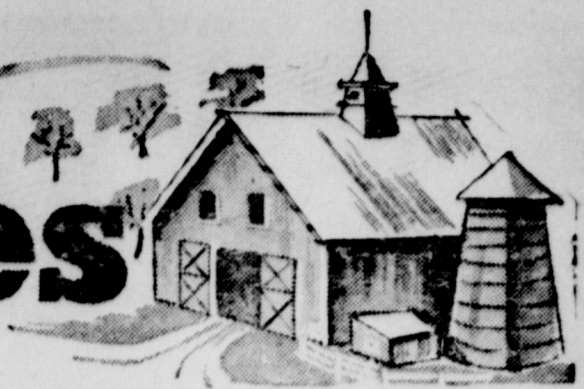

JOE P. WELDON IS PASTOR OF KELTON CHURCH

Joe P. Weldon, assistant pastor of the Parkview Baptist Church and senior student at Wayland College at Plainview has accepted a call from the First Baptist Church at Kelton. Brother Weldon assumed his duties as pastor of the Kelton Church about a month ago. He moved his family to Kelton 2 weeks ago.

While in Plainview he served as music director from October, 1956 until January 1, 1958 at which time he was hired by the church as full-time music director and assistant pastor. At the time Mr. Weldon came to the church, there was no organized choir. He began work immediately with twelve members. Their first program was presented at Christmas of 1958. At the present time, membership of the choir is 26.

During the first two years, the choir has made many public appearances over the territory, and has participated in the annual District 9 Music Festivals. The entire music program of the church was greatly advanced as a result of Mr. Weldon's leadership.

Mrs. Weldon worked as director of the Junior choir during this time, and added much to the Church choir as a soprano soloist.

Next year Bro. Weldon will drive to Plainview two days each week to complete his studies at Wayland. The Weldons have three children, Jody, 6, who will start school at Kelton next fall, Jane, 4, and Anne Marie, 2.

FOOD HANDLING SCHOOL TO BE HELD HERE

Two Sanitary Food Handling Schools will be held in Wheeler County during June. Charles Gragg, county sanitarian, announced this week.

One of the schools is scheduled at the high school auditorium in Shamrock, and the dates have been set as June 9-12. Two sessions will be held daily, the morning session from 9 a. m. to 11 a. m. and the afternoon session from 2 p. m. to 4 p. m.

The other school will be held in the grade school auditorium in Wheeler, June 14-18, with an evening session only, 8 p. m. until 10:00 p. m.

Teaching the schools will be Harry A. Smith, Public Health Inspector, Division of Public Health Education, Texas State Department of Health.

MIAMI TO HOLD ANNUAL COW CALLING MEET

Miami will hold its eleventh annual Cow Calling Contest and Pioneer Roundup Saturday, and the Miami Men's Service Club, which sponsors the event, anticipates a crowd of more than 2,000 persons from all over the Panhandle area.

The day's program will begin with a gathering of old timers in The American Legion Hall. Registration will begin at 9 o'clock and last until 11:45 when everyone will go to the Thompson Grove, one mile east of Miami, for lunch. The only admission will be a well-filled basket of food.

The cow calling contest, only event of its kind in the nation, will begin at 2 p. m., and an open invitation is extended to all plain and fancy callers to participate. There will be no entry fees and the winners will receive cash prizes through the courtesy of Miami merchants and individuals.

A beauty contest has also been planned for the first time this year, at which time some 20 of Miami's most beautiful girls, sponsored by Miami merchants, will vie for additional prizes.

The women's clubs of Roberts County will sponsor contests for the children, and a dance, sponsored by the Miami American Legion Post, will close out the day's activities. It will start at 9 p. m., and music will be furnished by a string orchestra.

19-Year-Old Found In Motel With 7th Grader

19-year-old Jerry Wayne Adams of Odessa, Texas was arrested in a Shamrock motel Monday after a Shamrock mother reported that her daughter had been out all night. County officers found the 13-year-old girl in the motel with Adams, she had spent the night there with him.

Adams was arrested and placed in the county jail and the girls mother filed "Statutory Rape" charges against him. His bond has been set at \$5,000, and he will be held in the county jail pending action of the grand jury.

In a conversation with the girls mother it was learned that Adams had been dating the 7th-grade girl for about a week, but, "he had been bringing her home by 10:30," the mother said. The mother became worried when her 13-year-old daughter didn't return home, she contacted the sheriff's department at 5:30 Monday morning and Deputy John Fopper found Adams and the girl in a Shamrock motel at noon Monday.

