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An Editorial:

To Be Or Not To Be

There has been some talk lately about the possibilities of bringing industry of some sort to Wheeler and Wheeler County. This has been treated in the shoulder slugging manner reserved for wild ideas and the like but this writer feels that the "pass it off as foolish" attitude is completely in error due to the fact that there is no idea on earth formed by man that cannot be carried out by man in the way of material things if he is determined enough and gets enough help from his fellow men. This is also true in the realm of bringing industry to the Wheeler area. There is a motto that states that there is nothing impossible for a group of willing men if none of their number cares who gets the credit. Regarding the possibility of bringing some type of larger type business activity to this area this also holds true. The men and women who run big business are not asleep and realize that they have bargaining power in obtaining good locations for their installations but the very fact that they have worked their way to the top of their respective fields proves beyond a doubt that they will and do listen to good counsel and advice when it is actually good.

The only question actually existing in this area at the present time is: Do we want some larger type business activity in this area or not? If we actually want it we can get it with enough work and enough preparation in the right places and at the right time. To be or not to be, that is the question. Shall we actually be progressive or just lend lip service to progress. Shall we be content to sit and drink coffee over an idea or shall we know and feel discontent until something is done about the idea.

Wheeler county lies between two major railroads carrying any type freight East, West North and South. It lies between two and is on another major highway running from Coast to Coast. It is nearer to the heavily populated East than most of the Western part of the USA. For some time there has been an idea that lack of a railroad has hampered our progress but this is no longer true today. Generally speaking, nearly every railroad company in the US is in financial trouble because their methods are to slow and cumbersome for today's modern business methods. Everyone is swinging to highway and air transportation and yet we keep insisting that the lack of rail transportation is our trouble.

Wheeler is the center of an area comprising 16,000 people and yet we say this is just a little one horse town. Since the modern road program has been put into effect there is hardly anyone within 35 miles from Wheeler that is more than a mile or two from a paved highway and this puts any of these people within 30 to 40 minutes of the area around Wheeler. I imagine that the people in the so-called heavily populated industrial areas wish they could get to work this quickly. It will sometimes take a person in not too large a city more time than that required here to go a few blocks due to traffic. Miles are nothing in the modern age; time is the precious element and this area can offer business as good a time table as anyone.

RAPE SUSPECT TO BE TRIED MONDAY, MAY 11

Hare's trial was originally set for January 19. However, it was postponed until May 11 when the court learned that his wife was under treatment in an Amarillo hospital. She died February 3rd.

Hare will be present Monday morning, May 11 at 10:00 when his attorney begins the tedious task of picking 12 jurors from the 120 name venire.

To those pessimists, and barber shop philosophers that seem to enjoy casting a cloud of doom on every worthwhile community project. We want to commend you for the fine job you are doing in regard to the Farm Bureau Television Translator System.

The farm bureau officers and members that worked practically night and day to raise money for the project realize that, due to circumstances beyond their control, actual construction of the project has been delayed. Nevertheless some of the prophets of doom have already started predicting the downfall of the project. All of their predictions are, of course, without facts and based purely on their own imagination.

We admit that the delay is seemingly unnecessary but, would we want it any other way? Application for the permit to construct the 100-watt translator system is in the hands of the Federal Communications Commission and has been for sometime. And since this will be the first 100-watt civilian translator system in the world it naturally is taking longer to process the papers. Especially when you take into consideration the amount of paper work and investigation that is necessary before FCC will issue any type permit.

In the beginning, when farm bureau officials planned to construct only a 10-watt station, the permit could have been issued within a few weeks after the money was made available for the project. But the 10-watt station is not near as powerful as the 100-watt station. Surely we can all wait a few weeks longer.

BURKBURNETT PICKS BROWN FOR PRINCIPAL

A. E. Brown, who resigned as superintendent of the Wheeler schools effective July 1, 1959, announced this week that he has accepted the position of grade school principal in Burkburnett, Texas.

Brown will be principal of a new 12-classroom 280,000 school, which will be completed in January of this year.

Construction of the 12-classroom school began last week with January 17 as the target date for completion. The school, which will serve mostly Air Force families, will be part of the Burkburnett school system.

The school will have 12-classrooms, offices, auxiliary rooms and kitchen. The 16-acre site includes a large playground area. The school will be built with federal funds and administered by the Burkburnett school system.

It will serve the 500-unit Capehart Housing Area across the highway from Sheppard Air Force Base.

According to an official report from Burkburnett, Brown was picked from a host of applicants. He plans to take over his duties there on July 15. Mrs. A. E. Brown will serve as supervisor of the cafeteria just as soon as the new building is completed.

Date Set For Annual County 4-H Junior Rodeo

County Agent, Bryan Swaim announced today that the 4-H Junior Rodeo would be held at the Sheriff's Posse Rodeo Ground, Shamrock, Texas, Saturday, July 11, 1959. There will be a parade downtown Saturday morning. Afternoon performance and night performance.

Entry blanks are available at the County Agent's office, Wheeler Chamber of Commerce office, Shamrock, and from each 4-H club President. These entries must be filled out, properly signed and in the County Agent's office by 5 p.m., May 30th.

Events include bull riding, calf roping, 3 man tiedown, barrel race, potato race, goat tie-down and ribbon goat race. Each boy and girl going to school in Wheeler County is eligible to enter three events, but must list them in order of preference in case there are too many entries to run off in two performances.

The rules of each event will be published in the Wheeler Times prior to the rodeo. Stock committee for the rodeo is Ernest Henderson, Chairman, Clois Hanner and Cortez Barnett.

