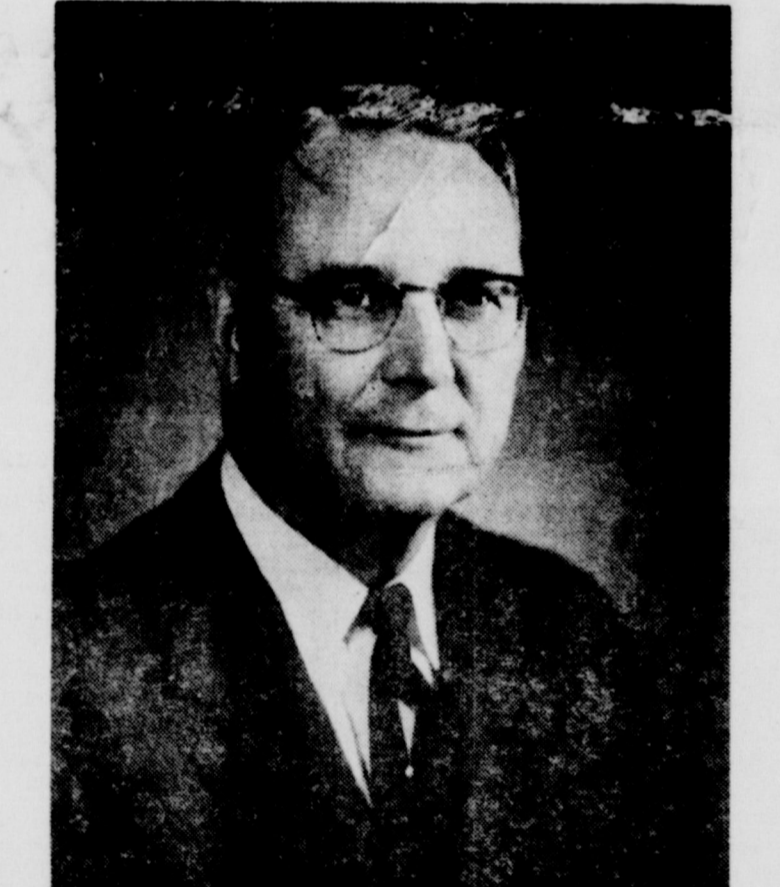
Special services will be held in the "Full Gospel" Assembly of God Church in New Mobeetie according to the pastor Rev. J. P. Holder.

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## HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS

AUSTIN, Tex.—First of the political headquarters signs will be set up before the Christmas lights.

An executive committee, formed to steer the Johnson-for-President drive, is opening a state headquarters in downtown Austin. Goal of the state office is to add to the 60 or more county clubs for Johnson and eventually to expand into a national operation.

With two exceptions, the state's top Democratic brass is on the committee. Gov. Price Daniel and Speaker Sam Rayburn are honorary co-chairmen. Plans were announced by Ed Connally, chairman of the State Democratic Executive Committee, and Byron Skelton, national committeeman.

Not on the committee are the state's junior senator, Ralph Yarborough, and national committeewoman, Mrs. R. D. Randolph. Both, long identified with the party's liberal wing, have hedged questions on their presidential

preferences.

**TIGHT SCHEDULE**—A possible time table for filling the three vacancies in the Legislature was set up by Atty. Gen. Will Wilson when Governor Daniel asked him for an opinion on the election law.

Forty days would be needed between the time the election is called and the time the new officials could take office, according to Wilson. This allows a required 35 days between the call and election day, two days for Commissioners Courts to canvass the votes and three days for county judges to certify the results to the secretary of state.

Law does not require that all seats be filled in order to have a session, Wilson commented. But he said he felt it would be especially desirable if more taxes are to be voted because of the old American principle of no taxation without representation.

Governor Daniel has discussed calling a special session in January to raise money for teacher salary increases.

**INSURANCE PLAN DEBATED**—Impact of a big change in auto insurance rates, due to take effect January 1, is a prime discussion topic among insurance circles as well as the motoring public.

Under the merit plan, drivers with no record of accidents or moving traffic violations for three years get a reduced rate. Others pay on a sliding scale up to double the usual rate, depending on the number and seriousness of their accidents and violations.

Opinions on the plan vary widely. Among them:

(1) It will make drivers more careful.

(2) It will make clear to the driving public the direct relationship between accidents and cost of insurance.

(3) It will cause "bad" drivers to drop their insurance.

(4) It will result in more hassles over who was to blame for an accident. (Only the driver held responsible gets his insurance hiked.)

