LARGE CROWD ATTENDS C OF C MEET TUESDAY

A large crowd attended the Chamber of Commerce meeting held Tuesday night at Nora's Cafe. Speakers for the evening included George Taylor, soil conservation supervisor; Charles Duncan, soil conservation engineer; and Mayor Thomas Daughtry.

Taylor and Duncan told of the progress being made on the flood prevention dams to be built in Wheeler County. Seven men, who will make up a detailed survey crew, moved into Wheeler Monday and started work on the project.

Informed sources say that actual construction of the dams will begin sometime around the first of the year.

Chamber of Commerce members voted to help with the project to the fullest extent. Mayor Thomas Daughtry discussed the project.

ANNUAL KIDS DAY PROGRAM IS COMPLETE

The program of activities for the annual Kids Day festival in Wheeler is completed, Lewis Lancaster, Committee Chairman announced this week.

The big "Kids Day Parade" begins at 10:00 Saturday September 26. It will assemble in front of the Methodist Church with tricycles entering at the Baptist Church. Parade judges will be at the starting point to look over the entries as they assemble. Dick DeArment, Bryan Swaim, Bill Owen, Jack Garrison, Richard Hampton, and Kenneth Farris are in charge of parade arrangements. First, second and third place prizes will be awarded to the best decorated bicycle. Three prizes will also be awarded in the saddle pony division.

Immediately following the parade the Wheeler high school band will present a 20 minute concert on the courthouse lawn.

The body lay in state at the Kirk Funeral Home Monday till 10:00 p.m. then was taken overland to the Murray Funeral Home at Durant, Oklahoma where funeral services were held Wednesday at 2:00 p.m. at Coleman, Oklahoma.

He was a member of Wheeler Baptist Church, and was a star football and basketball player during his school years.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. T. J. Joyner of Wheeler; a sister, Mrs. Jacqueline Dean of Pampa.

SCS MEN ARRIVE TO BEGIN SURVEY ON COUNTY DAMS

The Soil Conservation Service has assigned a detail survey party to begin operations on the Gageby Creek and Washita River flood project. The first of the crew arrived in Wheeler September 14. They will get the field information needed for final design on all the structures that have been cleared for right-of-way.

A core drill crew will arrive about September 28 to start test coring and fill material on the sites. These men are all here on a temporary basis. They will get information needed to let bids on contracts for construction of 5 to 9 sites.

About the time the first contracts are to be let, men will be assigned to the project to supervise construction and finish detail surveys of the remainder of the sites. No construction can be started for six months or more. The exact time cannot be set at this time.

The man in charge of the present party is Charles H. Duncan, Acting Project Construction Engineer. Assisting him are S. E. Pennington, E. W. Willis, J. O. Moore, T. F. Langseth and Roger Sockwell. The work these men are to do will take about two months.

The Survey Party has a temporary office on the third floor of the Courthouse. More permanent location of the party to follow has not been determined at this time.

Riding Club To Hold Quarter Horse Show

The Wheeler County Riding Club will hold a Quarter Horse Show on Saturday, September 19.

The show has been approved by the American Quarter Horse Association. Entries are expected from all over Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Kansas.

Trophies to be presented at the show have arrived. Entries will close at 12:00 Saturday and the show will start at 1:00 p.m.

Johnnie Rex McClellan, Clarendon, who comes very highly recommended, will judge the show.

Minimum requirements for a Quarter Horse Show: For a show to be approved and points awarded, a minimum of three halter classes for stallions and a minimum of three classes for mares must be offered. These to include yearlings, two year olds and three year olds and older, and a minimum of one performance class must be included. Performance classes and additional halter classes may be added if entries justify.

For a show to meet minimum requirements, there must be a minimum of twenty-four (24) horses entered and exhibited.

Rules of the Wheeler Show

1. This show is approved by the American Quarter Horse Association under the direction of the Wheeler County Riding Club, Inc. All quarter horses are subject to rules and regulations set up by the A. Q. H. A.

2. Eligibility: All stallions, mares, or geldings must be registered with the American Quarter Horse Association, permanent, tentative, or appendix. All stallions and mares that are registered in the appendix are eligible to participate. (Continued on Page 8 No. 7)

Crump To Head 'Dollars For Democrats' Drive In County

The "Dollars - for - Democrats" drive in Wheeler County will be headed this year by A. B. Crump, of Wheeler.

Announcing this today, State Campaign Chairman John Wildenthal Jr., said the annual fund-raising project would get under way on September 25 and continue through October 4.

All funds collected will go to the National Democratic Committee and will be credited to the Texas quota for the Party, Wildenthal said.

Calling for the co-operation of all Democrats, the drive Chairman declared:

"The success of this campaign will depend upon many individual contributors who are interested in keeping the Democratic Party responsive to the needs of the people.

