be in a rut, and about all anybody can think of is to put a new tax on cars and gasoline. Any time any official has to wrestle with the problem of finding new revenue to balance a budget, he generally comes up the idea of raising the tax on gasoline.

This makes sense, in one way, as most people will give up nearly everything, including groceries and clothes, before they'll stop driving their car.

But I'm afraid they can go too far in this direction. Of course

their argument is that we're building 30 billion dollars worth of new highways across the nation, not counting all the side roads and local highways, and the best way to pay for them is to tax the users.

Well, I'll tell you. You can tax a driver to pay for a simple highway, one he uses every few days, and it makes sense, the user ought to pay, but it's going to be mighty hard to tax a man going one way for three more lanes going in the same direction and four more going in the other. The average man just can't use enough gasoline to pay for an eight-lane highway, unless they make cars that burn eight times as much gas, and I think they're working on that too.

The problem is too big for me, but if a man wants to go down in history two notches ahead of Thomas Edison, Alexander Graham Bell, Robert Fulton, and the Wright Brothers, let him invent a new source of tax revenue. And I think he'd better hurry.

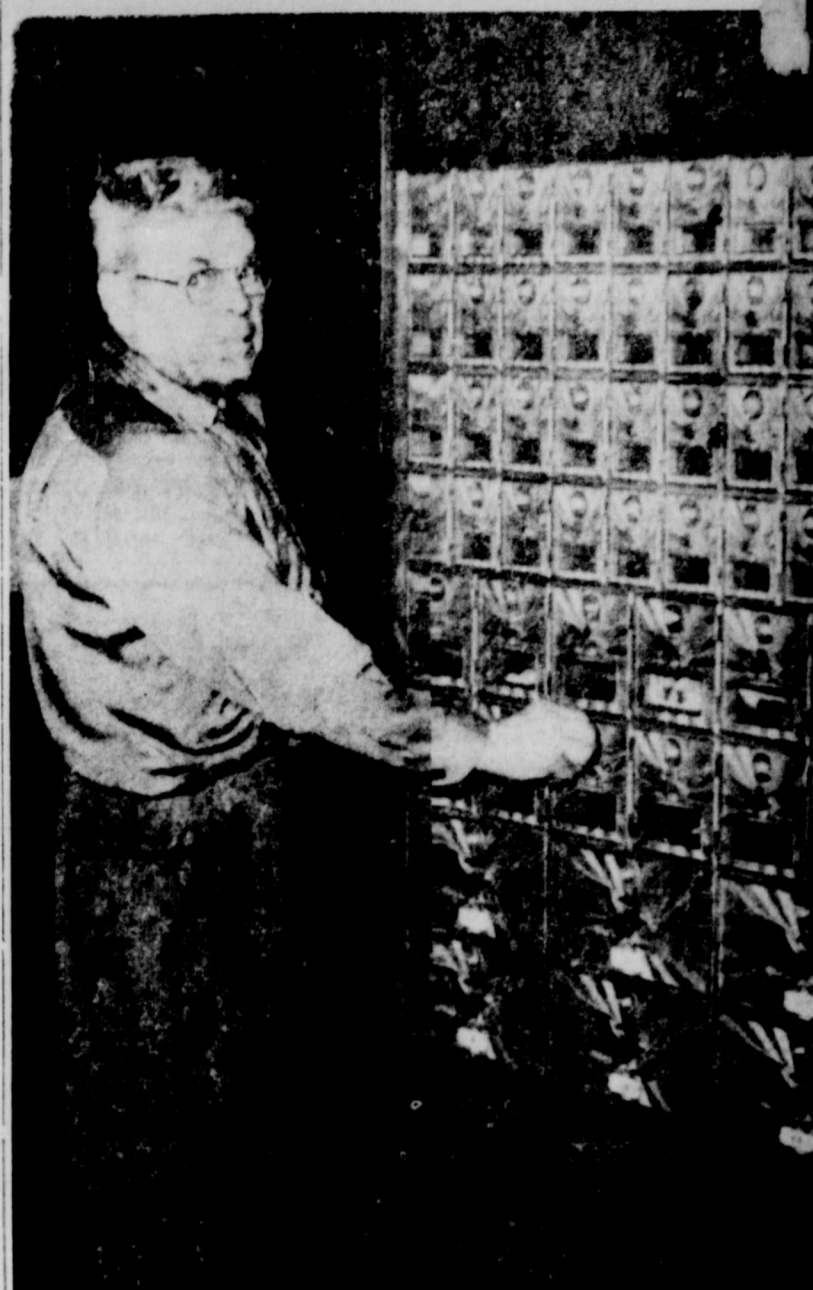

TEXAS SCHOOL PROGRAM

By Lee Barry

In the beginning Texas History reveals many brave and valuable soldiers who had little or no schooling. Most of the leaders were scholars of varied accomplishments. The leaders seemed to sense a need for an educational system. Merabeau M. Lamar, the second president of the Republic, is often referred to as the father of Texas education. He said "A cultured mind is the guardian genius of a democracy. When guided and controlled by virtue the mind is the noblest attribute of man". He urged that land from the public domain be set aside to establish primary schools and colleges so that every child in Texas might have an educational opportunity. Many thought that private and church schools would suffice but more and more people believed there should be a system of public schools. A small beginning was made under the Republic but little was accomplished. Governor Elisha M. Pease urged the passage of a bill providing \$2,000,000 worth of bonds be set

