WHEELER YOUTH RECOGNIZED FOR 4-H CLUB WORK

For the 17th consecutive year, the Producers Grain Corporation of Amarillo has recognized an outstanding group of Texas 4-H club members. Their sponsorship, in cooperation with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, of the Talent Club has brought recognition to 282 boys and girls from every section of Texas.

The 1959 winners, a boy and a girl from each of the eight director districts of the Corporation, were announced this week. They and the counties they represent are: Bobby Schwalk and Joyce Ann Matthews, both of Ochiltree; Dean Sims, Wheeler; Vivian Warminski, Carson; F. G. Colliard III, Potter; Nancy Parson, Deaf Smith; Alan Whitmore and Judy Dawson, both of Swisher; John Thomas Terrell, Hale; Barbara Ann Meador, Lubbock; Tom Parker, Ward; Patricia Ann Fell, Upton; Bobby Quisenberry, Hardeman; Becky Hemphill, Coleman; Dennis Huff, Jim Wells and Kay Botard, also of Jim Wells County.

The new Talent Club members will assemble in Amarillo on August 6. They will be guests of Producers at a get acquainted banquet that evening and on the next morning will tour the grain cooperative. They will depart after lunch by charter bus for Urbana, Illinois, and the national meeting of the American Institute of Cooperation.

Total attendance at the meeting to be held at the University of Illinois is expected to reach 3,000. Six of the Texans will serve as panel leaders and consultants on the youth part of the AIC program. The winners are due back in Amarillo on August 15. A county agent and home demonstration agents will chaperon the group.

THIN END OF COMMUNISM

If this government continues to buy up surplus products of the farm - such as grain, eggs, butter, pork, etc. - at prices that the farmers cannot get on the open market, there can only be one result of that economic folly: government bankruptcy.

In buying up those agricultural products the government has itself gone into the grain, eggs, butter and pork business. Its object was to help the farmers by maintaining market prices; but already the government has enormous stocks of those products on hand which it is selling to other countries at lower prices than those charged to the American consumers. Thus the government is entering into competition with the farmers by cutting prices in the foreign market, upon which the farmers have to depend for the sale of a large portion of their products.

The worst feature of this foolishness is that it is the thin end of communism, which eventually would have to be adopted through the government's appropriating all farm products and marketing them, as in Russia. This is a more sensible and businesslike system than the present one of subsidizing over-production and freezing vast surpluses at the cost of millions of dollars in taxation. Those taxes are paid by the American consumers of farm products, which means that they are paying higher than the market prices for their food, while the government is piling up surpluses at increasing storage costs annually.

Some years ago there was a popular outcry against the burning of food products in order to create a shortage and thus maintain market prices. And what is the difference between that and the government's creating a shortage by withholding and hoarding good food and rendering it valueless? Far better that it be destroyed outright in the first place, saving the expense of hoarding and preserving perishable commodities for no useful purpose.

1960 WHEAT MARKETING QUOTA REFERENDUM

A referendum of wheat farmers will be conducted in each wheat county on July 23, 1959. The designated polling places in Wheeler County for each community are as follows:

Under a wheat quota program, a farmers who complies with his allotment may market free of penalty all his wheat from acreage. If he grows wheat from acreage in excess of his acreage allotment, his "excess" wheat will be subject to the marketing quota penalty, which will be 45 percent of the wheat parity price as of May 1, 1960.

The amount of wheat subject to the marketing penalty - called the "farm marketing excess" is the normal production of the acres in excess of the farm allotment. If the producers satisfact-

orily establishes the fact that his actual wheat crop was below normal, however, the farm marketing excess may be reduced.

When the penalty is paid on the excess wheat, the producer may market all his wheat without further penalty. If the excess is stored or delivered to the Secretary in accordance with special regulations, the producer is free to market the remainder of his wheat.

None of the wheat from a farm with excess wheat will be eligible for price support.

TRANSLATOR SYSTEM TO BE COMPLETE SOON

The VHF antennas, amplifiers, tower housing and Stirlitz transmission line for the Farm Bureau TV Translator System arrived in Wheeler Monday, and construction engineer Odell Setliff moved the equipment to the tower site late Wednesday afternoon.

Setliff said that the VHF antennas and amplifiers will be installed within the next two days. And as soon as they are installed they will be ready to set the translators in place and mount the transmission antennas. The translators and transmission antennas have not arrived. They are being shipped from the Adler Company in New Jersey.

