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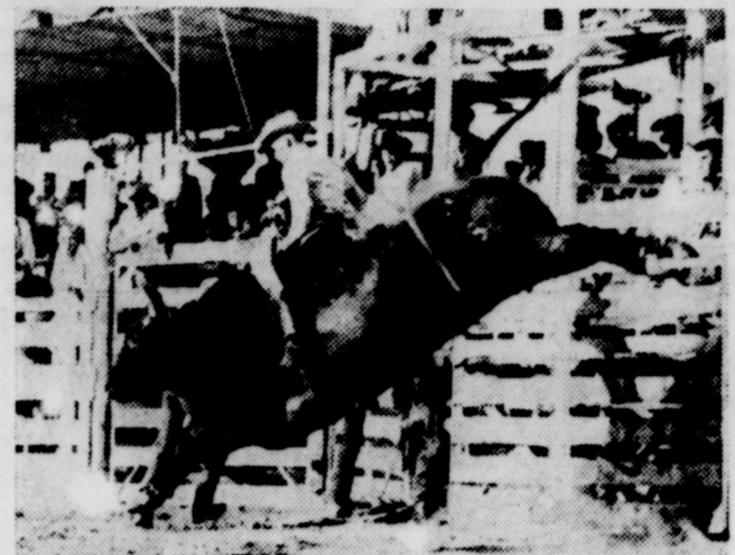

The newly elected president, Lewis Lancaster, was born in May, Texas, July 22, 1917, and graduated from high school at May in 1936. While in high school he played basketball, football and participated on the track team.

After graduation from high school he attended the Daniel Baker College at Brownsville, Texas, where he was married in 1940 to Inez Hall.

In 1942 he entered the air force, following his discharge in 1945, he entered the dry goods business at Odessa, Texas. Lancaster has been manager of the J-Lee Department Store in Wheeler since 1954 with the exception of 6 months spent in Shamrock.

He is a past president of the Chamber of Commerce. Mr. and Mrs. Lancaster have one daughter, Catherine, 14 years old. They are members of the Episcopalian Church.

In outlining the Kiwanis work program for 1960 Lancaster named Arling Cordell as chairman of the Kiwanis Committee on Boys and Girls Work; Gordon Whitenor is chairman of the Key Club Committee; Frank Wofford is chairman of the Committee on Vocational Guidance.

And the very capable George Taylor will head the committee on Agriculture and Conservation. Geo. Gandy was named chairman of the Committee on Public and Business Affairs; the committee on Support of Churches in their Spiritual Aims is headed by Geo. Weems.

Walter Dunn, manager of Cleo Smith Lumber Company, was named as chairman of the Committee on Achievement Reports; David Britt will head the committee on Attendance and Membership.

Tom Britt is in charge of the House Committee; the committee on Inter-Club Relations will be headed by Jack Garrison. Harry Wofford is chairman of the committee on Kiwanis Education and Fellowship; and Grainger McElhany will head the committee on Laws and Regulations.

Dick DeArment will be in charge of the Committee on programs and music.

Social Security Rates Are Higher

"Remember, there is an increase in the social security tax this year," stated Hal Geldon, Manager of the Amarillo Social Security District Office today in discussing the financing of the social security program.

Beginning January 1, 1960, the social security contribution rate is three per cent each for wage earners and their employers, and four and one half per cent for the self-employed. These rates apply to the first \$4800 of earnings.

The Bureau of Old-Age and Survivors Insurance provides protection for most Americans against the hazards of retirement, disability, and death. Geldon stated. Today over thirteen million beneficiaries are receiving over eight hundred million dollars each month in social security benefits, and the beneficiary rolls are increasing with each passing year. The protection afforded by this social security program has become a major factor in our American economy and its continuance depends on the stability and soundness of the old-age, survivors, and disability insurance trust funds. To assure the financing of the program on a sound actuarial basis, Congress, in August, 1958, approved the contribution schedule which provides for the increased rate beginning January 1, 1960.

