Enrollment in Wheeler Schools Shows Increase

Enrollment during the first few days of school has been very high, and more students are being added daily, Superintendent Arling Cordell said Wednesday.

A total of 371 students had enrolled here as of noon Wednesday. That is 12 more than was enrolled during the entire term last year.

Cordell said the 1959-60 school term got off to a good start.

New teachers this year in addition to superintendent Cordell are: Darvin Wadsworth, business administration; Johnnie Frank McClellan, high school science; Mrs. Earle Ellis, junior high language arts; Mrs. L. B. Hill, 5th grade; and Mrs. Frank Weiss, 4th and 5th grades.

Inspection Period Opened September 1 For Motor Vehicles

September 1 marked the beginning of a new motor vehicle inspection period for more than four million vehicle owners in Texas, according to the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Inspection stations throughout the state opened their doors for the inspection period that runs through April 15, 1960. There are more than 400 stations in the state which have been authorized to check automobiles and trucks.

In announcing the opening date, Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, suggested that Texas residents have their trucks and automobiles inspected at the beginning of the period. This, he (Continued on Page 8 No. 5)

Gridsters Open Season Friday Against Strong Canadian Team

The 26 young and ragged looking gridsters that checked out uniforms last week to begin their conditioning workouts are quickly shaping into a fast and hard hitting fighting unit.

They will be given their first real taste of the pigskin sport Friday night when the Canadian Wildcats invade Wheeler.

Year before last Wheeler upset the big Canadians 13 to 6. However, last year the seasoned Canadian team downed the Mustangs 42 to 14.

The big Canadian team, rated number one in the district, is reported to have the heaviest team in this area.

Starting lineup for Wheeler this year will include: Jimmy Atherton at quarterback, Jimmy is a junior this year and weighs 155 pounds. He is an excellent passer and one of the strongest runners on the team. Jimmy will start at quarterback but there is a possibility that he may see a little action in the fullback slot. Starting fullback Marshall Watson has an injured ankle and may not be able to play Friday night. Atherton will be wearing jersey number 11.

Buck Holcomb will start at left end. Buck is a senior and weighs 150 pounds. He lettered last year at end and according to Coach Boynton is a "natural pass receiver". Coach Boynton had this to say about Buck, "Buck is a natural, he can catch a pass standing on his head, however, Buck needs to work on his hustle and team spirit."

A strong contender for Buck's end position is Wayne Hill. Wayne is a 150 pound junior and has a lot of hustle. He is especially good on defense.

Donald Gandy will start in the other end position. Donald saw enough action last year to letter, and has shown tremendous improvements this year. He weighed in at 155 and will be wearing number 13. Sophomore Larry Levitt will see a lot of action as a defensive end.

Jim Jolly and David Tremble are both working hard in the right halfback position. While Jolly is the fastest man on the team Tremble is a good defensive man and is showing a lot of possibilities in the backfield.

Translators Finally Arrive In County

It's here... The Farm Bureau Television Translator Equipment arrived at 4:00 A.M. Wednesday morning in Shamrock. Construction engineer Odell Setliff was busy all day Wednesday making preparations to have the equipment transferred to the tower site near Mobeetie.

Setliff said, "Wheeler County residents will definitely have television sometime this week end. I know we have had setback after setback but barring a catastrophe we will have both translators in operation this week."

But keep in mind Setliff said,

for the first few days of operation we will be turning the translators on and off checking the equipment and making adjustments, so please, don't become alarmed if the picture goes off, he concluded.

Before a translator system can officially go on the air, FCC (Federal Communications Commission) must be notified. So, just as soon as the system is completely checked out, FCC will be notified, the station will be inspected and put into permanent operation. KEEP YOUR FINGERS CROSS-ED.

SCHOOL TAX EXPLAINED

On Friday, September 11, the board of equalization will meet in the commissioners courtroom all day to discuss and explain the present school tax program.

Everyone in the Wheeler school district owning either personal or real property has been notified of the meeting.

As you probably have noticed, the assessed value of your property has been raised 7 percent, from 25 percent to 32 percent. Everyone in the Wheeler school district received the 7 percent raise.

In addition to the 7 percent blanket raise the valuation of some of the property in this district has been raised, and some has been lowered and some remained the same.

The board of equalization, appointed by the school board and made up of local men, has done its best to raise valuations where necessary and lower the valuation when warranted.

