## 3 YOUTHS ARE ARRESTED IN SHAMROCK AREA

Two youths, 23 and 17 and a 14-year-old pregnant girl were arrested Friday 8 miles East of Shamrock by highway patrolmen Dave Crosslin and Bill Lusk on suspicion of car theft.

They were placed in the Wheeler County jail and later transferred to Amarillo where state and federal charges of car theft were filed Monday.

Officers in Guthrie, Texas, plan to prosecute the trio for the burglary of a service station.

A detective said the 20-year-old youth and girl left their homes in Tipton and Arcadia, Ind., in July and has been touring the country in stolen cars and supporting themselves by burglaries.

A final count indicated that they were wanted in at least 5 different states for car theft or burglary.

A week ago they met the 15-year-old youth, also from Tipton, stole a car in Little Rock, Ark., and headed west.

Shortly before 5 p. m. Friday, Glenn Miller of 1109 N. Arthur saw them changing license plates from the Little Rock car to another car. He contacted authorities. At 6 p. m. Highway Patrolmen Bill Lusk and Dave Crosslin arrested them east of Shamrock on Highway 66.

The patrolman said the trio was armed with a 22-rifle, rubber hose, chain and lead pipe. They offered no resistance to arrest.

The car stolen in Amarillo was taken from a supermarket parking lot in Amarillo and is owned by R. C. Montgomery, 400 N. Lincoln.

Deputy Sheriff T. H. Nail and Detective Sgt. Don Prather returned the prisoners to Amarillo.

## LUKE HENLEY IS CANDIDATE FOR SHERIFF

Luke Henley, a resident of Wheeler and Gray Counties for the past 38 years, this week announced his candidacy for the office of Sheriff of Wheeler County.

His candidacy will be subject to the action of voters in the Democratic Primary which this year will be held in May.

Mr. Henley has had eight years of service as a peace officer three of which he served as deputy sheriff in Wheeler County.

"I feel that the experience I have gained in law enforcement work qualifies me for the important job which I seek. I am in position to understand fully the duties to be performed, and it is my sincere pledge that if the good people of the county see fit to elect me, I will serve without partiality, showing no favoritism to anyone breaking the law, regardless of whom it may be."

Mr. Henley is 52 years old. He and his wife, Eula, make their home in Shamrock, where he is currently employed as a carpenter.

A veteran of World War II, Mr. Henley served two years with the 147th Infantry Division, seeing action in the South Pacific.

He stated: "In submitting my candidacy for election to the office of Sheriff of Wheeler County, I would like to say simply this: 'I would like very much to serve you as Sheriff. I feel that I am well qualified for the job, and to those who do not know me I would like very much for them to check my record as a peace officer in both Wheeler and Gray Counties.'

"If you see fit to honor me by electing me as your Sheriff, I shall devote all of my time to the office, serving all the people to the very best of my ability, and doing my utmost to fulfill every duty connected with the office."

"It will be my endeavor to see all residents of the county and ask them personally for their votes and support. To each of you, I would like to say thank you very much for your consideration in my behalf."

## STOCK SALES BOOMING IN CANADIAN

Stock in a newly-formed corporation in Canadian is rapidly being bought by Canadian professional men. The company will build rental housing units.

The proposed capital of \$50,000 is being raised through the sale of stock priced at \$100. per share. At the present time, more than half the shares have been purchased.

The organizers of the company, Tom Abraham, Gilbert Dickens, and Erbin Crowell, hope to begin building by the middle of January, or soon after this date.

Houses built by the corporation would be in the \$7,500 to \$8,000 class. Most of these are three bedroom with central heating. The monthly rental would be about 1 per cent of the building cost. This would enable the project to be paid for in about two years.

After the initial money is pledged, stockholders will meet and elect a board of directors empowered to borrow money and enter into buying and selling agreements.

## Census Questionnaires Are Being Mailed To Area Farmers

Questionnaires for the 1959 Census of Agriculture are now in the mail and will be in the hands of local farmers within a few days, it was announced today by Field Director James W. Stroud of the Census Bureau's regional office at Dallas.