SERVICES HELD FOR FORMER RESIDENT

Frank Henry Ing, who was a resident of Wheeler Community for over 50 years, passed away Dec. 24, 1959, at Duncan, Okla., where he resided for the past 15 years. At the time of passing he was 92 years, 1 month and 29 days old.

Mr. Ing was born at Old Boston, Texas, October 25, 1867. Monday would have been the 68th wedding anniversary of Mr. and Mrs. Ing.

Mr. Ing owned and operated the telephone exchange at Wheeler and Mobeetie, he also resided on a farm at Vorn Valley.

Mr. Ing was a member of the Methodist Church and a member of the Masonic Lodge.

The body was brought to Wheeler December 25, 1959, by Grantham Funeral Home of Duncan, Okla., and funeral services were held at the Wheeler Methodist Church on December 26, 1959, with the Rev. C. C. Lamb, pastor of the Methodist Church of Mobeetie officiating.

Rogue Theatre To Have Cash Drawing

The owners of the Rogue Theatre have announced plans to begin a cash drawing to be held at the local theatre.

Here is the way the drawing will work:

Beginning Jan. 1st, any adult can register — one time only. Their name and number will be put in the hopper. One name will be drawn. Cash award will be given the winner if he is present. Attendance at the movie is NOT necessary to register, but they must be there to win. If they are not there, the money will be kept in the Pot and added to each week.

The first drawing, starting with \$10.00 will be on Thursday night, Jan. 28 and then each subsequent Thursday. Anyone coming to the show on Wednesday night will register and will be entitled to the money if his name is drawn on Thursday night.

Plan To Retire; Contact Social Security Office Early

The person filing for social security payments can help speed the receipt of his first check, according to Hal Geldon, Manager of the Amarillo Social Security office.

Geldon advised that all persons intending to retire should contact the Amarillo social security office one or two months before actual retirement. They should bring with them the papers necessary to establish their rights to benefits. These include the social security card, proof of age, and proof of earnings for last year. Proofs of earnings can be W-2 form or, if the person was self-employed, the income tax return with Schedule C or Schedule F and the cancelled check with which the self-employment tax was paid. If the retiring person's wife is 62, she should bring proof of her age. Also, if there are any children under 18, their birth or baptismal certificates, or other proof of age, should be furnished.

Bringing these records, Geldon said, will save the individual time and trouble. Most of all, it will help insure that his first social security check will arrive soon after retirement.