Here is the way your school tax is figured. For example, we will say the board of equalization valued your property at \$9,000. We then take 32 percent of \$9,000, which will give us the value of your property to be used for tax purposes, 32 percent of \$9,000 is \$2,880. Since our tax rate for the Wheeler school district is \$1.35 per \$100.00 valuation, we divide \$2,880 into the \$2,880 and we come up with 28.80. We then multiply \$1.35 times 28.80 and we come up with \$38.88, which is the amount of school tax a persons must pay on property valued at \$9,000.

VANPOOL-BURTON MOTOR CO. WINS TOP FORD HONORS

Approximately six months of investigation is necessary to determine whether a dealership is eligible, Moss said. First it's nec-

TOUR OF AREA DEMONSTRATION PLOTS PLANNED FOR TUESDAY

A Northwestern Texas Research Demonstration Tour will be held in Wheeler County Tuesday, September 8 beginning at 9:30 a.m. according to county agent Bryan Swaim.

Swaim has urged all area farmers and ranchers to make the tour. The group will leave the courthouse by bus at 9:30 a.m. Tuesday morning. The first stop will be 2 1/2 miles West of Wheeler where the men will see the Johnson grass control plot on the Edward Meek farm. A demonstration will be given on how to apply chemicals to Johnson grass

and visitors will be able to see the results of the five commonly used chemicals.

The next stop will be at the Fat Jones farm, 1/2 mile East of Wheeler. This demonstration plot shows the recommended rate as compared with check plot and four other applications.

At 10:40 the group will drive past a DeKalb Grain Sorghum Plot 1 mile North of Twitty. No stop will be made.

A coffee break will be held at the Bindweed Control Plot on the W. A. Jolly farm, across from the (Continued on Page 5 No. 1).