"The Dollars - for - Democrats campaign gives every Democrat the opportunity to help build a stronger and more united Party dedicated to the cause of good government."

Wildenthal said the drive's activities in Wheeler County would be co-ordinated by Mr. Crump, and all precinct Democratic workers were urged to assist him in the campaign.

The general attitude of people throughout the county indicates that the majority of them are happy with the television reception they are receiving over the Farm Bureau Translator System. Nevertheless, a few isolated cases have reported that they are receiving little or no reception. The poor reception area seems to be centered around the Kelton area. Shamrock reports good reception.

A mobile unit equipped with a nine ft. tower and a T-24 Trio UHF antenna, a standard 17" portable television set, and a B-T Converter, has been touring the county this week, in an attempt to learn just how far the signal is reaching and to check on the reception in the different areas.

Monday evening the mobile unit along with this reporter, headed straight east out of Wheeler on highway 152 toward the Oklahoma line. The first reception check was made on the state line. A good picture was received, however, it contained quite a bit of "snow".

The next stop was made 1/4 of a mile west of Sweetwater, Oklahoma. At this point the reception was very good on both channels. No "snow" was present. From Sweetwater the mobile unit was driven 3 miles north on highway 30. Again the reception was very good. The next stop 11 miles North of Sweetwater also showed excellent reception.

A check showed positive reception at the intersection of farm to market roads 2124 and 277. The final check was made in Allison, where reception was very good.

The system is now operating under full power, however, technicians haven't started "cleaning" the picture yet. The final tune-up and alignment of the system will begin within a few days.

Construction Engineer O. E. L. Setliff explained that he was very happy with the powerful signal being put out by the system, but he was quick to point out that it will continue to improve as the equipment ages and final adjustments are made.

MUSTANGS TROUNCED BY TIGERS 36-14 BEFORE CAPACITY CROWD

Before another fine crowd at Nicholson Field last Friday night, the Wheeler Mustangs went down to defeat for the second time this season. This time at the hands of the McLean Tigers to the tune of 36-14.

The Tigers won the toss and chose to receive, defending the south end of the field. The handwriting seemed to be on the wall as the Tigers took the opening kick-off and marched down the field for their first touchdown. David Crockett, a fine 175 lb. fullback, led the attack and scored from two yards out to climax a 59 yard drive in 12 plays. Woods ran for the extra point and the Tigers boosted the first 8 points on the new scoreboard. Crockett scored again a short time later and after the try for point failed, the Tigers led by 14-0. That was the score as the first quarter ended and it was with alarm for Mustang fans as the local team had the ball for only 5 plays in that quarter.

Early in the second quarter, the smooth operating Tiger machine launched another drive for paydirt. The Mustangs were forced to punt and the Tiger line swarmed through and blocked it and took over on the Wheeler 31 yard line. Watson took over the chores on this drive and accounted for 23 of the yards on the drive. . . the last drive by Watson being for 9 yards and the TD. Willingham ran for the extra point and the Tigers left the field at halftime with a 22 point lead.

The third quarter started much in the same manner as the first with the Tigers eager to cross the goal. After recovering one of the four Mustang fumbles of the evening, the Tigers marched again. Taking over on the Mustang 35 yard line, the Tigers were penalized for offside the first play and after a yard gain by Willing-

ham, Crockett set sail on a 39 yard scamper to paydirt. The try for the extra point failed and McLean was ahead 28-0. On the kickoff, the Tigers recovered an offside kick on the Mustang 49 and proceeded to go that distance for their final score of the evening. Woods went over from the 1 on a quarterback sneak. Woods passed to Cash for the extra point and the score rose to 36-0.

The Mustangs finally got their offense to moving in the final stanza against a mixture of Tiger regulars and reserves. Recovering a fumble on their own 31, Wheeler started moving the ball. Atherton mixed passing with runs and Mustang hopes rose. Trimble made several nice gains and combined with three pass completions the Mustangs were on the Tiger 8. From there, Atherton passed to

Holcomb and the lights blinked on the scoreboard for the Mustangs for the first time this season. Cox ran the extra point and the Mustangs raked up 8 points. The joy of the first touchdown was soon gone as the big boy of the Tigers, Crockett, broke loose on what looked like a 56 yard run for the TD but McLean was guilty of holding and the Tigers were forced to punt. McLean punted to the Wheeler 31 and with the minutes ticking away, the Mustangs started on another 69 yard drive to paydirt. The big play in this drive was a 23 yard keeper by Atherton to keep Mustang hopes alive. On the last play of the game, with time gone with the snap, Trimble scored from the one and with the try for point failing, the final score read McLean 36, Wheeler 14.

