## ONE KILLED AS CAR OVERTURNS NEAR LAKETON

Earl L. Scroggins Jr., a 36-year-old Cheyenne, Okla., funeral home manager, became Gray County's sixth highway fatality Sunday evening.

Scroggins died about 8:50 p.m. when his 1954 Buick plunged off State Highway 152 into a 30-foot deep culvert about one mile east of Laketon.

The accident occurred on a stretch of highway currently under improvement from Laketon to the Wheeler County line. No warning signs or lights were posted on the highway at the point of the accident, according to highway patrolmen.

Investigating Patrolmen Travis Underwood and Standley Schneider said Scroggins had just passed over a small hill headed toward Pampa. Unable to make a curve near the bottom of the hill, the Scroggins car went off the road, flipped and landed on its top and then made one complete rollover.

Scroggins was thrown from the car and was pinned halfway under the rolling car.

The wreck was discovered minutes later by a passing motorist, Ted Atwood, 409 Magnolia. Atwood drove to Pampa and reported the accident to Underwood. A second motorist, Harold Hall, 1922 N. Wells, saw the wreck and drove into Laketon to report the accident.

## BUS DORMAN TO SEEK RE-ELECTION

Bus Dorman, who has established a commendable record as sheriff of Wheeler County, this week authorized the Times to announce his candidacy for re-election to that post.

Sheriff Dorman said he was announcing his candidacy early because of the new election laws which moves up the deadline for filing to February 1 and the date of the first Democratic Primary to May 7.

In past years, Democratic Primaries have been held in July.

"In submitting my candidacy for re-election as Sheriff of Wheeler County, I would like to renew the pledge I made when I first asked the voters for their support. That pledge is that I will strive to serve all of the people to the best of my ability, showing no favors to individuals or groups," Sheriff Dorman said.

"I am sincere in believing that I have fulfilled that pledge during the time I have served as a peace officer of Wheeler County. If you good people of the county see fit to re-elect me, I shall continue to serve you in the manner in which you so rightly deserve," he declared.

Sheriff Dorman is 45 years old and a native of Wheeler County. He was born in the Twitty Community and grew up in Wheeler and Collingsworth Counties. He became popular in his 'teens as a sandlot baseball pitcher, and later played professional baseball.

He is married to the former Myrtle Green of Twitty and they have three children.

"It has been a pleasure to serve you as sheriff, and I want to express my appreciation to all of you, who through your splendid cooperation, have made my duties easier to handle.

"I would like for all persons to check the records of my office and if, in so doing, they find I have executed my duties in a satisfactory manner, I will sincerely appreciate your vote and support in the coming election," Sheriff Dorman stated.

## Firemen Answer 3 Alarms This Week

Wheeler volunteer firemen have answered three fire alarms during the past few days.

Last Wednesday afternoon they were called to the "old Stevens" place 9 miles southwest of Wheeler where they extinguished a small grass fire.

On Friday night the Wheeler department along with the sharnock fire department was called to the Jack Young farm near Laketon. Again they quickly extinguished a small grass fire.

And at 11:30 A. M. Wednesday morning the fire alarm sounded again. This time the firemen and volunteers were only able to contain the blaze after it had burned 200 acres of grass and destroyed one combine and damaged another. The fire was on the Gordon Stiles ranch east of Wheeler.

Mr. Stiles said the motor on one of the combines caught fire and sparks from the motor ignited the pasture. Both combines and crews were from Carnegie, Oklahoma.

## For Want Of A Nail

AS THE ANCIENT ballad tells, for want of a nail a kingdom was lost. A modern paraphrase could be that for want of the right kind of advertising great amounts of business are lost.

The Windsor (Mo.) Review, points out that "The chief competitors of the small city retailers are not other local merchants. His most serious competition comes from nearby metropolitan centers." Prices on standard brands of merchandise, the Review goes on, are virtually the same everywhere. Low overhead sometimes gives the small-town retailer a competitive advantage over the big city merchant. So the Review asks and answers a question: "Why, then, do so many shoppers travel fifty or a hundred miles to buy the same items they could obtain at home for the same price? Many retailers who ask this question should look to themselves to find the blame. Inadequate advertising is likely to be the answer."

The merchant who just opens his doors and waits for the customers to enter, without attracting them through advertising is going to do a minimum of business. The merchant who sees to it that people know what he has to offer is going to do the maximum. And the local newspaper is the outstanding advertising medium for the retailer.

## AREA KIDS TO TRICK OR TREAT FOR 'CROP'

In 250 communities in Texas young people are organized for "Trick or Treat" for CROP at Halloween. Organization is underway in our community. Detailed plans are being worked out so that the youth of the community will be calling on you Halloween, not for the traditional handouts of candy, cookies and apples - no Halloween is different now. They will give you the opportunity to make a cash contribution to help send food to the starving people overseas. Our young people want you to know that they really care that two-thirds of the people of the world never have enough to eat. They are doing this through Trick or Treat for CROP - the Christian Rural Overseas Program.

