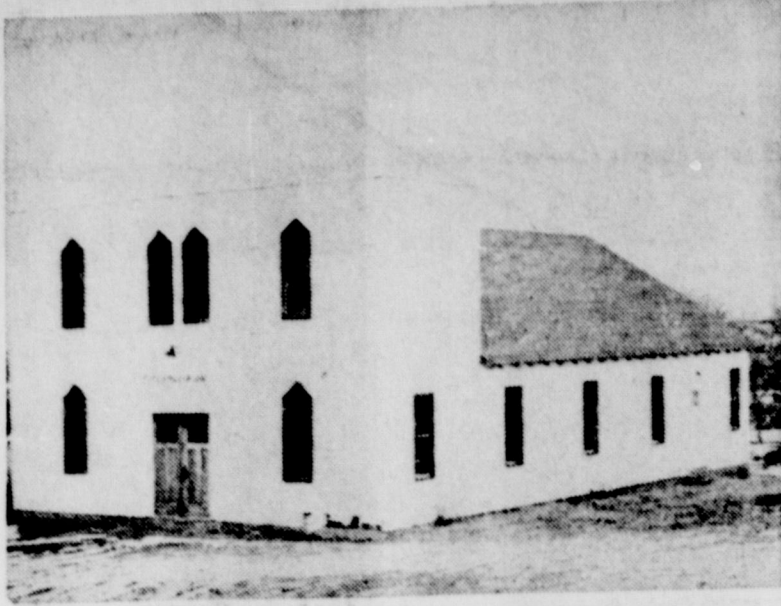

DON'T BE A QUITTER

Luke 18:1-7. That men ought always to pray, and not to faint; saying, There was in a city a judge, which feared not God, neither regarded man: And there was a widow in that city; and she came unto him, saying, Avenge me of mine adversary. And he would not for a while; but afterward he said within himself, Though I fear not God, nor regard man; yet because this widow troubleth me, I will avenge her, lest by her continual coming she weary me. And the Lord said, Hear what the unjust judge saith. And shall not God avenge his own elect, which cry day and night unto him, though he bear long with them?

Our text tells us of a judge who didn't fear God neither regarded man. There was a widow who came before him one day, and the Judge pronounced his judgement. The widow asked him to change his mind and he told her no. The next morning she was back and asked him to change his mind. Again he said No. The next and the next, and again and again she came back. The hard judge said listen woman I don't fear God and neither do I regard man No. This widow kept coming until finally he said though I don't fear God, nor regard man; yet because this widow troubleth me I will avenge her, lest by her continual coming she weary me.

If this widow would have stopped after about the third trip she would have never got the vengeance she thought. She refused to be a quitter.

When something new is started you always have lots of help. But when you are completing the very same task, there are but a few to finish up. Friends what kind of a person are you? Are you one of those that are willing to start but don't have the backbone enough to stay to the finish. Or are you one of the strong persons who is always one of the ones who stick a task out. If it's worth starting it's worth finishing. Don't be a quitter.

The first part of our text tells us to pray and faint not. When you start praying for something don't pray awhile and quit; keep on praying. In many cases we stop praying when the answer is about there. We faint. Friends don't quit. It's always the darkest just before dawn.

I remember an article in a Colorado paper that read like this: There was a young man who went to town recently. While he was at town it started snowing. He thought he had better get back home, because he lived quite a distance in the country. As he was on his journey home his car got stalled. He figured he had better start walking home. This young man got cold but thought he just had to keep on walking. After walking for hours he started getting warmer and sleep. This happens after a person gets so cold. He got so sleepy that he laid down to sleep awhile. He was found the next morning about 500 feet from his house door. He quit just a little too soon. Friends when you've started to do something for our Lord or our country have you been a quitter? Or have you stuck it out? Our country needs strong people who refuse to quit and most of all God needs strong people who will refuse to quit. Friends for our country's sake and for our Heavenly Father's sake . . . Don't be a Quitter.