(5) It will flood the courts with contests over traffic tickets.

(6) It will be declared illegal because of the "double jeopardy" principle. Some lawyers reason that the driver is punished for his violation once when he pays a fine and cannot be punished again with higher insurance rates.

Sen. George Parkhouse of Dallas recently predicted that merit rating would result in such an overflow of traffic cases that new courts would have to be created and new buildings to house them.

Others have complained that traffic laws and their enforcement are not uniform and that some drivers—victims of speed traps, for example—will be penalized. Answer to this, says Insurance Board Chairman Penn J. Jackson, is to work out the wrinkles in law enforcement.

Insurance agents, in meetings and conferences over the state, are honing up on the new procedures, planning how to explain them to their customers.

Although the rules apply after January 1, present policyholders will not be affected until their contracts run out sometime next year.

**TOO MANY IRONS IN THE FIRE**—Duties of Texas' attorney general should be streamlined down to one main job—that of serving as the state's top legal officer.

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson made this recommendation as he and his staff gained new, streamlined office space. Department moved from the west wing of the

Capitol into the top five floors of the just-completed Supreme Court Building.

Wilson said he is an ex-officio member of more than 20 state boards and has to spend nearly half his time at their meetings. Moreover, he said, it makes the attorney general responsible for the activities of agencies over which he has no direct staff control. He cited the Veterans Land Board troubles of several years ago as an example of the problems caused by such a situation.

Wilson advocated strengthening the executive branch of state government by gradually placing more responsibility with the governor. As a starter he suggested having the governor make appointments to replace the attorney general on state boards.

**PENNY SAVED, PENNY EARNED**—A House Economy in Government committee says it has turned up some cost-cutting ideas.

Use of more prison-made products by state agencies was recommended to the committee by O. B. Ellis, director of the prison system. For example, Ellis said prison-made bricks would cost the state much less than it now pays. Also, he said prisoners could do the re-building of school textbooks at a saving of about \$300,000 a year.

Possibility of cutting back the farm-to-market road program was explored by the committee. State

Highway Engineer DeWitt Greer made no recommendation, but said the state is now spending \$78,000,000 a year on building and upkeep of rural roads.

Under the Colson-Briscoe Act of 1949, \$15,000,000 a year is automatically appropriated to build rural roads. None of this can be used for repair which must be paid out of other highway department funds.

Rural road program has exceeded its 1949 goal which was to build 25,000 miles. There now are 31,000 miles.

Board of Control could cut costs by combining its Austin warehousing operations, the executive director told the committee.

**SAFETY AWARD**—Department of Public Safety announced that its annual fleet safety contest was won by DPS Region 3, headquartered in Corpus Christi.

All DPS vehicles are involved in the contest. To win it, the 188 drivers in the Corpus Christi region drove 157 vehicles 4,668,993 miles with only 18 accidents. More than one-third of the accidents occurred during emergency pursuit driving at speeds of up to 105 miles an hour. There were no fatalities.

### Have A Good Lunch



A glass of milk, a cookie or two, a bowl of applesauce—a good light lunch for young and old.

The only way to have a year around supply of applesauce with a real home cooked taste is to make and can it. Comes cheaper that way too. A peck (12 pounds) of apples makes 4 or 5 quarts sauce. Don't let the fact you have never canned anything stand in the way. Here is all you do. Wash, rinse, and drain fresh, sound, tart apples. Remove stem and blossom ends. Cut apples into small pieces and cook until soft. Better add a little water to start cooking.

While apples are cooking, wash, and rinse home canning jars and lids in hot water. Start water heating in canner or kettle deep enough for water to cover tops of jars.


Press apples through sieve or food mill to remove skin and seed. Sweeten sauce to suit your taste then reheat to boiling. Pour hot sauce to within about 1/4 inch of top of jar. Stir sauce with wooden spoon to remove air bubbles. Wipe top of jar. Put dome lid on jar; screw band tight. Put jars into canner. Process (both) 1/2 pts. 10 min., pts. 15 min., qts. 20 min. Remove jars from canner. Let stand about 12 hours. Remove bands and test seal.

