Work Progresses Rapidly On Farm Bureau Translator System

COUNTY SYSTEM TO BE FIRST IN NATION

Approximately 75 percent of the translator equipment shack is complete and almost half of the 160 ft. tower has been erected and all of the electrical wiring in the building has been completed according to Odell Settiff, construction engineer.

Settiff plans to have the tower completed and the building painted by Saturday of this week. And if the heavy translator equipment arrives from Colorado on schedule we will be ready to start monitoring a signal by the middle of next week Settiff said.

Settiff explained that by monitoring he means to "work with the signal and picture from the two Amarillo stations in order to tune-in the best possible signal for the Wheeler County System." Channels 10 and 4 will be received on the Farm Bureau system.

Realizing that completion of the first 100-watt civilian television translator system is almost a reality, a special translator committee of the Farm Bureau met Tuesday night in Wheeler to discuss plans to incorporate the translator system and setup proper bookkeeping facilities.

The group voted to setup two offices for collection of the \$12.00 per year maintenance fee. One office will be located in Shamrock and the other will be located in Wheeler. Farm Bureau lawyers are drawing up documents to incorporate the system now.

In talking with local TV technicians this reporter learned that hundreds of requests for converters and special antennas have been pouring in. And many of the area residents have already changed their TV over to receive the UHF signal just as soon as it is available.

Looking at the Wheeler County System in a broader scope residents will find that the eyes of the United States and perhaps the entire world are focused upon Wheeler County and the Farm Bureau Translator System. Cards and letters from as far away as North Kingstown, Rhode Island have been received by the Times inquiring about the translator system. Residents from Hemphill and Collingsworth counties are especially interested in the outcome of the Wheeler System, since they are tentatively planning one of their own.

Perhaps we are spreading the roses too soon, but it seems to me that the Farm Bureau organization and its loyal members such as Clarence Zybach, Glynn Bell, Rayburn Hall, John Daberry, Benny Schlegel, Raymond Moore, Clifford Walsler, Farmer Hefley, P. A. Martin, George Richardson, Coy Revison and John C. Vise, to mention only a few, these men need a slap on the back and a word of praise. After all, they have made history, and who knows, they may even be mentioned in the history books that our children will be reading in a few years - the same history books that will tell of the jet age, space travel, atomic powered submarines and the like.

Yes, Wheeler County is indeed fortunate to have men like these with enough of the pioneering spirit in them to "get the job done."

ANNUAL TOP O' TEXAS RODEO SCHEDULED FOR AUGUST 3-8

Rodeo grounds are now undergoing a complete remodeling in preparation for the annual Top o' Texas Rodeo in Pampa, scheduled for August 3-8. The grandstand is being rebuilt and 42 new box seats are being installed.

For the first time in the fifteen year history of the show rodeo performances will be held five nights, with the first performance on August 4th and running through Saturday, August 8th.

Cowboys and Cowgirls from a wide area will be competing in the two go-rounds for some \$5000.00 in prize money plus many special awards, including a beautiful hand stamped saddle for the top cowgirl, and special engraved silver buckles for the champion cowboy in all individual events as well as the all-around cowboy.

Morris Stephens of Quitaque, Texas will furnish stock and direct the arena with Jack Johnson, prominent rodeo announcer calling the events. Stephens has been in the rodeo business for many years and has produced some of the outstanding rodeos in the country.

PENNINGTON SERVICES HELD IN WHEELER

Funeral services for William Edwin Pennington, longtime resident of Wheeler, were held Friday at 3 p.m. in the Wheeler Baptist Church with D. E. Douglas Carver of First Baptist Church and Rev. M. B. Smith of the Highland Baptist Church, both of Pampa, officiating.

Mr. Pennington was born September 29, 1867 in White County, Tennessee and died Thursday at 7:20 a.m. at Pampa.

He had resided in Pampa for five years coming there from Wheeler where he had lived and operated a general merchandise store for 45 years. Since moving to Pampa he had made his home with his son, Floyd, who operates the Pennington's Food Store at 1100 Alcock. Mr. Pennington was married to Miss Sarah Parthena, Pryor, in 1894. She preceded him in death July 4, 1935.

GOD STILL SPEAKS

Every man, regardless of his intellectual training, religious background, racial heritage, has certain spiritual experiences. The primitive man in the jungle and the cultured man of civilization share them alike. They are not the exclusive privilege of favored souls, but the common experience of all men.

There comes times when every man feels driven by great desires, hopes, and longings. He feels himself fitted for a finer and better life than the one he is living. There come up from the depths of his being, great, wistful longings; he is unable to dismiss the thought that he is capable of living a freer and fuller life than the one he is now living. His weaknesses shame him; and his sins are revolting.

Such experiences, coming up unbidden and apparently independent of any purposeful action of mind or will, call for an action of mind or will, call for an explanation. No one can be truly scientific in his analysis of himself who ignores such deep and searching spiritual pains. Just as pain is a warning that some investigation must be made, so these deep spiritual agonies are a warning that we are dealing with some powerful and significant spiritual force. They indicate the need of adjustment.

Something urges man toward perfections.

He is constantly seeking a better way of life - better forms of government, better techniques in the healing arts, more beautiful works of art and literature, wider ranges of knowledge, more complete control of the forces of nature, and more perfect mastery of himself. This holds true for both individuals and the race.

This experience of the "inner urge" is as universal as mankind. Different races and different individuals respond to these promptings in different fashion, but the differences in response only emphasize the similarity of the urge. And since the urge is neither an intellectual process nor a physical manifestation it remains to be recognized as a spiritual stirring.

Men have called these impulses by various names. The plain man on the street, untrained in spiritual matters, speaks of his "hunches." The college youth unable to identify the strange stirring of the spirit says, "I feel something inside of me." The Old Testament prophets declared that God spoke to them. Modern men speak glibly of conscience. But by whatever name, and on whatever occasion the impulse is recognized, the simplest explanation is that God still stirs the heart of man. The Father speaks to his children.