A "record and wanted" check was run through the state office on Adams and it was learned that he had served time at Gatesville prison for boys. His record also showed that he had been arrested on charges of burglary and auto theft.

Methodist Pastor Moves To Crosbyton

Wheeler lost one of its leading citizens this week when Rev. Carlton Thomson, pastor of the First Methodist Church, moved to Crosbyton, Texas where he will assume his duties as pastor this week.

Carlton, Waldean, Jane and Tommy have lived in Wheeler for the past four years. During that past four year period they organized the "Methodist Men", two WSCS circles and a very active "Young Couples Class".

Under Carlton's leadership the church building was paid off and a formal dedication service held. He was an active member of the Chamber of Commerce and Kiwanis Club. He worked with the PTA and was very active with area young people.

Rev. Thomson's wife, Waldean, was president of the Pampa district WSCS. She helped with the office work at the church and was head of the group that served the Kiwanians during the noon meetings. Waldean also served as a substitute teacher in the local schools.

JONES IS NEW PASTOR OF FIRST METHODIST CHURCH

Rev. Carrol M. Jones, pastor of the Stinnett Methodist Church since October of 1955, has been selected to serve as pastor of the First Methodist Church in Wheeler.

Brother Jones was born at Childress, Texas December 4, 1908 and as a boy he moved to the Hart Community in Castro County. Two years later his family moved to Olton, Texas where he graduated from high school. He attended the Wayland Baptist College in 1926-28 and was married to Ivela Bell in September of 1930.

Following his marriage Brother Jones served as principal of the Wildcat School near Vernon for three years. And for the next 8 years was superintendent of a

rural high school at Farmers Valley in Wilbarger County. In 1938 he received his M. A. in mathematics and school administration from North Texas State College, and from 1941 until '45 he was principal and assistant superintendent at Olton high school.

During the fall of 1946 Jones decided to give up school work and move to the farm in Bailey County. However, with the shortage of teachers he was pressed into service as principal and teacher in the Muleshoe school until May 1948 when he entered the ministry of the Methodist Church. He was granted a Deacon's Orders in 1951 and became county elder in 1953. He fully ordained elder in 1953. He served as pastor of the Y.L.

Progress Methodist Church during the first two years of his ministry. And in October of 1955 he moved to Stinnett where he served as pastor until now.

Brother Jones received a special Town and County Award from Northwest Texas Conference two years ago. He received a special award from Texas A and M Sears Roebuck-Progressive Farmer Rural Church Improvement Program in 1954. He has been CROP district supervisor for several years and in 1955 he went with the Texas Friendship for Korea along with 13 other "Texas Cowboys" to deliver 1,000 head of Texas livestock and other supplies to stricken Korea. He has also served as district secretary in Pampa District for the past three years.

WHEELER COUNTY SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

Recent rains in excess of eight inches over loaded many terrace systems in the district. Some few were damaged so badly that they will need a complete rebuilding. In many instances, a waterway would provide a safety valve to dispose of surplus water without damage.

Grasses suitable for hay can be grown in a waterway. Production is usually good because the waterway will get extra water. All water disposal structures should be designed to fit the area draining into them. Soil Conservation Service personnel assisting the district have engineering help available for such design work.

The ACP program has cost sharing available for shaping waterways and for seeding the grass to protect them. The Great Plains Conservation Program also has funds available to assist with this practice. When too much water accumulates, a waterway is the only solution to the problem.