CROP was organized in 1947 because a group of Christian people heard of the terrible want overseas. Some had actually seen it and reported it "almost unbelievable." That need is still with us. Does it matter to you that so many are destitute? To some, it doesn't. ## OCT. 30 DATE FOR DRAWINGS ON DEER HUNT

AUSTIN, Oct. 22—Applications now are being received by the Game and Fish Commission for free deer hunts on five management areas in Texas. However, only two weeks remain before the 9 a. m. October 30 deadline for entries.

Requests for application blanks for the hunt should be sent immediately to the Commission offices in Austin. Approximately 2,000 permits will be issued by the Commission this year, but to be eligible for one of these permits your application must be in Austin in time for the public drawing following the deadline.

The areas to be hunted are the Kerr, Engeling, Angeline, Black Gap, and Sierra Diablo. All permits issued will be for 2-day hunts except for the Angeline area where one day permits will be issued.

A total 360 permits for a desired kill of 160 deer will be issued for the Kerr area; 150 permits for the Engeling area for 75 deer; 700 permits for 110 deer on the Angeline area; 400 permits for 160 deer on the Black Gap area; and 80 permits for 40 deer on the Sierra Diablo area.

Only persons 17 years or older will be permitted to hunt on these areas, according to the director of Wildlife Restoration, Texas Game and Fish Commission. Applications can be filed on a party system, with not more than four persons in the party.

Mustang band members were happy last Thursday when their new shakes and plumes arrived from Ostwald Uniform Company of New York.

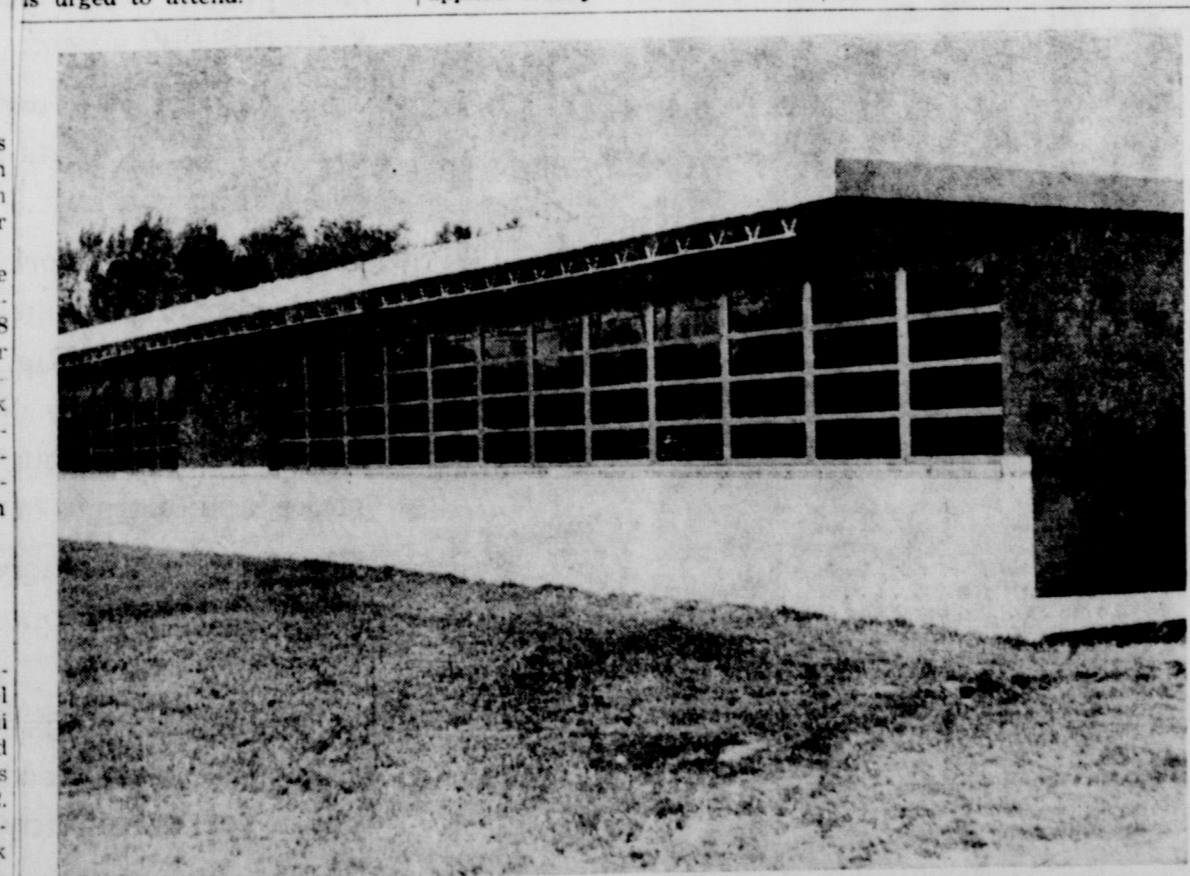
With the new shakes and piecing together other uniforms the band was able to perform in full uniform with the exception of the drum major.