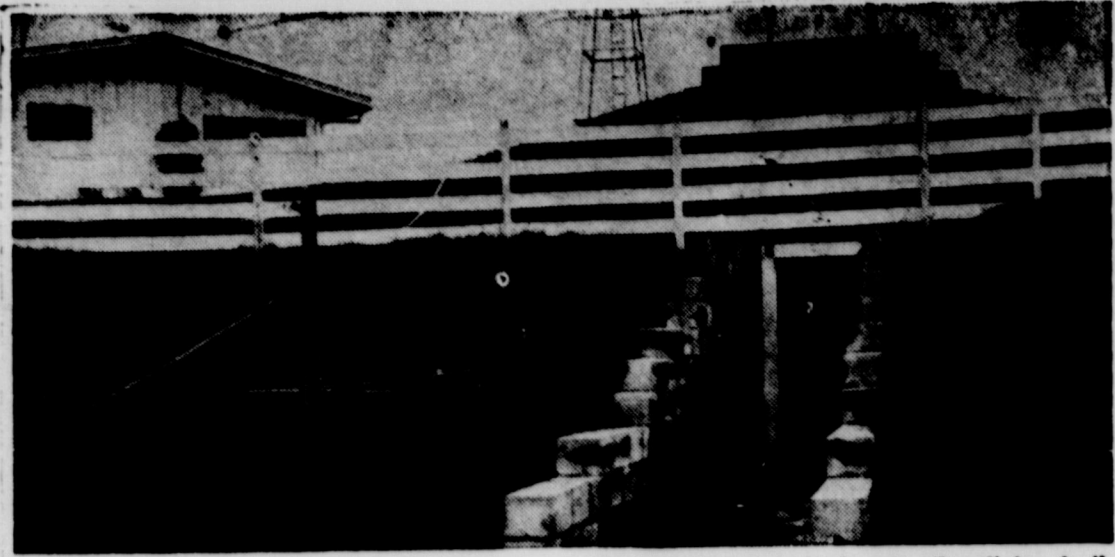

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS FROM YOUR STATE CAPITAL

AUSTIN, Tex. — As the year draws to a close, it's hard to look backward for looking forward to what so many are sure will be the "silver-lined sixties".
But 1959 was an eventful year. Some of the biggest Texas headlines centered on these happenings:

SPEAKER'S RACE—Suspense became almost unbearable in a hard-fought, down-to-the-wire speaker's race. Waggoner Carr won a second term, 79-71, over challenger Joe Burckett. Now the race is again with Reps. Wade Spilman of McAllen and James Turman of Goben contending for the job in '61.

TAX BILL — It took a marathon meeting of the Legislature from January until August before agreement could be reached on a \$185,000,000 new tax bill. Lawmakers faced, not only the need to cover a \$2418,000,000 budget for the 1959-61 biennium, but a dismaying \$65,000,000 deficit.

Biggest bones of contention were two of Gov. Price Daniel's key proposals: the abandoned property tax, which did not pass; and the severance beneficiary tax on natural gas, which did. Three-fourths of the new revenue comes from selective sales taxes. A number of old sales levies, on autos, cigarettes and liquor, were upped. New ones, including furs, jewelry, air conditioners, phonographs, hotels and motel rentals, were added.

SIGNALS CHANGED—Though it was primarily a "tax session," Legislature passed a number of other laws with wide public effect. Political primaries and conventions will be held in May and June, instead of July and August. Boat owners must register their craft, observe certain safety regulations. City firemen and policemen won shorter hours, and city administrative officials grudgingly juggled their budgets to meet the extra cost. Truckers finally passed a bill they'd been pushing for some years to raise the truck load limit from 38,400 to 42,000 pounds.

TEACHERS' PAY — Question of whether a fourth special session should be called to raise money to increase teachers' salaries was posed but not answered in '59. Governor Daniel said he would leave it to the people to decide. Thus far the decision is not known, except that the governor said if he calls a session, it will not begin until after the Feb. 1 filing deadline for public office.

TIDELANDS — Texas officials went before the U. S. Supreme Court again to fight for state ownership of the tidelands. Texas claims it owns the submerged lands for 10½ miles out. U. S. Attorney General says state ownership extends only three miles. High court's decision is awaited.

NEW BUILDING — A big part of Texas government picked up and moved this past fall from rented quarters scattered over Austin into three new state buildings. Texas Employment Commission Building, State Office Building and State Courts Building were completed within a few months of each other. Earlier the Health Department expanded Archives Building is in construction, and an Insurance Building into a new building. A State is on the drawing board.

AUTO INSURANCE RATES — State Board of Insurance announced new auto insurance rates designed to put the burden of expense on the drivers who have accidents. Plan has stirred up a beehive of controversy. But it is to go into effect, as scheduled, Jan. 1.

LBJ FOR PRESIDENT — State politics was almost swept aside after Speaker Sam Rayburn an-

nounced a Lyndon Johnson for President campaign. Texas party leaders took up the banner, and Johnson clubs spread across the state, covering, at last count, 191 counties. Sen. Johnson says he is not a candidate for president. But he has criss-crossed the state in an energetic "re-election" campaign.

ELECTION CAMPAIGNS — Politicking was rampant as the year ended, but very few candidates have paid their filing fees for statewide offices. Some put off filing until January to avoid competing with Christmas for public attention. Others are awaiting for Governor Daniel to say whether he will seek a third term before he decide whether to stay put or try to move up.