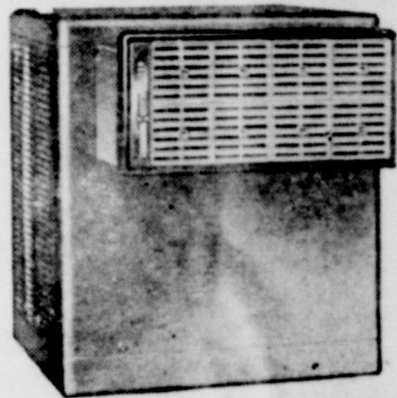

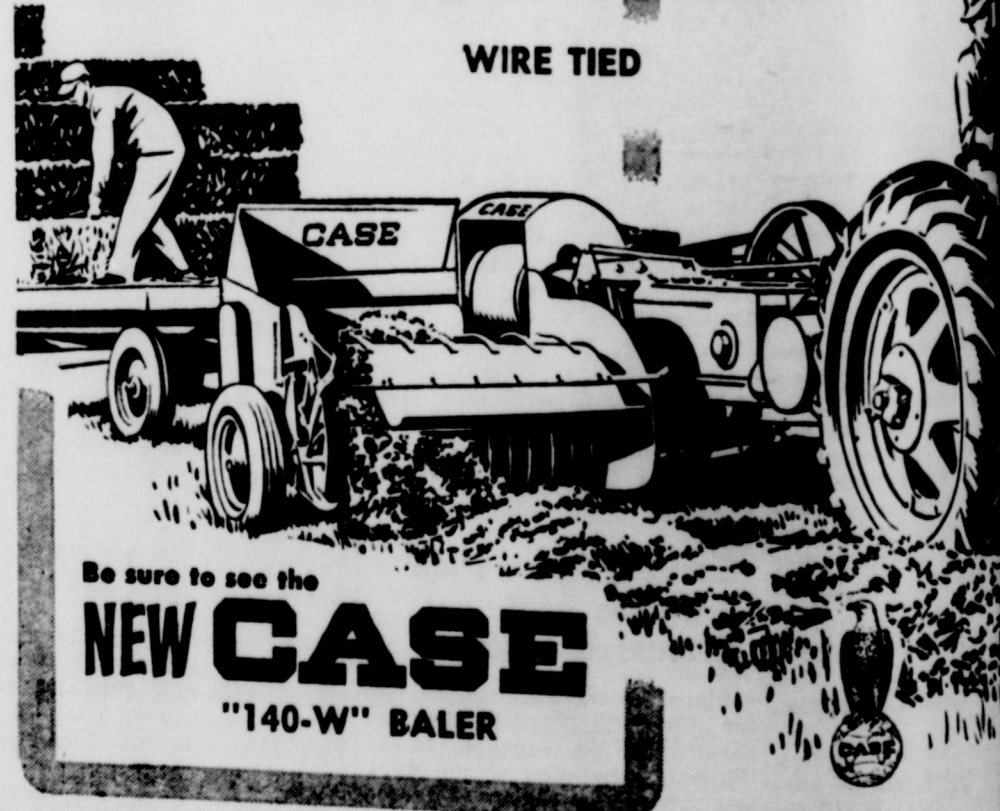

IN A LETTER from Representative Grainger McIlhany we learned that, "The House this week passed an Omnibus Tax Bill which would collect an estimated \$18,000,000 more annually through a "severance beneficiary" tax on natural gas; \$12,000,000 under a new formula of franchise taxes upon interstate corporations; \$11,800,000 by new taxes on cigars and other tobacco; \$10,500,000 by boosting cigarette taxes one cent a package; \$18,000,000 on utilities gross receipts; \$7,500,000 on motor vehicle sales; and \$8,000,000 on liquor and wine.

"An extra \$600,000 a year is expected to come from collecting taxes on special motor fuel through wholesalers instead of re-

tailers. This bill reduced taxes on sulphur production by an estimated \$900,000 annually. This bill will go to the Senate for public hearings, McIlhany said.

"The Governor this week signed the bill for Senator Andy Rogers which creates a Red River Authority," McIlhany concluded.