## WHEELER COUNTY SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

Fall weather brings out the urge to oil up the old shotgun. It is most noticeable on years when game is plentiful. Upland

game birds and deer have been increasing for several years. This should be an outstanding year for shrubs will stop the erosion and hunters.  
 Game birds will increase rapidly when they have cover and food. Cover is probably most important in this area. Good conservation on the land will make more hunting. Most game lives on range and cropland that is

used primarily for agricultural production. This is just an incidental benefit to good management.  
 There are many small areas from less than an acre in size to four or five acres that should be set aside as permanent homes for wildlife. Gullied areas, blowout holes and odd areas make good wildlife areas. In many cases, a fence will control a bad gully by

just preventing overgrazing. Plantings of grass, trees and furnish cover and food for game. Trees such as cedar and pine may be obtained from the Texas State Nurseries for a nominal amount. They usually cost about \$1.25 per hundred delivered. The County Agent or the Soil Conservation Service personnel assisting the District will assist a farmer to order trees and advise

him on the planting. Wildlife is a great community. Property can add materially to of any locality.

The event is sponsored by the Youth Activities Committee of the State Fair of Texas and funds for the dinner are provided thru the Dallas Chamber of Commerce.

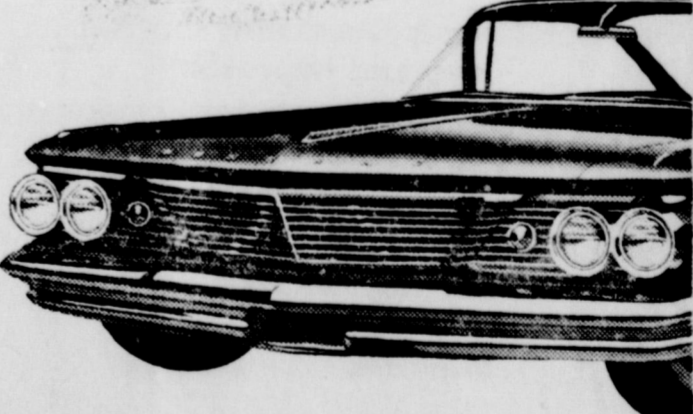

Be you six or sixty the news that franks are on the Cookout bill of fare is almost sure to bring a grin of anticipation. But just wait until you taste them with this good, new and so—easy-to-make relish!

**Hot Dog Relish**

2 cups chopped ripe tomato	1 teaspoon celery seed
2 cups chopped green tomato	1/2 cup sugar
2 cups chopped cucumber	1 tablespoon salt
1 cup chopped onion	2 teaspoons dry mustard
1 sweet red pepper	1 1/2 cups vinegar

Wash and drain vegetables. Scald, core, and peel ripe tomatoes. Core but do not peel green tomatoes. Cut blossom and stem ends from peppers; discard seed. Peel onion. Chop vegetables and squeeze to remove juice—saves cooking time.

Mix all ingredients and cook until the liquid part is about as thick as Chili Sauce. Taste and add more seasoning if desired. Watch it! If too highly seasoned the relish will mask rather than enhance the flavor of frankfurters and wieners. Pour boiling hot relish into hot fruit jar. Put dome lid on jar, screw band tight.

**FACULTY IN-SERVICE TRAINING PROGRAM IS USED IN WHEELER**

As a result of eleven State Curriculum Commissioners' recommendations made last year, the Wheeler Faculty is using the materials gathered by the Commissioners to begin a continuous program of evaluating the school.

Major areas to be covered are the Language Arts, Mathematics, Science, Social Sciences, Vocational Education, Business Education and Guidance. When the standards recommended by the Curriculum Commission are thoroughly studied, Teacher Committees will use them to evaluate our total school program. Plans can then be made to strengthen areas of weakness, and to point out areas of strength.

Of particular interest at the present time, is the school's program of Guidance and Counseling. Last spring Achievement and Intelligence Tests were given to the seventh grade students. The results are now being used to counsel with them so that they can improve needed abilities, and also to help the pupils and their parents to plan for High School and College training. This Counseling is being carried on by Mr. Cardell and Mr. Helton.

This year the seventh grade will again be given the complete battery of Achievement Tests and Mental Maturity Tests. Aptitude Tests will be given to all Freshmen, and the complete battery of Advanced Achievement Tests will be given all Seniors. Parents are especially advised to consider these test scores together with the teachers and pupils in attempting to point out individual weaknesses and strengths, to help them

to improve, and to plan for the future.

In time the school hopes to increase the testing program to cover all grades.