Crockett was the big gun for the Tigers gaining 195 yards on the ground but the other Tiger backs also had a big night with Watson making 88 yards and Lee rushing for 53. The McLean forward wall outcharged the Mustang line offensively and defensively throughout the game and this coupled with poor blocking and tackling of the Mustangs, added to the Tigers yardage and complete domination of play. More time than not, the Mustangs would attempt to tackle the ball carriers high and they would either shake them off or carry them for good gains. Coach Boynton said after the game that it looked like his boys were in a rodeo instead of a football game.

Cox was the leading ball carrier for the Mustangs with 33 yards gained with Trimble only a couple of yard back with 31. Atherton passed well and his receivers showed up much better than in the Canadian ball game. Several Mustangs came up with good defensive plays but on a

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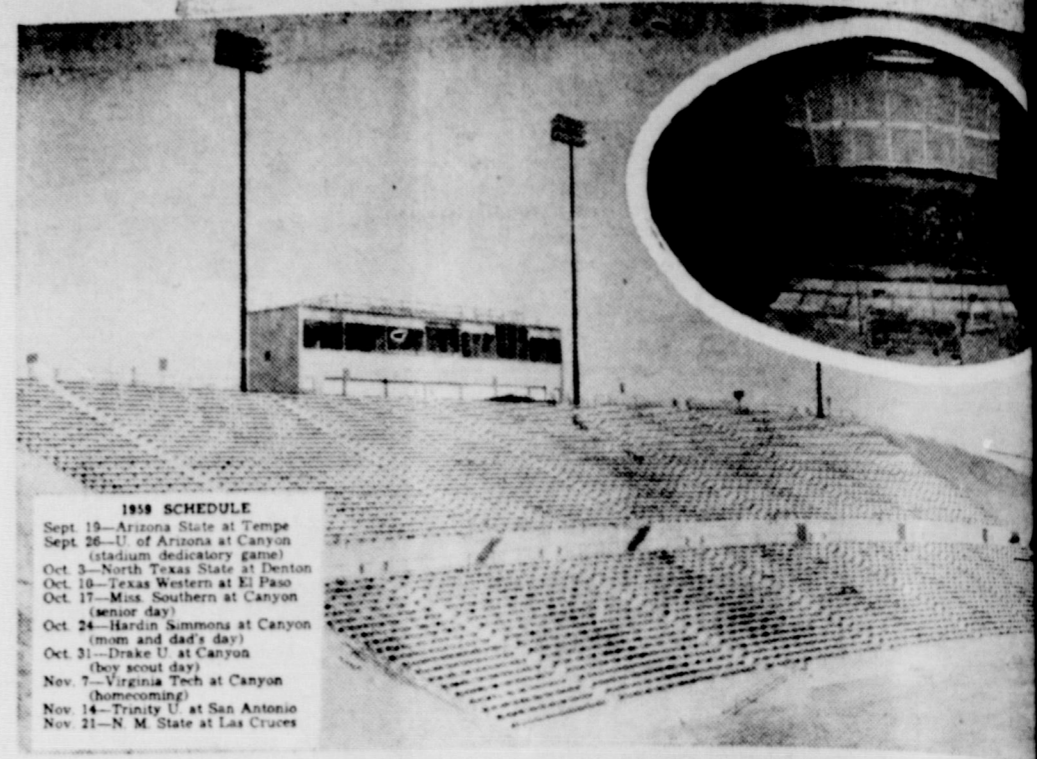

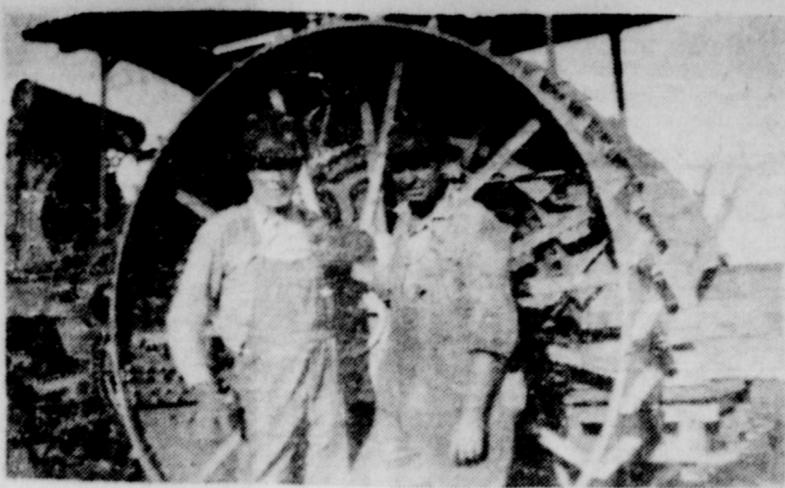