aside as a permanent school fund. The idea was to use the earnings of this fund to assist and encourage public schools. The first payment was, 1854, sixty-two cents per child. The next year the payment was \$1.50. At this time there were very few people in Texas. They were widely scattered, less than twenty towns had as many as 1,000 population. Any school that could be set up was necessarily poor. The per capita payment was fair and just as all school districts were poor alike.

Population and industrial investments have concentrated in certain localities, towns and cities have come into existence. Wealth often increased more rapidly than did population. Schools became larger and some very rich. The progress and development of industry, especially petroleum, has brought fabulous wealth to some rural districts. They had needed assistance and will need it again if the oil ceases to flow but they do not need it now. Other rural districts are little better than they were one hundred years ago. Then Texas did not have an adequate school program. Texas has never had an adequate rural school program. If a child lives near a city and can adopt city ways which are different from rural life, by sacrificing parental influence and weighing on home duties and obligations might have full participation in a city school program.

The greatest school need in Texas today is a rural school program. The greatest curse is the per capita payment. The Hale-Aikin committee missed the boat on both counts. No mention of either. They ask for more money to increase the maximum in rich schools while we are wasting money that is sorely needed to offer the minimum in poor districts. Thousands of rural children are offered less than the state promised minimum while we are wasting large sums of money through the per capita payment to rich districts that have more local money than is needed to give the maximum with all the trimmings. The legislature, the state board, the education agency and the supporting cast, some or all are responsible for this condition. If we can improve the distribution of state finances and put an adequate school program in reach of the rural children we will have enriched the state school program.

Texas is infested with a large number of self-appointed educational leaders who would try to level a piece of ground by taking dirt from low places to the hill. To improve the state program assistance will have to be applied where it is needed. State revenue is gathered from all the people.

The boys have won 7 and lost 15 games so far this season. The Miami boys are leading in conference play.

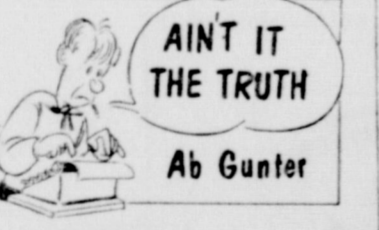
Two home games are scheduled for this week end. Shamrock visits Wheeler Friday night and the hard fighting Canadian teams will invade Wheeler Tuesday night.