## PFC Claude Cox Receives Safe Drivers Award in Germany

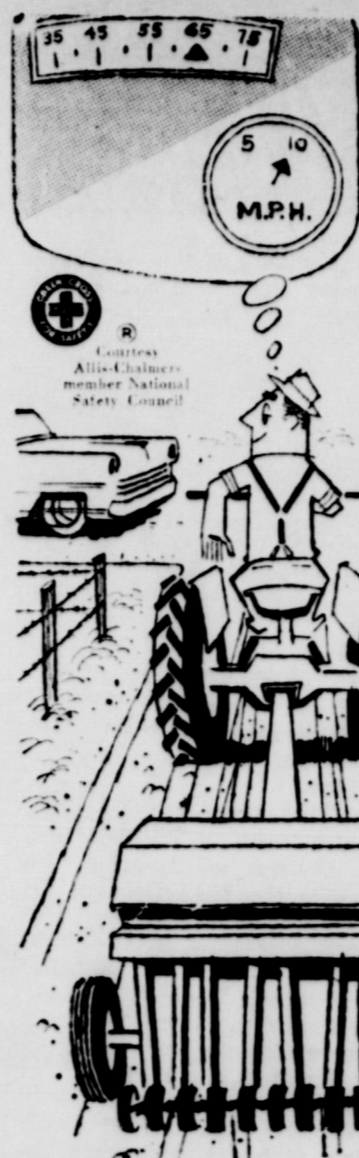
Mannheim, Germany (AHTNC) Army PFC Claude Cox Jr., 23, whose wife, Freida, and parents live on Route 1, Wheeler, Texas, received a safe driver award while assigned to the 51st Transportation Company in Germany.

He won the award for driving military vehicles 7,000 miles without an accident or traffic violation.

Cox entered the Army in October 1958, completed basic training at Fort Carson, Colo., and arrived overseas last March.

He is a 1956 graduate of Wheeler High School. Before entering the Army, Cox was employed by the Harvey's Queen Mills and Elevator Co., Plainview.

it was announced today by Field Director James W. Stroud of the Census Bureau's regional office at Dallas.

Farm census questionnaires have been mailed to all farm operators. The census takers will visit all local farms to collect the questionnaires and, if necessary, assist the farmer in filling out the report form.

The 1959 Census of Agriculture is the 17th in a series of nationwide canvasses, the first of which was conducted in 1840. The census of Agriculture is taken at five-year intervals to provide up-to-date statistical information about the nearly five million farms which supply food and raw materials for manufacture of goods used by the people of the United States, now numbering about 178 million. The current census will yield information on the number and size of farms, acreage and harvest of crops, livestock production and inventories, selected farm facilities and equipment and selected farm expenditures.

The field director emphasized that all information about individuals and their farm operations furnished to the Census Bureau is held in absolute confidence under Federal law. It is used only to provide summary figures such

### 1960 Cotton Referendum:

A referendum to determine whether or not marketing quotas will be in effect for the 1960 crop of cotton will be held December 15, 1959. Polls will be open at 8:00 A. M. and close at 6:00 P. M. Polling places will be:

"A" and "B" Communities-Commissioners Court Room., Wheeler, Texas.

"C" Community Building next door to Atkins Grocery, Mobeetie, Texas.

"D" and "E" Communities-City Hall, Shamrock, Texas.

The referendum issue is the same as in the past years—whether or not there will be penalties for harvesting acreage in excess of the allotment. Allotments will be in effect regardless of the outcome of the referendum. If the referendum carries choice "A" and "B" allotment will again be in effect. 1960 farm allotments will be in the operator's hand well in advance of the December 15th date of the referendum. Farmers and their wives who were engaged in the production of cotton and 1959 will be eligible to vote.

### 1959 ACAP Program

We still have funds available under the 1959 ACP program. Those who would like to chisel their land at a minimum depth of 8 inches and at a spacing of not more than 48 inches, may now make a request for cost-share assistance. The cost-share rate is 75 cents per acre. Remember, all requests for Federal cost-shares must be made before the practice is started.

### New Grower Cotton Allotment For 1960

The County Committee has a small amount of acreage available for New Growers Cotton Allotments.

To be eligible, the farm operator must file an application for a 1960 cotton allotment for a new farm by February 16, 1960. The farm operator must be largely dependent on income from the farm for his livelihood, and the farm operator or farm owner cannot have an interest in any other farm for which a 1960-cotton allotment is established.

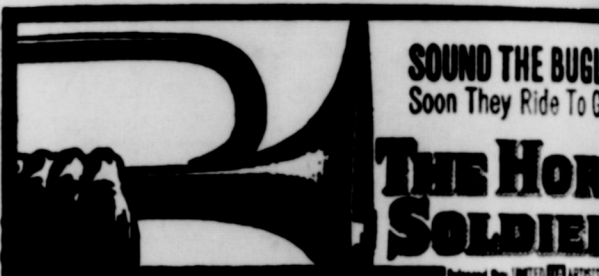