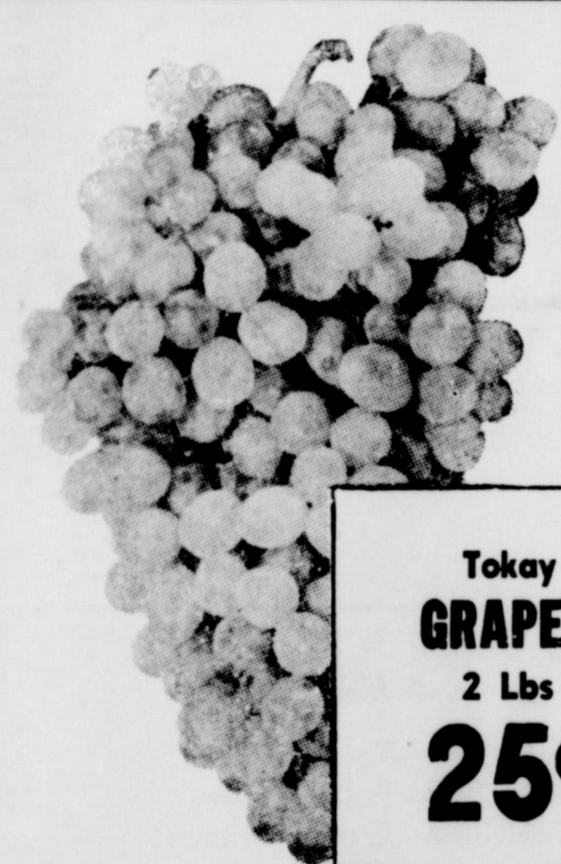

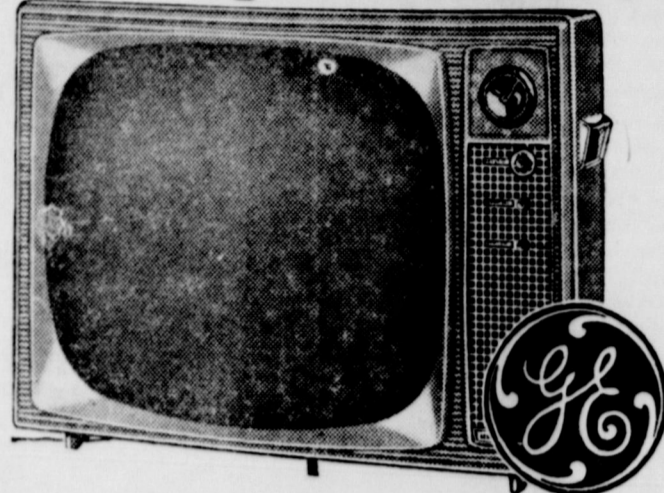

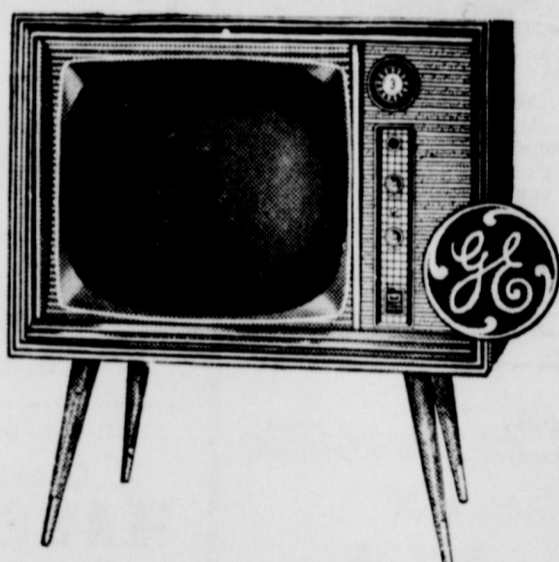

WHEELER . . . Boom Town U. S. A. . . Mr. Webster describes boom as meaning, "To have a rapid growth in market value or in popular favor; to develop rapidly in resources and population".

Here are the facts, you decide for yourself.

1. The Parker Drilling Company crew (15 men) has located in Wheeler during the past few days. Families included this means a population gain of at least 45 people.

The crew has already started setting up the rig and will be in operation soon. The well will be drilled on the Bowers Ranch several miles north of Allison. The foreman of the crew said the contract calls for a 20,000 ft. well. It will be drilled with air and will take at least a year. Possibilities are that the crew will be here for 2 or three years. 7. Construction will be completed within a few weeks on the new Mobeetie school building. Kelton has also just completed a \$37,000 remodeling project on their school.

8. Within the next few months the federal government will be spending between 50,000 and 70,000 dollars in Wheeler County as their portion of the disaster relief program as a result of the flood last spring.

9. Detailed planning is progressing rapidly for the construction of the eight dams to be located in the northern part of Wheeler County.

10. Several families have started construction of new homes in the last few weeks. And several pieces of property have changed hands in Wheeler during the past few days.

11. And Wheeler County will soon have the only civilian 100 watt TV translator system in the United States.

FARM PRICE SUBSIDY SENSELESS

You would undoubtedly howl like a banshee if Congress decided to subsidize the automobile industry to the tune of \$8 billion a year... with your tax money.

Or, put it another way, suppose the government guaranteed every motor car manufacturer \$4,000 for every car produced, and would buy all vehicles the automakers couldn't sell.

That, in a nutshell, is what is happening in the federal farm price subsidy program.

The farming industry is big business, no less than automobiles.

We are guaranteeing prices on farm production, encouraging over-production, and then buying all the farmers can't sell — with tax funds.

Farm price supports cost the U. S. taxpayer \$5.4 billion this year. All-time record wheat and corn crops this season will probably boost program costs to \$8 billion next year.

We have already bought \$9 billion in farm produce which we can't get rid of. It costs about \$1 billion a year in storage charges, on top of what we paid for it.

If the government was holding \$9 billion worth of surplus autos, and paying \$1 billion a year to store them, the Congressmen who voted for such an idiotic subsidy would be swept out of office to the last man.

Why should big farmers be babied any more than shoe manufacturers or any other producers?

When farm subsidies were first voted, they were intended for relief of the struggling, desperate small farmer.

Since then big farms have almost entirely taken over. Some huge farm operators draw down in excess of \$2 million yearly in subsidies.

Let's get back to some semblance of common sense. Some aid for the small, single-family farmer may be in order. (Even that can be argued.) But guaranteed profits for gigantic rural industrialists is ridiculous. No other industry is so subsidized.

There is a bill in Congress now to limit payment of farm subsidies to any individual or corporation to \$50,000 a year, maximum. It is a step toward common sense, but we should go farther.

Any individual who can qualify for a \$50,000 subsidy payment can't qualify as a struggling farmer. He doesn't need relief.

Let's limit the maximum payment to any farmer or farm corporation to \$15,000 tops per crop year, plus hail or drought insurance at reasonable premiums to protect against weather vagaries. That would be fair.

But let's get away from a senseless program that enriches one favored industry by taxing all other industries and everybody else, to boot.