The farm census questionnaires are being mailed from Chicago, Illinois with the distribution timed so that the report forms will reach farmers about a week ahead of the date when census takers will begin the field canvass. The advance mailing is for the purpose of giving farm operators time to consult their records before filling in the answers required by the questionnaires and getting ready for the census takers to pick up. This procedure is designed to insure greater accuracy of reporting and to save time both for the farmer and the census taker when the latter calls at the farm.

The 1959 Census of Agriculture questionnaire is designed to provide information on the number and size of farms, acreage and harvest of crops, livestock production and inventories, selected farm facilities and equipment, selected farm expenditures, farm values, and mortgage debt. On the average, each farmer is asked about 100 questions, many of which can be answered by simply checking "yes" or "no."

Judge Goodrich denied the bond Ruff was returned to the Wheeler County jail where he will await his trial which will be held sometime in January.

It looked like fourth down and too many yards to go Saturday evening when a plucky but undermanned team of youth took the field for C. R. O. P. Came 7:00 o'clock and kickoff time and it looked like a six man affair—four boys and two girls. The rooting section was almost as ragged. Six Kiwanians were in the stands and two preachers on the sidelines to help with ceremonies. There was neither water boy nor chain gang. It was a crucial game with the benches empty.

There wasn't much hope, but a preacher said a prayer, the whistle sounded, and the game was on. With such depleted ranks the field was divided in half from north to south at the onset. Main street to the east side of town

became the playing field for the first quarter. Then a couple of rooters went out recruiting. The game was too tough for six kids without a single replacement. Anything that could carry a ball regardless of age and size was to be drafted. And drafting wasn't an easy thing with time the crucial factor and it running out. But heroic efforts and sheer courage doesn't acknowledge defeat when the cause is right.

Six shavers were eventually conscripted and the field was enlarged to include the whole of Wheeler. A full scale offensive was launched. The plays were well mixed-door bell ringing, right down the center, telephone calling for off-tackle gains, end runs that skirted the sidelines

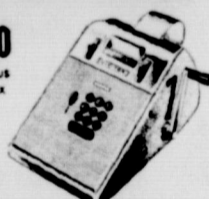

**CLAUDE WINS OVER MUSTANGS**

CLAUDE, Nov. 6 — Claude's fired-up Mustangs gave promise of giving Groom's defending champion plenty of competition for the District 1-B title by stampeding past Wheeler, 20-8, Friday night.

Trailing 8-6 halftime, coach F. G. Crofford's Mustangs unleashed a pair of fast-stepping halfbacks, Robbie Bartley and Carroll Watts to score two quick touchdowns following intermission to ice the contest.

The victory gave Claude a 4-0 record in conference play while Wheeler was knocked out of title contention with its second straight loss. Groom, also undefeated to league play, will travel to Claude next Saturday to decide the District championship.

Watts, a 130-pound scabback, sparked Claude's go-ahead scoring drive with a 25-yard sprint to Wheeler's eight. Bartley broke through tackle on the next play and squirmed his way into the end zone. Bartley threw to end Dale Dunn for the conversion with only two minutes gone in the second half.

After Wheeler was promptly forced to punt, Watts provided Claude with an insurance tally two plays later. The junior halfback broke into the open around end and cut back to midfield to out-distance the final two Wheeler defenders and scored on a 55-yard run.

Bartley, who gained 81 yards in 12 trips, sprinted 75 yards into the end zone midway in the last period but a clipping penalty denied the Mustangs the score.

Claude broke the scoring ice in the first five minutes by marching 35 yards. The Mustangs' drive was delayed by a 15-yard penalty but Bartley shot a pass to Dickie Eddleman in the end zone for a seven-yard scoring play. Eddleman's conversion attempt failed.

Wheeler went ahead after driving 52 yards in 10 plays. Fullback David Tremble galloped the last 19 yards. A conversion pass from Jim Jolly gave the visitors an 8-6 lead at the midway point.