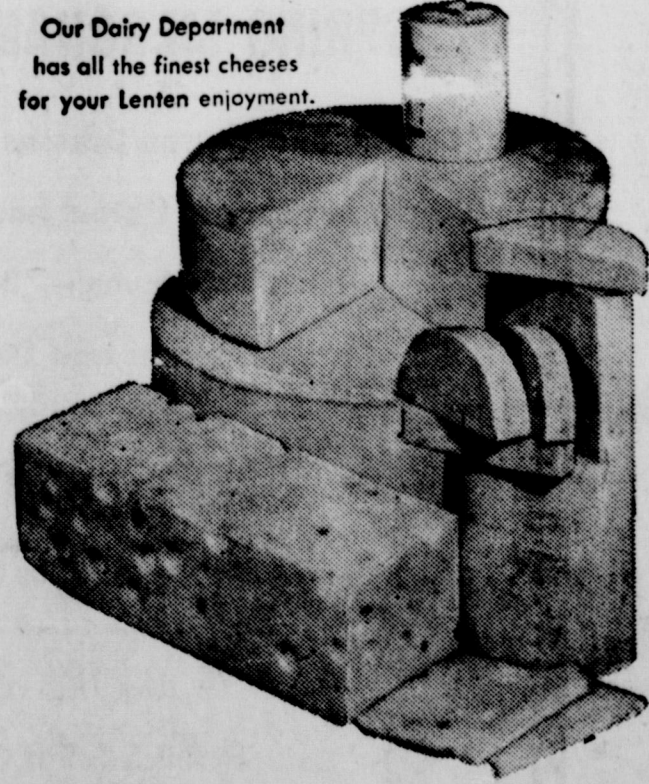

Assistance Available For Conservation Work

Is conservation being left out of your farm plans because of the cost involved? Would you include it in your plans if you could receive financial assistance and procedural advice? If you answer "yes" to both of these questions you may be interested in some programs that can help make this increasingly important practice a part of your operations, suggests Bryan Swaim, extension assistant soil and water conservation specialist. The Farmers Home Administration has money available to lend for soil and water conservation work, Swaim explains. As much as \$25,000 may be borrowed and paid back in 20 years or less. The Agricultural Conservation Program is a cost-share program which provides up to 80 per cent assistance for conservation practices. The Great Plains Conservation program, another cost-sharing program, provides assistance to 76 counties in the Great Plains area of Texas. It is administered by the Soil Conservation Service. All of these programs are designed to encourage and assist farmers and ranchers in carrying out conservation work, Swaim points out. Information on these and other programs and facilities for which you might be eligible may be obtained from the office administering the program or from your local county agent.

THE LIVESTOCK MAN Livestock are animals that are bred and raised to keep the producer broke, the commission man confused, and the buyer crazy.

The price of livestock goes up after you have sold and down after you have bought. A buyer for a Montana packer was sent to Chicago to watch dealings on the livestock market. After a few days of deliberation he wired his office to this effect: "Some say the market will go up and some say it will go down. I say the same. Whatever you do will be wrong. Act at once."

When you have light cattle, the buyers want heavy ones; when you feed heifers they want steers, and vice versa; when they're thin they should be fat, and when they're fat, the tallow market goes to (you know where!).

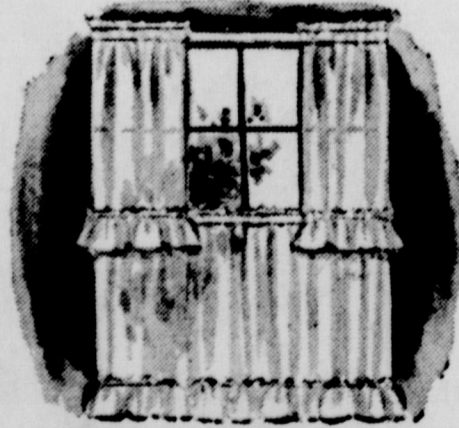

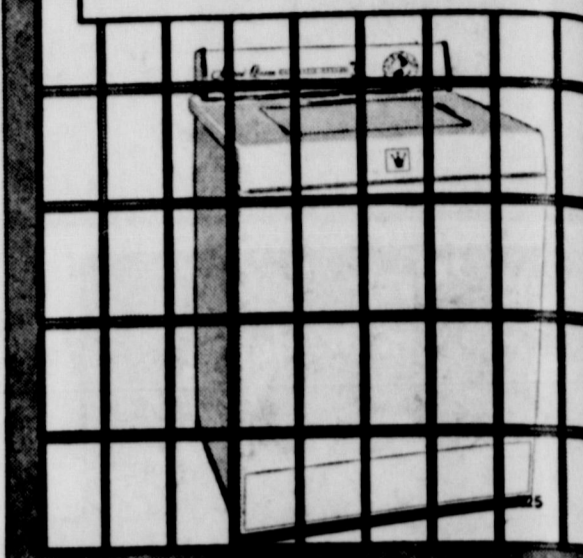
They were arrested at Pampa several weeks ago after running a stop sign and police officers discovered the stolen merchandise in their car.