OIL STILL TRICKLING — Texas oil wells will flow only 10 days in January. This production pattern, the same as during December, was ordered by the Railroad Commission after major purchasers' requests ranged from 9 to 11 days.

THREE MILLION JOBS — Texas will enter the 'sixties with more than 3,000,000 employed in non-farm jobs. Employment gained 7,000 over November to push the total at mid-December to 2,969,800, the Texas Employment Commission reported.

Attainment of the 3,000,000 figure was expected by late December, the report said.

ANOTHER TAX STUDY — State taxes will undergo another study by a nine-member legislative and layman committee. Particular attention will be directed at property taxes and the new taxes adopted in the recent sessions.

Sen. William S. Fly of Victoria, who was chairman of the tax study committee for the past two years, was named to head the new effort. Rep. Frates Seeligson of San Antonio will again be vice chairman as before. A layman, John McKee of Dallas, will also serve again in his previous role as secretary.

Other members of the committee are Sen. George Parkhouse of Dallas; Sen. Louis Crump, San Saba; Rep. Gordon Bristow, Big Spring; Rep. V. L. (Bo) Ramsey, Beckville; Hugo Lorvenstein, Amartillo; Dr. John R. Stockton of Austin.

Hearings will again be heard over the state as during the past two years. They will begin early in 1960.

TEXAS CITIES SELF-RELIANT — Cities of only four other states are more self-reliant than Texas cities, according to a study by the Texas Municipal League.

State assistance to Texas cities amounts to 3.1 per cent of the expenditures of municipal government. States in which the percentage is lower are Missouri, 3 per cent; Kentucky, 1.3 per cent; Montana, 0.9 per cent; and West Virginia, 0.4 per cent. National average is 16 per cent.

INSURANCE PLAN HIT — You may pay more, or less, for your automobile insurance after January 1. Everything hinges on your driving record. But the new system is being challenged.

Sen. Grady Hazlewood of Amartillo has leveled a barrage of criticism at the merit rating plan. Under the system, drivers are assessed rate increases for accidents and moving traffic violations occurring during the three years preceding the payment of the premium. Drivers with flawless records get a 20 per cent reduction.

Hazlewood complained that the application of the plan to past offenses was unfair. He said lack of uniformity in traffic law enforcement is also unfair to drivers in strict enforcement areas.

Law requires the Board of Insurance to call a hearing within

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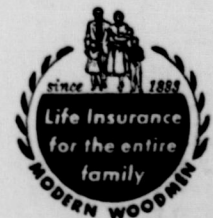

Q: "Is there any way of making thick ankles look thinner?"

A: Yes, you can do this by wearing the right type of shoes and avoiding certain pitfalls that only tend to exaggerate their width. Here are a few don'ts and do's on the subject:

Don't focus undue attention on them by wearing ankle bracelets, heavy socks, or shoes with tongues that come high over the instep.

Do wear pumps that are cut low on the instep to give an impression of length between the ankle and the vamp of the shoe. When the distance between the ankle and the vamp is longer than the width of the ankle, this tends to give an appearance of slimmness.



Do wear heels instead of flats. Ankle always look thinner when the foot is slightly raised by a heel.

Do exercise your ankles whenever you're sitting down. Simply rotate your foot in a full circle, first in one direction then in the other. This helps firm the muscles - and can help diminish the width.

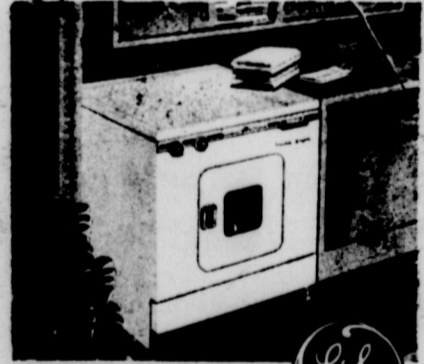

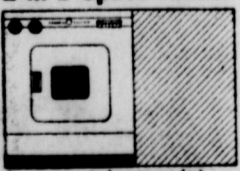