Anyone that has roping calves or riding stock that may be used in the rodeo please contact one of these men. Riding calves should weigh from 350 to 400 pounds. Proceeds of the rodeo go to the County 4-H Council.

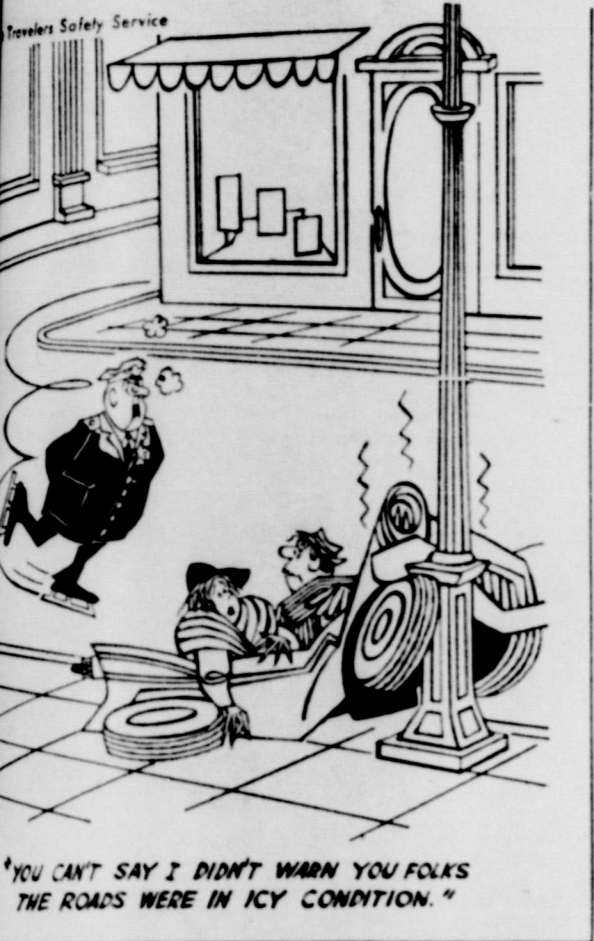

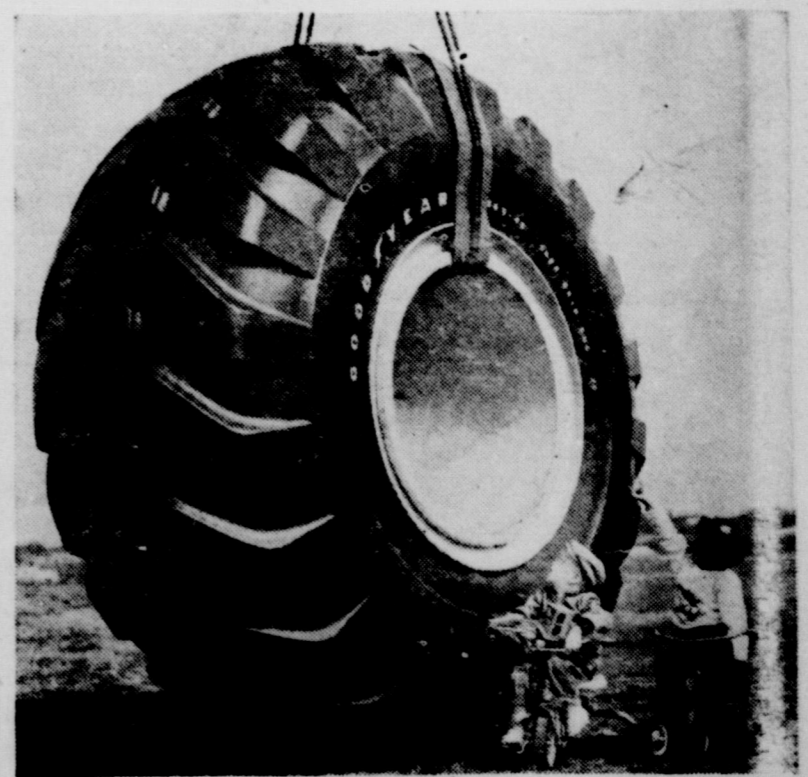

mong House members of someone's proposing at a later date to solve the problem by cutting the appropriation bill across the board to 4 per cent less than the 1958-59 budget. This would bring such violent reaction, it was thought, that both lawmakers and their constituents would be more receptive to new tax proposals.

Senate State Affairs Committee has indicated it has no intention of trying to shove through a tax program just to beat the May 12 deadline of the regular session. Full hearings have been promised for all viewpoints.

SEN. GRADY Hazlewood's bill to regulate milk imports is stirring up more commotion than a short in a milking machine.

Senate passed the bill and a sub-committee of the House Live-stock Committee approved it.

Bill would require that milk brought into Texas from other states meet same standards as those imposed on Texas producers.

Milk producers, who favor the bill, say it will protect consumers from unsanitary milk. Milk producers, who oppose the bill, report that all states have adequate sanitation standards. They contend the producers are seeking a device for excluding out-of-state milk so local prices can be jacked up.

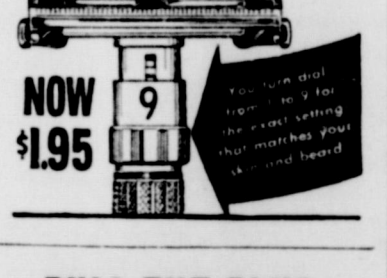