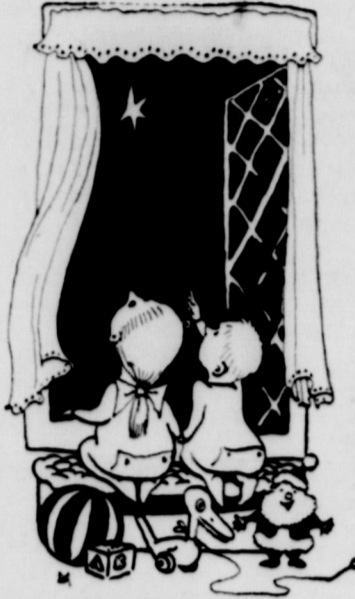

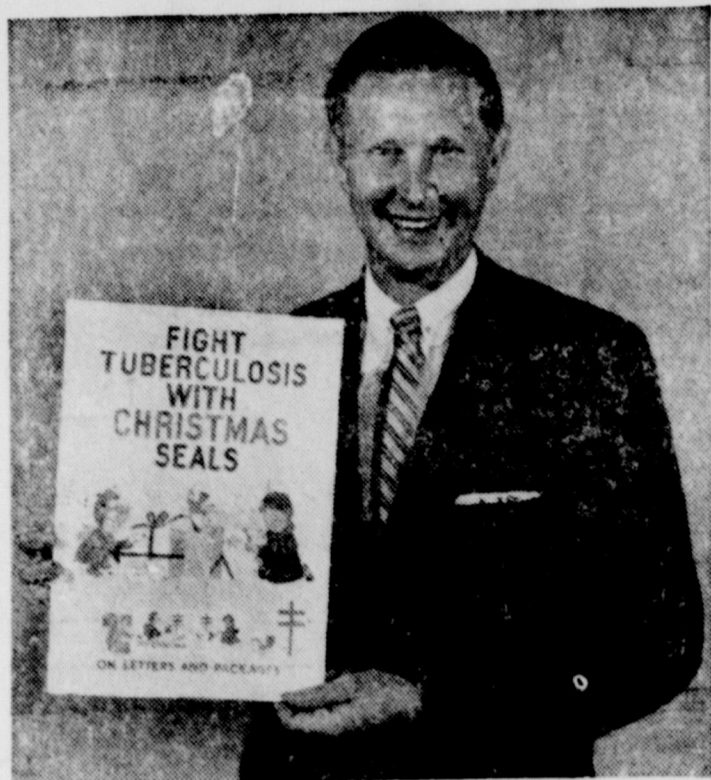

**HOME DEMONSTRATION NEWS**

Home Demonstration Council will not meet on November 18 as scheduled.

The agent is attending a semi-tailoring workshop in Panhandle this week. This training is the latest methods of semi-tailoring. Plans have been made for a special interest group in the county on semi-tailoring during the early part of 1960.

The holiday seasons of Thanksgiving and Christmas are only a few weeks away, your interest in buying turkeys is probably greater at this time of the year than at any other. The homemaker should consider a number of things before buying.

How big a turkey should you buy? This will largely depend upon the number you expect to serve and reaction of family members to eating leftovers. You should keep in mind that for each person served you will need about 3/4 pound of oven-ready turkey for a generous allowance.

Now that you have decided upon the size turkey to buy, you should consider the quality you want. Best quality turkeys are designated as grade "A", will have an even covering of fat over the entire bird. They will be broad breasted with bulging thighs and large drumsticks. Turkeys with these qualities have a maximum percent of meat to bone and thus give more edible meat for your dollar spent. In addition to the previously mentioned qualities that determine grade, you should select a turkey without blemishes, such as torn skin and bruises.

Look for the inspection and grade tag on the turkey you buy. Turkeys that have been inspected for wholesomeness under USDA supervision will have a tag, either metal or paper, attached to them which states that the turkey has been inspected for wholesomeness and it will have the prefix U. S. on the shield. The tag is usually attached to the wing. If the turkey has been graded, which indicates quality, under USDA supervision, it will likewise have a tag attached. This quality is indicated by the letters "A", "B" or "C", "A" indicating top quality. If the turkey is both graded and inspected under USDA supervision there may be only one tag on the turkey but it will show both the grade and the inspection for wholesomeness. There may be, however, two tags, one indicating wholesomeness and the other grade. You should remember that an inspection tag for wholesomeness does not indicate the grade of turkey you buy. In addition to suggestions of buying tips, here is a helpful suggestion on cooking. Allow 15-20 minutes per pound of oven-ready turkey weight. A 325° oven temperature is recommended. The larger the turkey—less time per pound will be needed for cooking.