Setliff indicated that the system will be ready to broadcast within two days after the rest of the equipment arrives.

4-TIME LOSER BEING HELD IN COUNTY JAIL

Freddie Mitchell, 40-year-old Oklahoma City negro was charged with burglary and arson Wednesday following his arrest Tuesday in a Sayre, Oklahoma bus station.

Wheeler County Sheriff Bus Dorman said the negro broke into the home of another negro, Son Spencer, and stole 2 pistols, and 10 or 11 silver dollars. After stealing the guns and money Mitchell set fires in both bedrooms of the neat looking negro home and fled.

After leaving the burning home Mitchell went to the Shamrock bus station and purchased a ticket to Altus, Oklahoma with the silver dollars.

The fire completely gutted the Spencer home, however, upon investigation Spencer discovered that the pistols and money had been taken and he notified Deputy Sheriff John Topper.

Topper immediately checked at the bus station and learned that a negro had purchased a ticket to Altus using silver dollars to pay for the fare. Topper then attempted to catch the bus and Sheriff Bus Dorman notified Sayre authorities, who stopped the bus at Sayre and apprehended Mitchell.

After checking Mitchell's record Sheriff Dorman learned that he has served 4 prison terms. 3 for burglary and 1 for assault with intent to kill. Mitchell is being held in county jail. He will be arraigned before Judge Templeton Thursday.

GOSSIP

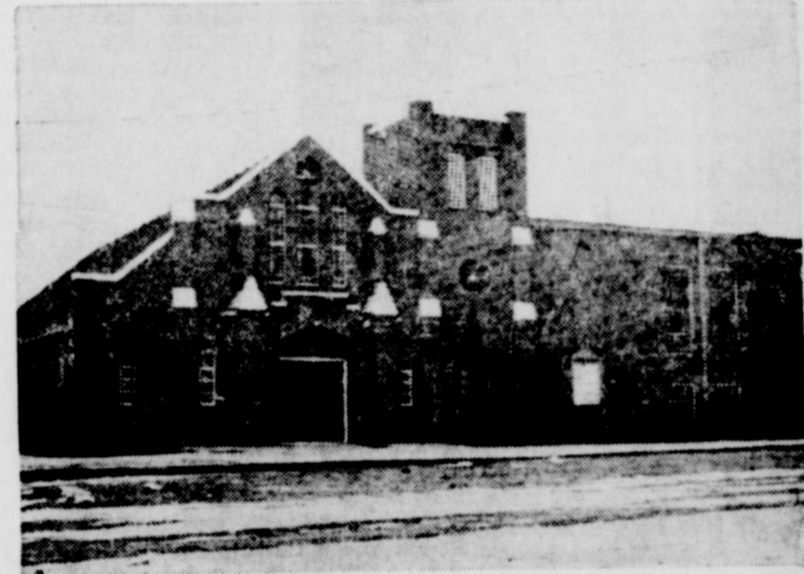

I'm sure that many times we all would like to take back something that we have said because it was not designed to help anybody. The wrong use of the tongue is considered as a fire by James in James 3:6 "And the tongue is a fire, a world of iniquity; so is the tongue among our members, that it defileth the whole body, and setteth on fire the course of nature; and it is set on fire of hell." When we see the results of a great forest fire, we should be reminded of the fact that just a small fire started the great conflagration. Just a careless match thrown to one side, or just a glowing coal not extinguished by some careless camper. Non-Cooperators will not be entitled to price support on the farm.

Just what are you voting for or against. It is not Acreage Allotments. You will have acreage allotments regardless of whether marketing quotas are voted in or out. You are voting for a price support of not less than 75% of parity to complying farms, if carried. Or if marketing quotas do not carry, price support to complying farms would be 50% of parity.

their grain by holding it and thus creating a shortage that would increase its market value. The market refused to pay the higher prices asked for wheat and the Pools were left with large surpluses.

In order to pay the farmers for their grain, the Pools borrowed money from the banks. That landed them into financial difficulties the result that the government had to back the loans and eventually establish a Wheat Board assumed full responsibility for marketing and the surpluses.

If it wasn't so financially serious, this government's buying and storing surplus would be funny. Imagine what would happen if the surplus were to be extended to other industries. The farmers would be relieved of the anxiety of being to market all their products, and the government would be swamped with surplus goods of all kinds, from automobiles to tooth brushes, for which it would have acres of warehouses in which to store them.