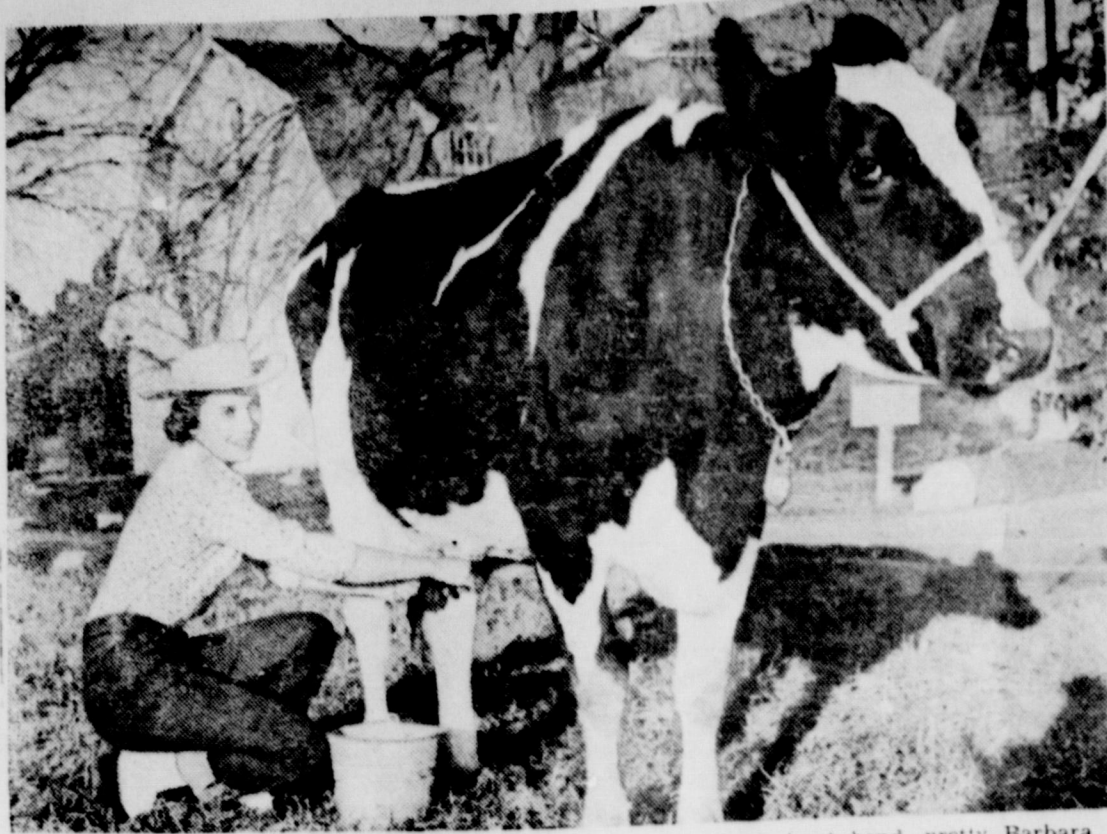
Area Children Urged To Keep Flower Scrapbook

Dear Editor:

It's a long way from this shiny farm out here to Bolivia in South America and I don't know any more about what's going on down there than the Bolivians know about what's going on out here, but it seems to me anybody who'd riot over what a magazine says is hard up for something to riot about.

As I understand it, a U. S. magazine quoted some anonymous person in the foreign service as saying the only way to solve Bolivia's problems was to abolish Bolivia, and the Bolivians rioted.

What I'd like to know is, what are they complaining about? U. S. magazines are always suggesting the way to solve the farm problem in this country is to abolish a lot of us farmers, but you don't hear of any of us rioting about it, do you? In the second place, abolishing a lot of us farmers might be an improvement, come to think of it but you don't want to carry this line of thinking too far. Although understand when I'm not plowing, that's no sign I'm mad. In fact, as a rule, I'm a lot madder plowing than not plowing.

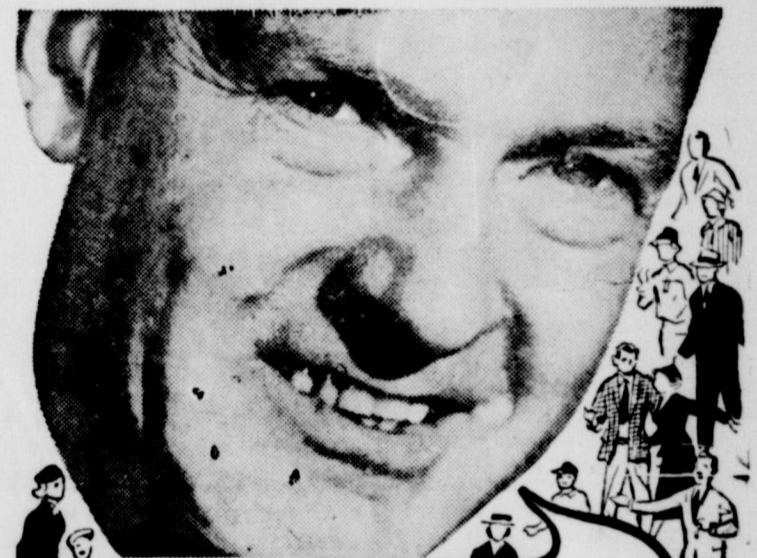

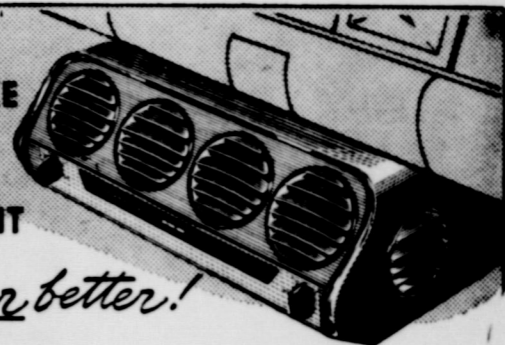
KELTON SENIOR TRIP
